Early and Later Light on Diet and Digestion David Paulson, M. D.

M ANY expert workmen know how to keep complicated machinery in perfect running order, yet they do not know how to keep their own bodies working at the highest efficiency. Three-fourths of the chronic disor-

ders come from unscientific eating and the indigestion and autointoxication which follow as a natural consequence.

For this reason we should carefully gather up all the rays of light that God has let shine upon the subjects of dietetics and digestion.

Accident Which Bore Fruit

Curiously enough, a frightful accident gave us the first reliable information on the subject of digestion. Nearly one hundred years ago the accidental discharge

stomach, causing it to pour out mucous, thus laying the foundation for gastric catarrh. People who in season and out of season add mustard, pepper and other fiery spices to their foods in nine cases out of ten will a little later pay a dear price for the same.

After some years Dr. Beaumont's half-Indian "patent digestor" became tired of all these endless experiments and left for his old Canadian wilds. This was a great disappointment der for it to be properly digested. That even the attractive appearance of food caused gastric juice to be secreted. That there was in a certain sense a separate gastric juice for each kind of food. This emphasizes the importance of *simplicity* in diet.

He discovered that it was necessary to be in a good state of mind in order to have normal digestion. In other words, we should not only thank the Lord for the food *before* we begin

to Dr. Beaumont, for he had hoped to develop a number of other important truths.

Pawlow and His Dog Experiments

Strangely enough, several generations passed by before God raised up any one to shed any additional important light on this wonderful subject of digestion.

Finally, Pawlow began his famous digestive experiments on dogs in his laboratory in St. Petersburg, Russia. All of his conclusions have since been verified in one way or the other on human beings. He observed that it was necessary for food to be *appetizing* in orto eat but continue to be thankful *during* the entire meal.

Horace Fletcher and Fletcherism

After Pawlow, Horace Fletcher added the next most important chapter to our knowledge of this interesting subject. Twenty years ago Mr. Fletcher was a broken-down physical wreck. In his own words, "Every six months or so I had a bad attack of 'influenza'; I was harrowed by indigestion; I was afflicte with 'that tired feeling.' I was an old man at forty, on the way to a rapid decline."

Being a man of wealth he naturally availed

himself of the best medical advice, but without any satisfactory results. It was then that he started to experiment on himself. "I chewed my food carefully until I extracted all taste from it there was in it, and until it slipped unconsciously down my throat. When the appetite ceased, and I was thereby told that I had had enough, I stopped; and I had no desire to eat any more until a real appetite commanded me again."

In five months' time he observed most noticeable improvements; clear head, springing body, walking was enjoyable, tired feeling gone and no colds. He was convinced that he had made a great discovery and he finally succeeded in arousing an interest in scientific circles to put his simple theories to a searching test.

The first experiments were made in the University of Cambridge, England, and later, on a much more extensive scale by Prof. Chittenden of Yale, and later by Prof. Irving Fisher also of Yale University. As a result of this extensive experimentation it was scientifically demonstrated that thorough mastication produced greater endurance, better health, and naturally cut down the amount of flesh food used and improved the general health.

Scientific Fasting

Horace Fletcher advised those who do not know what true hunger is to "skip a meal or two and give nature a chance to show you what *real* appetite (true watering of the mouth) is." The prolonged fasting that we sometimes hear about is certainly an unnecessary strain upon the system, while an occasional fast for a day or two, especially for people who have been overeating, is undoubtedly highly beneficial.

The same result can frequently be secured by living exclusively on fruit during the same length of time. This gives the liver a rest, cleanses the alimentary canal, and introduces useful salts into the blood. For those who are putting on surplus fat Fletcher has the following suggestion: "Those last two, three, or a few mouthfuls after appetite has said gently 'enough,' and before the same appetite says, loudly, 'stop' are the difference between obesity and decency of form."

Every good thing can be carried to an ex-

treme, and thorough mastication is no exception. On this point Fletcher says, "Do not overdo chewing, for then you take away much of the pleasure and smother the enjoyment of eating. Masticate all solid food until it is completely liquified, and excites in an irresistible manner the swallowing reflex or swallowing impulse."

Prof. Chittenden's Personal Experience

Before Prof. Chittenden undertook his remarkable dietetic experiments on a group of the United States soldiers which established the fact that the average man can advantageously cut down anywhere from one-half to two-thirds the amount of protein food that he is consuming, Prof. Chittenden first experimented upon himself. In diminishing protein or the beefsteak line of food he at first observed some discomfort, but he soon discovered that he was in an improved physical condition.

"A rheumatic trouble in the knee joint, which had persisted for a year and a half and which only partially responded to treatment, entirely disappeared (and has never recurred since). Minor troubles, such as 'sick headaches' and bilious attacks, no longer appeared periodically as before. There was greater appreciation of such food as was eaten; a keener appetite and a more acute taste seemed to be developed, with a more thorough liking for simple foods."

An Interesting Danish Experimentor

Some years ago Dr. Hindhede, who is now director of the Danish government laboratory for nutrition researches, began to doubt the reliability of the old dietary standards and so for one month he restricted himself to a purely vegetarian diet and especially such foods as were notably *deficient* in protein. He lived chiefly on bread, butter, potatoes, sugar and fruit. I quote his experience from his recent book, "Protein and Nutrition."

"I wanted to find out how long I could live on such a limited quantity of protein. Of course, it was not my intention to prolong the regimen until death threatened; I merely wished to keep to it until I felt myself becoming really weak. To make more certain, I applied myself, meanwhile, to vigorous physical exercise, such as gardening, cycling, etc.

But, strange to say, no infirmity evinced itself; to the contrary I experienced excellent health. I never had that feeling of tension and sluggishness which usually follows the consumption of a good beefsteak."

As a result of subsequent extensive experiments Dr. Hindhede came to this conclusion, "I have a suspicion that a vast number of ailments—disorders of the stomach, nerves, liver and kidneys, not to mention gout—are to be attributed simply to overfeeding. I believe that in this respect we physicians have done

infinite harm to our patients. When all those dyspeptic and nerve-weary people come to us complaining of drowsiness, debility, general disgust with life, how often have we not exhorted them to eat plentifully? 'Take plenty of invigorating food: meat, eggs, etc.!' We sometimes recommend 'Port wine and quinine,' 'Stout,' or 'Burgundy' to be taken with the food in order to help it down. But the more the food is thus assisted on its downward course, the weaker do our patients become; while it is certain that with the aid of an apparent 'hunger diet' we should in many an instance have been able to restore them to strength. Rich meat has a singular power of tempting the palate, and we are thereby induced to overload our poor stomachs."

The High Cost of Living

Dr. Hindhede calls attention to the fact that it costs twenty times as much to live on meat as on cereals, and furthermore, "that which makes living so expensive among the well-to-do are meat, coffee, tea and spirituous liquors," and he raises the important question, "What do these people get in return for this additional cost?" And his answer is: "Diseased kidneys, liver and heart; gout, and, above all, bad temper."

A Remarkable Experiment

Hindhede reports the case of a young man by the name of Madsen who not only was a vegetarian, but also left out coffee, tea, liquor and tobacco. Finally he was drafted into the military service. He ate nothing of the regular menu that did not meet his approval. I quote the following from the surgeon-major's report of his case. "His diet was almost incredibly simple, consisting of bread, water, cocoa butter, potatoes and rarely a little milk. He was a particularly useful man, an arduous worker and possessed of greater powers of endurance than most people. He thrived amazingly; during the whole eighteen months he was never on the sick list and never sought medical assistance."

Later on this same man, Madsen, successfully performed the following experiment for Hindhede, namely, living eighty-six days *exclusively* on potatoes and butter and maintaining perfect nutritional balance.

As everyone knows, potatoes contain but a small amount of protein. As a result of this and a number of similar experiments, Dr. Hindhede concludes that "We need never trouble our heads about protein," that there is absolutely no danger when using any ordinary sensible diet but that we shall receive enough of this line of food.

Speaking of the meat diet, Hindhede says, "After eating beefsteak there is more inclination for sleep than for hard work. Meat is a fierce fire, but it seems to burn out the oven .

- itself in the long run. The truth is, that the energetic races eat but little meat; but with increasing wealth and culture, meat eating also increases, while the national energy decreases.
- . . . Every student of history must know that wealth, gluttony, and drunkenness are

the three great destroyers of energy."

One thing is absolutely certain, either we shall be tempted to eat and drink damnation to ourselves (1 Cor. 11:29), or else we shall be inspired to eat and drink to the glory of God. (1 Cor. 10:31.)

Some Helpful Principles* Woodrow Wilson

N order to start a fire you must originate a fire. You must have a little spark in order to have a great blaze. I have often heard it said that a speaker is dry, or that a subject is dry. Well, there isn't any subject in the world that is dry. It is the person that handles it, and the person who receives it that is dry. The subject is fertile enough.

Life Instead of Entertainment

When we say, therefore, that the way to get young people to the church is to make the church interesting, I am afraid we too often mean that the way to do is to make it entertaining. Did you ever know the theatre to be a successful means of governing conduct? Did you ever know the most excellent concert, or series of concerts, to be the means of revolutionizing a life? Did you ever know any amount of entertainment to go further than hold for the hour that it lasted?

If you mean to draw young people by entertainment, you have only one excuse for it, and that is to follow up the entertainment with something that is not entertaining, but which grips the heart like the touch of a hand. I dare say that there is some excuse for alluring persons to a place where good will be done them, but I think it would be a good deal franker not to allure them. I think it would be a great deal better simply to let them understand that that is the place where life is «lispensed, and that if they want life they must come to that place.

Who Can Detect Hypocrisy

Did you never have the uneasy experience

There are two beings who assess character instantly by looking into the eyes-dogs and children. If a dog not naturally possessed of the devil will not come to you after he has looked you in the face, you ought to go home and examine your conscience; and if a little child, from any other reason than mere timidity, looks you in the face, and then draws back and will not come to your knee, go home and look deeper yet into your conscience. There is no eye so searching as the eye of simplicity. And you might as well give up the attempt of trying to wear a mask before children, particularly the mask that you are so desirous of wearing-the mask of hypocrisy. It does not work, and it is a very fortunate thing that it does not work. If it did, we would make our children as big hypocrites as we are. You must believe the things you tell the children.

Love vs. Fear

I don't believe any man was ever drawn into heaven for fear he would go to hell. Because, if I understand the Scriptures in the least, they speak a gospel of love. Except God draw you, you are not drawn. You are not brought in by whips, you are not drawn by a frowning face, you are not drawn by a threatening gesture. You are drawn by love, you are drawn by the knowledge that if you come you will be received as a son. Nothing but yearning draws you. Fear never drew you anywhere.

You must realize that it is all a question of personal relationship between man and his Maker, and a personal relationship founded upon love. For love is the only thing that I

know that ever led to self-abnegation. Ambition does not lead to it; no use of power for power's sake leads to anything but self-aggrandizement. Can you name me any motive in the world that ever led a man to love another life more than his own except the motive of love? And yet what we are working for in the young people, as in the old, is to show them the perfect image of a Man who will draw all the best powers of their nature to Himself, and make them love Him so that they will love Him more than they love themselves, and loving Him so, will love their fellowmen more than they love themselves. Everything heroic, everything that looks toward salvation, is due to this power of elevation. It is a noteworthy thing that we reserve the beautiful adjective "noble" for the men who think less of themselves than of some cause or of some person whom they serve. We elevate to the only nobility we have, the nobility of moral greatness, only those men who are governed by love.

How to Create Love in Others

You can not create love by entertainment, but you can make love by the perfect exhibition of Christ-like qualities, and, with the assistance of the Holy Spirit, by the withdrawal of the veil which for most men hangs before the face of our Lord and Saviour. Our whole object, it seems to me, in church work is simply this: to enable all to see Him, to realize Him, and if we devote ourselves to that purpose with singleness of heart and without thought of ourselves, we shall suddenly find the seats filling, because where there is fire thither men will carry their lamps to be lighted.

Where there is power, men will go to partake of it. Every human soul instinctively feels that the only power he desires, the only power that can relieve him from the tedium of the day's work, the only thing which can put a glow upon the routine of the day's task, the only thing that can take him back to the golden age when everything had a touch of magic about it, when everything was greater than the fact, when everything had lurking behind it some mysterious power, when there was in everything a vision and a perfect image-is this thing which he sees enthroned upon the shining countenances of those who really believe in the life and saving grace of their Lord and Master.

Twenty Times a Murderer

[Brother Munson was for years a missionary in India and Sumatra and is now located in Java. We are quoting herewith only briefly from a talk which he gave to the Hinsdale workers on a recent furlough to this country.—ED.]

I N British India a good many years ago one of the missionaries was preaching to a large congregation of natives and he preached the simple gospel of salvation through Christ. One of the preachers came to him afterwards and said, "Doctor, there is a man in the border of the crowd wants to speak to you."

"Call him up here," he said.

There were lights burning there—it was night—and he said, "No, he won't come up here." So the bishop went to him and at once realized the character of the case he had to deal with. As he took his hand, the man said:

"You said tonight that Jesus would save the vilest sinner; is that so?"

"Yes," the doctor replied, "that is so."

"But wait a minute; will He forgive a man who has taken the life of a fellow man?"

When he said this, the doctor knew he had hold of the hand of a professional murderer and thief. But Jesus said that all sins would be forgiven except that one of blasphemy, and he replied:

"Yes, He will forgive if he thoroughly repents."

"Wait a minute," he said, "Will He forgive a man who has taken the life of two?"

And then he asked that question again and again till he reached twenty, and said:

"Will He forgive a man who has taken the lives of twenty men?"

"Yes," he said, "if he repents He will forgive twenty as well as one."

The man broke down and said, "I have taken the lives of twenty of my fellow men, and I want the gospel I have heard tonight."

And he believed and was converted and became a consecrated Christian. These are the experiences that encourage us to keep on until we find what we want.

Have You Victory?

There are some even in Christian America, even in our own circle, who have not the victory from sin which they long for and might have. They are in bondage to sin and want the victory. Now there is only one way to get it—that is, in the *complete* renunciation of self and in simple faith in the Lord Jesus Christ—just as this thug found it. I know that God is able to save unto the uttermost all that come unto Him by Jesus Christ.

Desires for guidance and right are all right as far as they go, but if we simply desire to have the victory, and go no further, we shall be lost. I am sure if we are in earnest we may each one of us have just the Christian experience that the Lord intends we shall have. I believe it is our privilege to have all the victory and all the blessing that the apostle Paul himself had. We can have the victory Christ had and do the works He did. In fact He said we should do greater works. But there must be thorough work; there can not be any compromise with self. There must be complete surrender.

This is a very high standard; some of us are discouraged when we think of it. We think it may be possible for some of the old veterans in the service, but not for us. I remember when I was seeking the Lord in my early teens. After my brother died, whose godly life had an influence upon me, I knelt by the bedside to pray. But instead of getting comfort my prayers seemed to just go up to the ceiling and come back again. And the tempter came and said, "Your mother, and So and So," mentioning others in the village, "can be Christians, but you can't be a Christian; He does not accept your prayers and you are more unhappy than you were." And I believed it, and said, "I am afraid that is true," and I went to bed.

But I had not lain there long when the thought came to me, what if I should die tonight, unreconciled to God? I began to pray with all the intensity of my soul, and fell

asleep with a prayer upon my lips. The next morning I was conscious of a heavenly peace within my soul and how thankful I was the Lord had heard me.

I was not a Christian but was on the road, and for a fortnight I attempted to be a Christian on the sly. If we have religion of the right sort, we have got to talk about it; we must confess Christ. I tried not to talk about it, but it did not work, and after a fortnight I got up in meeting, confessed the Saviour, and said, "I want you to pray for me," and I found the Saviour. And I have always found Jesus and have been pointing others to Him that wanted to know the Lord.

SOMEBODY'S CHILD

In the January LIFE BOAT we published the experience of a young woman prisoner in the Vermont prison, who was left an orphan early in life and who drifted from bad to worse until she had reached the lowest depths, and then in a moment of passionate jealousy she committed the deed which has deprived her of her freedom for life.

While waiting to be taken to her prison home she poured out her soul to God and sought and found her Saviour. Since that time she has been a real missionary among the women in prison, and she has written the following for the sole purpose of helping other women behind the bars.

Those Care-Free Days

"After seeing other dear little girls so innocent and sweet I remember now how my mother loved me. Years have passed since those happy days and she has been called to rest, but I can still in my imagination picture those care-free days before a cloud darkened my sky. Yes, I remember well when I promised her I would be a good, Christian girl, and in a few days was left an orphan, with no mother's hand to guide. I did not keep that promise until a few years ago, much to my regret.

"So many have had a similar experience, so many have been driven by despair to the lowest depths of sin, yet they are somebody's children. I want to say a word to such.

"Perhaps you have parents whose hearts are aching on account of your waywardness. Do you still mean to go deeper? Even if you have no one in this world that you think cares for you, and it is generally the fact that our friends in sin are unfaithful in misfortune, Jesus has loved you and gave His life for you. Will you accept Him? There is no better time than now. It matters not what your life has been, He is willing to forgive you freely.

Still He Sought Me

"I would love to tell every wayward one how I wandered so far from the Saviour, but still He sought me. I have seen life on all sides and it breaks my heart tonight when I think of so many that are on the primrose path, the end of which is the morgue and an unnamed grave.

"Some few Sundays ago our chaplain used for his text these words, 'The wages of sin is death,' and I could not help but think of the wages sin has paid me in the past years when I served Satan. After a night's debauchery I would say I had a good time, little thinking that that 'good time' was another scar on my character, which was gradually but surely sinking into the abyss of degradation; still I continued living a life of sin.

"The thought of my mother's prayer and her pleading voice would sometimes make my heart harder, for when one lives so long in sin that precious monitor, the conscience, is almost silent. I still persisted, but thank God, tonight this promise has been fulfilled in me: 'Though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow,' and I know He can and does make over the vessels scarred by sin and shame, and if He saved me He will save you.

Could Not Be Any Better

"I remember once speaking to a friend about her soul's salvation and in answer she said she was so wicked she could not be any better. My friend, that is just the work of the evil one. He is continually using that deception, and again, on the other hand, he makes us think we are good enough, for as sinful as I was I would always think I was just as good and even better than some one else.

"Jesus is waiting to save if you will only accept His invitation. He says now to you,

- poor wanderer, 'Come unto me.' You will admit a life of sin does not pay, for there are pleasures in it; yes, but only for a season, and the end is eternal destruction.
- "Jesus offers us peace. Adversities may come, but if we are trusting in Him He will bear our burdens, and though the tempest rages,

we know all is well. For the sake of your darling mother or whoever is near and dear to you on earth that is interested in your welfare, and, above all, for the sake of Jesus who bore your sins in His precious body, *heed His call* and accept Him as your Saviour and Friend."

Echoes From the Welsh Revival

[Some three years ago Miss Jones was a helpless invalid in the Hinsdale Sanitarium. After some mouths of treatment her health began to return and at present she is a comparatively well woman. While at Hinsdale she read and learned to love the LIFE Boar magazine. When she returned to her home in Chicago she began securing subscriptions for it and was a faithful worker for its interests. Last November she and her father went to Wales, where she is now making her home. The following interesting account of the effects of the Welsh revival as given from her personal observation will be of extreme interest to our readers.—ED.]

 T HE Welsh Revival of 1904 originated in South Wales and extended over the entire length and breadth of the country. It was not started by any person or persons, but like the day of Pentecost everyone was filled out a hymn to be sung, all seemed moved by the same impulse and from their voices came the sweet melody of praise and thanksgiving. As the dewdrop freshens and the sun strengthens the blossom, so this great mass of praying,

with the Holy Ghost, "and began to speak as the Spirit gave them utterance." Acts. 2:4.

There was but little preaching done, most of the meetings being carried on by prayer and song. No one had a hymn book, no one gave weeping, singing humanity were refreshed and strengthened.

The Bible in a Coal Mine

The most conspicuous figures in the movement were Evan Roberts and the five singing sister's who accompanied him. Evan Roberts, then but twenty-six years of age, was a collier in the Broadoak Colliery, Loughor, South Wales. He used to take his Bible down the mine and put it in some convenient place where he could glance over its pages when he had a moment to spare. His leisure time was thus spent in studying for the ministry.

The Lord had a greater work for this young man than that of digging for coal, so He led him out of the mine even as He had taken Elisha from the plow to revive His work. It seemed as if the prophecy of Joel 2:28, "I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh and . . . your young men shall see visions," was being fulfilled, for the Spirit was poured upon the people and Evan Roberts and many others saw many strange things.

Son and Mother Transformed

A few Sundays ago a minister was here to tea and I asked him what the revival had done for the people. He told of several instances that had come under his own personal observation, one of which was that of a big stalwart man in his community who was much given to drink and who used the most profane language. One evening he went to one of the meetings, and, hearing the prayers of those around him, his heart was touched with anguish and remorse. This man of great stature sobbed like a little child, and dropping down on his knees he prayed—prayed for the first time in his life—"Oh Lord, forgive_me, forgive me, and remember my mother."

How often we hear of a mother praying for her wayward child, but how seldom do we hear of a son or daughter praying for the conversion of mother. But so this man prayed, for she, like himself, had never been brought to the feet of her Maker.

The next night the man was again seen at the meeting and far off in the corner was heard the trembling voice of a gray-haired old woman praying for faith and forgiveness. The people around recognized the voice and knew that the man's prayer for his mother on the previous evening had been answered. That night mother and son together laid their gifts upon the altar and gave their hearts to God. Today that man is a changed man and a leader in Christian work.

It Reached the Children

The minister also told of how not only grown people were influenced by this great revival but little children as well. One morning his little boy, then six years old, kneeling down by his mother's side said, "Dear Lord Jesus, fill me with Thy Holy Spirit, keep Annie from scratching me, make Lizzie kind, but you don't need to change Maggie because she's all right, but do make Tommy Williams a good boy. He is getting worse and worse every day and takes Thy name in vain. Through Jesus Christ, Amen."

Prayer Meetings Instead of Football Games

The daily papers, at the time of this revival, told of how football teams in many places held prayer meetings instead of their former games. Distinguished men from England, Scotland and many other places came to hear religious lectures. Those of the Church of England as well as other churches extended their blessing to the movement.

Revival Better Than Prisons

Drunkenness greatly diminished everywhere and the revival was the means of checking it more than fines or imprisonment could ever do. Thousands of families were reunited, their children were fed, clothed and brought up as they never had been before. There was more harmony between employer and employee.

Many, of course, have gone back to their former ways of living; some because they buried their talents or hid the light that had been given them under a bushel; others kept for themselves, instead of sharing with their neighbor, that great gift, the gift of God's love. Many thought that when the Spirit was once poured upon them it would be everlasting, forgetting that the Lord taught them to pray for their "daily bread."

The Coming Crisis

THERE was held, in the Moody Church, Chicago, Feb. 24-27, an International Prophetic Conference, at which more than two thousand people were gathered from early morning until late at night listening to a stirring discussion of this great theme, —that of the soon coming of Christ.

Rev. Canon F. E. Howitt, of Hamilton, Ontario, in speaking of the Lord's coming as a key to the scriptures, said: "This truth has made the Bible to be a new book to me. There is more said about the Lord's coming than about any other doctrine of the Bible. More than one-third of the whole Bible is devoted to prophecy. Almost every prophecy of the Old Testament refers to the second coming of Christ. It is no new truth. Enoch, the seventh from Adam, said, 'The Lord cometh with ten thousands of his saints.' Jude 14. David said, 'I shall be satisfied, when I awake with thy likeness.' Ps. 17:15. All the prophets are united in bearing testimony to the same fact. The second coming of Christ was the hope of all saints.

The Key to the Bible

"In the New Testament it is strictly referred to no less than 480 times, one writer says. Every writer in the New Testament speaks of the Lord's second coming.

"Why is it so? Because the Lord's coming is the objective point to which all God's past and present operations are tending. It is only when you see that truth that you get a proper connection of what the Bible teaches. Without that truth, the Bible is a disjointed book. You will never get a vision of the whole until you realize the fact of the Lord's coming.

"An art critic was asked to go to Rome and see a beautiful piece of fresco work. He arrived on a dark day and with a small lamp he could see only a portion of the great painting at a time; he would see an arm here and a face there. The next day when the sun shone he went to see it again and this time he saw the whole painting in all its beauty. So with the word of God, we can never appreciate the Bible as we should without the light of the second coming of Christ.

"The Messiah is Prophet, Priest and coming King. Most people do not see Him as the coming King. He can not carry His work to a successful issue unless he does become King.

"You can never fully appreciate public worship unless in the light of the Lord's coming. 'Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is; but exhorting one another: and so much the more, as ye see the day approaching.' Heb. 10:25. If our public worship was only conducted with a realization of that truth how it would change us all!

"I do not think we appreciate baptism until in the light of the Lord's coming. (Col. 2:11,12.) Baptism not only looks back to the death of Christ but it also implies resurrection in Christ. (Col. 3:1-4.) That is why we are baptised,—it is the preparation for the Lord's coming.

"I do not think we ever value the Lord's supper until we look upon it with reference to the Lord's coming. We are told to break the bread *until* He comes! This ordinance looks back to His broken body on the cross and looks forward to His coming in the clouds of heaven.

"The types of the Bible necessitate the coming of the Lord. The Bible is filled with beautiful types, but I do not know that any of them can be appreciated apart from the great second advent of Christ. Without this key all will be confusing.

"Gordon told the story of a gentleman who was in a great hurry to get to a certain place and he jumped into a cab and said to the driver: 'I want you to drive me as quick as you can.' After they had driven some time the gentleman called out and said: 'Where are you going, sir?'

"'I do not know. You told me to drive off as quickly as I could and I have done it.'

"So it is with us, we are driving fast,

but we do not know where we are going until we get hold of this great hope of the Lord's return."

Should Be Preached

President R. M. Russell, D. D., of Westminster College, Pa., made the statement, that, "There is not a man preaching in this land or in any other land today who is living 'soberly, righteously, and godly,' but what has in his soul this blessed hope of Christ's second coming." He also said that "There is just as much need for men to rise up and preach this truth of the second coming of Christ today as there was need for Luther and those men at the time of the reformation to rise up and preach the gospel which they did."

Rev. E. Y. Wooley, acting pastor of the Moody Church, said: "One of the great days of my life was the day when I discovered the truth about the second coming of Christ. The only real optimist is the man who is looking for the coming of our Lord."

The Cry of Peace and Preparation for War

Rev. Wm. B. Riley, D. D., of Minneapolis, spoke very convincingly on the recent proclamation of peace and the preparation for war as a sign of the times. He said:

"If one should listen to what is being said and written about peace he would be compelled to conclude that we are about ready for the dissolution of the army and the navy and that in a few years there will not be war on sea or land. But all one needs to do is to lift up his eyes from the printed page long enough to study the actual facts around about him.

"Great Britain is ready for battle. France has an army of half a million. Germany has what is considered the most perfect fighting machine the world has ever known. Italy has half a million. Austria, half a million. Greece and the Balkans have their multitudes of armies. These things indicate the real conditions. There could be a terrible strife that would involve us all before twenty-four hours.

"'God shall send them strong delusion, that they should believe a lie.' 2 Thess. 2:11. There never was a time when so many men are engaged in searching for the truth, and so many men are *accepting* delusion and believing a lie as at the present time.

"Having a profession of Godliness (2 Tim. 3:5), but the practice is *ungodliness*. This is a graphic description of what we see in the churches today. Throughout the breadth and depth of the land churches are now being built containing smoking rooms, theaters, and dance halls. Daniel saw the 'abomination of desolation,' 'stand in the holy place,' and we see it today.

"It has been said that 'sin is merely a failure to attain to the ideal. That conviction of sin is no longer the work of the Holy Ghost; it is simply the pains of sin to attain perfection."

An Apostasy of the Church

Dr. C. I. Scofield, of New York, author of the Scofield Reference Bible, was present at this conference and spoke at the ten o'clock hour each day. In speaking of the great apostasy of the church in these last days, he said: "There shall be a falling away, an apostasy. 'The love of many shall wax cold.' Matt. 24:12. The picture of the earthly pathway of the church is one of declension and departing from the truth. As there were false prophets among Israel, so there are false teachers among the churches today. Jude tells us of the apostasy of the last days. When the church is strong and spiritual she sloughs off these people. John says: 'They went out from us, but they were not of us.' 1 John 2:19. When the church is turned aside from her pilgrim pathway and has settled down in the world there is no holy power of itself that pushes off."

The Character of His Waiting People

I am glad that these prominent Christian workers are proclaiming this grand truth of the nearness of Christ's second coming. But we must not forget that those who will be ready to say at that time, "Lo, this is our God; we have *waited* for Him, and He will save us," Isa. 25:9, are those of whom it can be said, "Here is the patience of the saints; here are they that *keep the commandments* of God, and the *faith* of Jesus." Rev. 14:12.

Speaking of our day, Paul tells us in Rom. 13:11,12 "that now it is high time to *awake* out of sleep: for now is our salvation nearer than when we believed. The night is far spent, the day is at hand: let us therefore *cast off* the works of darkness, and let us put on the armour of light."

As we see these signs all about us we must each know for a certainty that we are keeping the commandments of God and that we are not only getting ready ourselves for that great event, but helping others about us to get ready.

We are told that, "When the Lord's time comes and no changes have taken place in the hearts of proud, ambitious human beings, men will find that the Hand that had been strong to save will be strong to destroy." "Today, the world, utterly regardless of the warning voice of God, is hurrying on to eternal ruin." "Soon everything that can be shaken will be shaken, that those things that can not be shaken may remain." Now is the time to get ready while mercy is still extended to the children of men.

"I thank you ever so much for the advice you gave me, also for the tracts you sent me on the use of tobacco, and I was very much pleased with THE LIFE BOAT. Just as soon as I read it, which I did at once, I passed it to some friends who enjoyed reading it very much, and they passed it along, and I don't know but what it is still going and doing good yet.

"I do not see how any sane or reasonable man can read a paper like that without it doing him good. Every time I read one of them it reminds me of the teachings of my dear old mother, but I was deprived of her tender care when I was only nine years old. My father had died before. I was left without money and was thrown among strangers. If I had always remembered my mother's teachings I would not have been here, but I am trying with the help of God to make amends for the past. Pray for me, will you? I am doing the best I can now to do right and it seems easier now than when I began, although the temptations are very great sometimes.

Some have recently been placed in private homes so we are not able to publish all their pictures herewith, but we can show eight of them. Think of the great possibilities wrapped up in this large family of children!

We have at last got our industrial department started. One of the girls is devoting her entire time to that work and is just now weaving some carpeting for the home, which is sadly needed.

The Lord certainly has blessed this work. Our hearts are full of gratitude and praise to Him. We wish to thank all the friends who have had any part in making this work a success.

FROM A HOME GIRL

As far as possible the girls in the Rescue Home are encouraged to mother and keep their babies. There are several reasons for this. If the mother is permitted to shirk this responsibilities that subsequently lie in her pathway. Secondly, and what is perhaps more important, the child has a spiritual mission to its mother, as will be seen from the following letter:

"Your most kind and welcome letter received. I was very glad indeed to hear from you and can never explain in words how I appreciate it.

"I was dreadfully lonesome for the girls for a few days after I returned home. I was very glad to hear that you remember us in your prayers. I ask help often myself, but it makes me feel better to know that I have someone to help me, and it gives me more strength to ask myself.

"You can never imagine how much I gained the few weeks I was at the Rescue Home. I know myself that I left there with a different feeling than when I entered. I feel nearer and understand our dear Lord better than ever before.

"To have my little darling taken from me in any way would mean taking the sunshine

He has preached the gospel to thousands of prisoners and wherever he has gone has always been anxious to see THE LIFE BOAT put into the hands of men behind the bars. We are glad bro. Mackey, written especially for this special pris-oners' number.—ED.] I was looking over some old papers today.

I was looking over some old papers today, and came across the following experience of an old friend of the Life Boat Mission:

"I said to one of the sisters who came to the prison to sing, where I was doing a short term, 'I want to live a different life when I get out of here. Can you find me some work? My time will be up next Thursday.' She said she would help me and when I was released I went to her. She was surprised to see me, for many had said they would come, but did not. Well, I am glad I came to her for in her I found a friend, and through her I found Jesus, 'a Friend that sticketh closer than a brother.'"

Mrs. Worthy Harris Holden wrote the following poem after hearing this girl's testimony:

"She sat in the dreary prison, Barred out from the scenes of life, Barred in with her soul's deep yearning To banish its woe and strife. Penniless, homeless, forsaken, Not even a comrade in sin Came near as of yore to release her,— Alone with her sorrow,—barred in.

"Then arose sweet voices singing A sinner's humble cry,— "While on others Thou art calling Do not pass me by!" And the echo oft repeating Calmed her bitter grief; He, the friend of chiefest sinners, He could bring relief.

"Wafted through the iron grating Which to her were gates ajar Came the 'peace, good will' from heaven;---There arose her Bethlehem star. Guided on she found Messiah, Found her Saviour very nigh, Who to e'en the faintest calling

Never, never will pass by.

"Shout for praise, ye ransomed prisoners, He hath burst thy bonds for thee; Join with her in grateful tribute, Christ alone hath power to free!

Sing, O toiler in the vineyard, Sing of Jesus very nigh; Sing beside the hedge and highway, Sure 'twill reach some passer-by.''

Some weeks ago I was in San Francisco and there came along a man who gave this testimony of his conversion ten years ago:

"I dropped into the Life Boat Mission on State street in Chicago, Ill., and heard a young woman tell the story of her redemption through a song sung in prison. I was convinced that there was a reality in the saving power of Christ, and I surrendered my will to the will of Christ and found a Saviour who can save and also keep. I had just been released from the Anamosa State prison, and my past was black, but the blood of Jesus Christ 'cleanseth us from all sin.'"

Prisons Can Not Keep Out God

I do thank God today that there is power in Christ for every sin-bound one. Prisons can not keep out God. Joseph was in prison, "But the Lord was with Joseph." Gen. 39: 21-23. Manasseh was in prison, "And when he was in affliction, he besought the Lord his God, and humbled himself greatly before the God of his fathers." 2 Chron. 33:12. Jeremiah was in prison, but the word of the Lord came unto him there. The apostles were in prison, and the angel of the Lord visited them. (Acts 5:17-20). Peter was in prison, but prayer was made. (Acts 12:5-8.) Not only is this true of Bible days, but it is true today. It is so easy to get into trouble because of Satan, who knows man's weakness.

I lived in Detroit, Mich., thirty years ago and one night I got into trouble. It was because I was troublesome that I was arrested, tried, convicted and sent to prison, not for a long term, to be sure, but I think the hardest experience of my life was a few days later when I said good-by to my liberty, in fact I had lost all.

The way of the transgressor is hard, but thank God, there is a real remedy for sin and it is the gift of God. My sin acted different with me than with some men. I became a helpless and hopeless drunkard, and when I was nearly forty years of age one night, Jan. 4, 1894, on Van Buren street, Chicago, I met a man, and when I said, "Friend, will you help to buy a drink," he said, "You don't need any more drink, you need Jesus," and he brought me to the Pacific Garden Mission, and after

I heard many men testify that they had found a remedy for their sinful ways, I thought on my ways and called upon the Lord and He heard my cry, and now I am waiting for this very same Jesus to return and fulfill this promise in 1 Thess. 4:16, 17, to me.

REVIVAL EFFORTS D. H. KRESS, M. D., Melrose, Mass.

[Dr. Kress, Pastor Quinn, and others have been having showers of God's blessing attending them as they have been laboring for the spiritual upbuilding of God's people with whom they have met. We quote the following from a personal letter recently received from Dr. Kress.—Ed.]

The results of these efforts are really remarkable. They are not ordinary revivals. A power of an extraordinary character attends the efforts put forth. This is true everywhere we go, and it does not matter what the conditions in the churches have been previous to our coming.

The Spirit of God unifies in a marvelous manner where arguments of the most logical and convincing manner have failed. In fact, we have come to regard this as the only remedy for all our spiritual ills. I can see why the burden of the apostles after they were reconverted was to repent and be converted. (Acts 3:19.) They knew that this was the only hope of the church and the only way by which true reforms could be brought about.

The work must begin at the seat of all our difficulties-the heart! Then out of it will issue the principles of righteousness. The plan of beginning on the outside and working inward is a failure. It always will be a failure. God's way is to give man something he has not and to make of him something he is not. Man must be born from above.

It is surprising how difficulties disappear before this doctrine. In a few minutes results are accomplished that are surprising. In one place where lectures and talks on organization had utterly failed, brethren, with brokenness of heart and many tears, fell on each others' necks in the presence of the entire church and confessed their wrongs. Some of these wept aloud and got up to confess anywhere from four to ten times before the meeting closed. This meeting lasted six hours, and yet it seemed short. No one left. We forgot all about food and drink.

In places where the health principles had

been ignored a wave of reform swept over the entire congregation. It was not done by arguments or even scientific reasoning, but under the deep conviction of the Spirit of God. This thing seems to sweep everything before it. One of the ministers who had never taken much interest in health reform as taught by us turned and said to me at one of our meetings, "I see it all, this thing has to come through the *heart* and not the stomach."

That is just as it is. The only reason why the Children of Israel turned from the very best food heaven could provide for them to evil things was because they were *unconverted*. The one who is truly converted will delight to do God's will. The mere restriction of the diet will not cure a diseased or perverted appetite. No one can be truly temperate in all things until the heart is transformed by the grace of God. Repent and be converted. This is the remedy today just as truly as it was at Pentecost.

We will see greater things than these, greater evidences of God's grace on the human heart. One man here in the east sold his farm and has given all but a few hundred dollars to the cause. This they did at Pentecost. "As many as were possessors of lands or houses sold them and brought the prices of the things that were sold and laid them down at the apostles' feet." (Acts 4:34, 35.) I fully believe that the same confidence in God's work and in the men he has chosen to lead out will be restored when we have the same experience those men had back there, and I believe our leaders will have this experience. The spirit of God will come upon us and we shall be changed into other men. Of Asa it is said, "They fell to him out of Israel in abundance when they saw that the Lord his God was with him." 2 Chron. 15:9.

Of Saul, after the Spirit of God came upon him and he was turned into another man, it is said, "There went with him a band of men, whose hearts God had touched." 1 Sam. 10:26. When the time came to turn the kingdom of Saul to David, "According to the word of the Lord," they came to him and said, "Thine are we, David, and on thy side, thou Son of Jesse: peace be unto thee, and peace be to thine helpers: for thy God helpeth thee." 1 Chron. 12:18. "At that time day by day there came to David to help him, until it was a great host, like the host of God." Verse 22. These were men who "had understanding of the times, to know what Israel ought to do; . . and all their brethren were at their command." Verse 32. They were those who could keep rank: they were not of a *double* heart. (Verse 38.)

The time has again come for the kingdom to be turned to David. I expect to see a flowing together such as we have not witnessed since Pentecost.

[A year and a half ago our junior missionary purses' class undertook to establish a center of gospel helpfulness in a needy but nnoccupied district in Chicago. The Lord immediately added His blessing to their efforts. They soon found a wide field of usefulness, children to be clothed, sick to be treated, and broken hearts that only the gospel of Christ could reach. After that class of nurses graduated other student nurses took their place, so the work has not had to be suspended for a single day. It has been entirely a labor of love on the part of these girls and has been largely a work of faith. But the patient seed sowing has not been in vain. Souls out to obey the Bible truth that they have learned to love.—Ep.]

It is only because my heart is burdened for poor souls shrouded in sin and darkness that I am devoting some time among the needy in Chicago. And I can't help but ask the Lord daily to spare some poor soul now in darkness so that the gospel of the kingdom might be proclaimed to her.

NEW PLANS FOR MEDICAL MISSION-ARY TRAINING

DAVID PAULSON, M. D.

For years splendid young men and women have enthusiastically turned their faces toward medical missionary training with the idea that it would fit them for a larger field for usefulness in the Master's vineyard. Many of these have found that the more proficient they become in the art of nursing the less interest and anxiety they have for the patient's spiritual welfare so that when the time comes for them to graduate professional ambition has eaten out of their hearts the soul-winning instinct that they had when they began.

There is a good reason for this. In fact it is the logical result of the prevailing program.

Day by day the nurse reports to the physician on the character of the patient's physical diet, pulse, temperature, etc. The nurse's training is almost exclusively directed toward the physical restoration. Only incidentally is it impressed on the nurse that the patient has a sin-sick soul that is a thousand times more important to cure than it is to merely restore the physical health.

We feel that the Lord is impressing us to reverse this policy by training a class of noninstitutional medical evangelists rather than professional institutional nurses.

The Medical Evangelistic Year

During the first week in July we shall organize a one year's medical evangelistic training course. During this time the students will be taught the most important practical medical missionary principles and methods that are ordinarily given during the entire three years' nurses' course. These students will neither be set to work doing domestic work in the institution nor will they be confined to institutional bedside nursing. They will be led out under experienced supervision to make medical evangelistic tours into the surrounding towns and villages. They will learn how to do house to house work. They will assist in building up schools of health, cottage prayer meetings, and learn how to treat the sick in their homes, and will also have abundant experience in city medical missionary work.

Every effort will be made to make this one year's work as nearly self-supporting as possible, but those who come should be so situated, that if God does not open the way for them to entirely earn their expenses, they may be able to receive a little help from their friends, who will be interested in their securing this valuable and unusual opportunity.

Additional Two Years Nurses' Training

Many of those who have taken this one year's medical evangelistic course will necessarily return to their homes with an enlarged vision and a greater fitness for service.

To all those who have satisfactorily demonstrated that they have a real call of God for medical missionary work and desire advanced training, such will be given an opportunity to have two additional years of actual bedside nurses' training, receiving such instruction and experience as is necessary to develop them into thoroughly trained nurses.

An additional year of special medical training, including as far as God may direct some months' experience in leading Chicago hospitals, will be given to those who are preparing to fit themselves to be medical matrons, superintendents of missionary nurses or to go to some foreign field where they can not have the benefit of physicians' advice and supervision. The accompanying diagram gives the entire plan in a nut shell.

Recently one of our patients was very lavish in her appreciation of an eminent surgeon who had no doubt saved her life by skillfully removing from her a horrible tumor. She had an intelligent conception of the seriousness of her disease, hence she naturally had a proper appreciation for her relief.

The main reason the early Christians loved Christ so much, was because they had a proper conception of what He was doing for them. Few people today have a correct *diagnosis* of their real spiritual diseases. They do not know that "the imagination of man's heart *is evil* from his youth," Gen. 8:21, so, of course, they do not *seek* any remedy for it.

I have seen a poor emaciated consumptive with a cavity in one lung the size of my fist, yet enthusiastically insisting that there was nothing the matter with him. He would say, "It is all nonsense, this talk about my having consumption. I only have a little cold at most." Likewise I have seen amiable, naturally good-natured, kindly disposed unconverted persons insist that they had no need to worry about their spiritual condition for they entirely forgot the *divine* diagnosis of their case, that, "Verily, every man at his *best* state is altogether vanity." Ps. 39:5.

A broad-shouldered, robust-looking patient was complimenting himself on his good health, but I was compelled to tell him that he was suffering with an *incurable* disease. He firmly said, "I do not believe it. I *feel* so well." But I did not permit his unbelief and his feelings to change my diagnosis, and I was right, for in few months' time he passed to his grave. **K**(1

It is better for you and me to *accept* God's estimation of our *natural* goodness than our own. There are some people who are naturally handsome, but that in itself does not secure for them either God's approval or an entrance into His kingdom. Likewise there are those who *naturally* have handsome traits of character. They are amiable, good natured, naturally make friends and have other really estimable qualities. But these natural endowments do not furnish any more fitness for the next world than handsome features.

This is a fearful truth that many splendid people will discover when it is *too late* for them to secure the divine remedy, for Christ himself said, "Many will say to me in that day, Lord, Lord, have we not . . . in thy name done many wonderful works? And then will I profess unto them, I never knew you; depart from me, yet that work iniquity." Matt. 7:22, 23. In other words, our "work" is the only thing that even the best man can produce in his own strength. The unconverted man can unquestionably perform some wonderful works. He may build anything from a chair to a Panama Canal. They may be good in themselves and eminently useful, but from the standpoint of eternal things they are only *works of the flesh*. (Gal. 5:19.)

On the other hand, only in the converted man, who keenly appreciates that his own unaided best efforts are only vanity in God's sight, can the spirit of God produce FRUIT. (Gal. 5:22.) There is all the difference in the world between fruits and works. Works are dead things. If you plant a chair it does not yield a crop of chairs, while fruit will multiply itself as well as nourish others. Works bring glory to man; fruits bring glory to God.

Remember, it is not the good man that produces the fruit, it is "the fruit of the spirit" of God that the man permits to dwell in him. Gal. 5:22. Consequently such a man is always humble; he takes no credit to himself for the miracle of fruit bearing that is taking place in his life. He constantly remembers that it is God that "maketh thee to differ from another? and what hast thou that thou didst not receive? now if thou didst receive it, why dost thou glory, as if thou hadst not received it?" 1 Cor. 4:7.

Consequently such a man does not glory in his natural wisdom, nor in his natural strength, nor in what he has accumulated. Instead he glories "in this, that he understandeth and *knoweth me.*" Jer. 9:23, 24.

Bear in mind that whatever works any of us can produce here below their usefulness must necessarily be limited to this world. It is only *fruit* that is going to be gathered into the heavenly garner, so if we have spent our entire life and all of our activities merely producing works and have not given Christ any opportunity to *create* that cluster of divine fruits described in Gal. 5:22,23, we will have *nothing* whatever to take with us to the heavenly garner. God is only going to take back to heaven what we have given him a chance to put into our lives *from* heaven. "Where is boasting, then? It is *excluded*." Romans 3:27.

Amazing as it may seem, this heavenly fruit develops best in an environment of trouble, hardship and suffering. "Now, no chastening for the present seemeth to be joyous, but grievous: nevertheless afterward it yieldeth the peaceable fruit of righteousness unto them which are exercised thereby." Heb. 12:11.

If we once grasp that glorious truth that the trials and tribulations that God permits to come into our lives are simply a part of the divine program, then we will "rejoice in tribulation" knowing that "every branch that beareth fruit, he *purgeth* it, that it may bring forth *more fruit.*" John 15:2.

CIRCULATE THIS LIFE BOAT

Many are finding most helpful and encouraging missionary experiences in selling this magazine to their neighbors and friends. Everywhere people are becoming sick and tired of reading trashy fiction, foolish love stories and all of that kind of literary chaff, which does not furnish *nourishment* for their starving souls. All of us have been bitten by "that old serpent, which is the devil, and Satan." Rev. 20:2. The only question is whether the devil's toxin which is called sin shall get the mastery over us or not. (Romans 6:14.) If it does not, it will be because, like David, we have inoculated ourselves with the divine antitoxin. "Thy word have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against thee." Ps. 119:11.

There were plenty of people who carelessly jostled up against Christ when He was here on earth and they received little or no benefit. But there was one woman who had spent all her means for physicians "and was nothing bettered, but rather grew worse," and she said, "if I may touch but his clothes, I *shall* be whole," Mark 5:26, 28, and she was healed.

It is not enough to aimlessly jostle up against the Bible, which is the Master's message to your soul. Ask Him to set free for your benefit the remarkable working power that He has locked up in it, and you will find it not only an antitoxin for your sin but also a *preventative* against sin. "Wherewithal shall a young man *cleanse his way?* by taking heed thereto according to thy word." Ps. 119:9.

THERE IS NOTHING I CAN DO

Have you become convinced that you have absolutely no missionary opportunities? That there is nothing that you have any chance whatever to help anyone else do?

You are entirely mistaken. You have at least one chance that no one can deprive you of. You can *pray* for others. Will that do any good? Most assuredly. Did it do any good for the wireless operator on the Titanic to send his message of distress hundreds of miles across the trackless ocean? Most assuredly. Well, do you believe in the wireless, and do not believe that God who made the wireless can *hear you*?

Do you want to help some one hundreds of miles away? If you have no other means at your disposal, pray for them and do not forget when you pray one for another that "the effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man *availeth* much." James 5:16.

TOO WICKED FOR THE LORD TO ACCEPT

I have often had men say to me, "It is no use, I have been so wicked that the Lord will neither accept nor forgive me." For the benefit of such I want to present a most remarkable experience.

There once lived an old king who was not only wicked, but it was said of him that he actually sold himself to work evil. When he had some difficulty in securing a piece of ground from one of his subjects he permitted his contemptible wife to have this man murdered in cold blood so that there would be no obstacle to his securing a legal title to the ground.

Then God sent him a startling and awful message of condemnation in the following words: "Hast thou *killed*, and also taken *possession?*... Thou hast sold thyself to *work evil* in the sight of the Lord. Behold, *I will* bring evil upon thee." 1 Kings 21:19, 21.

Please observe how this wretched, evil king accepted this message: "And it came to pass, when Ahab heard those words, that he rent his clothes, and put sackcloth upon his flesh, and fasted, and lay in sackcloth, and *went softly.*" 27th verse. That was *genuine* repentance. That was *real* sorrow for sin.

Was there any hopes for this deep-dyed criminal? Most assuredly. Notice the next two verses. "And the word of the Lord came to Elijah the Tishbite, saying, Seest thou how Ahab *humbleth* himself before me? because he humbleth himself before me, I will not bring the evil in his days."

There is a reason why this account was put in the Bible. Notice, "For whatsoever things were written aforetime were written for our *learning*, that we through patience and *comfort* of the scriptures might have *hope*." Rom. 15:4.

What God did for this abandoned sinner when he repented He is not only willing, but anxious, to do for you, for He is "no *respecter* of persons." Acts 10:34.

Mixed a Little of the World

Don't forget to pray for me."
