NDOUBTEDLY many of our brethren and sisters in Indiana have seen the distorted reports that have appeared in the daily papers regarding

recent meetings that have been held in Battle Creek, by Elders Daniells and Irwin, President and Vice-President of the General Conference.

It is known by many of our people, that for years testimonies have been coming, condemning many things that have been done in Battle Creek. and exhorting that a different course be pursued and a different policy adopted. But matters have gone from bad to worse until recent testimonies have come, setting forth the true situation, and Elder Daniells was requested to go to Battle Creek and read these testimonies to the

and the situation which we take from their conference paper.

THE WORK AT BATTLE CREEK.

"The writer has been in Battle Creek most of the time during the past three weeks. I take this my earliest opportunity of setting forth a few facts regarding the present conditions at that place as viewed by the writer.

A series of special meetings have been conducted in the tabernacle for the express purpose of considering what has been written in reference to the work in that place. These meetings have all been conducted in an orderly manner. No harsh or unkind words have been spoken by anyone. There has been no such thing as a church trial; it has not been thought of by those who have had this series of meetings in charge. There has been nothing sensational in these meetings.

There is a great question of principles at stake. It is plain to be seen that there are two factions, both claiming to believe the truth of God, and express their desires to live in harmony therewith. Both cannot be right. The banner that has been held up by the Seventh-day Adventist people, is that on which is inscribed the commandments of God and the faith of Jesus. Seventh-day Adventists believe in keeping all the ten commandments, and believe that the faith of Jesus as expressed by John the Revelator is the Spirit of Prophecy.

For several years, appeals have been made to us as a people, asking that we cease to center so many interests at Battle Creek. We were told that the judgments of God would visit Battle Creek if we did not heed the appeals. The burning of the Sanitarium and the Review and Herald buildings furnish sufficient evidence to all believers that the appeals were not heeded. Viewed from the standpoint of the Spirit of um was erected against the expressed will of God.' At the General Conference assembled in Battle Creek in the year 1901, under the guidance of the Spirit of God, an action was taken which closed the Battle Creek College. The re-opening of the Battle Creek College in 1903 was in direct opposition to the action of the General Conference and to the counsel given through the Spirit of Prophecy. One facton stands upholding the actions of the General Conference, and the other upholding those who have worked in opposition to the actions of the General Conference."

The above, I believe to be a true statement of the situation, only, much more might have been said, facts that I have learned from those on the ground. We are in the sifting time, brethren and sisters, which the Lord told us more than fifty years ago would come just before the end. When many who have stood as bright lights in the denomination would go out from us. These things are to be lamented, but our faith should not be shaken, but rather, strengthened.

We have come to the time when we must heed and follow the spirit of prophecy that has guided this message from its infancy, we will be separated from the message. There can no longer be any half hearted belief in these matters. Corruption will be manifested among the opposers of the testimonies, as is already being manifested. A strange medley of confusion will exist. But let us follow that sure guide that has led us for the past fifty years.

Sister White has just had published in pamphlet form, recent testimonies setting forth quite fully the present situation, entitled "Series B, No. 6. Testimonies to the Church." Every Seventh-day Adventist in Indiana, and in all the world, ought to have this pamphlet and read and study it carefully. Some will be deceived, be-

men in the denomination in the past, are leading in the opposition. But there can be no good reason for being deceived, if we will heed what is coming to us from the same word of prophecy.
