•THE BOGOTA CAMPAIGN--An average of 2200 persons attended the introductory lectures of the Bogota crusade headed by Mexican Union evangelist Carlos E. Aeschlimann. The meetings started February 7 and are held Friday through Monday evenings at the Pavillion K of the Bogota Fair. The evangelistic team is composed by the evangelist, sixteen senior ministerial students of ICOLVEN, and about fifteen workers coming from five different fields of the Colombia-Venezuela Union. Elder Aeschlimann and Prof. Edgar Escobar teach morning classes in public and personal evangelism, pastoral psychology and hermeneutics, and in the afternoon the team, divided in three groups, makes calls on 2000 people who have shown interest in the lectures.--J. Aeschlimann, of the Mexican Union, read the charge, and the certificates were awarded by a group of ministers under the supervision of Prof. D. G. y Poyato, who introduced the missionary mailmen plan in Inter-America and is also in charge of the Radio Department of the Mexican Union.--J. G. Nikkels.
