

#### Transportation

There will be no special rates this year over either the railroads or interurban lines. The regular fare now on the steam cars is the same as the special reduced rates have been in the past, or two cents a mile. This is better than the reduced fare in the past, for then each person had to pay 25 cents to bear the expense of an meeting to sign up the tickets. Many can come over the interurban lines at a cost of about one and one-half cents a mile. We would call attention, however, to the fact that most of the steam roads which are parallel with interurban lines, sell twoway tickets at the same price as interurban fare, and in some instances
