HILE others have written in regard to our annual Conference which was recently held at La Fayette, I think it proper to

call the attention of our brethren and sisters to a few of the recommendations that were passed at this gathering.

All will notice by carefully reading the recommendations in this issue of the paper that the work that has been done at Beechwood Academy has been greatly appreciated by our brethren and sisters throughout the state, and that it was voted to ask those in charge of the sanitarium work to arrange to give the students in the training-school there the necessary studies to make them proficient in their work. This undoubtedly will open the way for a three or four-years course by those who may wish to take it, where they can

go and pay their way while they are obtaining an education and receiving instruction in caring for the sick. It will also give those who are deficient in some lines of education an opportunity of taking studies to better prepare them for the work. This will mean quite a forward movement in educational matters in Indiana. While it will not detract in any great degree from the work now being carried forward at Beechwood, some of the older students who have or might otherwise attend the Beechwood Academy, may desire to go and attend the school in connection with the sanitarium, where they can work and pay their way, which they could not do at Beechwood.

I am sure it will be very gratifying indeed to our brethren and sisters to know that we have reached the time in Indiana when we can extend assistance to the work outside of our own borders. It was unanimously voted that during the coming year we would support a native worker in each of the the following countries: South Africa, Japan, China, and India; that we would support Elder Steele in the West Virginia Conference, and that we among the colored people of the Thus it will be seen that South. while Indiana will endeavor to carry forward more aggressive work than ever before in its own borders, that it is reaching out to assist other needy fields in the United States and throughout all the world. I am sure that this movement will receive the hearty co-operation of all the brethren and sisters throughout the state of Indiana, and I trust that it will be a great incentive to our brethren and sisters to be more faithful if possible in the payment of tithes.

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CONFERENCE ENDORSES THE ACTION OF RAISING \$25,000 FOR THE ES-TABLISHMENT OF THE WABASH VALLEY SANITARIUM

AT the recent Conference the following recommendation was unanimously adopted.

(b) That we endorse the plan of the Conference Committee to raise \$25,000 on the certificate plan to pay for the erection and equipping of the new building, and urge the hearty cooperation on the part of all to secure as many large loans as possible to the Association, on the certificate plan, from private individuals throughout the Conference.

(c) That every Seventh-day Adventist church in Indiana be asked to raise a fund on the certificate plan which will stand to the credit of that church to be applied on board, room, and treatment of anyone whom the church may desire to send to the Sanitarium, the sums to

on a plan similar to the one adopted in raising the \$150,000 Fund, accord ing to the membership of the church.

We wish to speak in this article especially in regard to the last recommendation, in which it recommends that all of the churches in Indiana join in raising the sum of \$5,000 on the certificate plan to be applied on the \$25,000 Fund being raised to build and equip the new Sanitarium building at Lafyette.

When this matter came before the Conference, it seemed to meet with the hearty approval of nearly every person present. It was thought that we ought to raise as much on the certificate plan amoung our

> There is no better way that our brethren and sisters can help who desire to give small amounts ranging from one to ten dollars, than to assist in helping to raise a fund for the church; for the person giving only \$5 on the certificate plan would not In raising \$5,000 on the certificate have a credit sufficient to amount to from each person, the sum total will assist some needy person in the recovery of health.

> > It was decided at the conference to make the amount \$2.50 per capita, or have each church raise a sum equal to \$2 50 per capita of its membership; but in looking over the churches of the Conference with the secretary, it was found that many of the churches have been so reduced in membership that the \$2.50 per capita would not be sufficient to raise the \$5,000. Therefore we had to figure upon a basis of \$3 00 per member, but be it definitely understood that this is not an assessment; neither is it proposed that each member will pay just \$3.00, no more or no less. Let our churches enter upon this work cheerfully, and those who are able to pay five, ten or twenty-five dollars, do so, to make up for those who can pay only small amounts; and if some churches can raise more than the portion named, let them do so, as it will be needed in making up the sum total.

We are publishing in this week's REPORTER a tabulated list of the names of our churches, and the amounts to be raised, similar to the one published in raising our portion of the \$150,000. This report will appear from time to time, and we trust our workers and brethren and sisters will take hold unitedly to raise this fund as quickly as possible, as it is greatly needed now in completing and equipping the new building.

The raising of these sums by our churches does not preclude others' making large loans on the certificate plan, and we hope there will be many of our brethren and sisters

We recommed, That all our workers help to strengthen the State Home Department of the Sabbath-School by furnishing the State Secretary with the names and addresses of all such, whom they may find in their lobors throughout the Conference, and that the local Sabbath-Schools be urged to take up this work for those of their number who do not attend, and thus bring the entire conference into a united and harmonious study of our Sabbath-School lessons.

Whereas. The primary object of fund, that in some appropriate way to-house canvass during the next our young people's work is the salvation and development of our youth, through prayer, study, and personal missionary effort; that in order to develop in them skill and tact, and that they may bear their share of the responsibility in the work of God; therefore.

- 5. We Recommend, That all our churches engage in active missionary effort, cooperating with and directing the young people in their midst.
- 6. Resolved, That it shall be one of the chief aims of all our workers and church officers to interest our young people in getting an education and training for the work.
- 7. Resolved, That we urge our young people to follow the instruction given in the chapter in "Ministry of Healing" headed, "The False and the True in Education" on the subject of literature for the young; and that they institute a crusade against harmful reading.
- 8. Resolved, That our consecrated young people be encouraged to carry out the instruction given them in the Spirit of Prophecy to "act a part in well organized plans for helping other youth.'
- 9. Resolved, That we do all in our power to check the tendencies to to worldliness among our young people, holding before them by our example the principles of sacrifice, plainness in dress, and simplicity of life committed to us as a people.

WHEREAS, The unfolding of the Third Angel's Message has developed the need of many primary Christian schools, and,

WHEREAS, There is a great dearth of competent teachers among us, therefore,

10. Resolved. That the Conference workers and church officers urge suitable young people to prepare for this important work.

Whereas, our Beechwood school is without suitable appliances, such as maps, globes, and other apparatuses, necessary for the most effective work; and,

WHEREAS, Our institutions should be continually improved in their facilities for training workers; there-

11. We Recommend, That more at-

means be solicited for this purpose.

WHEREAS, The Lord has stated and it has been demonstrated that medical missionaries have a great advantage over those who have no knowlege of treating the sick; and,

WHEREAS, The Indiana Conference has established at La Fayette a school, where students may not only obtain a knowlege of how to treat the sick but at the same time work to defray their expenses; and,

WHEREAS, Many who desire to enter the nurses' course are deficient in some lines of education; therefore,

- 12. We Recommend, (a) That the Board of Directors of the Indiana Medical Missionary and Benevolent Association make arrangements to give the necessary studies to make school proficient in their work;
- (b) That we endorse the plan of the Conference Committee to raise \$25,000 on the certificate plan to pay for the erection and equipping of the new building and urge the hearty co-operation on the part of all to secure as many large loans as possible to the Association, on the certificate plan from private individuals throughout the Conference;
- (c) That every Seventh-Day Adventist church in Indiana be asked to raise a fund on the certificate plan which will stand to the credit of that church to be applied on board, room, and treatment of anyone whom the church may desire to send to the Sanitarium, the sums to be raised by these churches to be upon a plan similar to the one adopted in raising the \$150,000 Fund, according to the membership of the church.

WHERMAS, The book "Ministry of Healing" has been published and dedicated to the medical missionary work; and,

WHEREAS, This book contains just the information that not only our own people need, but which should be in every home in the land;

13. > WHEREAS. The new Columbia Union Conference recently formed in the East has invited Elder Rees to take the presidency of the West Virginia Conference, which position he has accepted; and,

WHEREAS, This new union conference has also asked that the Indiana Conference permit Elder Rees to choose a minister from this conference to assist him in that field and support this worker for one year; and.

35. We Recommend, That the Constitution be amended as follows:

ARTICLE II, after the word "Treasurer" insert "an Assistant Treasurer"-

ARTICLE II, Sections 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12, be numbered respectfully, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 13, 14.

That ARTICLE II, Section 6, read as follows:

Section 6 It shall be the duty of the Assistant Trensurer to act as accountant and to exercise the prerogatives of the Treasurer in his absence, and do such other business as may be assigned him.

That ARTICLE II, Section 12, read as follows:

Section 12. It shall be the duty of the Financial Agent to audit the books of church treasurers, to investigate church and conference deeds, and to promote other financial interests of the Conference.
