### South Carolina Camp-meeting

THE camp-meeting that has just closed was the largest and best in the history of the conference. Harmony existed in every department, and rich blessings were received by those present. Quite an interest was manifested by the people of the town, and Elders Branson and Webster, and Sister McHugh will remain for a time to develop the work.

Brother Chas. N. Miller, who until recently, has been editor of The Christian Worker, our magazine for the blind, is spending a few days in Spartanburg.

Brother and Sister A. L. Manous have gone to Nashville, Tenn., where he will begin work at once in the Publishing House.

Brother J. M. Swofford is under arrest for Sunday labor. The hearing is to take place at Cherokee, Tuesday, August 8.

Following are the recommendations and resolutions adopted by the conference at the camp-meetings:

Recognizing the leadings and provinences of God in our departmental and field work, and that His blessings have been manifested in a special manuer in the spiritual growth and harmony that prevails, and,—

Whereas, We realize that it is through Him we receive the bounties of nature, and the blessings that have attended the ministry of the Word, and the distribution of our literature, therefore,—

I. Resolved, That we express our thanks to Him for all these blessings, and pledge ourselves to greater faithfulness and devotion to His service. Whereas, We recognize the solemn admonitions from the Lord to educate our children for His service in the schools where the Bible may be made the foundation of all study, therefore,—

2. Resolved, That we urge all our brethren to use their utmost endeavors to send their children to our Southern Training School, at Graysville, when sufficiently advanced to warrant their admission, and to maintain local church-schools for children of the lower grades.

Believing that our church-schools should be well organized and under conference supervision,—

3. Resolved, That we hereby instruct our educational secretary to provide examinations for all teachers, to issue certificates when merited to provide school boards and teachers with contract blanks, daily and monthly report registers, and a course of study outlining the work of each grade, to provide examinations for all students who complete the eight grade, and to issue suitable certificates or diplomas to those who make satisfactory grades.

Whereas, In the recent General Conference Council, at Friedensau, it was decided to ask our people to complete the raising of the \$300,000 Fund by January 1st; therefore,—

4. Resolved, That we take action at once in harmony with this recommendation, and endeavor to raise our quota of this fund by that date.

Whereas, The book and periodical work is a great factor in getting the truth for this time before the people; and,—

Whereas, The testimonies say that where there is one canvasser in the field there should be one-hundred, therefore,—

5. Resolved, That in a practical way we sustain and help to carry forward this important branch of the work,

Whereas, As a conference we are in great need of a supply of suitable tents, both large and small,

6. Resolved, That we make immediate provision for our needs by donations to our Tent and Camp-meeting Fund, and that our officers be authorised to secure as early as possible, one large tent,  $40 \times 60$  feet, with equipment, and sixteen family tents without flies.

Recognizing the great value of the scholarship plan which is offered by

the Southern Training School in cooperation with the Southern Publishing Association, whereby our youth may have opportunity to earn means for attending school through the sale of books and magazines,—

7. Resolved, That our young people be encouraged to take up the sale of our subscription books and ten-cent magazines as a means of defraying their expenses in school, and for the purpose of obtaining a practical experience in field service.

Whereas, The tithe is Heaven's appointed plan for supporting the ministry, and a lack of faithfulness in its payment retards the work, therefore,—

8. *Resolved*, That we urge all our members to be prompt in responding to this important obligation to God.

9. Recommended, That our laymembers take a more active interest in the old time tract and missionary work.

10 Recommended, That every Seventh-day Adventist family in the conference be a subscribers to the Review and FIELD TIPINGS.

Recognizing the necessity of providing as far as possible a definite income for the support of our work in mission fields, and the responsibility as a conference in the world-wide extension of the gospel message, therefore,—

11. Resolved, That in harmony with the recommendation of the General Conference, this conference devote five per cent of its tithe to the support of mission work, the same to be paid through regular channels, and that we approve the action of the conference committee in this matter.

Appreciating the urgent need which exists to provide support for conference workers who have become disabled through age or infirmity, therefore,—

12 Resolved, That in harmony with the recommendation of the General Conference, this conference devote regularly, from year to year, five per cent of its tithe to the Sustentation Fund for this purpose, the same to be paid monthly through the regular channels, and that we approve the action of the conference committee in this matter.

Whereas, There is published at College View, Nebraska, under the direction of the Central Union Comference of Seventh day Adventist, a paper for the blind, known as The Christian Record, containing the mes-

Whereas, This commendable work for those who are deprived of their sight is much in need of financial assistance, therefore,—

13. Resolved, That the South Carolina Conference be encouraged to raise each year an amount equal to ten cents a member for this enterprise.

Whereas, The third angel's message is to go to every nation, kindred, tongue, and people, and,—

Whereas, God has spoken very plainly concerning our duty to the colored people, and,—

Whereas, The Oakwood School is the one school provided for the education of workers for the colored race,

14. Resolved, That we carefully consider this work and encourage it by—,

(a) Recommending suitable persons to attend school;

(b) Patronizing the industries of the school when consistent;

(c) Praying for the students and teachers;

(d) Contributing to the needs of the school.

Believing that our young people should be educated for definite service in the Lord's work, and appreciating the organization of their department into the Y. P. M. V. Society, therefore,—

15. Resolved, That we take a deeper interest in their work, and urge them to take up the systematic studies given in the Reading Course and Standard of Attainment.

In view of the great work that still remains to be done by us, and inasmuch as the council at Friedensau has recommended,—

(1st) That beginning with January 1, 1912, the rate of ten-cents-a-week a member for missions be raised to fifteen cents a week.

(2nd) That a fifteen-cent-a-week fund include all donations to missions except the percent of the tithe appropriated by conferences to missions and such donations as are specifically applied otherwise by the donors,—

16. Resolved, That we adopt this change as above indicated, and that we earnestly carry out the provisions herein stated.

Whereas, Much good has resulted from the work of the Harvest Ingathering,—

17. Resolved, That we enter heart ily into the plans and work this year.

Whereas, The various expenses for carrying on the work in our conference are very heavy, therefore,—

18. Resolved, That we show our loyalty and faithfulness in sustaining the Emergency Fund.

19. Resolved, That we encourage all our people to supply themselves with our denominational books.

20. Recommended, That where funds will allow, conference laborers be settled with in full monthly.

Whereas, The recent efforts to secure religious legislation should be a warning to all lovers of liberty that their rights are herein endangered, and that our only safeguard is the enlightenment of the general public upon this subject, therefore,---

21. Resolved, That we put forth more diligent efforts to educate our legislators, officials, and prominent citizens upon this subject.
