Let there be a class for the training of the youth as well. Young men and women should be educated to become workers at home, in their own neighborhoods, and in the church.

All this work of training should be accompanied with earnest seeking of the Lord for His Holy Spirit. Let this be urged home upon those who are willing to give themselves to the Master's service. Our conduct is watched by the world; every act is scrutinized and commented upon. 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TO WHOM TO SEND PETITIONS FROM INDIANA

THE petitions to Congress against Sunday legislation should, in all cases, as far as possible, be sent to the congressmen representing the districts in which the petitions have been circulated. The State of Indiana is divided into thirteen congressional districts, each of which is represented in Congress by a representative. These districts, the counties comprising them, and the representatives representing them, are as follows:-

The petitions should be accompanied by a brief, courteous letter of explanation, and sent to the proper congressman, care Capitol Building, Washington, D. C.

In order to ascertain who your representative is, look through the different districts, and when you find the county in which your petition was circulated, you have found your district, and the name of your representative in Congress. Please let all carefully take note of this instruction, and act accordingly; and remember the petitions may be sent in any time after December 7, the time of the opening of Congress.

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THE MISSIONARY CONVENTION

A MISSIONARY CONVENTION Was held at Indianapolis, beginning Friday P. M., Nov. 6, and continuing until Sunday evening, Nov. 8. R. C. Spohr, Missionary Secretary of the Conference, arranged the program for the Convension, which proved to be very interesting, but above all, instructive and helpful, and should prove a source of encouragement to all who were privileged to attend.

The musical part of each session, under the direction of A. N. Anderson, was a helpful part of the program, and appreciated by all. The recitations by the children were also interesting.

Mrs. R. W. McMahan presided at the first session. R. C. Spohr gave a very interesting talk on the "Progross of the Message in the Worldwide Field." He said that some time ago it was being reported that Seventh-day Adventists are disintegrating. Unmistakable evidence was produced showing that if the denomination is disintegrating, Webster failed to define the word correctly.

Elder O, S. Hadley's talk on "Circulation of *Liberty* among Lawyers," was full of good points. In his work among these men, he found many who were really ignorant of the principles of religious liberty, but when the matter was clearly presented to them they saw the injustice of Sunday laws, and expressed themselves as desirous of casting their influence on the right side.

Sabbath morning, P. J. Miller presented the subject of "Circulating Petitions against Sunday Bills." It was clearly shown that now is the time to be active in this work.

Mrs. R. W. McMahan's paper, "The Sabbath-school an Important Factor in Missionary Work," should be an incentive to all of us to be more faithful in the Sabbath-school work. We are told by the spirit of prophecy that our Sabbath-schools are to play an important part in the closing up of the message," also, that "many will go out from our Sabbath-schools to labor for the Master who never have had the opportunity of entering one of our academies or colleges."

Of interest to all, and of special interest to our youth was the subject presented by Floyd F. Thompson, "A Successful Summer's Missionary Campaign," It was interesting to note how the Lord guided and prospered the little pioneer company of periodical workers last summer. The work was not only a blessing to them, but has been the means of stimulating, in many other young people, the desire to do aggressive field work.

In the afternoon the subject, "Management of a Periodical Company," was presented by the writer, showing to some extent the daily work connected with this task.

R. C. Spohr presented the matter of "The Great Fall Missionary Campaign" with the special number of the *Review*. This is a work in which all should have a part. The following words are from the pen of Mrs. E. G. White in regard to toll."

this work: "Talk it over and do all in your power to secure gifts." "We are not to feel that it would not be the thing to ask men of the world for means, for it is just the thing."

Sunday afternoon Mrs. Ida V. Hadley gave a very interesting talk on the "Bible Readings Effective Missionary Work."

It was shown that the success of Bible workers depends upon the manner of presenting the truth. They must endeavor to present the Saviour as He is,—a loving father, and not a judge.

Elder Miller presented the subject of "Missionary Effort with Congressmen and Legislators," This is a work that must not be neglected. There is at present a Sunday bill in Congress which has passed the Senate, and at the next session will come ap for consideration in the House. If this becomes a law it means that the work which might have been done in times of peace, will have to be done in troublous times. Some of the congressmen have promised to use their influence against this bill.

Dr. O. A. Olsen, of England, gave a very interesting talk concerning the medical work and the distribution of our health journals. He endeavored to impress all with the importance of having a part in this great work by taking at least five copies of *Life and Health* each month to distribute. Our people in England are doing much more than this, and generally speaking, they are not as well able to do it as our people in this country.

Elder W. J. Stone was present at this service, and spoke words of encouragement which were much appreciated. His physical condition did not admit of his being present at the other meetings.

Sunday evening Elder Miller gave a sermon on "Curistian Citizenship," to a large and attentive audience.

This was the closing service of the Convention, the results of which will, no doubt, be seen in a deeper consecration and more eacnest work throughout our Conference.
