## **OBITUARY**

RODOLFO LEAL, renowned in the state of Nuevo Leon, Mexico as chief justice, judge in Montemorelos, philosopher and anthropologist, passed to his rest May 10, 1976. After his retirement from public office, he served the University of Montemorelos for several hours each day as an outstanding teacher and lawyer, and did much for the establishment of the Normal and Business Administration Departments of the college. The funeral service was held in the chapel of the University of Montemorelos at which students, faculty and friends paid tribute to his life of service.—A. Miranda.

SANTIAGO, PANAMA, a city with 20,000 inhabitants, had no Seventhday Adventist church members until recently when the conference committee requested the conference president, Luis Alaña, to do initial evangelization together with several teachers and Pastor Magdaleno Bartuano. The first phase was Bible courses, from which 893 students graduated, followed by a Five-Day-Plan in which 237 persons gave up smoking.
