BAPTISMS

Henry Niemann, president of the Upper Magdalena Conference, reports that conference reached 30% of its goal for the year by the close of the first quarter, and the meetings of union evangelist Jose Osorio are continuing in that conference in the city of Ibague where 3,500 persons are attending the lectures in two sessions each night. Sabbath services are being held in Pastor Osorio's tent with approximately 700 newly-interested people attending; 600 are in the baptismal class. To date 462 have been baptized as a result of this series of meetings, and estimates are the number will be 600 by the end of the month.

Lay evangelism is surging torward in the Mexican Inter-Oceanic Mission. In the months of February and March there were three simultaneous evangelistic campaigns in progress, with the laymen giving their whole-hearted support. Lay activities director, Natan Werekeintzen, held a series of meetings in Veracruz, and 257 were baptized. Pastor Mauro Reyes held evangelistic meetings in Cordoba, and 161 were baptized. In the third series Pastor Carlos T. Salome fulfilled his pledge to God by baptizing 120 persons.

Conference lay activities director, Diogenes Suero, states 1,200 newly-trained lay preachers in that field are uniting their efforts with those of the pastors for the evangelization of the southern region of the conference.

Pastor Werekeintzen conducted an inspirational lay congress in the city of Veracruz, with lay activities directors participating from the General Conference, Inter-American Division, and Mexican Union: Pastors Valentin W. Schoen, Sergio Moctezuma, and Xavier Soto. At this congress the laymen set a goal of 1,094 baptisms for the glory of God in 1976.

H. S. Walters, president of the West Indies Union, reports that E. R. E. Wright, president of the West Jamaica Conference, has been under a tent with an evangelistic team, and up to April 22 he had baptized 246. L. C.

Thomas, a pastor-evangelist in the same field, has also been engaged in tent evangelism, and has baptized 206 precious souls. During the first quarter of 1976, 900 new members were baptized in West Jamaica, which is the highest number to be baptized in any conference of the West Indies Union in a single quarter.

Pastor Walters also reports that L. V. McMillan, president of the Bahamas Conference, with his evangelistic team, baptized 273 new members one Sabbath in April—the highest number to be baptized in a single baptism in the West Indies Union. Ten ministers performed the rites in the sea, with some 3,000 people witnessing the sacred scene from a Nassau beach.

B. L. Archbold, president of the Inter-American Division, Nassau on April 24, and reports that as of that date 361 had been baptized as a result of Pastor McMillan's crusade. His goal is 400 by the close. of the series. Some of those baptized have joined existing churches in the area, but 247 have become charter members of a newly-organized church which is meeting in the government school auditorium while endeavors are made to find some other location and a permanent church home can be provided.

We thank God for the success that has been attending these efforts, and we pray that the Lord will continue to bless the efforts now in progress in the Inter-American Division.

As a result of these student campaigns and with the cooperation of faculty members and laymen, two new churches (Boqueron and Barrio Cruces in Aguada) have been organized this year. — Israel Recio.
