A program was rendered by the Topeka Young People's Society at the close of the Sabbath-school last Sabbath, August 6th. A report of our work in this city was given, also a nice report from Sister Emerson of what other societies were doing. Each member gave his experiences thus adding to the interest of the occasion.

Sisters Hornbeck and Bland, from Leavenworth write, "Since the organization of the Colored Sabbath-school, the average attendance has been sixteen, and they are much encouraged by the prospects of increasing the attendance. More are attending the white people's Sabbath-school and meetings also." Sister Bland says, "Two more of my readers have just begun the observance of the Sabbath."

A letter from Brother A. D. Gilbert reveals the fact that in St. Louis our workers are "scattering the literature like the leaves of autumn." He says, "We are getting along real well with our work in this city; the interest is good and a great many are reading the Family Bible Teachers, which we are putting out at the rate of 2,500 per day. Bible Readings are being held with many families in the city."

Miss Carrie M. Hiatt, of Winfield, the former stenographer at this office, was seriously injured last week, by being thrown from a horse. She was out riding with a party of her friends, when the horse became frightened, and began to pitch violently, thus throwing Miss Hiatt to the ground. A finger of the right hand was dislocated, the left arm was broken twice above the wrist, and the tissues of the chin badly lacerated. Recent reports state she is slowly improving.

We wish to say to those who complain that our tents at camp-meeting are too low, and it wearies them to stoop so much—we will have some tents on the grounds this year that have walls six feet high. These are very convenient. Some are 10x14, 12x14, 12x16, and 10x20. They will rent a little higher than the low wall tents. A 10x14 will cost \$2.75, it has two rooms; a 12x14 with three rooms, will cost \$3.25; a 12x16 with three rooms, \$3.75; a 10x20 with three rooms, \$4.25.
