VISITING OUR STATIONS

SINCE the last issue of EASTERN TIDINGS, Brother and Sister Daniells have visited all our mission stations in South, West, and North India, with the exception of Garhwal, in North India. Beginning with South India, we spent Sabbath with Brother and Sister James in Trichinopoly, and with them went to Nazereth, where the school and members of the church gave all a most hearty welcome. Brother Daniells spoke twice, and while there we also had the pleasure of attending their Harvest Ingathering service, and were surprised at the generous manner in which all gave.

After another day at Trichinopoly and a day at Madras, we went direct to Bombay and were made welcome at the home of Brother and Sister Pettit. Here Brother Daniells spoke to the church, both Sabbath and Sunday; the members from Kalyan, Lonavla, and Panvel were also present. On Sunday night when he spoke on the Eastern Question, many went away, as all the seats were taken. On Monday, we went to Panvel to see the work carried on by Brother and Sister Kelsey, and a day was spent at Kalyan in visiting the dispensary conducted by Sister Wood and her assistants, and the bungalow, where Brother Daniels spoke to the native workers which Brother Wood has gathered about him.

Friday and Sabbath, November 27 and 28, were spent at Lucknow, Brother Daniells speaking twice to the workers there, and we left Sunday, the 28th, for Mussoorie to visit the school before its close. We were welcomed by Mrs. Bruce, the other teachers, and the students. After seeing the school at work, and visiting the other places where we

carry on work in the summer, we went on to Simla. The meetings in the public hall had been closed for the winter, but Dr. Menkel had fitted up the largest room in their house into a very comfortable place of meeting, and it was crowded by our members and others who are deeply interested, as Brother Daniells told how the message of Rev. 14:6-12 was being fulfilled at the present time. After a day in looking about Simla, we reached Lahore Friday, the 4th. Evening after the Sabbath, in company with Dr. Mann and Brother Loasby, we left for the villages where our work has started, and spent two interesting days among the people. After spending a day visiting the interesting city of Lahore, we left Tuesday night, and, after a brief visit to the places of interest in Dehli, Agra, and Cawnpore, reached Lucknow the 10th. At Agra we spent the evening with Brother Ianes and family.

This brief report of the visit of Brother and Sister Daniells to our mission stations gives little idea of the pleasure and good cheer which it brought to each place, nor of the welcome they received. It has been a great encouragement to our workers and lay members to have the Chairman of the Mission Board personally inspect the work being done at each place where our missions have been planted, and come face to face with the labourers in their daily tasks.

Brother Daniells visited Najibabad this week and has now left for Calcutta. He will visit the stations in Bengal and Burma after the bi-ennial conference.

The Lord calls upon his people to arouse out of sleep. The end of all things is at hand. . . . In the future the earth is to be lightened with the glory of God. . . . Ye churches of the living God, study the promises of the Saviour, and think of how your lack of faith, of spirituality, of divine power, is hindering the coming of Christ. . . . There is to be a rapid and triumphant spread of the 'The Lord whom ye seek, shall suddenly come to his temple.' . . . Who may abide the day of his coming? and who shall stand when he appeareth?"—Mrs. E. G. White, in Review and Herald, Nov. 23, 1905.

THIRD QUARTER, 1914

THE third quarter of this year is past, and as the reports have come in from different schools, the summary will appear in EASTERN TIDINGS.

Each school is to be congratulated on the donations for the three months. The total amount for the the quarter exceeds one thousand rupees which, I believe, is the largest in the history of our work in India. I am sure the Lord will bless the spirit of sacrifice in every individual.

Another school has been added to the list, making nineteen in all. The individuals composing this school first learned of the truth through some literature purchased from one of our Indian canvassers. After some study, they began observing the Sabbath, and thus we have a little Sabbath-school meeting in Pondicherry, week by week. From Garhwal comes the news of the baptism of one of the boys, the first-fruits of the school there. He has had to suffer persecution, but has remained faithful.

The aim and ambition of every school should be to make each quarters's work better

than that of the preceding one. The officers should be carefully chosen; but officers alone cannot make a school. Much depends on the co-operation of the members. Every member can help by being regular in attendance, by punctuality, and last, but not least, by a carefully prepared lesson. I am sure that the officers of a school where such members abound will rise up and call them blessed.

God forbid that any of us should fall into the way of thinking of Sabbath school as a place to go if the mood so appeals to us. On the contrary, let us feel that we must be in our place every Sabbath, unless we have some exceedingly good reason for staying away.

In striving to make advancement from quarter to quarter, let us not forget that the real object of the school is to win souls. No matter how successful the machinery of the schools may be, unless the Holy Spirit dwells in the hearts of both officers and scholars the real aim will not be reached. "We need a life giving power, a zealous enthusiasm, a true animation, that our schools may become filled with an atmosphere of true piety and purity, that there may be real religious advancement; that the fear of the Lord may circulate through the school; that the superintendent and leaders may not be satisfied with a dead, formal process, but may set every agency at work, that the school may become the noblest, most efficient school in the world. This should be the object and ambition of every worker in the school.... What both workers and pupils need is the endowment of the Holy Spirit, that there may not be spasmodic reforms, but a steady growth in grace, a constant accession of spiritual life power."—Testimonies on Sabbath-MRS, S.
