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The Great Earthquake

San Francisco and Other Cities in Ruins

U NDOUBTEDLY nearly all of our brethren and sisters have learned of the terrible calamity that visited the Pacific Coast on the morning of April 18. In less than one minute the beautiful city of San Francisco, and a number of other cities, were laid in ruins; and hundreds of lives were lost, hurled into eternity without a moment's warning.

When the last issue of the REPOR-TER went to press, we had received no particulars regarding our people or institutions on the Coast; and up to the present time have not been able to obtain a full report of the situation, but have received a letter from our brethren of the Pacific Press saying that the institution suffered a loss of from ten thousand to twenty thousand dollars. The buildings ment sustained but a slight damage. Our brethren of the Pacific Press ask that those of our people in the East who escaped this terrible calamity, contribute as they are able to help in the repairing of the Pacific Press building. We trust that many will respond to this call. We would

suggest that in all our churches a collection be taken, and the money sent to our Conference office, which will be forwarded on to the Pacific Press. Several other cities where our people live and where we have institutions, received more or less damage,

tions, received more or less damage, but we have not received definite information as to the amount of loss these institutions sustained.

Meaning of this Terrible Calamity

But few understand the meaning of these things. Not so with intelligent Seventh-day Adventists. Just a few months before the great fire which swept away many of the socalled fire-proof buildings in Baltimore, Maryland, the following Testimony came to this people:—

"We are on the verge of the eternal world. Some may say, "How do you know this, Sister White?" I know it by the judgments of God that are in the land. These judgments are given to bring men and women to their senses. God has a purpose in everything that He permits to take place in our world, and He desires us to be so spirituallyminded that we shall perceive His workings in the unusual happenings that are now almost of daily occurrence. Already His judgments have begun to fall upon the inhabitants of the land. He can touch the largest so-called fire-proof buildings, and in two or three hours they are as noth ing, burned to the ground."

Two years later the Lord caused a scene to pass before His servant, described in the following words:—

"The scene that passed before me ing of these things.

was an alarm of fire. Men looked at lofty and supposedly fire-proof build ings, and said. 'They are perfectly safe.' But these building were consumed as if made of pitch. The fireengines could do nothing to stay the destruction. The firemen were unable to operate the engines.

"I am instructed that when the Lord's time comes, no earthly power can stay the hand of God. No material can be used in the erection of buildings that will preserve them from destruction when God's appoint ed time comes to send retribution on men for their insolence and their disregard of His law."

When we read the account of the great catastrophe in San Francisco and other eities, we can the more easily grasp the truth of the above predictions. The only safety of God's people is to walk humbly and softly before Him in the light that He is giving us, trusting in His almighty power and protection.

The instruction given us for the past few years to get out of ths cities has been timely, and if we will heed the counsel given us from time to time carefully, God will shield us from all these calamities. But we should not be satisfied with the protecting care of God for ourselves. There are others whom God desires to save, and He has placed us here to tell them the meaning of these things.

The Pacific Press

Overturned by An Earthquake. Re-Organization and Work

LL our people throughout the world have learned through the public press of the almost unparalleled disaster which visited San Francisco and adjacent cities and town within a radius of about one hundred miles.

In this brief statement we will not attempt a representation of the facts concerning this awful calamity, but wish to place before you its effect upon our people, and our plans for the future.

When the Pacific Press moved from Oakland to Mountain View, two years ago, it was the definite intention of the Board to set aside commercial work and turn the facilities of the press entirely upon the publication of the Third Angel's Message. But our denominational work has not increased as was hoped, and it has seemed necessary to keep up the commercial work to some extent, and little by little it has been growing to occupy a strong position in the office. In a few seconds the great earthquake settled this question. Our customers are ruined. All our commercial jobs must stop where they are, and the work done is probably lost. To-day there is no commercial San Francisco from which we can look for work. In its place we stand in the shadow of a great calamity, the meaning of which we know, and this meaning must be told to the world. Therefore we have decided:

1. To repair our shattered building with frame work in place of brick, and make it safe for operations.

2. To close out commercial work, as far as possible.

3. To go to the world with this message, and throw all our energies and facilities into publishing the signs of these times.

4. To call upon our people everywhere to stand loyally by the Pacific Press and devote their energies to the circulation of our books, tracts. and papers; for we must depend upon our people to scatter the literature, and by doing it they will give the world the light, and will give to the Pacific Press sufficient work to save the office from further loss.

5. As the most urgent and important step, we are issuing a Special Number of the Signs of the Times, which will be called The Earthquake Special.

We trust that in the light of this great warning to the world, our peotion which the issue demands.

The Pacific Press is readjusting all its working facilities to publish these words of warning. The editors, with several photographers and other assistants, visited Oakland, San Francisco, and San Jose, gathering material for the paper. Offices have been opened in a private house for pushing the circulation.
