This was more than double the sales in 1973 and 30 times as great as five years ago. During the last five years, the number of full-time employees has increased from two to ten, and the number of student employees from five to 34. The main product of the factory is Soyapac, a texturized soy bean preparation which is 50% protein, and comes in beef, chicken and ham-like flavors. The factory also produces Tri-Soy, a ready-to-eat wheat and soy cereal. This industry enables students to earn part of their school expenses.—*Charles R. Taylor.*
