#### The Church School Work.

"There is earnest work to be done for the children. Before the overflowing scourge shall come upon all the dwellers upon the earth, the Lord calls upon all who are Iraelites indeed to serve Him. Gather your children unto your own houses; gather them in from the classes who are voiceing the words of Satan, who are disobeying the commandments of God. 'Strike the blood upon your door posts, and go not out until the morning. For the Lord will pass through to smite the Egyptians; and when he seeth the blood upon the lintel, and on the two side posts, the Lord will pass over the door, and will not suffer the destroyer to go in unto your house and smite you.'"

With many of our good S. D. A. Brethren the question is still lingering, Why not send my children to the public school? Ah that is shunning your Godgiven responsibility; that is leaving the placing of the blood upon the door post to the "herd boy." Dare you do it? Shall you leave that God given responsibility to another? What is the object of education? It is to "restore the image of God in the soul:" It is to teach him to behold Christ until he becomes like him. I am sure there is not one among us who does not want this object fulfilled in his children. Can you expect such results from the public school? No, there they are not taught to behold Christ. They are taught to indulge in the gratification of appetite, and selfish gratification of the senses, in ambition, pride, love of dress and display, love of praise and flattery, and strife for high rewards and honors as

a recompense for a scholarship. It will be impossible to escape these things and yet send your children to the public school. How can a school give a christian education when it is not christian itself? But some will say, oh I have my children with me the greater part of the time, and I can counteract influence of the school. But you do not have them the greater part of the time. You send them away to school at 8:30 A. M., they return at 4:30, being gone nine hours. You have then four hours in the evening and two in the morning, making in all, six hours; the time that you have them to teach. Will anyone say that he can counteract in six hours the evil influence of a public school for nine hours? It would have to be a better S. D. A. home than I have ever seen, and I have seen some good ones. Note the following quotation from P. C .: "I would rather that children grow up in a degree of ignorance of school education as it is today, and employ some other means to teach them."

The very fact that the Lord has instituted the church and home school is the best evidence that we cannot give our children a christian education without them.

. We are told that the time is soon coming when no one but the children will be allowed to carry the message to those in darkness. Then brethren, as it is utterly impossible for the public schools to give the education necessary for this work let us come up to the help of the Lord. Let us press together and do all in our power to establish schools where needed; where our children can be educated to finish God's work in the earth.

I am very much pleased to note the earnestness with which many of our people take hold of this work, but yet there are some hesitating; some withhold their means, and some do not see the importance of the work. It is a fact that some schools are needed in some churches that are not able to support a teacher; but there are many more that need schools that are pleading hard times. Brethren, we will see hard times as long as we rob God in tithes and offerings. Let us claim the blessing promised in Mal. 3:10-12.

I will state right here that all who have not read the two articles entitled "Training Children for God", by sister White in the Reviews of September 16, will miss a great deal if they do not do so at once.

THE SUPPORT OF THE WORK.

The question of a definite plan for the support of our schools has been one of great perplexity to our people. No doubt all recognize that the plan of charging tuition is not an ideal method. It makes the burden unequal. It is very heavy upon those who have children, and light upon those who have none. I believe that as we advocate a free gospel, that our church school work should be a free system of education, not to our people only, but to those outside the church. And for this reason I believe that the plan of support by donations is far better than the uition plan.

It is evident that the matter of feeding, clothing, and educating a child devolves upon the parents. This is true education, and is set forth in I Tim. 5:8. "If any provide not for his own, and especially for those of his own house, he hath denied the faith, and is worse than an infidel." However the expenses connected with some families are so great that the parents will not be able to bear the entire expense of educating their children, then the duty rests upon the church, and if the church is not able, then let the Conference provide for their education.

But if the present plan is not entirely satisfactory let us stand by it like loyal soldiers until more light is given.

Let no one think that because you have no children or your children have grown up and left your roof that you have no responsibility in this matter. I believe that every one connected with our people who does not take an active part in this work, will have it to meet in the great and final Judgment. This is clearly set forth in the following: "Let all share the expense. Let the church see that all who ought to receive its benefits are attending the school. Poor families should be assisted. We cannot call ourselves true missionaries if we neglect those at our very door, who are at the most critical age, and who need our aid to secure knowledge and experience that will fit them for the service of God. "Vol. 4 p. 217.

Reader, if you should see your brother's child drowning, would you not reach out after it at the peril of your own life? Your brother's child is drowning, as literally drowning in the contaminating influences of this world as though it were in the midst of a large river. Will you not reach out a helping hand to save these children? Your work will not stop here, its results will follow you throughout eternity.

Brethren I do not think that we will fully meet the mind of the Lord in this mater until we as a people unite in bringing to Him a second tithe for the support of this work. There is much I would like to say along this line but

space and time will not permit. But brethren cannot we all heartily comply with the recommendation passed by the conference? It reads like this,—"We recommend that each church member donate 25 cents or more each quarter to a conference school fund for the purpose of assisting and encouraging the educational work." This is certainly in harmony with the last clause of the following testimony:—

The church is asleep, and does not realize the magnitude of this matter of educating the children and youth.

The church should take in the situation, and by their influence and means seek to bring about the desired end. Let a fund be created by general contribution for the establishment of educational work."—S. T., p. 200.

Notice the testimony does not say that we should contribute occasionally, but it says that we are to make "general" contributions. Many of our schools are hampered for means, consequently the teacher is poorly paid. I admire the self sacrificing spirit with which many of our teachers are laboring. But brethren let us not impose on them, for it is God who gave them this spirit that this work might be carried on under trying circumstances. Do you know what it means to support this work in a manner in which it may be successfully carried on? It means the closing up of God's work in the earth very soon.

We are very thankful for the contributions last year. But as this year brings to us more calls for help, we must have more means to help with. Do you think, brother, as many do, that your donation would help the work very little, but give as though the work depended upon your offering.

If the above testimony and recommendation be complied with by all, there will be plenty of means in the treasury to help all who are not able to employ a teacher.

May the Lord help us to press together with one mind and purpose in this work, that when the work is finished we may be among those to whom it is said, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant: thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things; enter thou into the joy of the Lord."

#### Save The Children.

It is a recognized fact that many of our young people, who have been brought up in Seventh-day Adventist homes, are drifting out of the truth. If there is a power in this truth that will reach out and bring in those from the outside, who are even prejudiced, there certainly ought to be power enough to hold our own children.

Evidently the reason that this power, which reached the parents, and through them reaches their neighbors, does not get hold of the children is because the truth is not taught to them. The girl or boy goes to camp meeting and starts in the Christian life, to return home, and in a few weeks be in a worse condition than before they started, simply because they do not have the help they need at home.

Of course we have family worship and the children take part in a listless way, but do they really get any spiritual food from the Bible. Some parents say, "I do not know how to teach the Bible to my children and make it interesting." "The Story of Daniel the Prophet" by Elder S. N. Haskell has lately been revised, and by the addition of carefully prepared questions, which are given in the appendix, will be a great help to such parents.

We learn "that the character of Daniel should be studied, for its development reveals the secret of God's preparation of those who will welcome Christ at His appearing," and I am sure we all want our families to have that preparation. This ought to be studied by all the family together, and short lessons taken so that each child may do thorough work. At first it may take some perseverance on the part of the parents, but stick to it and insist on each lesson being well learned, because the salvation of the young, as well as of the older ones, depends on, not a daily reading, but a daily study of the Word of God.

#### Influence.

Every Christian is producing two sets of influences. Two currents of power issue from him, which set in motion the wheels of life around him.

One is the unconscious, involuntary influence of his real character; the other is the voluntary influence of what he consciously says and does, what he says and does for a special purpose. Now these two currents that flow from him may be opposed to one another. The character may be saying one thing and the lips and conduct another.
