OUR JAPANESE SCHOOL IN SAN FRANCISCO.

When Mr. Grainger and I came into the school in August, 1895, there were 40 students. Our school gradually increased to 110. That was the largest enrolment in 1895–96. This year we had about 60 at the beginning of the school in August, 1896. In November, 1896, we enrolled 110, with an average attendance of 54_{15} . In December we enrolled 108, with an average attendance of 77. In January, 1897, we enrolled 139, with an average attendance of $82_{\frac{1}{2}}$. In February, we enrolled 108, but as the month is not yet finished, we cannot give the average attendance.

We have sixty day pupils, and they are all studying the Bible. Three classes are studying the Old Testament in Genesis. My class is in Exodus. I have found that the Japanese do not want to read the Japanese Bible in the primary classes, because it is Japanese, and they want to learn English, so they are better pleased with the "Bible Lessons" No. 1 and No. 2. We have four studying Latin and three in "Alhambra." The students who have Latin and "Alhambra" are all in my Bible class, so they are not neglecting the Bible. There are three studying arithmetic and twelve are taking United States history.

We have not succeeded in getting every class in the night school to take the Bible, on account of time. They have but two hours altogether, and some have but one. We are planning to get all of the night students into the Sabbath-night Bible School. Our day-school students are the leading Sabbath-school scholars. When we came to this school, it seemed almost impossible to get the Bible in as a text-book. The students did not want it; but every step that has been taken toward introducing the Bible, the Lord has opened the way, and the school has increased in interest. I feared that Mr. Grainger's going away and the departure of Brother Okahira would have a discouraging effect on our school; but on the contrary the interest has deepened.
