AM glad to hear through our workers and the REPORT-ER the good progress the work is making in Indiana in my absence.

A few had faith and advanced the money to make a payment of a thousand dollars and take an option on the place for thirty days. The leading brethren on the Conference committee still opposed it; but it was finally carried over the heads of all and the property was purchased.

Some who opposed it nearly went into darkness, and doubt. Now, through the instruction of the Lord, His blessing has been manifested in such a marked manner, that nearly all can see that the Lord was leading all the way, and that Loma Linda is destined to become one of the leading educational centers of this denomination. Some have had hearty confessions to make to get back into the light. How much better when the Lord speaks, whether we can see and reason out just how the thing is to be done, that we accept it and take hold to carry out to the best of our ability the instruction the Lord gives us.

No one will ever regret in the judgment the money invested in this branch of the Lord's work. Never has there been an institution launched in Indiana which was destined to be the factor in the hands of God of accomplishing as much good as

this As I see the scores of bright young men and women here at Loma Linda, seeking to obtain the finishing touch that will prepare tnem to go forth into the great harvest field. I can get a glimpse of what we will see-in part-at the Wabash Valley Sanitarium a little in the future. And the time will actually come when some who are now withholding their influence and means, will lament their blindness, but it may be too late.

I wish I could impress upon the minds of all our dear brethren and sisters in Indiana the intense feeling that comes upon me as I write these things, and as I have been made to sense them since coming to Loma Linda, and learning more of how the Lord has been leading here. I am convinced as never before that our people generally are not yet half awake to this important branch of the Third Angel's Message.

I hope to see the \$5,000 to be raised by our churches on the \$25,000 Fund quickly made up. Then the remainder should be loaned in larger sums by our brethren who are able, on the certificate plan.

In the REPORTER of Sept. 18, 1907, I wrote an article in which I stated that we would like to have ten persons who would loan on the certificate plan, \$500 each; fifty persons who would loan \$100 each; one hundred persons who would loan \$50 each; and two hundred persons who would loan \$25 each, to aid in this sanitarium enterprise. I am glad to see that we have nine of the ten who are putting in \$500 each, but the \$25, \$50, and \$100 lists are not growing as rapidly as they We are glad, however, to should. learn that others are thinking and planning to assist.

Our workers are giving some attention to this matter as they visit the churches, and I hope it will all be made up before tent season. want to see the coming summer marked by successful tent effort, and a general forward move along every line of our work in Indiana.

Excellent reports come from our school work at Beechwood, and there is not a department of the work but that is onward. Let us praise God and take courage, for W. J. STONE. God is with us.

Case Against Adventists Thrown Out Of Court

ABOUT one year ago, F. E. Belden filed a bill of complaint in the Circuit Court requesting that the Seventhstrained from reorganizing and em- satisfactory room.

bodying any new religious tests into the creed of the church and that the Battle Creek Tabernacle Board of Trustees be restrained from selling or incumbering their church property. The reason that the suit was brought was that it was expected the new Board of Trustees would transfer the property to the West Michigan Conference legal association. It was to prevent the transfer that the suit was brought.

A temporary injunction against transferring the property was granted. Numerons legal papers have been filed by both sides during the past twelve months.

On Friday afternoon, February 28, Judge North filed his opinion with the county clerk, by which the bill of complaint is dismissed from court. We quote a few statements from Judge North's decision.

Inasmuch as the original articles of association expressly provide for disposing of church building, etc., upon proper proceedings having been taken in the organization, the court of equity can scarcely be asked to intervene to prevent a disposition of the property when it does not appear it the bill of complaint that such disposition is not being made in the manner provided in the articles of association. . . .

The bill of complaint does not specify any new or other religious tests than those of the original organization. . . and in any event, it is a serious question as to what right the court has to interfere in the regulation of the religious tests or requirements of such a body as the Defendant organization.

Our readers will all be glad to learn of this victory, which has, however, been expected by those best acquainted with the case. It. was feared for a while that the Tabernacle might be lost to the denomination, but this decision permits the denomination to handle it in whatever manner it desires.

The following churches missed it would reach our office before the Greenfield, Indianapolis 23rd Street, only one month of sending in tithe; Anderson, Connersville, Gum Corner, Indianapolis, West Side, Marion, and South Bend. Several churches sent tithe ten months out of the year. Will not all our churches endeavor to send in their tithe every month so there will be no blank places in our report?

We are glad to note the gain in many of our churches over last year. It is commendable indeed. SOFFY to see also a falling off in a few instances. On the whole, the amount per member exceeds the average of last year over two dollars a member. We have tried to cut down the membership of each church to about its actual membership, which gives only a membership of 1858 instead of 2033; and we are confident if we had the actual membership of all our churches it would fall still short of this estimate.

It will be interesting to study the amount of tithe paid per member of each church. The church paying the largest tithe was Jefferson,-an average of \$31.00 per member. while the Angola, Goshen, and Wolf Lake churches paid next the largest tithe per member, being over twenty-three dollars.

The smallest tithe paid per member by any church was \$2.50. A few other churches fell below the three dollar mark. Would it not be well for the officers of these churches and the ministers raising up these churches to look into the matter and give some thorough instruction as to duty along this line?

DOUBTLESS all are aware that there are six Sunday bills now pending in Congress. Two are before the Senate, and four in the House of Representatives. There has never been a more persistent and unrelenting spirit manifested on the part of Sunday-law advocates than there is at the present time to secure a Sunday law for the District of Columbia.

Last week the advocates of Sunday legislation held a mass meeting in the New York Avenue Church of

Justice Harlan, of the United States Supreme Court, presided. The arguments for a Sunday law in the District of Columbia were strong from their view point; but exceedingly weak from the stand point of the Gospel and American principles.

Senator Gallinger, the Chairman of the District Committee of the Senate, has announced that in the near future a hearing will be given to all classes of people on the Sunday bills which are now before that Committee There will doubtless soon be a hearing before the District Committee of the House of Representatives. What we do to defeat these bills now before Congress, must be done at once. We fear should these bills be recommended favorably to the Senate and to the House of Representatives, they may become a law.

We therefore urge every Seventh-Day Adventist and all lovers of liberty to write without delay letters of protest to the chairmen of these two committees, and to each member of these committees, if possible. The following are the two committees referred to:-

"Yet this very class put forth the claim that the fast spreading corruption is largely attributable to the desecration of the so called 'Christian Sabbath,' and the enforcement of Sunday observance would greatly improve the morals of society. The temperance work, one of the most prominent and important of moral reforms, is often combined with the Sunday movement, and the advocates of the latter represent themselves as laboring to promote the highest interests of society; and those who refuse to unite with them are denounced as the enemies of temperance and reform. But the fact that a movement to establish error is connected with a work which in itself is good, is not an argument in favor of the error. We may disguise poison by mingling with it wholesome food, but we do not change its nature. . . . It is one of Satan's devices to combine with falsehood just enough truth to give it plausibility. The leaders of the Sunday movement may advocate reforms which the people need, principles which are in harmony with the Bible, yet while there is with these a requirement that is contrary to God's law, his servants can not unite with them.

"Through the two great errors, the immortality of the soul and the Sunday sacredness, Satan will bring the people under his deceptions. While the former lays the foundation for Spiritualism, the latter creates a bond of sympathy with Rome. The Protestants of the United States will be foremost in stretching their hands across the gulf to grasp the hand of Spiritualism; they will reach over the abyss to clasp hands with the Roman power; and under the influence of this three fold union, this country will follow in the steps of Rome in trampling on the rights of conscience."
