A LETTER TO OUR BRETHREN AND SISTERS IN INDIA.

SINCE my return from Burmah, I have been spending a few weeks resting at Karmatar, which is a very quiet and restful place. Although not able to do much work I have been able to do quite a lot of reading and have read with much interest our religious papers published in different parts of the world. As I read these papers and watch the trend of events in the world as seen through the religious and secular press, I am more and more convinced that we are living in the generation that is to see the consummation of the Advent Hope. The world-wide message of Christ's Second Coming is going to the world as it has never gone before, and God is guiding the pen of our brethren in different lands with a readiness in bearing the message of this hour in a way that to me is very remarkable.

The reports of the progress of our work as given in the Review and Herald are soul-inspiring. God is greatly blessing the move that has been made in transferring the head-quarters from Battle Creek to Washington. When the move was first suggested, there were many who thought it would be disastrous to the cause, and that the separation of the work at Battle Creek might cause a division among our people. There was a feeling that such a step would necessitate so large an outlay of money as to make it unadvisable from a financial standpoint, but those who were at the head of the work followed the advice of God's aged servant, Sister White, and moved forward fearlessly, believing in God, and their hopes are being realized. There is a general spirit of unity among the zealous believers of the message that is inspiring.

I wish every one of the Sabbath-keepers took the Review and Herald. It comes to us every week freighted with deep spiritual truths and experiences of our people in all parts of the world. The progress which the work at

Washington is making, and the building of the head-quarters there, is reported from week to week. As you perhaps all know, the brethren who are leading out in the work there thought it would be necessary to raise about 100,000 dollars or about 3 lacs of rupees, to establish a Publishing House, Sanitarium and School at Washington, and so to accomplish this they have made a general appeal to our people in different parts of the world to make a donation to this work. It is encouraging to see how loyally our Brethren and Sisters are coming to help in this work. Already as reported in the last Review and Herald over one fourth of the desired fund has been raised.

While at Karmatar, our workers there were talking about the work at Washington and all felt they wanted a little substantial interest in this good work, and so each one gave as he or she was able, and then sent our list down to Calcutta for the Church. Some may say why should we donate to the work in America while there is so much to be done in India? But we must remember that this is a worldwide message and God wants us to be soliberal and large-hearted that we will be as interested in the work in one place as another. Washington is to be the Head-quarters of our worldwork and Sister White has said our people are to remember "that for the present the work in Washington is to be our first interest." For this reason some of our most able men are throwing their best interests into this work.

Shall we not give something toward this fund? I am sure it will be a means of increasing the interest of our people in America in the work in India. It will thrill their hearts to know that there are loyal souls in this land, whose hearts are interested in the same grand work. The sooner our work is established in Washington, the sooner will more means and more men be sent to other lands to hurry forward the proclamation of this truth in the dark corners of the earth. Every rupee that we give toward this work, will bring one hundred from without to speed forward the

evangelization of India. So let us, brethren, give something, no matter how small it may be. Much has been given to us—a truth which is to be our means of salvation. Let us learn to give as we have never done before.

In recent letters from the Mission Board of America, we are given definite assurance that a contingency of workers will reach India the coming cold season. The Board tells us that India is to be made first in receiving recruits. From letters received from Brother and Sister Quantock and Brother and Sister Burgess, we expect that they are all at Washington and will do all they can in getting workers for India.

Since writing the first part of this letter I have returned to Calcutta, and find all our workers very busy. The nurses at the Sanitarium are severly taxed to meet the demands upon them. How much we need young men and women of Christian character to connect with the Sanitarium and learn nursing! To care for the sick is a grand work. We hope the time is not far distant when a larger class of young people may take hold of this line of work.

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DEAR Fellow-Workers,

You will no doubt be interested to know something of how we are getting along in our Sanitarium work. It has been quite a difficult undertaking for us to remove from our former premises to our present building, and it has also been a considerable expense to us, but I am thankful to say that we are nearly through with the work now, and I believe that we will be in better shape to do efficient work than we have ever been in the past. The house is, in many ways, better adapted to our work, being farther from the street and containing a larger number of rooms, which are arranged so that they can be divided into different Departments. This will be a great advantage to us. Our Treatment Rooms are more commedious and better fitted.

As I look back over the experience of the past two or three months, we have much to thank the Lord for in the way that things have worked out for us in connection with the moving and settling in our new quarters. The expenses have been heavy, and at times it has strained our finances somewhat, but we have been able so far to meet our obligations, and we are trusting the Lord that he will supply us the means with which to meet our further obligations which will come to us in connection with the settlement of the place.

The workers are all of good courage, I think, and ready to do all they possibly can for the advancement of the interests of the Institution, and this helps greatly in carrying it forward. We have to thank some of our friends and workers for the interest they have shown in our work in a material way by making small donations toward the furnishing of our house. There is much more, of course, that we need in such an undertaking, but we must go slowly and wait for this to come in the way that the Lord may see fit to send it.

Some of our hearers have been so much interested in Present Truths, that they are filled with a desire and zeal to reach out to their brethren and sisters, and have therefore come forward with funds to help me to circulate tracts by post.

During the last month and up to date, I have received voluntary donations amounting to Rs. 22 from the Bengalee congregation for purchasing and sending by post, (1) Sample copies of Oriental Watchman, Good Health and Present Truth Tracts in English, to the English-knowing Bengalee Christians in this city and elsewhere, and (2) Bengalee Tracts published by the local International Tract Society, to the Bengalee Christians who do not know English.

SINCE our last report to the "Tidings," God has been helping and blessing us in the work at Simultala and the district, and we are full of faith and courage to go forward in His Name. During Elder Shaw's last visit, he had the pleasure of baptizing three Santhals, the first-fruits among the Santhals, as far as we know, as Sabbath-keepers. Two were school students and one a young woman, the wife of our school assistant, and thank God they are doing well and studying the message. The young woman will soon be able to read her Bible, although she could not read until lately.

The two newly-baptized students lead the other students on Sabbath days into the villages to sing and preach the gospel and circulate tracts and papers. We also have the Sabbath School lessons translated into Santhali and by the aid of our Prophetic Chart we spend a very profitable hour together.

/In October, we hope to have a visit from Brother Shaw, when he will D. V. dedicate our New Village Church and School-house which has been built by God's help during the past few months and which is situated about 9 miles from the Simultala Mission on the north-east side and right among the Santhals. The fifteen Santhal students from the Training School will go with us to open up the village School work and we hope to locate a newly baptized Sabbath-keeper there after we have started the School./ There have been two inquirers, both Bengalis, requesting baptism during the month and God willing we hope to see them coming out on the Lord's side, and on Brother Shaw's visit one or both may be baptized. I visit one weekly about seven miles away and he comes here weekly. he was here last Sabbath.

We have had nearly 100 sick cases during the past 3 months and a few Cholera cases of which 4 have already recovered, for which we thank God. God bless all of our fellow-workers in India Burma, and Ceylon.
