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MUSICAL CITY OF IBAGUE, COL. RESPONDS TO EVANGELISM—We are now in the midst of an evangelistic campaign in the musical city of Ibague, Colombia, the capitol of Tolima—a district that was beseiged with political violence a few years ago. In this city we have two Adventist churches, 500 active members, and two church schools.

We began the campaign February 14 with the graduation of 1,035 students from the Voice of Prophecy course, and then with the help of Dr. Daniel Gonzalez of Barquisimeto we initiated a Five-Day Plan to Stop Smoking. Even with two sessions each night it was impossible to accommodate all the 3,500 smokers who desired to enter, and hundreds followed the plan standing in the aisles and around the sides of the tent. We calculate that 2,450 smokers abandoned the habit by the close of the plan, and the newspapers carried stories that it had an impact on the sale of cigarettes in the city. This was a marvelous experience.

We are receiving invitations from different parts of the city to give lectures. A battalion of soldiers with their officers are planning to come next Tuesday night to hear a topic they have especially requested.

On the opening night of the evangelistic series there were 1,900 present, but the attendance has increased to approximately 4,000 each night in two sessions. It is impressive to see the long lines around the block waiting to enter, and when the doors are opened and they rush in, it inspires us to preach dynamically that many may be prepared for the coming of Jesus. —*Jose Osorio*,

1976 EVANGELISM PROGRESS—George Carambot, president of the Colombia-Venezuela Union, is holding evangelistic meetings in Cartagena (photo above). Workers associated with him in the campaign are district pastor, Oscar Ortiz; ministerial intern, Hernando Villarreal; and Bible worker, Alix Martinez. Between 500 and 600 persons attend the nightly meetings, and 200 are attending the baptismal class, which figure equals the current membership of the Cartagena church.

Norberto Carmona, president of the Pacific Colombia Mission, indicates that he and all the departmental directors are engaged in evangelistic campaigns.

Ernesto C. Santos, president of the West Venezuela Mission, opened a series of meetings on March 7 in Ciudad Ojeda, close to Maracaibo. The other administrators, all departmental directors and pastors, as well as many laymen, will be engaging in evangelistic campaigns throughout the mission.

Robert Folkenberg, president of the Central American Union, states there were 559 persons baptized in that union during the first two months of this year, which is double the number baptized the same period a year ago.

Cami Cruz, president of the El Salvador Mission, reports that 70 evangelistic campaigns are being conducted by laymen alone, and every pastor in the mission has a campaign in progress. As a result, 300 persons were baptized in that mission during the first two months of the year.

Luis Alaña, president of the Panama Conference, has opened a series of evangelistic meetings in the city of Santiago, where we have not previously had any work established. Approximately 250 adults are attending, with separate meetings for more than 100 children each night. The workers of the Panama Conference have each pledged a third of their salary for this new work so that when the campaign closes a church will be established in Santiago.

Evangelistic meetings were begun Feb. 22 in the Kerlys, Martinique church. As part of this crusade, Marcel Abel, IAD Temperance director, conducted Temperance Week with 400 attending.

Samuel Guizar, secretary of the Mexican Union, informs us that for the first two months of 1976, 1,089 new members were baptized in that union.—Carlos Aeschlimann.
