A FIRST--For the first time in the history of our church, the General Conference Mid-Term Session will be held outside the United States. Mexico City, in the territory of the IAD, has been chosen to host more than 500 delegates coming from all over the world to attend the session October 13-21, 1972.--Marcel Abel.
