We have arranged with the Indianapolis postoffice that our lesson quarterlies may be sent to regular subscribers at pound rates. So nothing remains for the local societies to do but to secure a club of subscribers for Quarterlies and order it to one address for the school. Each librarian should remit for these much the same as for the other Sabbath School periodicals, after collecting subscriptions or donations for that purpose.

Let all our schools co-operate with the church librarian, report their club to the State Tract Society at once thus saving extra expense of postage.

The camp-meeting for Indiana will be held at Franklin, Johnson County, in the fair grounds, beginning Wednesday, September 10th and closing Sunday night on the 21st. The grounds are within half a mile of the court house and can be reached from three streets in the city. We will have the use of all the buildings.

Though a little farther south than our last camp ground, it is really a little less expensive to reach Franklin by rail from the north part of the State. At Peru I met Brother Dunn, who has been there some time in the Object Lessons and other work. I found him with a growing interest in many ways and with a young Baptist mis-

They were both quite well settled in the truth of the Sabbath and the state of the dead when I met them and I took hold and helped them all I could-Arrangements were made and I gave a few talks in their tent. Brother Dunn was also connected with them in his work. They are now in Logansport and Brother Dunn is pushing his Bible and other work and is reaching a good class of peo-Don't forget that a campmeeting is demanded and expected at Peru.

At Winamac I had a good meeting. Ordained the Deacon, Bro. Thaddeus Crawford, and organized a young people's society of thirteen members. and got several subscriptions for Life Boat. I was home for quarterly meeting. Elder Hankins conducted the services and spoke several times. There was a good Sunday night attendance. July 18th to 21st at Grass Creek. Good meetings were held, although I was sick in bed part of the time. Yet the Lord blessed me with strength in time of need. I ordained a Deacon for the church and organized a young people's society of sixteen members. Chairman Daisy Harrison; secretary, Ethel Harrison, treasurer, Bertie Rans, all of Grass Creek.

Vincennes.

In response to the committee call we have removed from Greenfield to this place. We experienced quite a task in finding a vacant house, so took furnished room at the onset. We are now located in our home. This is the oldest town in the State, with a population of 12,000. It is quite an historical place, and the sites of several fortifications used in the past during the Indian war are still in good state of preservation.

The town is quite largely inhabited by Germans and French, and is quite a stronghold for catholics. We visited one of the largest churches here last Sunday and were each invited to teach a class. The subject was "The Ten Commandments." We were most cordially invited to return next Sunday. The teachers' meetings are held at the home of one of the weal-

thiest citizens of the city, consequently we were made acquainted with some very prominent people. The results are already marked to some degree, as we placed several orders for Patriarchs and Prophets. which book is a commentary on the Sunday school lessons. We have also sold during our short stay one Bible, one Object Lessons, two Best Stories. The Lord is surely opening the way for the giving of the last angel's warning in this place. We recognize his guiding hand, and feel to praise His holy name that we are to be instruments in His hands for this time. There is another power at work, but we are not discouraged. Why should we be? When God is for us who can be against us? Remember us and the work at this place in your prayers.

The average attendance by actual count has been 36 up to the present time.

Four have signed the covenant, while some others are much interested.
