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INDIANA ANNUAL CONFERENCE



S STATED in the last RE-PORTER, our Conference Committee at its council October 7 and 8, decided to hold the annual conference

A mistake was made in some way in the last issue, in stating the number of delegates that each church is entitled to. Each church is entitled to one delegate for every twenty members or fraction thereof. Therefore a church of less than twenty members is entitled to one delegate; and over twenty and up to thirty-nine, two delegates. A church of thirtyfive members is entitled to only two delegates instead of four as stated in the last issue of the REPORTER.

We hope to see present every laborer in the Conference, and each church should be represented by delegates. As stated above, the first meeting will be held at 10:30 A.M. November 13th. In getting off the cars either at the Union Depot or the Interurban Station, inquire where to get a Central Avenue car. Anyone, almost, can tell you. Get off at 23rd street, and go east half a block to the church. If any should Monday afternoon, follow these instructions and someone will be at the church to direct you where to go.

Immediately following this meeting of the Conference our ministers will all go out to visit our churches for a few weeks. We trust that our conference will be a great blessing to our laborers, and that good results will follow the efforts put forth in our churches during the next few Will not all of our brethren weeks. and sisters pray that God may greatly bless our coming conference meeting, and that such plans may be laid as will greatly advance the work during the coming year.

OUR SANITARIUM ENTERPRISE

For two years the matter of a permanent institution for the treatment of the sick has been discussed more or less here in Indiana. It was hoped from the time we began to talk about a sanitarium at Connersville, that that institution would be the beginning of a permanent, substantial sanitarium, around which the whole denomination could and would rally.

For months we thought that the old Daum Sanatorium property would come into our possession. It seemed like a providential opening, and in fact God gave Connersville the opportunity of having in its midst this institution of the Lord; but selfishness became so marked, and circumstances so changed the situation, that it became very evident that Connersville would not be the proper place to establish this institution. The situation at Connersville never was what we supposed it to be. Much has developed during the past year that has brought to the surface a condition of things that we did not know existed; and when the Sanitorium was advertised to be sold on the Sabbath, and was purchased by other parties, this seemed to be additional evidence that the Lord did not want us to locate there.

However, our sanitarium at Connersville has served a good purpose, and has been doing a noble work; and though its influence we are enabled to now go elsewhere and establish an institution free from debt. It is true that the location at Connersville just outside of the city, that so many of our pepole looked at last year at the time of our campmeeting, was a beautiful place in many I hope to meet many of our breth-respects, but we have now a site

that far surpasses it in every way.

Had we gone forward and purchased the Connersyille property, the sanitarium would have had to hire some money. The interest would have been not to exceed one-half the rent we have been paying, so we felt that it would be a saving to hire a few thousand dollars rather than pay rent; but the Lord is always ready to direct and lead if we are willing to be led, and in our waiting He has brought to us the men and means, as well as a location that will be hard to excel.

A Location Purchased

An advertisement was placed in the Indianapolis News for a sanitarium site, and we received many letters in response, and have investigated a number of these; but the one that seemed the most favorable was located three miles above LaFayette on the Wabash river. Dr. Worster and I visited the place, and then a company of six of us went and looked it over. Some of these persons are donating liberally toward the enterprise, and all were delighted with it. T. A. Goodwin, who has been chosen as Financial Secretary of our Conference, although desiring a location near Indianapolis, felt that this was just the place. The site contains 25 acres, and is known as the Levering Home. It once sold for \$25,000. We purchased it for \$10,000.

Where Did You Get The Money?

Many of us do not yet believe that the cattle upon a thousand hills are the Lord's, and that the gold and silver are His, although He has said it over and over again. Some, however, believe this, and they have come forward and offered to assist us until we have the promise of about \$ 20,000 with which to start this institution. It is marvelous; nevertheless it is true. There are two houses on the place, one a ten-room building in good condition, and a fourroom cottage; besides a barn and other outbuildings; but we will need a main sanitarium building, and it will take all we have promised to erect this building. We should have at least \$5,000 to furnish the buildings and beautify the grounds.

How Shall We Raise This?

We believe our brethren and sisters in Indiana can sell \$10,000 beggar.

worth of Ministry of Healing. This is much less than we sold in Object Lessons; and when we think that one-half of this will go to our own institution located in the state, we believe it will be a great incentive to help in this work. If we can sell \$10,000 worth of Ministry of Healing this will give us \$5,000. Our Sanitarium people are going to try to sell in LaFayette \$2,000 worth of these books.

No Compulsion; No Over Urging

We shall not over urge or compel anyone to sell this book for this worthy object. Let all understand this. Some-yes, I trust many-will desire to have a part in this work. This excellent book ought to be placed in the homes of the people. It contains just the truths they ought to have for this time; and this worthy object alone ought to be an incentive to us to take hold and sell the book. Then when we consider how much benefit may be derived by assisting in our sanitarium work, makes it doubly important that we push the sale of this book.

Donations and Loans

Donations to the Sanitarium enterprise will be cheerfully received from all who may wish to give; and also loans of money without interest, to be taken out in treatments when the institution is ready to open its doors. The money promised last year with which to purchase the Connersville property will be cheerfully received on this; but in addition we feel like asking all our people who can advance money to this institution to help in getting started, and then take it out in treatments, or let their friends take it out in treatments, to the full amount of money advanced. We do not expect to make a great pull for money for the establishment of this institution. We will gladly receive funds and donations, but no great call will be made. But those who desire to let the institution have money on the above conditions, will be given an opportunity to do so.

Christ Not a Beggar

It will soon be too late to give. The time is coming when we will not have to beg for money for God's cause as we have in the past. Yes, it is even now here. Christ is not a beggar. He gave all for us, and

those who are saved at His coming will have given liberally, if not all, for Him. When calls come for the advancement of God's work, some are ready to say, "You are all the time begging for money." I wish to ask who is back of these calls? Whose cause is it we are endeavoring to advance? Isit to advance man's work or the cause of Christ? And if the cause of Chrst, do we consider Christ a beggar? And is it not only too true that many when they give give grudgingly, as though they were giving to a beggar or one not worthy? God loves a cheerful giver, and, thank God, His Spirit is so working upon hearts that they are cheerfully giving, and that liberally, now to finish His work in the world.

The Advantages

In a future article we will give the advantages, the natural surroundings, that make the present site near LaFayette so advantageous to our sanitarium work. There is almost everything here needed to make an ideal place for such an institution, in the way of water, shade, beautiful lawn, power, light, fire protection, boating, easy to be reached, the good will and co-operation of the people, surrounded by a fine farming country, and many other things of which more will be said in the future.

OBITUARY

EDWARDS.—Died at the home of her son, W. H. Edwards, at Indianapolis, Indiana, Dorcas Pray Edwards, aged 85 years, 7 months, and 12 days. Sister Edwards was born in Shapleigh, Maine, February 8, 1821. At the age of eighteen she was converted and joined the Baptist church. In 1850 she was married to Wm. H. Edwards of Danvers, Mass., and had about that time become a member of the Second Congregational church of that place, and was a member of that church until 1877

when Elders D. M. Canright and C. W. Stone, assisted by F. L. Mead and Drusilla Lamson, came to Danvers and conducted a series of meetings. There was a great interest awakened by the presentation of the great truths of the Third Angel's Message, and Brother and Sister Edwards were among the first to take a stand for the truth. For years her home was open to all of our ministers and others, and they were more than welcome, as she was a woman of more than ordinary hospitality. She would share the last of everything with anyone in need.

Sister Edwards was very active in mind and body. Although quite deaf, she has kept abreast of the times by her perusal of the church publications and daily papers. It was refreshing to call upon her and converse upon the fast fulfilment of prophecy.

To show the trend of her mind although eighty-five years old and unable to attend Sabbath services, Sabbath, April 7, she composed the following lines:

() holy day of sacred rest, The best of all the seven, The day on which God placed his seal, To guide our steps to heaven

Help us, dear Lord, to keep this day, As thou hast us commanded; Let not our acts or work be done Until the day is ended.

And as we cannot meet to-day In holy convocation, May thy sweet Spirit visit us, In this our humble station.

And when our earthly life is o'er, And all our labors done, Mny we receive the victor's crown From Jesus, thy dear Son.

One morning a short time before her death, she was feeling somewhat depressed, but with her thoughts lifted hevenward she composed the following prayer:

DEAR Lord, I come before Thee now, Humbly at Thy feet I bow; Asking Thee for grace divine, To subdue this heart of mine.

I am weak, but Thou art strong, And for Thee my soul doth long: Give me of Thy strength supreme, Sanctify and make me clean.

The above shows the trend of her mind and something of her deep Christian experience. She left two sons, one brother, three sisters and other relatives to mourn their loss. The service at Indianapolis was conducted by the writer, assisted by Elder Moon. Text, Rev. 14:13. Truly she rests from her labors, but her work still lives. She was laid beside her husband at Beaverly Mass., the service at the grave being conducted by Elder H. E. Robinson, chaplain of the Melrose (Mass.) Sanitarium.
