#### What God Has Revealed

God has revealed in His Word and through the testimonies of His spirit all the dangers that are to befall the people of this world in these last days, and He has set watchmen who are to discern the signs and warn the people.

God's Word reveals the perils of our times, and shows us that through love of self and covetousness, greed will so take possession of the people in the last days that

ant, not only in the world, but among the professed followers of Apostasy will be written everywhere, 'evil men and seducers waxing worse and worse". The craze for money will lead many to err from the faith and become overcharged with cares. All of these things, and many others, are revealed in the sure Word.

From time to time we have endeavored to call the attention of our people to these dangers, both by voice and through the REPORTER. We have kept the dangers of the present apostasy before our people, and have warned them against designing and scheming men who would secure their money for naught; and for months as money matters have been tightening up, with a general depression in business, and but little real estate being sold, we have at our camp-meetings and otherwise advised our people to make the Conference their

#### Place of Deposit.

Some have taken this advice and their money is invested in the cause and where they can get it when needed. Others, for lack of interest in the cause of God, or for a lack of confidence in the managers, instead of depositing their surplus funds with the Conference, hid it somewhere, or have deposited it in banks or loaned it at a rate of interest ranging from two to four per cent, some even drawing no interest at This has been the case with some when the Conference was in need of funds and offering four per cent for the use of the money. A few have recently told me of these facts. But we are glad there is coming a change and a number are beginning to believe that

our money where we know it will be advancing the work of God, than to have it in banks to be loaned out perhaps to saloon-keepers to carry forward a business in opposition to our work and ruining our boys, or it may be loaned to erect places of amusement and houses for the ruination of our girls. Should we not stop and think seriously of these things, and then place our funds where they will be helping to advance the Message we claim to love?

#### Must Give an Account

The watchman must give an account, and God will require faithfulness; and those at the head of the work are watching every movement in the world. They are keeping an eye on the commercial reports and the general trend of the financial world, as our brethren in general do not and cannot do, as they have not the opportunity or the information at hand. We have called the attention of our people to the fact that in the near future there would be failures that would result in many losing their funds deposited in banks. Some took our advice and have been making the Conference their place of deposit. Others perhaps may have thought that we were trying to scare them to get them to place their money with the Conference. But this was not so. We saw all the indications pointing unmistakably to this sure result, and were simply doing our duty as faithful stewards.

#### The Climax

We have now reached the climax, and many of our brethren find their little surplus locked up in the banks. In the last issue of the REPORTER I spoke of the failure of the Knickerbocker Trust Company of New York, and several large manufacturing establishments in Pittsburg. Later several large banks in Brooklyn, with millions of dollars in deposits, things would have thrown the whole country into the greatest panic it has ever seen had it not been for the Government and a few wealthy men coming to the rescue; but notwithstanding this, all the money of the country, or nearly so, is locked up in the banks, and the depositers are unable to get more than a few dollars each day on their deposits.

#### Some Experiences

One of our brethren recently told me that he had been having some work performed, but his money was in the bank and he could not get it to pay for the work. I told him to bring his certificates of deposit to our office and we would get his money for him, or let him have what he needed. He tuen I think realized for the first time the truthfulness of what has been said, that the Third Angel's Message is the safest place in the world to deposit our funds. He told me he was going to take all of his money out of the bank and do his banking with the Conference. This is a wise decision. Other brethren have told me that their money was locked up and they could not get it.

#### What Should We Do?

Why should not every Seventh-day Adventist who really believes we have a message for the world, cooperate in this work by letting every surplus dollar not needed by us be working for the advancement of the message? This is the only reasonable course to pursue. The Conference is safe and will pay any reasonable amounts upon a few days' notice.

#### For The Present

While we are erecting the sanitarium, the Conference will take a limited amount of money at 4% interest, payable on sixty days' notice, or will take small amounts without interest, payable on demand. And we can remit your money by post-office order, or registered letter, so you can have it as it is needed

If any of our brethren have certificates of deposit for money in banks, whether due or not, and wish to turn them over to the Conference as a loan, the Conference can handle them and will take the certificates

brethren can. We have arrangements with our bank where we can get favors that our brehhren throughout the state doing business with small banks can not get. If any of our brethren have money deposited in banks that they can not get, and are needing it, send your certificates or certified checks to us at our office, and we will let you have the money on them.

#### Again Demonstrated

Thus it is again demonstrated that the Third Angel's message is the only thing that is sure and is the safest place in the world to place our deposits. Do not be afraid of the bank of heaven. It is good, and will pay all deposits when everything else is tumbling.

#### How Long Will Present Conditions

Some of our brethren are asking how long the present state of affairs will continue. No one can tell. At first men of the world predicted that it would last only a few days. Later they said a few weeks. Recently the papers have predicted that we will feel the effects for months. The only salvation of half the banks in the country has been their taking the benefit of an existing law which allows them to hold deposits a certain length of time, or until due notice is given of its withdrawal.

The people have been so wrought up that runs would have been made on thousands of banks, and forced them to the wall. As it is, many are withdrawing their money as fast as they can, and will not soon deposit it again as they have done; and this will cause a general depression, and place the banks in a condition where it will be harder to procure loans. For weeks many of the small banks have refused to discount good notes, or loan money, and the present situation will add to the scarcity of ready cash.

#### "LIBERTY" AND WHAT IT IS DOING

As our workers made fairly good wages selling Liberty at five cents before it was enlarged, and as Life and Health has demonstrated that a 10 cent paper will sell as well as a 5 cent paper, what may we expect? Most of our Life and Health agents sold during September and thus far into October from 50 to 100 copies per day. Life and Health more than doubled its circulation during the month of September just after it was raised to ten cents a copy. If Liberty does this well we will place over 135,000 copies this quarter, and 5 00 we believe we will do it. Certainly

the contents of this number deserve at least this number put into circulation.

The problem of selling Liberty and Life and Health is now solved. Our people now know that they can make a good living selling these A 15 year old girl in iournals. Lincoln, Nebraska, was, up to a few days ago, making regularly \$7.00 per day, clear profits selling Life and Health. Up to about a year ago we did not seem to be able to gain admittance into the Southern states with Life and Health, but since that time Florida has given us a good patronage. One of our workers recently wrote us that she was averaging 12 copies per bour while she was selling 500 copies of the October number. Two sisters in Texas wrote us that they have averaged 50 copies each a day. A company of Life and Health and Liberty workers traveling through the Eastern states reported from Auburn, New York that they are were selling from 50 to 75 copies each every afternoon. We have a large number of persons who use only their spare time in selling these periodicals, and they report all the way from 10 to 20 copies per hour. All this shows the average in sales with these periodicals is good. #### EXTRACTS FROM CORRESPONDENCE

BROTHER H. C. CARMICHAEL, our oldest canvasser, writes from Seymour:

"The Lord is still blessing me in the canvassing work. I am trying to make sacrifices for the Lord and He blesses me in that also. I am making it a habit at present of coming in on Thursday evening to attend prayer meeting. Each one should feel that he is individually responsible for the success of the cause in the place where he lives."

Miss Fannie Johnston, who very recently began work with "Coming King!" in Columbia City, says concerning her first experience in the work:
