CARIBBEAN UNION NEWS--Patrick Thomas, district pastor of Couva, Trinidad, celebrated the 75th anniversary of the Couva church Sabbath, January 15 with a district-wide convention at which about 50 souls were baptized as the first fruits of Evangelism '72. Visiting ministers included union president G. R. Thompson and secretary-treasurer E. J. Murray.
