Chapel and Living Quarters for Chuk Un

SOME years ago, in order to help expand the work of the Lord in the Yuen Long district of Hong Kong, a house was rented in Chuk Un, five miles from the Yuen Long Church. This building was to be used as an evangelistic center as well as a place of worship for Sabbath services.

Many of the people in this area are refugees who came out from China. Most of their children do not have opportunity to attend school. With this in mind, a school was opened for them and 80 students enrolled. Through the school and the evangelistic meetings each year a number were added to the church. As the work progressed the need for a permanent building for worship grew. God led in the discovery of a piece of land 7,000 square feet in area and well located for a church site. Upon inquiry it was found that several denominations were interested in securing this property. Fortunately a friend who was the father of one of our students was able to assist in our purchase of this land.

We are indebted deeply to Brother and Sister Anderson, who are the parents of Mrs. William Hilliard. During a good part of the development of the work in Chuk Un, Pastor William Hilliard was president of the Hong Kong-Macao Mission. The generous financial assistance of the Andersons helped provide the funds for the erection of three buildings on the site, a chapel, a school, and living quarters.

ULY 17, 1966 was a memorial day to the three teachers and about 90 students of the Goshen Adventist Primary School in Sabah. It was a "Tamau Besar" day. They were given notice by the local educational authority that schools from all over the district would put out an exhibition on arts and crafts. Both teachers and students got busy to prepare for this eventful day. Different kinds of arts and crafts were made.

At 9:30 a.m. the "Tamau Besar" was declared open by one of the political leaders of that district. Sabah visitors from far and near flowed into the various departments of the exhibition.

The Goshen School won four prizes, two first prizes on painting and bamboo crafts respectively, one second prize in woodwork, and one third prize in basketry.

Christian Education for Alejandro

"I RATHER have Christian education or none at all," wrote Alejandro D. Egarle, 1966 graduating class president of Mindanao Mission Academy, after he passed the examination for a five-year scholarship grant in engineeriing offered by the Philippine Packing Corporation in April. Of the more than 60 top high school graduates from all over the Visayas and Mindanao who took the battery of tests, he ranked fourth, thus putting Mindanao Mission Academy in the limelight.

After the results were ascertained, Father Mooney of the Xavier University in Cagayan de Oro City, chairman of the examinations committee, wired Alejandro to report to his office on Saturday, April 23, for an interview. Alejandro did not report for this interview, it being the Sabbath, but was able to make it on another day due to a special request for consideration by the school principal, Pastor R. C. Ferrer.

During the interview, Father Mooney and the two other priests present were impressed by Alejandro's alert mind and his ability to speak in English fluently. This led them to inquire who his teachers were in English, and especially in Physics and General Science which two subjects he topped during the examinations. Just before the interview ended, Father Mooney asked, "And now, Alejandro, is there any thing that may prevent you from availing yourself with this scholarship opportunity?"

At this, perplexing thoughts flooded the mind of Alejandro. The scholarship grant stipulates that he had to take the course at La Salle College in Manila. He had to be a boarding student in a Jesuit-operated school where the students make the sign of the cross at the start of each activity or class, and where he had to attend classes on Sabbath in order that he could maintain his grades as expected of scholars. And when he graduates, he would have to be employed by the Philippine Packing Corporation and thus be obligated to work during Saturdays. And would he be willing to miss the privilege of associating with his Adventist friends

and fellow students in Mountain View College where he had planned to study? Would he exchange Christian education which prepares for service in God's cause and for the coming of Jesus for a five-year scholarship grant and future financial security?

At last, Alejandro answered, "Sirs (forgetting that he was addressing priests who were used to being called 'Father'), yes, there is one thing that might hinder me from availing myself with this scholarship, and that is my Sabbath. I believe in the eternal principles of God, the Ten Commandments. I am a Seventh-day Adventist."

Alejandro was then asked to return the following day. When he did he was informed that he could not be given the coveted five-year scholarship!

Who is this Alejandro Egarle to turn down such a rare opportunity? Did he come from a rich family? Perhaps his brothers and sisters are professionals? No! Indeed not! Alejandro Egarle is an orphan whose parents died when he was a small boy. From the time that he was in the second grade until he finished his elementary course, he had to work as a houseboy in order to go through school. As a working student, he studied in Mindanao Mission Academy until he finally completed his secondary course last May through sheer determination and faith in God. As I write this story, he is still in Mindanao Mission Academy working in order to fully pay his debts to the school.

Several weeks ago, I was at the Academy. I will never forget what

Alejandro said to me then. "Pastor, only God knows what is ahead. I will work my way through college even if I have to do it in ten years. I know I cannot afford to be a doctor for I am poor. But I will take the teaching course so that someday I, too, can help prepare more doctors, nurses, ministers, and teachers for the service of God."

In my possession at present is the Gold Eagle Award medal granted to Alejandro by the Insular Life Educational Foundation which entitles him to take another scholarship examination offered by the Insular Life Assurance Company. Any student passing successfully the examination would receive a fiveyear scholarship grant which would give him the right to take any liberal arts course in any university or college in the Philippines, including Mountain View College or Phil-

ippine Union College. But this again was lost by Alejandro just because he could not conscientiously take the scholarship examination on a Sabbath.

Commenting on this later, Alejandro said, "Pastor, I would not dishonor my God for just a five-year scholarship grant. What can a man profit?" Then with a faraway look in his misty eyes, and a confident smile on his face, he handed to me his bronze medal and added, "Pastor, I want you to keep this Gold Eagle Award until I finish my college course. I feel that I don't deserve it. But on that day I receive my diploma, kindly give it back to me, for then it will be a symbol of my success and victory for standing steadfastly for Jesus. It will then be a constant reminder of what Christian education has done for me.'

Lawyer Directs Bible Schools and Branch Sabbath Schools

COMING from a third generation of Seventh-day Adventists in Sindangan, Zamboanga del Norte, Philippines, Attorney Mariano Macias, grandson of Elder Tiburcio Singuillo of Sindangan Church, recently directed a big scale program of branch Sabbath Schools and Vacation Bible Schools in spite of his crowded program as a lawyer.

In connection with his Branch Sabbath schools, the attorney directed three Vacation Bible Schools around Sindangan town, utilizing the active young people of the local church. There were 150 children, out of more than 200 who enrolled, who finished the entire VBS course and were given their certificates. A colorful "graduation night" was held in Sindangan's Magsaysay Town Hall, attended by hundreds of non-Adventist parents. Elder P. M. Diaz, President of the Western Mindanao Mission, was the speaker.

The healing of a mentally deranged 17-year-old girl, Bonifacia Romano, was a big surprise to the people of the town of Sindangan. This girl had enrolled in the Vacation Bible School in barrio Goliyo in a very untidy condition. As she attended classes day by day, rapid

Pilot School Inspires Laymen in Mindanao

THIRTY LAYMEN from the three provinces that compose the newly organized Northeastern Mindanao Mission received their certificates in Butuan City after five days of a rigid program of instructions, class work, and examinations during this first pilot school ever to be conducted since its mission organization.

Leading out in this six-day program were L.A. Secretary, R. G. Garcia, and L. A. Yutuc of the S.P.U.M., assisted by D. A. Brion and T. C. Cabaluna, leaders in the local mission.

Host to this active group, cream of the mission's laymen's force, was the Butuan City Church. With its 94 members participating in various working committees, the church truly contributed much to the success of this school.

The Mission's four districts were well represented. Lower Agusan had the most number of delegates, 17. The rest were Upper Agusan 4, Surigao del Norte 5, and Surigao del Sur 4.

Montano Morales, a layman from Surigao, reported a total of 154 souls won to the Master during the past five years with the rest winning 173 souls for the same period. Their goal for the rest of the year is 100 souls.

Celestino Silagan, another active layman from the coastal town of Cagwait, Surigao del Sur, is barely three years in the faith. He is dedicating all his time visiting churches, promoting church schools, and giving Bible studies. His father, a Catholic leader, could not resist his son's dedication to the work and was baptized in December, 1965. The father, now in his 80's, is proud to have one self-supporting missionary among his 11 children, only two of whom have not yet accepted the faith.

Thrilling soul-winning experiences included the story of a drunkard, who after despising the message and bragging there was no God, found the truth after having been awakened one night by an angel that appeared to him as a woman who emphatically rebuked him for his evil doing.

Two young men now enjoying the message trace their conversion when they first heard the song. "It Was Alone the Saviour Prayed" sung by two of our people coming home by banca from a Sabbath meeting one afternoon.

It is hoped that the pilot school will result in much more zealous missionary work in our churches.

Firmo Marcilla and his wife, Dory, came to Davao City a year ago. This is their latest move since serving at Manila Sanitarium & Hospital, Central Luzon Mission, and also Southern Luzon Mission. Being an accountant in the South Philippine Union, one would hardly think that this family should be a soulwinning family. Yet accountants can be soul-winners.

Brother Marcilla and family were assigned Crossing Durian Church as their home church. When they came, the church had just a handful of members. Missionary work was at a standstill and old members were either moving out or staying passively and participating as little as possible.

West Indonesia

Record Total of 2,158 Baptized in One Day in West Indonesia Union

SHORTLY after the Far Eastern Division council voted to set a general baptismal date for 1966, Pastor Clinton Shankel, then the West Indonesia Union Ministerial Secretary, launched a union-wide evangelistic program. Posters were printed and sent out to each church with the outline for evangelism included. All local missions, as well as organized churches, were encouraged to take part. A goal of 1,500 baptisms for May 14, 1966 was set. However, following the local mission sessions, this figure was raised to 1,700.

So it was that shortly after the West Indonesia Union Session scores of evangelistic meetings were started simultaneously throughout the island field. As time went on a spirit of evangelism swept through the churches. Reports began to come in of hundreds of people joining baptismal classes.

By the time the baptismal date arrived some 125 evangelistic meetings had been held, and many estimates of baptisms were sent into the union office. We hardly dared believe these figures for they were far beyond the goal that had been set. Also there was the political upheaval which was sweeping the country that some felt would militate against the work. God's hand, however, was revealed in a marvelous way.

When the final reports came in from the missions the total baptismal figure for May, 1966 had reached 2,158. The large number of souls who had taken their stand for the Saviour on this one date far exceeded the total number of baptisms reported in any previous 12month period in the history of the West Indonesia Union. The previous high for one calender year had been reached in 1965 when 1,804 souls were baptized.

Since there are some 100 million Mohammedans in Indonesia, we were especially anxious to know how many Moslems had actually been baptized on this one Sabbath. When it was reported that of this 2,158 souls baptized some 749 were former Moslems, how we rejoiced and thanked the Lord for His many blessings! Just three years ago our total baptism for one year had not been much more then this. Surely we can exclaim, "What Hath God Wrought."

No doubt the largest baptism held on this day was in Djakarta, the capital of Indonesia. At the swimming pool in the Sukarno Stadium some 2,000 people gathered to witness the scene as 289 persons were baptized by 19 officiating ministers. Reporters from the local TV station were on hand to film this event. Later it was shown on television throughout Djakarta and West Java.

Three of our eight local missions exceeded 600 souls baptized for this one Sabbath. These were East and West Java, and the North Sumatra Missions. Already during the first 2 quarters of 1966 the North Sumatra Mission has almost doubled any previous 12 months record! With the 2,561 baptisms in the first 6 months of 1966, the membership of the West Indonesia Union Mission stands just under 17,000. Please pray that these precious souls will be faithful until Jesus comes, and that many more may yet take their stand with God's remnant people.

Sitompuls Return to Indonesia

PASTOR Pangarisan Sitompul, his wife and three children have returned from Beirut, Lebanon to Djakarta, Indonesia. They have spent three school years in Beirut, the capital of Lebanon, taking graduate work. After hard work, and by God's help, they were able to finish their studies. Pastor Sitomoul received his Bachelor of Divinity degree with a major in Islamic studies from the Near East School of Theology. This theological in-

Public Evangelism Reaps Results in Semarang District of Indonesia

DURING the months of September, October, and November, 1964, Pastor A. Tambingon, District Pastor of Semarang, held a series of evangelistic meeting in Semarang. His assistants were Djie Joe Siang, MV Leader; N. D. Langi, Bible Worker; and the members of the Karangbalong and Semarang churches.

One of the Sabbath School members, who is a baptismal candidate and a worker in the glass factory that belongs to Souw Tiouw Tjien, Semarang church elder, is Brother Sumardi from Jogjakarta. Brother Sumardi invited his friends to attend these meetings and one of them was Sadino, a government high school student in Semarang.

Brother Sadino became very interested in our doctrines that were given in these meetings. He had never heard anything about this before as he was a Moslem since childhood. After he realized that Jesus Christ is the Saviour of this sinful world, and that the Sabbath is the sign of the power of God, he took his stand to keep the Sabbath holy and did not go to school on the seventh day. He faced many hindrances but in spite of all these he passed the final examination with success.

The friendliness of the workers and members also forced him to

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study the Christian truth better and at last he was baptized on December 12, 1964, in Semarang with 10 others including Brother Sumardi.

During the Christmas vacation of 1964 Brother Sadino went home to his village with a burning desire to tell others the wonderful things he had learned. He remembered clearly the Bible Studies and advice given by N. D. Langi. He told him to bring this message of truth to his family and friends after he was baptized. Mrs. Langi asked him to paint the pictures for the children's Sabbath School during the holidays so each night he worked on these pictures. Friends who came to visit questioned him about what the pictures represented and he made good use of this opportunity.

His answers to the questions were blessed by the Lord and soon his home became the center of questionings. His friends took these truths back to their parents and families and many came to question him also and hear his answers both Christians and Moslems. Because the number kept increasing and he himself was still young in the truth he sought the help of our church elder in Solo, Kwik Sien Tjay, and the church pastor.

On January 10, 1965, an effort was started in Brother Sadino's village, Wiragunan Kartasura, with more than 100 youth and adults in attendance. Everyone did what they could to make the effort a success. They raised the entire budget for these meetings with no additional help necessary from the local mission.

Four months later there were 25 souls ready for baptism and keeping the Sabbath. Of this amount, 75% were high school students who didn't attend school anymore on Sabbath in spite of the protests and persecutions of their parents, teachers, and friends.

Because of this the people were divided into two groups, the ones who were in favor of the meetings and the ones who were against them. They did all they could to stop the meetings and even forced Mr. Resodihardjo (the owner of the house where we conducted the meetings) to forbid us to use his house. The brethren who were interested spent several days in prayer in the house and also the Solo church members met for special prayer each Wednesday and Sabbath for this reason. Our mighty God did more than answer the prayers. Mr. Resodi-

hardjo let us use his house for the meetings without any charge and said that under any circumstance the meetings should go on because the lessons presented were the truth from God. At the same time the chief of the village returned from some government meetings held in Magelang and the next day announced that religion is free and everybody is free to choose his own religion and not to bother others and that the government will take action against those who were caught disturbing the meetings. Pastor Rifai Burhanuddin from the Rumah Sakit Advent in Bandung also spoke at the wedding ceremony of Mr. Resodihardjo's daughter where the author had the opportunity to introduce him as a Seventh-day Adventist pastor who was a former Moslem schoolteacher. Many hearts were softened by all this and by the change in attitude of the young people in their homes.

Six months later the church board voted to accept the 36 baptismal candidates and the baptism was held in the pool of Susuhunan X (Title of ruling prince of Central Java) Surakarta (see picture) and 23 of these were former Moslems.

From January-September in the Solo district alone we baptized 70 souls and 43 of these were former Moslems. The following is the summary of the baptisms:

PHILIPPINE UNION COLLEGE REACHES ENROLLMENT OF 1,034 STUDENTS

THE 1966-1967 school year marks the fiftheth anniversary of the founding of Philippine Union College As a fitting climax to the first fifty years of its operations, Philippine Union College has surpassed all previous enrollment records. With the enrollment for the first

With the enrollment for the first semester almost completed, the college enrollment has reached 1,034 — undoubledly making Philippine Union College the first senior college outside of the United States to join the '1,000" club. The enrollment increase has been 25% over last year's figure and would have been higher except that many applications had to be denied. The enrollment explosion has been felt in all departments of the college and none has been spared.

This major increase in population has not been without its problems. It has been necessary to make additional demands of already overcrowded dormitories. Rooms designed for four to six students are

now housing eight to ten students. Worship rooms have been converted into study halls, and the parlors have been transformed into sleeping quarters. Eager students are crowded into homes, garages, and basements. Buildings not intended for living quarters have been pressed into service.

To accommodate the heavy enrollment, additional sections have been opened in many courses and full or part-time staff members have been employed. Laboratory courses have been in great demand, and it has been necessary to purchase new equipment to take care of the additional sections formed. Provision for more lecture rooms is being made through the erection of emergency classroom facilities, using materials secured from nearby Clark Air Base.

All of this proves that Seventhday Adventist youth are eager to secure an education in our schools. Interest in attending Philippine Union College has never been greater. We cannot stop promoting Christian education, even though out doing so can only place an added burden on our already overtaxed facilities. The staff and stu-dent body are confident that it is in God's plan that no Seventh-day Adventist young man or woman should be denied a Christian education. Philippine Union College is looking forward to a future of even greater enrollment as consecrated youth choose the best preparaton for successful living — a college education in a Seventh-day Adventist institution.
