FOOD SERVICE SUPERVISORS ATTEND ANDREWS WORKSHOP

The workshop emphasized principles of cost control, personnel management, organization, sanitation, safety, layout and equipment, and was designed to prepare employees in food service for membership in the Hospital Institution and Educational Food Service Society (HIEFSS), sponsored by the American Dietetic Association.

To graduate from the program, the food service supervisor attends two summer sessions at Andrews University and is sponsored by a registered dietitian during a nine-month work experience in his own institution. The workshop next summer will emphasize principles of food preparation, purchasing, nutrition, modified diets, and menu planning.—Andrews University.

TWO NEW CHURCHES IN INDIAN VILLAGES

Two new churches were organized in the *Gran Sabana* of Venezuela: one with 56 members in San Martin de Turupan for those who speak Akauaio, and the other with 46 members in the villege of Matacuchias for those who speak Taurepan. Both churches were constructed by the local Adventist Indians with the assistance of the East Venezuela Conference, and both were recently inaugurated.

The youthful pastor, Frankie Isaac, who is the first Indian minister in his area, recently ended an evangelistic campaign in the village of Uroy Uaray and left 70 persons preparing for baptism, some of whom had walked two days to attend the meetings. In September Pastor Isaac, with the help of an Indian lay preacher, Leslie Nathaniel, began another series of evangelistic meetings in a village of one thousand inhabitants.

From various distant villages, Macedonian calls have come to the conference office asking for a pastor and a teacher. Responding to such a call, a teacher has been named to begin a school in the village of Paicupau where there are no Seventh-day Adventists at the present time.

ANNUAL WORLD STATISTICAL REPORT LISTS INTER-AMERICA FIRST IN BAPTISMS

According to the Annual Statistical Report for 1975, the Inter-American Division occupied first place in all the world in soul winning, with 49,163 baptisms. Then followed the South American Division with 35,729.

In addition, the Mexican Union was the union with the most baptisms, 10,931, followed by the South Brazil Union with 10,176, and the East African Union with 9,289.

The South Mexican Conference baptized the most of any local field in the world, 4,449.


