WHILE nearly all papers and magazines are publishing details of the great catastrophe which has recently visited the Pacific Coast, it may be well for us to recount briefly a few of the very precious blessings which the good Lord has showered upon us just at this time when blessings were very much needed to quiet overwrought nerves, and reestablish the good cheer and hope of those who have suffered.

- 1. Although the walls of the Pacific Press building were thrown down, still the machines, with the exception of the linotypes, were uninjured so that the office was running as usual in a few hours after the earthquake.
- 2. While there was a great loss in property by this destruction, the Lord moved upon the hearts of his people to give liberally for the relief of the Pacific Press. Thus the damage will be fully repaired, and both the Pacific Press and our people will be made better from the experience.
- 3. During the three weeks following the earthquake, the Signs of the Times has had a greater circulation than during six months under normal conditions. What a wonderful blessing this is to the world, to the workers, and to the Pacific Press.
- 4. Many who before were only half-hearted in the service of God have learned the infinite value of walking with God from day to day so as to be prepared for whatever Naturally, an earthmay come. quake of this kind stirs up the good, sets it working, and it helps the people to take a bold stand against sin and to put it away. In thousands of homes in this stricken district the Lord's name is honored and his will obeyed more than ever in the past.

It seems good indeed to see the activity of the Pacific Press since the earthquake. The circulation of the Signs of the Times has gone beyond all past records. In fact the orders have come in so rapidly that it has been almost impossible to handle them on time. The hands have been working almost night and day.

While I am dictating these few words there are fully a score of our sisters sitting at large tables in the halls of the Pacific Press building, folding the Signs of the Times. This morning the manager of the Circulating Department reported that the orders had gained on them until there were more than 50,000 orders ahead of what they had been able to fill, and so an invitation was sent out to many of our sisters in the the part of the printer.

# SOUTH AFRICA

AFTER spending twenty-five days on the sea we reached Cape Town in Everything appeared very strange to us at first, but this strangeness is disappearing as we become better acquainted with the habits and customs of the people. We spent five days in Cape Town and Kenilworth, meeting quite a number of our people there, and acquainting ourselves with the College, printing-office, and the Mission. Soon a telegram came stating for us to start at once to Oudtshoorn (pronounced Outshorn) to join Elder D. H. Groenewald in the work there. This place is about four hundred miles north-east of Cape Town, but on account of no railroad there, we were compelled to go around by DeAar Junction, Graaf Rienet, Klipplaat and finally reached Oudtshoorn after spending three days and three nights on the way, crossing mountains and the parched Karroo, making a distance of nine hundred

Very little work has been done here. Some canvassers placed quite a number of books in this district, and some are read, but the Dutch Reformed minister controls the minds of his church. Nearly all of the Dutch are thus directed by him. He warns his flock of other denominations, and in consequence of their obedience it makes it very hard for the truth to enter.

Elder Groenewald and I will start a series of meetings in a 30-by-50 foot tent soon, and at the same time two canvassers will place as many books as possible in the homes. We hope to put forth a strong effort so the Dutch minister will be unable to kill our interest. It is much harder here to get the gospel before the people than in America. The people are very slow to accept new ideas, and very much inclined to believe that there is only one church, and that the Dutch Reformed.

We are here visiting among the people and studying the Dutch lan-

guage while waiting for our tent. We hope that all the brethren and sisters in Indiana will pray earnestly for our success in this needy and much neglected field. We realize that this place is undoubtedly one of the most difficult; and then to make matters worse, the white and colored will not attend the same church even at different services. The Dutch absolutely refuse even to sit in church where a colored person has been, but we hope that the Lord may intervene, and be pleased to bless us as we labor to do His work in His way by guiding us to those wandering from the Shepherd's fold in such a way that they may be won, reinstated, and at last reach the pearly portals with God's redeemed.
