Our Bible worker in Valdosta reports four new Sabbath keepers who have recently taken their stand in that city. An increasing interest demands that we hold a series of meetings there as scon as possible. We hope this can be done soon after campmeeting. At Savannah, five members have been added to the church since our last visit. There are twenty new converts there awaiting baptism. A commodious church building, that will seat three hund red people has been purchased from the Methodists. It is located in one of the best residence sections of the city.

In Atlanta, the series of meetings being conducted by Elder Haynes, in the Broughton Tabernacle, continues with interest. The meetings have now continued for five weeks, and the testing truths of the message are being presented. A high per cent of those who attend are deeply interested, and already a number have taken their stand. Last Sabbath was an especially good day. It was the first Sabbath service held in the Tabernacle for outsidesr. The Spirit of God was manifestly present, which was evidenced by the general response made to an appeal made at the close of the sermon. Practically the entire audience moved forward, signifying their determination to surrender all to God and keep his commandments. mong these were a number of new Sabbath keepers and some backslid-Each of the new ones gave ers. ringing testimonies of their joy for the new light received.

We are encouraged to believe that God has many precious souls in this great city of Atlanta who will come into the light of present truth. Let us hope, work, and pray for the success of the different series of meetings that are now being conducted in our conference.

## Southeastern Union Conference Church Schools

DURING the past school year there have been held in this Union; twenty-five church-schools. This does not include the Southern Training School at Graysville. These schools were located as follows:

Florida, Conference: Fort Ogden, Orlando, Jacksonville, St Petersburg, Little Bayou, Sneeds Island.

Georgia Conference: Alpharetta, East Lake, Dixie.

\* South Carolina Conference: Spartanburg, Cherokee, Campobello, Greer,

North Carolina Conference: Asheville, Greensboro, Albermarle, Maple Grove, Baker Mountain, Hildebran.

Cumberland Conference: Bravton. Knoxville, Copper Ridge, Black Oak Ridge, Pikeville.

Three of these schools, Jacksonville, Alpharetta, and Baker Mountain employed two teachers each. In all, there was an envolvent of over four hundred students. This suggests to us the meaning of that testimony which refers to the army of young people which if rightly trained would prove a great power. to our work. Several teachers from the above schools have already signi. fied their intention to attend the summer school at Graysville, which is to begin May 28 and continue one month. Others who will take up the school work for the first time, will also attend, and still others who are preparing for later service. We earnestly pray that God will impress the importance of this normal school upon the minds and hearts of conference officers, church school officers. and teachers alike Teachers, do not forget the date. All should arrive by May 27, otherwise it will break into the opening exercises the first day. Drop a line to the Business Manager, Professor R. V. Cory, Graysville, Tennesse, stating when you expect to arrive, whether night or day and whether from the north or south Bring with you your school books, some bedding to furnish above the mattress, articles with which to tidy up your room, and above all, the blessing of God and His abiding presence in your hearts. Everything will be done that can be done to make your stay at the Training School both pleasant and profitable.

Get a few, place one in each book, call on a few neighbors, and leave the books. Then about a week later call again. You will find the way open for you to say anything that may be in place. Some may be ready to purchase, the book without any more being said. The plan is already being worked, and good success is reported. Try it.
