SOMETIMES our hearts are made sad when we see the large number of youth who have grown up in this denomination, strong and intelligent, but yet giving the strength of their earning period to the world. But with this sad picture before us, are we as Conference workers, parents, and teachers doing all in our power to influence the youth to secure the proper training for the work before them? That parent who does not put forth every effort to place his child in one of our schools, where regularly appointed teachers may lead them, he himself certainly must assume the responsibility of leading that child in the work.

We have at present fifteen church schools, and an intermediate school, but these have within them a comparatively small per cent of all who ought to be in training for the Mas-

ter's service. Some one is responsible that more students are not in training at the present time.

Is it possible that a parent in this Conference is too busy making money; is too wrapped up with the cares of this life to see that not only the youth in his own home, but those of his home church, have a Christian education? Is it possible that a minister in this Conference is too busy trying to snatch "brands from the burning," or to seek souls in other denominations to give attention to our own dear youth? Is it possible that the youth themselves are so wrapped up in the attractions of this world that the pleadings of God have no effect upon them at this time? The Master surely is in earnest in His call for workers at this time. Demands for skilled workmen are becoming more and more urgent as the months go by. As the work broadens, it deepens, and as Satan comes down with great wrath knowing that his time is short, greater demands will be made from those who are doing the work on the earth.

O that every youth, every parent, and every worker in our Conference could sense the awful responsibility of allowing a single soul to lose the opportunity of preparing for work just at this time. I trust that every one will pray earnestly to know his duty that in all our church schools, in all our intermediate schools, and in all our colleges there may be found such earnest and efficient young people that the Lord may quickly accomplish the work he has begun on the earth.

Let us pray earnestly to know our duty. Let us be more ready to invest in a new worker than in a new carriage. Let us be more willing to pay the expenses of a student in school than to add one acre to our farm. THE JEWISH WORK

DOUBTLESS many of our friends would be glad to hear of the progress of our work among the Jewish people. They are a very hard people to reach, for they are taught from infancy to hate Christ and to despise all Christian people. Consequently, when we go to them, they can not understand our motives. It takes a good while sometimes to gain their confidence, but when you once get them to see that you are laboring for them for the love of the Messiah, then you are in a position to gently tell them more of the Saviour.

The Jews have not seen much in the lives of the so-called Christians of to-day, that is Christlike. When they learn that we keep the Sabbath of the Lord and do not eat swine's flesh, and believe in religious liberty, they then desire to hear more of such a religion.

In our Wednesday evening meetings the Jews are allowed to ask questions. They are always answered satisfactorily from God's own Word. These meetings are attended by the blessing of God. We have a number who are deeply interested in the truth, and a few have taken their stand, but as soon as

they openly confess Christ they are cut off from among their people; and since many of them can not speak English, only starvation stares them in the face. There are many reasons why it is much harder for a Jew to step out and obey the truth, than it is for those who are not Jews. Many also have families and friends in Russia to whom they must send means, and who are dependent upon them for support. We ought to do something to help this people, and do it at once, lest their blood be upon our garments.
