The tents were pitched on the most commodious, picturesque, and pleasant site in the city. The weather was propitious throughout the entire The attendance of outside meeting. people was so large that the tent could not accommodate them. Of our people there were from forty to forty-five upon the ground. Of the white brethren, there were present: F. R. Rogers, W. J. Blake, and O. R. Staines. Truly their presence and help were invaluable.

The Spirit of the Lord was present in all our meetings. There was not a note of discord among us, but instead love, joy, peace, happiness, and harmony characterized each one who was present.

Sabbath, August 28, Brother N. B. King was set apart to the ministry by the laying on of hands. Sunday morning at 5 A. M., ten souls were buried with the Lord in baptism. Sunday night at the close of the meeting, an appeal was made to those who desired to keep all of God's commandments and to walk in his statutes, and in response five stood up. We can truly count on three of these as strong Sabbath-keepers.

Our free-will offering was \$2.55; the Sabbath-school donation, \$7.00; the gen-

eral donation, \$20.80; and the tithes, \$53.55. From these figures you can see that the Spirit of the Lord is moving upon the hearts of the colored people to push this work from now until the end.

Now let not one of us who was present at that meeting plan to die. Rather let us plan to be at the next camp-meeting, no matter where the Spirit directs that it shall be. Our schoolroom is furnished with very poor seating for the children, and is very nearly filled. I am looking forward to the time when we shall have two rooms in service and two teachers. We should be very glad to receive blackboards, songbooks, and Bibles. So ever pray for us here that the work may be successful.
