It is my pleasure to announce also that each issue of this monthly journal will be released in the principal languages of Inter-America: El Centinela, in Spanish; The Sentinel, in English; La Sentinelle, in French; and we hope soon to have it on a quarterly basis in

the Dutch language.

Each issue will contain interestingly written articles dealing with doctrinal subjects that will appear in proper evangelistic sequence. In addition relevant articles on significant current events, and choice articles on the family, home and health, temperance, and nutrition will present a well-balanced and attractive message to the masses of Inter-America. Therefore, this timely and beautiful two-color magazine will take the place of tracts which are more limited in their use.

I want all Adventist workers to join me in urging that immediate arrangements be made so that the budgets of our churches and institutions include ample provisions for a good supply of these periodicals to be distributed every month.

I urge every faithful believer man, woman, young person, boy and girl—to join me in making a pledge with God to set aside a certain amount of money to buy and sell or give away a substantial number of these truthfilled, soul-winning magazines every month.

This journal will provide the Advent people with the most effective tool possible to give mass circulation to the blessed and glad tidings of Jesus' soon return. EVANGELISM PROGRESS

P. J. Prime, president of the South Caribbean Conference, baptized 116 new members as a result of his crusade in the Sangre Grande church.

The meetings conducted by the youth of the Philadelphia church in St. Thomas with the help of Orien Fleming, youth director of the North Caribbean Conference, came to a close after three weeks; and K. S. Wiggins, Ministerial secretary of the Caribbean Union, came in for ten nights of reaping. The total result was 65 baptisms.

Lynford Williams conducted a seven-week crusade in St. Croix, supported by other pastors in the area and personnel from the North Caribbean Conference office. Two tents with a seating capacity of 1,000 were filled every night. The closing result was 138 baptisms.

With the baptism of 108 new believers, Eliseo Eceda Santos became the first centurion in the Honduras Mission in 1976, and three other workers in that mission baptized more than 60 each during the first half of the year: Victor Shepherd, Natanael Ortiz, and Victor Colindres.

Denworth Baptiste, a public school teacher, had a total of 108 baptisms from his crusade at Belmont, St. Vincent and became the first lay preacher in the East Caribbean to have reached 100 baptisms from a single evangelistic series.



THE PANAMA ADVENTIST INSTITUTE, which is located 8 kilometers from the city of La Concepcion in the province of Chiriqui, Panama, has just completed a modern boys' dormitory and several homes for teachers. This year's enrollment surpassed any previous record. Wilbert Oliver has been named director of the school and Eduardo Muñoz business manager.—Luis Alaña.
