

OBITUARY--Elder Orley Ford was born in Pullman, Washington, December 27, 1893. In 1917 he married Lillian Shafers. For the next four

years they labored in Peru, South America, and in 1921 they were transferred to Ecua dor, where they worked until 1931. That same year Elder Ford was nominated president of the Guatemala Mission. From 1942 to 1945 he served as president of the Costa Rica Mission. In 1945 the Fords arrived in El Salvador, where Elder Ford headed the organized work for thirteen years. Even after retiring he never ceased his efforts in behalf of the work in that country, his adopted homeland. The Adventist work in El Salvador is permanently indebted to Elder Ford and will always be thankful to him for his unselfish service. He was called to his rest on November 19, 1972.
