SET THINE HOUSE IN ORDER



NLY a short time ago we chronicled the sad and sudden death of one of our brethren, who had failed, in life and health to shape his

affairs, so that the cause he loved would receive its share of his earthly goods when he was gone. This issue of the REBORTER contains the obituary of our highly esteemed Brother Wilson of Royal Center. All who were at our last camp-meeting, at Connersville, will remember distinctly Brother Wilson's earnest testimonies, and how eagerly he received every ray of light; and, although one of our youngest Sabbath-keepers, he was among the first to lead out in every advanced move.

Brother Wilson has already helped the cause liberally, but it was in his heart to do more, and he doubtless would had his life been spared a little longer. For a month before his death, we had been trying to assist him in getting his financial matters in better shape, but a little over exertion brought on the lagrippe, and in a few days the story was told. But how glad we all are that his life was full of light at the latter end, and he died in the triumph of faith.

I am satisfied that there are many people in Indiana, who have property, that they intend shall go to the cause when they are through with it; but they think there is plenty of time to arrange the matter, and so time passes, and unexpectedly sickness comes, or an accident, and the brittle thread is broken, therefore the means they intended should go to the cause of God, goes into the ranks of the enemy.

If we are really in the message, and a part of the message, and we are only stewards over what we possess, does not all we have belong to the Lord? and should not the greater portion of it at least, when we are done with it, go into the cause of which we form a part? or shall we neglect to arrange our affairs, and let it go into the world? It seems to me that wisdom would direct that we arrange these matters, while we are in a condition of mind and physical strength, so there will be no question here after, but that the cause will receive the benefit of our hard labor and sacrifice.

Any of our people in Indiana, who have means that they expect, some day, to put into the cause of God, and desire to fix this matter, while they can attend to it themselves, and wish to let the Conference have this money, and receive an annuity, or regular stipulated interest upon it as long as they live, will do well to correspond with Elder Young, or the writer, and we will be glad to give you any information you may desire regarding the matter. Is not this an important question, brethren and sisters, and should we not think seriously about it, when we see so many falling with no preparation regarding these things? May the Lord help us to do what we know we ought to do, and do it now, that His name may be glori-W. J. STONE.

CONNERSVILLE SANITARIUM

Inquiries are coming to me to know what has been or is being done regarding the purchase of the Sanitarium property at Connersville, which was discussed through the REPORTER last summer, and at our camp-meeting more or less.

In reply to these questions, and to set the situation before all of our people, I will say that the property is tied up in the courts, so that nothing can be done. A man, who claimed to be a creditor, tried to have the assignment set aside, and the institution thrown into bankruptcy. No action was taken until about three weeks ago. The courts then decided that this man was not a creditor, and placed the matter back in the hands of the receiver. This would-be creditor has thirty days in which to carry his case up to a higher court. If he does this, the property is liable to be tied up for some time. Should he not carry the

case to a higher court, the property will be for sale in a few days.

The situation has not changed. The site and location are admirably adapted to the sanitarium work, and we have no reason to change our minds regarding this being a special providential opening, coming as it does at this time, when a denominational institution of this kind should be located somewhere in this vicinity.

The manner in which the people of Connersville have stood by this institution in starting it, and all the circumstances surrounding the whole enterprise, I can but believe indicate that this is a providential opening.

The course pursued in the future, regarding the purchase of this property, will depend something upon the feelings of the people of Connersville, and whether they are still willing to take hold, and render assistance in the purchase of the plant. We would advise our people for a time to hold themselves in readiness to furnish the money, which has been promised in case it is needed. We surly will know, within a few weeks, just what course will be pursued, and whether we will purchase the property or not. keep our people informed in regard to the progress that is being made. Our sanitarium at Connersville is now full, and we are very much in need of more room; and with the present outlook, if we were in the new location, there is no good reason why we should not have two or three times the patronage the coming year, that the institution has had thus far. May the Lord direct in all that is done, and may we be ready to step into His providential openings. W. J. STONE.

THE PROPER COURSE

(THE following letter was written by a local elder to the president of the Conference)

DEAR BROTHER: I would like to ask you a question, and that is: Do you think it is right for a minister of the gospel to visit a church, and teach its members both by precept and example to disregard the health reform principles, especially where the local elder has for years tried to bring his people to regard them? I told a minister not long since, that I could labor for a whole year to bring up our people to health principles, and a minister of the gospel, who disregards them, could in one visit defeat all that I had accomplished in the year. Now, I would make this request of you: Please do not send any more meat-eating

on the work alone, or else, send some one whose example will not cause a straight-cut division in the church on health principles. I do not believe in being fanatical on these lines but I do believe that God has given us light on health reform to be obeyed. I find the following statement in an unpublished Testimony given in November, 1896: "The Lord does not give light on health reform, that it may be disregarded by those who are in positions of influence and authority. The Lord means just what he says, and he is to be honored in what he says." In Vol. VI page 370, I read: "Healthful living must be made a family matter." Now how can one teach his people to regard these principles as a family matter, if one who is in a position of influence goes from family to family, and by his example and deliberate teaching. influences them to disregard them?

Please turn to page 376 in Testimonies Vol. VI, and read again, "Ministers to teach health reform." Then again on page 378, beginning with the first paragraph. This states that no man should be set apart as a teacher of the people, while his own example is not in harmony with the light God has given in regard to diet. "Such an one is not fit to stand as the Lord's messenger."

I did not like to write you these things, but I think if we ever expect our people to adopt the health principles, our ministers will have to set the example.

Now, instead of sending meat-eating preachers here, if there is no other place for them, send them to the Fiji Islands. I have no feelings in this matter towards any one, but I don't take kindly to workers coming here, and teaching these people to disregard the light when I have tried my best to set the true principles before them.
