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#### LAKE UNION CONFERENCE



HE delegates to the Lake Union Conference from Indiana were nearly all in the Tabernacle at Battle Creek, Mich., when the first business

meeting of the fifth biennial session was called to order Wednesday morning, February 9. With the arrival of Brother T. A. Goodwin, who was delayed on account of sickness in his family, and Prof. Clifton L. Taylor, whose duties at the Academy would not permit his leaving there sooner, Indiana's delegation had only two absentees, Dr. Worster and Brother Burt White, the latter being detained because of illness. The two latest arrivals came Thurs-

day evening of last week.

The first two days, last Wednesday and Thursday, were almost entirely devoted to the discussion of interesting topics in a Bookmen's Convention. All the delegates were edified by the discussions and can more perfectly cooperate now in the important work of circulating literature for the advancement of the third angel's message.

The standing committees for the session were announced last Thursday morning. Indiana was well represented on the committees, Elder Lukens being chairman of the nominating committee, Elder Young being on the committee on credentials and licenses, Elder Miller, Dr. Worster, and Sister McMahan on the committee on plans and resolutions, and Elder Lukens on the committee on distribution of labor.

A partial report of the committee on nomination was made last Friday afternoon and adopted, thus electing the persons mentioned, namely; President, Elder Allen Moon; Secretary and Treasurer. W. H. Edwards; Auditor for the Lake Union Conference books, J. H. Haughey; and Missionary Field Agent, J. B. Blosser. These were all elected to succeed themselves.

Very interesting, profitable Bible lessons are being given by Prof. W. W. Prescott. These are of great value to all in attendance and serve to establish more firmly in the minds of the delegates the truths that have made us what we are. The blessing of the Lord is being enjoyed in rich measure.

#### BIENNIAL REPORT FOR INDIANA

(Presented by Elder Lukens at the fifth biennial session of the Lake Union Conference, at Battle Creek, Mich., Feb, 8-18, 1910.)

TO THE DELEGATES IN CONFERENCE ASSEMBLED:

ASSEMBLED; Greeting: I take pleasure in rendering the report on this occasion for the Indiana Conference to the Lake Union Conference.

#### MEMBERSHIP

The Indiana Conference is composed of sixty-six churches with a membership of about nineteen hun-There are also six undrad organized companies of believers. These, together with the isolated believers, make a total of about two thousand. We have added four churches during the biennial term, yet we report fewer churches than we did two years ago. This is explained by the fact that several churches which existed in name only, were dropped by the Conference at its last annual session just one year ago, the remaining members having joined other churches. We have also dropped from the church records the names of persons whose whereabouts could not be ascertained. Some who had apostatized have been disfellowshipped; we have also lost some by removals and others by death. Notwithstanding all this, it will be seen that we have made some gain.

#### LABORERS

We have in the Conference at the present time, forty laborers: twelve ordained ministers, seven licentiates, twenty-one who hold missionary credentials. This number does not include our noble band of canvassers, nor our faithful company of workers at the Sanitarium, nor all of our teachers at Beechwood Academy.

#### EVANGELICAL WORK

Believing that now is the time to work our large cities, we have given special attention to this work in the last year. We now have workers living and doing aggressive work in Indianapolis, Fort Wayne, Terre Haute, South Bend, Muncie, La Fayette, and other cities,

Twenty tent efforts have been held during the two years. These, together with other efforts put forth, have resulted in gathering into our churches over two hundred people. We have held five camp-meetings. three of which were local. In addition to these camp-meetings, we had eight general meetings last fall. They were of great spiritual benefit to our people and gave a new impetus to our work in the Conference

We recently closed a very successful elders' meeting. We believe that when the elders put into practice the instruction given, it will help our churches spiritually as well financially.

#### MEDICAL

Two years ago, the following was read in your hearing:

"The medical work in Indiana has been strengthened by securing an ideal site consisting of twentyfive acres, three miles from the city of La Fayette, on a trolley line, and erecting thereon a good building for a Sanitarium. . , . , We expect to establish in connection with the Sanitarium an ideal training school."

The Sanitarium and training school are now realities. Already three classes of bright young people have been graduated from the training school, most of whom are now engaged in advancing the third angel's message,

We had the privilege last August of entertaining Sister White at the Sanitarium. In writing of her impression of the place and surroundings, she says:

"We were interested in this sanitarium and its surroundings, for the Lord has presented before me in vision just such a scene. I could hardly believe that I had not seen the place before with my natural eyes.

"I am instructed to say that it is in the order of God that this property has been secured. It is to become an important center for missionary work in the surrounding cities. Our sanitariums are designed of God to be institutions though which He can work.

"In securing and equipping the La Fayette Sanitarium, our brethern have acted according to their best judgement. They have not moved rashly. Some have tried to discourage this enterprise, but I am instructed to'say, "Help those that are struggling with difficulties, If they look to Him for counsel, the Lord will bless and strengthen the physician and the helpers in the Sanitarium.

"Let not our brethren feel it their duty to restrict the investment of means where it is needed. It is the Lord's order that the Sanitarium has been secured.

"There is an important work to be done in the vicinity of LaFayette."

While the running expenses of the Sanitarium were one thousand dollars more than the income in the year 1908, which was the first year of its existence, last year the receipts show a substantial gain of more than four thousand dollars. Our people are much encouraged over the out-look of the medical work in Indiana and are entering heartily into the plan recommended by the General Conference Committee of selling the book, "Ministry of Healing," to relieve the indebtedness of this institution.

#### EDUCATION

Becchwood Academy, located in almost the central part of our Conference, stands at the head of our educational department. The enrollment last year was sixty four; this year it has already reached seventy-two, which is said to be the largest that it has ever been.

The net gain of the Academy for the year ending June 1, 1909, was \$543.91. Eight teachers are employed. Thirty-five percent of the students are working a part of their way through school. The industries, are agriculture, horticulture, printing, domestic science, and sewing and dress-making. Several improvements have been made in the water system, fire protection, library, dormitory furnishings, treatment room equipments, bath rooms, etc.

#### CHURCH SCHOOLS

Our educational secretary, Sister McMahan, has worked hard in the interests of the church-school work.

port, both as to the number of schools and the number of students.

While there are many difficulties to meet, the Lord has greatly blessed the efforts put forth and all the schools are doing nicely.

#### SABBATH-SCHOOL

We are much encouraged over the work being done in our Sabbath The interest is steadily sehools. The seventy-eight Sabgrowing. bath-schools in our field have a membership of 1463. The donations for the last four years are as follows: 1906, \$1,063.02, of which \$815.90 went to missions; 1908, \$12,195 97, of which \$1,016.01 went to missions; 1909, \$1,404.71, of which \$1,126.86 went to missions; 1909, \$1,616.03, of which \$1,476.11 went to missions. The missionary spirit prevails in most of our schools, so that, with very few exceptions, our schools are sending all their donations to missions. During the last six monthsthe donations have practically all gone for that purpose. We hope that Indiana will soon be on the honor roll.

#### MISSIONARY VOLUNTIER DEPARTMENT

The young people's work has not been left out of our consideration. We now have twelve societies with a present membership of 172. Many of our young people are taking the reading course, and two have secured the certificate of attainment. We are also glad to report the conversion of several of our young paople during the last year.

#### MISSIONARY DEPARTMENT

The amount of business done by the Tract Society during the two years since we were last in session is \$21,505.84. During the year 1908, about 20,000 ten-cent magazines were sold by Indiana agents; during 1909, 50.941 ten-cent magazines were sold, making a total of 70,947 for the biennial period, the periodical business for this time amounting to \$9,201.64,

The books sold during this term were valued at \$7,224.94. Several of our churches have organized missionary societies and are doing aggressive work. Eternity alone will reveal the result of their faithful efforts.

#### RELIGIOUS LIHERTY

During the last biennial period, our secretary has, either in person or by proxy, visited all our national Congressmen except two, in reference to the Johnston Sunday bill. We believe much good was done by these visits

Public meetings have been held in answering National Reform ideas. At our camp-meetings, a number of religious liberty studies were given. Many of the underlying principles of liberty were clearly set forth in these studies. The petition work has received its share of attention and petitions have been sent to Congress protesting against religious legislation. The magazine Liberty is being sent to the Governor and all the state legislators.

At the present time, the mayor of Indianapolis is making a vigorous fight against the Sunday saloon, even going so far as to compel the saloon-keeper to go to church if he does not close his saloon on Sunday.

THE \$300,000 FUND

Already a beginning has been made in our Conference to raise our share of the \$300,000 Fund More than onefourth of our quota has been pledged, and several hundred dollars paid in. We hope to have the entire amount pledged before the year 1910 closes.

#### FINANCES

The tithe paid into the Conference for the year 1909 was \$19,135.08, a gain of \$656.92 over the year 1908, total for the two years being \$37,-613 94

The total donations sent outside the State for missionary purposes during the year 1909 were \$7,434.60, and for the year 1908, they were \$5. 569 72, making a total for the biennial period of \$13,004.32.

All departments of the Indiana Conference are free from debt with the exception of the medical department. The Medical Missionary & Benevolent Association has present worth, in round numbers, of \$17,000, the assets being \$51,000 and the liabilities, \$34,000. We hope the latter will be materially decreased during the present year.

RADER-Arminta B. Rader was near Fairmount Indiana, horn April 30, 1888, died at the home of her her sister, Mrs. Cemer, January 20, 1910, having lived twenty-one years, eight months, and twenty days. During her life she was a constant sufferer, being afflicted from childhood; but she was patient contented with her lot and seldom complained. Her childhood afflictions prevented her attending public school but she improved the time in home study and reading the Bible.

In June 1899 she was baptized and united with the Seventh-day Adventist Church at Michaels, Indiana. Not having the privilege of enjoying much of this world's pleasures she was a great lover of the church and locked foward with pleasure to the weekly gatherings and was always faithful in bearing testimonies when opportunity was granted. One of her last testimonies was,"I know the way my health is failing I will not be permitted to meet with you here many more times, but I am thankful I have the assurance that I will come forth in the first resurrection, and will be accompanied by an angel to meet my Saviour."

During the last few weeks of her life she often made the statements. "It would be so nice to be asleep in Jesus and lie by the side of father;" he having preceded her in death about five years. Of the family there remains the mother, two brothers, and a sister to morn their loss, but with the blessed hope, if faithful, of meeting again.
