Reports from the Field

FIELD NOTES

THE readers of the EASTERN TIDINGS will be interested in the following cablegram which I received a few days ago: "Planning to arrive in Colombo, November fifteenth. Daniells." This means that Pastor Daniells will come to India before he goes to China, and thus he reverts to the original plan which of course is better for us, as he will be able to visit a large part of the field before the general meeting in Calcutta. From the reports which reach me from Australia, I see that the Lord is greatly blessing Brother Daniells in his ministry, and is giving him health to do a large amount of work. Aside from his institute work, he is speaking to large audiences in halls and theatres on the events of the hour, especially the world wide movement of the Third Angel's Message, the meaning of the present war, and temperance.

Since the beginning of the war, several have written to me asking if we will now hold the bi-ennial meeting. We are going on with our original plans, and especially now that we seem sure of having with us the president of the General Conference we must hold the meeting, even though we have to plan greater economy in other things. Just now we need the blessing this meeting will bring to us more then all else. We need the spiritual uplift, strength, and courage which we have all been praying will come to us. A united Mission hungering and thirsting for divine power and praying for a greater infilling of the Holy Spirit, will never be disappointed.

We may be able to change the meeting back to the original date, December 18-28, but that will be announced shortly. This change to December would be especially welcome to our workers in Burma, as it would bring it within the Christmas concessions and be a considerable saving in transportation.

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The teachers of the Garhwal school are rejoicing in the first-fruits of their work. Recently, Brother Belgrave wrote me that Banka, one of the oldest boys, who had been with them since the school was started by Brother Burgess, had openly confessed Christ and he was sending him to Najibibad for baptism. Brother Peters, the head master, came down with him, and on Sabbath, October 3rd, I baptised him in the stream that flows just at the boundary of our mission property.

He has been a faithful student, and I believe will continue an earnest Christian. This step, of course, separates him from his family and his friends, but I pray he may be faithful to the end, and that through him many of the people in the hills of Garhwal may hear of the Coming King who is so near at hand. I hope other students in the school may soon follow him as he turns his back on idolatry and follows the Saviour of Mankind.

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While at Najibabad I was glad to find the workers well and hard at work. Brother Budaha Singh, who has recently joined us, I found full of zeal, and going about daily from village to village with the same message that has brought so much joy to his heart. I wish all our young workers were as active as Brother Singh, who is now past sixty years of age. The Sabbath I was with the workers, twenty persons—seventeen Hindus and three Mahommedans— came to the meeting through his invitation.

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The harvest Ingathering number of the Review has reached us, and is truly a beautiful number. Our brethren in America are planning to distribute more than eight hundred thousand copies. They are hoping this will bring to the mission treasury a sum equal to three lakhs of rupees. We have ordered nearly a thousand copies for India, and I hope we will be successful in getting a good sum for our medical dispensaries. This money will be used locally in each division raising it. We felt that if the money were all spent for medical missionary work, we could appeal to non Christians as well as Christians for our work. Last year the mission in Singapore alone got Rs. 1,200 from the Harvest Ingathering number.

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In spite of the war in Europe, which has affected finances and commerce throughout the world, our Home Board is sending out the help we called for. At the outbreak of the war they planned to send six via China, as that way seemed more accessible at that time. The Mission Board has written me that sailings were arranged from San Francisco, for September 26th, as follows: Brother and Sister Burgess, returning; Brother and Sister Blue to take charge of our Indian training school; and Brother and Sister Ludington to connect with the school in Burma.

A letter from Brother Spicer, which just came as we go to press, says: "The outlook for our Indian party seems good. News from India is also reassuring. Evidently, from what we hear, things are quiet in India and whatever activity there is, is on this side of the Empire. This will be good news for the Mission in India, and we feel of greater assurance in landing the new workers in Burma and Calcutta. We are just sending this week the teachers for Jamaica, who will release Brother and Sister Furnival. If matters continue favourable over the Pacific. we shall plan to get these teachers on to you when they have had a chance to visit their home people, perhaps not aiming to reach India before well along in December. I would not be surprised if Brother and Sister Lowry joined them."

This clearly indicates that the Mission Board has confidence that our brethren and sisters in American will rally to their support at this time, when greater demands are being made, and do more than ever before. They believe in this message, and are determined to see it through to its victorious finish.

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Good news comes from Simla. Dr. Menkel writes that four were baptized on Sabbath, the 3rd inst., and that another class for baptism is being formed. He adds, "There is a splendid interest in health work, and we are planning to begin next season with a School of Health, as this offers a means of approaching people who would not respond to an advance along gospel lines." It is indeed enoouraging to see a steady

growth in the church situated at the headquarters of the Indian Empire.

CEYLON

HAVING finished most of Colombo excepting the part recently canvassed by Brother Townend, we came on to Kandy the first of this month. As we look back over the three and one half months spent in Colombo and some of the out-stations, we feel very grateful to our heavenly Father for his care over us, and for the way he has blessed our efforts. During this time the Lord has given me more than seven hundred subscriptions for Oriental Watchman and Herald of Health. We pray him to bless these monthly messengers of truth as they go into the homes of Ceylon during these perilous times.

The month of September was the best in all my experience. My cash-sales for the month were above Rs 550. I secured 248 subscriptions, mostly for Watchman. Some of the Salvation Army workers were asking me last week if I didn't find it hard to get subscriptions since the war began. I gave them a brief report of my work for September, and they were very much surprised and said that I must have some special way of getting at the people. This proves to me the Lord is putting his hand to the work to finish it soon. We have the truth which answers the many questions now perplexing the minds of men; why should we not give it to the world? If the message we have was ever present truth, it certainly is now.

The Lord is blessing our efforts here in Kandy. J have met several of our old subscribers, and they seem pleased with the *Watchman*. One lady told me that she would not be without it. Another person said his father used to subscribe for it and he was very glad for the chance. I think all old subscribers, with two or three exceptions, that I have met in Ceylon, have renewed. So the work goes. We read the different reports of progress in the TIDINGS with great interest. Especially have we enjoyed reading the reports from Bombay.

The climate of Kandy is as near perfection as you will find, I believe. We have a nice place to stay, with friends of the people with whom we stopped in Colombo. Pray for us and the work in Ceylon.

Home Missionaries

THE LOVE OF CHRIST CONSTRAIN-ETH US

WHEN writing to the Corinthians about his work Paul gives us the reason for his zeal, "For the love of Christ constraineth us." The love of Christ dwelling in his heart was so strong that it compelled him to labour untiringly, in season and out of season, through suffering and privation, to manifest to men and women the love of God and to tell of his gift of his only Son for them. The evidence of Paul's love for Christ was his consuming zeal for the salvation of souls.

What is the evidence of our love for Christ? By what may the world know that we are really the people of God? It is not sufficient that we call ourselves the chosen people of God. Other denominations do that, too. There must be something that will prove our claim. As a body, we point to events in our history and work that are fulfillments of prophecy, and claim them as evidence that this movement is of God. But what is it that proves that any individual is really a part of this movement?

"There will be no idler, no slothful one who neglects the work of the Lord, found inside the kingdom of heaven." Here it is plainly stated that to neglect the work of God, is to be excluded from any part with God's people. Such people have shown, by their indifference to the souls for whom Christ died, that they do not love him. If they did, the love of Christ would constrain them to seek and save the lost. "Unfaithfulness to the cause of Christ makes manifest that love is lacking in the human agent. It was the love of Christ that constrained him to come and seek and save that which was lost; but the love of Christ does not seem to constrain those who profess his name, for a death-like slumber is upon the human agents, and the work is hindered by the failure of the human to co operate with the divine."—An Appeal to Our Churches, page 20.

With other new editions, will be one of "Steps to Christ," of three-thousand copies. This book can now be nicely illustrated, we having recently secured a set of the blocks used in the finglish work.

<u>The cool season effort in both Bombay and</u> Calcutta will open Sunday evening, the 25th. We have heard nothing as to the plans for Bombay; but in Calcutta, Theatre Royal will be used for a few services and th meetings are being especially adventised.
