

### Time for the Most Deadly Disease

David Paulson, M. D.

THE hay fever season is over, but what is far more serious, the pneumonia season has just begun. From now till next spring pneumonia will claim more victims than tuberculosis.

Strangely enough, the pucumonia germ, like the poor, is always with us. The greater proportion of our population carry around these germs in their throats every month of the

year. Why then, do they not have pneumonia? Simply because the health and vitality of the average individual is strong enough to keep the pneumonia germs in peaceful subjection instead of permitting them to get the mastery over us.

Just as it is our privilege to have enough spiritual vitality in the soul that we shall not become victims to the devilish temptations that are constantly being thrust upon

ns, so God maintains in every healthy mortal certain bodily defenses against pneumonia, and these must be battered down before the germs can get the upper hand.


### Suspicious Symptoms

The appearance of rusty sputum and a severe pain in the chest, a persistent cough, and sudden rise of temperature in nine cases out of ten spell pneumonia. The fever, the increased licart action, and even the congestion in the lungs, are really nature's last desperate efforts to gain the victory; but these curative efforts are sometimes so drastic that instead of de-


stroying the pneumonia germs, they kill the patient. Nevertheless the modern doctor is wise enough to appreciate this important principle and so co-operates with nature instead of smothering her efforts as was too frequently the case in former days. He endeavors to give healing reactions the guidance and direction that they need, for in the last analysis God has put more brains in the doctor's head, or at

least in *some* doctors' heads, than He had in the patient's blood and lungs.

The care and management of a pueumonia case is always a critical proposition. For this reason it is not wise for the average layman to undertake such a responsibility. But everyone may do something far better than to cure a case of pneumonia, and that is, prevent it.



such an excess of natural vitality that they can daily squander it in riotous living and yet have enough left to keep the pneumonia germs at arm's length; while others who are not so fortunate, even with reasonable care, spend legitimately each day about all the vitality they have to spare. In other words, having no deposit in the bank, they are simply living from hand to mouth, so as soon as they are subjected to some unusual exposure, such as loss of sleep, they are always in danger of taking pneumonia, for most of our vitality is generated while asleep.

Others invite pneumonia by some outrageous dietetic indiscretion which produces auto-intoxication, which in turn cripples the natural forces of the body, so the bodily defenses go into bankruptcy and the pneumonia germs seize the opportunity to break loose like an uncontrollable mob.

We read much these days about the importance of conserving our natural resources, preserving our forests, and developing better varieties of fruits and vegetables; but it is a thousand times more important to learn how to preserve and conserve our natural vitality so that we may successfully resist the invasion of disease germs.


### The Fresh Air Cure

Under ordinary circumstances an unusual

roof with only a wind break around it. They recently reported fifty-six successive cases of pneumonia without a single death, and not a drop of medicine was administered except a few laxatives. Compare this record with the fifteen to twenty-five per cent death rate under the old program when the patient was smothered in a stuffy room and systematically doped with poisonous drugs that only hindered his recovery. For Dr. Osler has well said that there is nothing in a bottle that is of any benefit in a case of pneumonia.

#### The Modern Method

Every few hours either the patient is moved indoors or the windows are closed if he is taking the cure in a room, heat is turned on and the patient is given a hot hip and leg

exposure to cold, wet and damp, is sufficient to bring on an attack of pneumonia. Then why is it we do not see more cases of pneumonia during a wet camp-meeting? Simply because the people are constantly taking the fresh air cure and that is the best treatment for pneumonia. And do not forget that which can cure pneumonia can prevent it.

The most intelligent doctors now endeavor to move their pneumonia patients out-doors and as a consequence secure surprising results. The pneumonia ward in the Presbyterian hospital in New York is up on the flat pack which brings twice as much blood down in the extremities as there was previously. That means only half as much blood in the lungs, and that means freer respiration and less work for the heart.

After this pack has been given a few minutes it is removed and the entire body is given a vigorous cold mitten friction. This tones up the nervous system, reduces the temperature and the reaction that follows brings the blood to the surface so it can cool off more rapidly. During this treatment an ice bag is placed over the heart and it can be

used advantageously from time to time during the day.

Great care must be taken that the shoulders shall not become chilled as this aggravates the disease.

#### A Free Prescription

Why not take the pneumonia cure in advance? Here is the prescription: Move your bed out on the veranda during the milder months of the year and so store up so much vitality that when the pneumonia germs begin to come in like a flood you will have resistance enough to confront them. When you finally move your bed indoors, arrange also to move as much of outdoors indoors as is possible. If you find it inconvenient to open your bedroom windows, smash one or two window-panes and forget to repair them. It is better to have a broken window than broken health.

Are you afraid of a draft? Then become accustomed to it just as your horses have become used to the automobiles. Why not wrap up your head at night just as if you were going out driving? This will do no harm provided you do not cover your face. Or hang a sheet a foot or two from the open window so as to break the force of the wind. Buy an extra blanket or two so you can keep comfortable and warm. That is cheaper than hiring nurses after you get pneumonia.

Remember, the fresh air fiend rarely becomes a pneumonia victim.

### Killing the Health Warriors

Several years ago, the pathologist of Rush Medical College inoculated two rabbits with pneumonia. One of them was given alcohol which used to be the orthodox remedy and is not altogether out of style yet. That particular rabbit died. The other rabbit recovered. Then he took a drop of blood out of the living rabbit and put it under the microscope, and he found that the white blood cells had eaten up the pneumonia germs. That saved the rabbit's life, for we must never forget that the white blood cells are one of God's great healing agencies as well as one of the most important defenses that He has established in our bodies.

When a drop of blood was taken from the dead rabbit it was found that the white blood cells had not eaten up the pneumonia germs, thus leaving them free to manufacture the terrible toxins that kill the rabbit just as they

destroy human beings under similar circumstances.

Now why didn't the white blood cells destroy the pneumonia germs in the rabbit that had received the alcohol treatment? No doubt because the same alcohol that made the rabbit drunk also made the white blood cells so drunk that they couldn't smell the pneumonia germs. In other words, they were anesthetized.

This instructive experiment explains why, when the drunkard catches pneumonia, he dies so promptly. It also explains why the moderate drinker is always in greater danger of pneumonia than the total abstainer.

It is a multitude of just such experiments that has taught the medical profession that alcohol has no place in the sick room, and for the same reason it is dangerous in health.

Do you sometimes take a few "drops" just to make you feel a little better? If you do, you are destroying your own divinely appointed defenses against disease. Isn't that a dear price to pay for a few good feelings, almost as foolish as it would be for a man to set fire to his house because he liked to see the flames?

#### The Good Feeling Drugs

But the same is true of the entire stimulant family. Tobacco comes under the same condemnation. It contains no nourishment. It is a poison and only a poison. The good feeling that it brings is the result of its poisonous effect. Some people have so much vitality that tobacco does not seem to do them any harm, but it never did anybody any good. It is better to live a poison-free life than a poisoned one. The most intelligent physicians are beginning to appreciate this although some of them, because of being slaves to some poison themselves, do not possess the necessary courage to tell the truth as they know it.

Dr. Evans, the eminent pathologist, until recently Health Commissioner of Chicago, now the popular health writer in the Chicago Tribune, says that the thousands who are addicted to the use of tea and coffee are "drug addicts." He says that physiologists are compelled to regard coffee, tea, tobacco and whisky as drugs in the same sense that opium and cocaine are. Certainly infinitely milder, but the same stimulant principle runs through them all.

Dr. Dixon, commissioner of health for the great state of Pennsylvania, says both tea and coffee are *stimulants* and though the mind is often stimulated for a short time by their use there is a period of *depression* following their use. It is precisely during this period of depression that sometimes pneumonia germs get in their deadly work. The "up and down" life is not an ideal one, either spiritually or physically.

### Self-Poisoning and Disease

More people are poisoned from within than from without. The large intestine is a paradise for germs and under certain conditions decomposition takes place very readily and poisonous substances are produced that overwhelm the entire system just as surely as though alcohol had been taken.

The luscious fruits, the nutritious grains, the wholesome vegetables with dairy products, do not furnish a fruitful field for the germs that naturally inhabit the alimentary canal, while flesh foods are their best culture media as every laboratory worker knows. When he wants to cultivate germs he plants them in beef tea, not in fruit juice.

Is it not foolish to saturate the alimentary canal with putrescible material that is so readily transformed into virulent poisons? When stagnation of the alimentary canal exists, and that is the most common ailment among civilized people, then the conditions are ideal for auto-intoxication, and this condition not only favors pneumonia but also nervous prostration, neuritis, sick headache, depression and a long train of other evils that are often supposed to be due to a "dispensation of Providence," when in reality it is largely caused by wretched, unwholesome and thoughtless eating and drinking.

#### In Conclusion

The main reason the pneumonia season is

about to arrive is because the cold weather drives so many indoors. That means inhaling more poisonous air, and that furnishes an excellent opportunity for the pneumonia germs to come to the front; so to avoid pneumonia, breathe pure air. Drink pure water instead of poisonous drinks. Eat clean, wholesome food fresh from the lap of nature instead of various second-hand foods in the form of flesh, fish and fowl.

Last, but not least, have faith in God. He is not only willing to preserve us from the pestilence that walketh in darkness, but He will also bless us with health and strength that He shall freely impart to us provided we are willing to co-operate with the laws of health which are indeed the laws of God.

(From the Dannemora, N. Y., Penitentiary)


"I received your nice letter and would have answered it before, but I have been very busy writing letters and trying to get God's people to take an interest in my case. I have been here now going on eight years.

### "My Diamonds in the Rough"

[Recently Mr. Lyon, who is engaged in a very helpful relief work for prisoners, visited Hinsdale and gave a talk in the sanitarium parlor. We cull the following from his speech.—Ed.]

Out of three hundred prisoners who came to us, at the end of five years, seventy-nine per cent of them could be satisfactorily accounted for. In another period of six years seventy-seven per cent were doing well.

#### Learned How to Live

I think of a man who came to us some twelve years ago. After his first term in prison he started out with the determination to live straight, as many another. He applied for a job, and the man said, "Come again another day." He couldn't wait another day, so asked another man to help him. The other man also turned the cold shoulder. That made him feel it was no use and he went back to his old habits.

That went on for fifteen years. He served a sentence in Colorado, another in Kansas, and one in New York; until at last he recognized that he could live a better life. He realized it as a sort of common sense thing, that he must turn away from this thing now or never, and he came to us for help.

He was an intelligent man of thirty-five by that time. A good bookkeeper, determined to get a position where he could live decently. But who would give a postion to such a man? We told his history to the superintendent of a company—got him a job. He worked for them for six years, being advanced from time to time in position and salary. Then he got another position for himself where he is working today. Last summer one evening he and his wife drove to our place and wanted us to take a ride. He said, "I never knew what it was like to live before."

These men have tremendous patience in their effort to make good and be the best they can be. This has been manifested to me in the correspondence I have had with a man in prison. He came to prison to learn the lessons of life. He says that in the five years he has been there he has been learning to read and write. He is reading the books in

the library, particularly on plumbing, and is now asking us to pay his tuition in a correspondence school, which we sometimes do, so he can finish his course. He writes, "So that when I come out of the institution, nine years hence, I may have a trade and can earn an honest living." Imagine the patience required. How many of us would labor fourteen years to get a trade? How many of us would face the scoffs of fellow prisoners, which I have known them to meet, successfully?

Another man was sent to Waupon prison for a year. He went to chapel the first Sunday, and said, "I realized for the first time what life should mean to me and what my life should mean to society." He resolved then and there to make that year a golden opportunity and prepare himself for better things. It is too bad that lad had to go to prison to learn the lesson some community back home in Wisconsin should have taught him.

A year or two ago I was out in Seattle, and a young man handed me his card. I remembered he had come to us from a reformatory. He was now in business in Seattle.

In Montana I met a young man who came to us from a penitentiary. We helped him to get hold of himself, and in turn lost track of him, but there he was in Montana, a contented tiller of the soil.

So they come to us and we try to inspire them with new confidence and courage and tide them over in practical ways, get them work and clothes, and homes where they may be surrounded with influences for good and be kept away from the pitfalls that may come to them.

They have many difficulties to meet. Many of them grew up in tenements, in bad company, and really did not have much chance to be straight. Perhaps nothing I could say would demonstrate this better than to tell of a young man who was at one time in one of the reformatories and is now out making good, and doing well, so the superintendent

tells me. This young man has stated the following in the dialect of his kind:

"Oh, yes, I'm guilty right enough, It ain't no use to throw a bluff, And yet I guess society Should share the guilt along o' me; I ain't the kind to weep and whine And say, 'What chance was mine?'
"Born in a dirty, reeking slum, Where God's good sunlight never come, And starved for food and starved for air, What chance would a fellow have living there? Evil things, and low, and mean, Was nearly all I ever seen; Of course,' I got to be a tough—A hoodlum and a bad young lad.
"But yet I might have grown up Reformed, and been some use to man If every time I left the trail." They didn't throw me into jail With those who taught me all I knew.
"Yes, I'm guilty; that is clear, But every man who's listening here And all these goody, goody folks As scoffs so much, is guilty, too, along o' me And will be till the world is free Of stinking slums and rotten holes And laws that pretend, but keep them there; I ain't the kind to weep and whine, But, say, what chance, what chance, was mine?"

And so it is, but when they go to prison and come out with a better purpose, do you recognize that better purpose and recognize the man as a human being because of this better purpose? Should we not aid in every way possible to help him in carrying it out?

Through all the evil influences may we not discover his dreams and extend a friendly hand that shall help recognize not only the brotherhood of man, but the patience and loving kindness of God?

### IN THE HARRISON STREET POLICE STATION

[The medical evangelistic students have many rich experiences at the Sunday morning services in the Harrison street police station. Our workers have maintained these services for more than fifteen years. Thousands of prisoners have had the saving gospel proclaimed to them and have confessed their sins. Some we know have never gone back to the old life; many have, but we continue to cast our bread "upon the waters," knowing that we shall "find it after many days."—Ed.]

On entering the Harrison street station we immediately go to an upper room, where our folding organ, song books, and tracts are kept. And it is in this "upper chamber" that we engage in an earnest season of prayer and deep searching of heart that we have every sin confessed before God, and be in a position that He can work through us for the salvation of those precious souls.

While we are kneeling in the presence of God we can hear the voices of the prisoners below in laughing and loud talking, and how

little do they realize that just above in a small room there is a little company earnestly praying that their hearts and minds be opened for the message that is soon to be given them. As we enter the steel gates that lead to the corridors there is a quietness that comes over the room and every one is orderly and attentive, and very much interested in the short talk. We have four corridors in which to speak and usually spend a half hour in each corridor.

One Sunday morning a few weeks ago when the jailer unlocked the doors we stepped in, and bidding the boys good morning, passed out the hymn books and invited them to join us in a song service. Usually they all accept the invitation and join in with us. This morning a short talk of fifteen minutes was given on the importance of the times, calling their attention to the times in which we are living and the events of eternal interest which are taking place before our eyes, also the nearness of the second coming of Christ.

As I was speaking I noticed a middle-aged man sitting in the far corner of the cell, and apparently not interested, but as I spoke of Christ's soon coming, and how prophecy that had foretold His coming was practically all fulfilled, he became interested and drew near to where I was standing and asked me several questions about His soon coming, which I gladly answered. When the invitation was given to accept Christ, he was one of the first to do so.

We then asked if there were any that wanted us to pray for them, and several hands were raised. We then knelt down with them and had a short season of prayer together, while those who did not feel inclined to kneel sat nearby with bowed heads. As we spoke some encouraging words to them for the stand they had taken, we shook hands and bid them good-bye.

When I entered the adjoining corridor one brother said to me, "I enjoyed your songs and talk very much." He was deeply interested, also several others, and after the service he knelt down with us in prayer.

We then hastened upstairs, where we held a service in the women's corridor. After singing a few favorite songs with which they were familiar, one of our workers read some comforting Scriptures. Some of the girls felt heart-broken because they had wandered far

from God. On assuring them that God had not forsaken them but that they had left Him, they wept bitterly and said they wanted to lead a better life. On extending the invitation they made a new start. These are some of the experiences we meet every week. We find some very stony hearts that seem impossible to touch, but usually before the service is over they are in tears or on their knees.




A SHAPELESS MASS OF IRON AND STEEL-A LITERAL JUNK PILE

next moment the passenger engine had jumped the track and the next instant was a shapeless mass of iron and steel, a literal junk pile.

The brave fireman was buried beneath it all and has since died from the terrible injuries he received. The engineer escaped, almost miraculously, from any serious injury. The

mail car was turned almost end to end, the mail clerk sustaining many injuries, none of them serious. He was among those who were taken to the Hinsdale sanitarium. He was a devout Christian and said that he had been in several wrecks before, but he had always looked to God to care for him, and certainly God had answered prayer.

Those in the first passenger coach suffered the most serious injuries. Kind hands did their best to lift the injured ones from among the wreckage and to temporarily dress their wounds until they could be taken to other places and have something more permanent done for them. Some of those who were taken to the Hinsdale sanitarium were terribly mangled.

As I saw this awful scene of wreckage and destruction, how forcibly I was reminded of the *uncertainty* of human life in these days. How important it is that wherever we are we should have our lives fully committed to God. Each day we should start out with a determination to carry out His purpose. Each night before we retire we should confess every sin and commit ourselves anew to God, so that if the record of our lives should be wound up ere we awake, that we should have no regrets when we have to meet the record at the bar of God.

### Breaking Up Heathendom

[This report from Pastor Munson was given at the time of his last visit to Hinsdale. It will be read with deep interest. Bro. Munson has spent more than a quarter of a century as missionary in the East India islands, first in Singapore, then in Java.—Ed.]

THIRTY-SEVEN years ago I gave my heart to Christ and very soon after that I gave my life to the work of the ministry and to foreign missions.

In my experience as a young Christian minister I had to contend with a great deal of discouragement; but I thank God I had been to a good school. I was associated with Godfearing men and women, and I learned more theology from their company than I did from the professors in the university. These were the experiences that have been of real benefit to me in my life work.

#### An Incident of Work in Bahama

Brother Manuel, our colored brother, was holding Bible readings in Bahama. Peters was a native; had been a soldier and lost a leg in the war. When he heard about Brother Manuel's Bible readings he came and stood outside the meeting. The buildings there are so you can hear through several partitions. He stood hidden by these bamboo screens and went there to take notes and data with which to hit Manuel, but he found to his consternation the ground was being cut from under his feet, and he confessed he had been altogether at fault, and wanted to be taught. He had a terrible struggle; was the only one of lifty that had the courage to step out and trust the Lord for his rice. He had a family.

He did not know where his food would come from.

I said, "Peters, we can not promise you any help at all until you have definitely taken your stand." But he finally stepped out and trusted the Lord to care for Him, and the Lord did care for him in a very wonderful way.

### Walked Four Hundred Miles to Find Peters

There was a man, a native of Java, who heard about Peters. So he walked into the city, twenty miles from his native city. He looked for Peters, but could not find him, and he walked back again. This journey was repeated many times, until he had walked four hundred miles to find Peters, and after all this effort he tried once more and succeeded, and the result was after hearing the gospel message from Peters he went back and proclaimed it to his people. This is only one instance showing how these people are hungry for a knowledge of the truth.

The Spirit of God works just the same among such men as He does here, because sin is the same everywhere. Men are just as much in need of religion in Java as here, and here as there, but the grace of God can regenerate the vilest of men.

#### Felt a Burden for the People

When we went back to Java from Australia four years ago we went to a place whose name

means "the joy of the earth." It is a very pretty spot, and a healthy spot. My business was to translate gospel literature for the people. I had very little time to hold meetings or go out and visit anybody, aside from the few meetings we held in our house. But Mrs. Munson, whose whole soul was on fire, could not live there and see the people in such darkness, without doing something. Although it was contrary to the instructions received, she said, 'I must go out, I can not stay here. You may work at your desk, but I must go out and visit."

### Walked the Streets to Find a Welcome

She went out, up and down the street, looking for some one to welcome her, looking for some woman, who with her eyes even, would say, "I want to talk with you." Finally she found a woman who was sick. If you can only treat the sick you are sure to find some one who needs your help.

This woman had been under a doctor's care but he did not seem to do her very much good, so when Mrs. Munson passed her door she looked so ill that she stopped a moment and spoke to her. She was invited into the house, and talked with her and counseled with her what to do, and she said, "Come over to the house; we have a little meeting there and perhaps it will do you good. At any rate, the walk will do you good."

The woman became very much interested. Her son came home and was taken very sick and finally died. We did all we could to assist them. And then the sister of this woman lost her husband by the cholera, and was so distracted she did not know what to do

She came to our house again and again. We learned afterwards she had to steal away from her house to come. Her father, who had many years before been a Christian, had given up Christianity and would have nothing to do with it, and when we went there he gave us a very cool reception. But this daughter came to the meetings until finally she showed this seed had taken root in her heart, and the way opened for the whole family to become converted to the truth.

### Repented When Facing Death

Cholera came to the island and scores of Chinese and natives were carried away. Her father was so frightened that instead of resorting to rational means he drank brandy to such an extent that it caused his death. Three days before his death he was aroused to a sense of his spiritual condition and repented.

Then the funeral had to be arranged for. These people did not wish to bury him as a heathen, and yet there were heathen relatives that wanted to participate. Their plan was to bury him outside the Christian burying ground, not in it.

In a Chinese home when a father or grandfather or grandmother has died, nobody sleeps, nobody bathes, nobody does anything at all to minister to their own comfort, because it would be an act of disrespect when he was dead.

Mrs. Munson, in visiting the home—the home that had rejected her advances before—found the girl on the verge of nervous collapse, and wanted to do something for her. "Oh," she said, "I can't think of it! It would be the greatest disrespect to my father."

As the girl was sitting up one night in her chair she seemed to be in a peculiar state, and began to talk rapidly. She did not know what she was saying, but the rest of the people understood what she was saying and it produced a consternation in the household. She seemed to see her father and he was saying, "You bury me in a Christian coffin and give me a Christian burial. And not only that, but you must be reconciled to your enemies and repent and be baptized and devote your lives to the work of the gospel. You listen to what Mrs. Munson tells you, for it is all truth and you must follow it."

After the funeral Mrs. Munson said to the girl, "You thought you heard your father speaking, but that is not so. Your father is dead. It was God speaking."

### Reaped a Harvest of Six Souls

As filial piety is the great virtue in the Chinese, God in that channel sought to reach the minds of these people. They were converted and became very earnest in their study of the truth, and not only this, but some more came to our house three times a week and studied the Scriptures. And before I left I baptized six candidates, and among them were these three people, members of this family.

### Cleaned Out the Tobacco

They had been dealers in tobacco, and the house they lived in was stacked to the roof with tobacco. We told them this was not a proper occupation for a Christian, so they disposed of it and the mother opened a little store to sell garments—anything by which to gain a livelihood. But what surprised me most was that before I came away the mother came and placed in my hands four thousand guilders (four hundred dollars) to go into the work of the Lord. Since then she has been engaged in teaching other women in Batavia this message.

This work is carried on not simply by our knowledge of the truth. We can not do anything of ourselves, but if the Spirit of God rests upon us and accompanies us it is marvelous what power there is in the truth, and I have seen some wonderful manifestations of that Spirit of power in this work.

I want to say to young people who are contemplating missionary work that it is the only life that is worth while.

I think I never realized in my life so much my absolute dependence upon Jesus Christ. I can not do anything of myself. I know when I first went to Singapore and saw the flocks of Chinese filling the streets, I thought I might as well go home. I went up on the hillside after I had been there some months and prayed God would give me grace to meet the situation. As I went down the hill I went down with a song of praise on my lips. The enemy never tempted me as to whether I was in the place the Lord wanted me or not, but I went on each day in the strength of the Lord and had the satisfaction of seeing a few brought to the Saviour.

### Forty-two Millions on Two Islands

But oh, there is so much to be done! There is great need. We can not get workers enough. This country must furnish the workers. In Java alone we have thirty-two million people—a little island no larger than the state of Ohio. Think what that means, and then we have another island with ten million people. Are we going to preach this message to all these people? It is impossible in our own strength. We can never accomplish the work except by the power of the Spirit of God, and I am sure if we want a part in

that work and desire the gift of the Spirit to fit us for it, He has promised it. And I believe we shall live to see more wonderful signs than were witnessed in the early church.

### SEEDS THAT GROW IN EVERY LAND

J. E. FULTON

[A word from Pastor Fulton, who has spent more than ten years as a missionary among the South Pacific Islands, as given before the Hinsdale sanitarium family on his last visit to the States.—Ed.]

I am glad the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ is suitable to every land. I was anxious, when I first went to the Pacific Islands, to see some of the old home plants grow, so I sent for some apple seeds and peach seeds and planted them, but found they were not adapted to the climate. It is not so with the religion of our Lord Jesus Christ and His gospel; it is suitable to every land, to every people.

Shortly after I arrived in Fiji I was thrown on the little island away from all Europeans. I was in a native home and walked in and out among the people and I had a native young man with me who was my companion on the boat, and it was a great-blessing to me, so I quickly got hold of the language.

Then I began to preach the gospel message, and did it very much the same way as we do in this country. I had a folding blackboard and charts of different kinds. The people are very fond of pictures, and they responded to the gospel taught in this way.

We taught them, among other things, that there must be a higher standard set up for Christians than some of them had learned about. We told them some of them must give up their filthy habits, such as their native drink, which is almost universal in the islands. Many who professed to be Christians still held to this filthy custom.

### How They Prepare the Native Drink

They take the root of a plant and one or two young men or women are detailed by the chief to prepare the drink. A large wooden bowl is set in the middle of the room, and the chief and the others sit around the room against the wall. There are no chairs in the houses; they all sit on mats. In our churches over there the people all sit on the floor, except perhaps the white minister, who has a stand.

So two young men or women sit down at the

bowl with the root in its dry state, which they chew. After it has been sufficiently masticated it is placed in the bowl. When a sufficient quantity has been mixed in this way, water is placed with it and then a strainer used to pass out the fiber. Then it is passed to the chief and he drinks, and then it is passed to the others next in rank. They always have great respect for Europeans, and it would be first passed to them. Many a time I have had this passed to me, but am glad to say I do not know how it tastes yet.

The governor has passed an ordinance now that it should be ground up instead of chewed, as in former days, but I know it is still ground up in the old way by those grinders we all know so much about. It is poisonous, and acts differently on the system from what the white man's drink does. The white man's drink goes to the head. But this goes to the knees and they lose their power of locomotion and sink down. It is a very degrading habit.

We have a most interesting native population connected with our Australasian field. They have many different languages. We have a large number of islands—thousands of them—and all the languages are not the same.

In Fiji alone, with which I am best acquainted, after working there ten years, I might say there are ten different dialects in that little group of people. So it gives you some idea of the work that must be done. There are many differences in the languages in the South Seas. Some words are the same in all these languages. Still they have distinct characteristics as people.

They know very little about the world at large. I have had the boys in school have their eyes stand out to hear of the great cities of the world and learn that in one of those cities there were as many people as could be found in all Fiji. Was it possible Chicago was as large as Fiji? It was doubtful, but they had respect for their missionaries, though they could not accept it fully.

There are opportunities for us all along the way every day, and I believe as workers we should have our eyes open to see these opportunities; and the Lord will give us opportunities. We do not *pray* enough as workers; we do not *believe* enough. I think if we would believe more we would expect more from Him.

#### A PLEA FOR THE PRISONERS

(From the Anamosa, Iowa, Prison)

"I received your welcome letter and THE LIFE BOAT some time ago. I have nearly finished a close study of 'Daniel and Revelation,' by Uriah Smith. I never could understand much of the Revelation before. I had 'Steps to Christ' four years ago and I liked it very much. I also have read 'His Glorious Appearing.'

"There are times when things seem to go wrong. Then they brighten up again. At the time, I think that I might as well give up trying to live to the honor and glory of God. The time sin presses the hardest is when I am in my cell where I can't fight it down by filling my lungs with pure air, and working it off my mind. I long to get out into the woods and learn of nature's God again, especially when the past and present seem to be overhanging and surrounding me.

"There are not many outside who know how hard it is to live up to one's conscience in prison, especially if he was brought up in a Christian home. When I pay my debt to the State I am not ever going to transgress the Lord's day again, if it is possible not to. And this vow is made with my Saviour's strength to aid me.

"If people understood the degrading tendencies that are pulling men in prison downward, I think the prisoners would be mentioned more often during the hour of prayer. It is the Spirit of God that can keep a man's mind and aspirations pure. The intercession of the faithful, in behalf of the prisoners, is a good means of changing the men from their wicked way."

"I want you to realize how much good there is in the Home. If you could only appre-

ciate it. I have made a new start and I am not going to give up, but keep on till I force people to see that I can do right.


"I often think of the evening and morning worship and pray for all the girls in the Home, also for those that have left. I hope you will remember me in your prayers for I need the prayers of all who trust in God."

### A Health Revival at Naperville

T HE majority of Christian people appreciate the importance of having spiritual revivals from time to time, but many of them do not know that the need is equally great for genuine health revivals; for the same Bible that commands us to do all things to the glory of God, also admonishes us to glorify Him in our body as well as in our spirit. (1 Cor. 6:20.)

With this thought in my mind, I went down a few weeks ago and visited the president of the Naperville W. C. T. U. and told her that I had a burden in my soul to organize a health revival in the town of Naperville, a village of about 5,000 inhabitants. She was deeply interested and said the local W. C. T. U. would meet the very next day and asked me to come and present the matter to them. This I did. They were enthusiastic over the idea and voted their full cooperation.

I then sought an interview with the president of the Ministerial Union to see if it was possible to have a union meeting of all the churches on Sunday night in order to usher in this Health Revival Week. He called a meeting of the Ministerial Union and laid the question before them, and they voted their unanimous co-operation and arranged for the Union meeting to be held Sunday night, Sept. 26th, in the First Evangelical Church, which is the largest one in the city. The following program was printed and circulated through the town by the members of our medical evangelistic class.

SUNDAY, 7:30 P. M.

Union meeting held in the First Evangelical Church. "The Mystery of Health and Healing," lecture by Dr. David Paulson.

MONDAY, 3 P. M.

The Grace United Evangelical Church. "Home Nursing," by Dr. Mary Paulson.

Various practical demonstrations by trained nurses.

TUESDAY, 3 P. M.

The Grace United Evangelical Church. "Scientific Dietetics," by Dr. David Paulson. With demonstration of healthful cookery.

WEDNESDAY, 3 P. M.

The Grace United Evangelical Church. "Gymnastics Without a Gymnasium," "What to Do First in Accidents and Emergencies," Illustrated with instructive demonstrations.

THURSDAY, 3 P. M.

The Grace United Evangelical Church. "The Newer Science of Digestion." Practical health hints. Question box. Drs. David Paulson and L. H. Wolfsen.

Although Sunday was a very stormy and unpleasant day, Dr. Jordan, the pastor of the church, estimated that there were eight hundred people present at the evening service. I brought to them a vital message from the Bible on the sacredness of the human body, the divine principles regarding the maintenance of health, and I showed them how fully the latest scientific evidences emphasize the great truths that were given to us by Inspiration more than thirty centuries ago. The Lord helped me in a very special manner to bring clearly before the people some important truths that went straight to the hearts of the people.

### Health Instruction to Students

The previous Thursday afternoon I had already talked in the grammar grades of the public school as a part of this health effort, and on Friday morning I talked to the students in the high school on "Health and Efficiency," outlining the alphabet of health, and especially emphasizing the curse of the cigarette evil.

Monday morning I gave an address to the four hundred students in the Evangelical College located in Naperville. I showed these young people the importance of being anchored on solid, substantial principles instead of chasing superficial fads. I told them how easy it was to secure a law banishing the common drinking cup, but how difficult it was to secure an effective law to banish the wine cup. Yet where anyone had caught any disease from the common drinking cup, there were 50,000 people who had caught damnation for this world and the world to come from the wine cup.

I told them how easy it was to secure a law making it unlawful for a boy to do substantial work until he was after sixteen years old, but how next to impossible it was to get a law prohibiting any one from selling him cigarettes to ruin his brain and to burn out his soul. But where one boy has been injured by working too much before he was sixteen years old. there were ten thousand who had been ruined for time and eternity by the cigarette evil.

I called their attention to the fact in some states a woman could not be married until she had a certificate that she was physically fit. But it is ten times more important to pass a satisfactory examination as to whether she can make a good loaf of bread, and cook a meal of victuals that will not sour on her husband's stomach. In other words, that a practical knowledge of hygienic cookery is far more important than a smattering of eugenics.

#### Church School of Health Work

Monday afternoon three hundred of the very best people of Naperville gathered in the Grace United Evangelical Church and Mrs. Paulson gave them a study on Home Nursing. The nurses gave demonstrations on how to give hip and leg packs, fomentations for pain in the stomach, hot and cold for headaches, how to take exercise to strengthen the abdominal muscles, and many other similar things. The audience was deeply interested.

Dr. Scott, the pastor of the Methodist Church, opened the session with prayer, as we felt we could consistently ask God's blessing upon what we were about to undertake.

Tuesday afternoon I gave a talk on scientific dietetics, food values, how to eat for efficiency and strength, and to the glory of God. Our sanitarium cook had prepared samples for all of hygienic soup, health sandwiches, sticks, health wafers, and a fruit drink.

Wednesday afternoon was household gymnastics day. I gave first of all a little Bible study on Ezek. 16:49. "This was the iniquity of thy sister Sodom, pride, fulness of bread and abundance of idleness was in her and her daughters, neither did she strengthen the hand of the poor and needy." I had a tree with four roots drawn on the blackboard, each root representing one of these fundamental things. One of the branches of the tree was named "Vice," another one "Degeneracy," another one "Crime," another one "Intemperance." Across the top of it was written "Sodom."

### The Sap of Sodom

I showed them how if we had any one of these four fundamental things in our lives, some of the sap of Sodom was flowing into our souls. I called their attention to the fact that steam and electricity were now doing the world's work. That we are more and more working with our brains, and yet, although we are working less, we are eating more, that the leisure life is producing disease and immorality. That those who are compelled to work do

it as a *drudgery*, and thus lose a blessing every day.

I told them that the ordinary athletics have become a curse; that we must grasp the idea of how to make the daily work gymnastics. I told them how to get the right position, and how to fix chairs so as to sit comfortably and hygienically. How to put the washtub up on the table instead of on low chairs, so as to do the work without stooping. I had a washboard, washtub, sawbuck and saw, dusting broom and dusters, and brooms, all there, also a step-ladder to show them how to walk upstairs so as to get exercise out of it instead of harm. It was suggested that there was as great a benefit derived from punching pillows and making beds as going into a gymnasium and punching a bag.

It was an interesting hour, and, I believe, profitable for all the people. Then Dr. Wolfsen showed them how to give artificial respiration, and how to get out of a burning building safely, etc.

Thursday afternoon was our last session, and there were just as many present as at first; in fact, more. I gave them a study showing some of the remarkable things that have been worked out on digestion in recent years, and called attention to some of the practical lessons that they suggest. I then read one or two very helpful statements from "Ministry of Healing" on the same subject.

Dr. Wolfsen answered some questions that had been handed in, and showed them some other practical things that had been crowded out of the previous hours. Then I closed the session with a word of prayer.

We who carried on this effort could naturally see many shortcomings in it, and no doubt many of the audience could do the same. During this Health Week I think I saw as never before how we may be able to carry on such a work much more thoroughly from a Bible standpoint than we have ever attempted before. In fact, make it more than ever a real religious effort. I am coming to believe that whatever we undertake must have stamped upon it the Divine trade mark, whether it be a gospel effort, or a temperance campaign, or a health educational work. And then the people who hear God will hear us. The class who have no respect for the Lord, we are wasting our time

over anyway. It was an earnest, responsible class of people who came day after day to the Naperville effort.

It is now our plan to organize smaller community efforts in school houses and little chapels where perhaps only fifteen or twenty families will come together and can be instructed in these great principles. I believe the Lord will go before us as we try to build up this health revival work.

### GREAT PRINCIPLES FROM A GREAT BOOK, No. 2

Last month we quoted some instructive principles from "Ministry of Healing." This book is brimful of truths that appeal to every heart. It contains just the information that every family needs. It is a beautiful blending of the gospel for both soul and body, and it sheds light on so many vital issues.

With so much turmoil and trouble in all parts of the earth everyone will want to give holiday presents that are only of the highest value.

Here is a book that would make a most

acceptable present for your friends and you will wish to have one for your own use.

The temperance question is one of the greatest issues before us today. On this subject I quote the following from page 171:


"Especially does the temperance reform demand the support of Christian workers. They should call attention to this work and make it a *living* issue. Everywhere they should present to the people the principles of true temperance, and call for *signers* to the temperance pledge."

The hour has struck when the children of God not only should labor to crush the liquor habit, but to *uplift* the drunkard. We are undoubtedly on the eve of another great revival among God's children for reaching the lost. On this point we read on page 173:

"You must hold fast to those whom you are trying to help, else victory will never be yours. They will be continually tempted to evil. Again and again they will be almost overcome by the eraving for strong drink; again and again they may fall; but do not, because of this, cease your efforts."

### The Relation of Diet to Intemperance

Temperature reformers are just beginning to appreciate the fact that juicy beefsteaks, fiery

spices and condinents, and other stimulating foods and drinks, create the *thirst* for liquor. Note the following statement on page 176:

"Those who are struggling against the power of appetite should be instructed in the principles of healthful living. . . . Only by living obedience to the principles of health can they hope to be freed from the *craving* for unnatural stimulants."

Do you sometimes have dark and discouraging hours when you do not feel you can possibly look up to God and pray? Notice this encouraging principle on page 181:

"Many who have been overcome by temptation are humiliated by their failures, and they feel that it is in vain for them to approach unto God; but this thought is of the enemy's suggestion. When they have sinned, and feel that they can not pray, tell them that it is then the time to pray. . . . Those whom Christ has forgiven most will love Him most. These are they who in the final day will stand nearest to His throne."

It is not those who have been the greatest saints on earth who will stand the nearest to God's throne. It is those who have been forgiven the *most* on earth. Isn't that a wonderfully comforting thought?

### The Fatal Flaw in Socialism

As long as we have to contend with human selfishness, the dream of the socialists can no more become true than can the dream of the peace advocates while the spirit of war is in the hearts of humanity. In this world the rich have a mission to the poor, and the poor have a mission to the rich. On page 186 we read:

"It was not God's purpose that poverty should wholly cease. It is one of *His means* for the development of character. 'The poor,' He says, 'shall *never* cease out of the land; therefore I command thee, saying, Thou shalt open thine hand wide unto thy brother, to thy poor and to thy needy, in thy land.'" Deut. 15:11.

The "Back to the Land" movement is beginning to inspire with hope thousands of thoughtful people. On this we read on page 189:

"Thousands and tens of thousands might be working upon the soil who are crowded into the cities, watching for a chance to earn a trifle. . . Think of the families herded together in miserable tenements, many of them in dark basements, reeking with dampness and filth. . . . If the poor now crowded into the cities could find homes upon the land, they might not only earn a livelihood, but find health and happiness now unknown to them."

Genuine missionary work includes this very enterprise. We read on page 192:

"There are multitudes of poor families for whom no better missionary work could be done than to assist them in settling on the land and in learning how to make it yield them a livelihood. . . . It is God's purpose that the rich and the poor shall be closely bound together by the ties of sympathy and helpfulness."

Many of our Christian farmers are rapidly shriveling up. They don't see how they can do any missionary work. They are simply burying their talents in the earth. Such should take to heart this statement on page 193.

"Christian farmers can do real missionary work in helping the poor to find homes on the land, and in teaching them how to till the soil and make it productive. Teach them how to use the implements of agriculture, how to cultivate the various crops, how to plant and care for orchards."

### The Best Charity

"Real charity helps men to help themselves. If one comes to our door and asks for food, we should not turn him away hungry; his poverty may be the result of misfortune. But true beneficence means more than mere gifts. . . To give thought and time and personal effort costs far more than merely to give money. But it is the truest charity." Page 195.

There are so many who give to charity what they do not need for themselves, but that is *not* charity in the Bible sense. The higher ideal is well expressed on page 206.

"No one can practise real benevolence without self-denial. . . . Upon the walls of our homes, the pictures, the furnishings, we are to read, 'Bring the poor that are cast out to thy house.' On our wardrobes we are to see written, as with the finger of God, 'Clothe the naked.' times find twenty-five to thirty playing together. They never seem to be quarreling or fighting, but are very congenial to each other.

We are working among thirteen different nationalities in Chicago. So far we have had literature for only the Germans and Bohemians beside the English.

We take the book, "Ministry of Healing," back and forth on the train and study it on the way.

Every day we visit the poor woman who was hurt by an insane man, whom we met the first day we began this work. We carry our lunch with us and she lets us eat in her kitchen. She is very cordial. We treated her knee and have had prayer with her and read the Bible with her. One morning when telling me of her trials she said, "Really, I don't see why this trouble should have come." It caused her to lose her position and she is a poor woman, anyway.

She said, "I feel like this: Ilad this not happened I never would have met you girls, because I would have been in the factory instead of at home when you came by. As it was, I was hurt when you came and if I hadn't been I never would have learned to love the Bible as I now do."

Little experiences like that we treasure as gold and blessings from heaven, because we know the Lord is cooperating with us in our work and working through us. Yesterday morning when we stopped in I had "Ministry of Healing" with me, and said, "I will leave it, and if you have time to look in it, you cannot open it up anywhere but what there are good things which you will enjoy."

"Being in the way the Lord led me." Gen. 24:27.



The Chicago *Tribune*, commenting upon this editorially, says:

"A year and a half ago this avalanche of military might have thrilled us. Today, though we are intellectually conscious of its importance, we have become so accustomed to thinking of armies counting millions, and battles covering hundreds of miles in extent and weeks in time that we have lost the capacity for wonder or surprise."

The inspired seer on the isle of Patmos, two thousand years ago, looking down the future ages, discerned a time when "the nations were angry." Rev. 11:18. Was there ever a time in human history when there were so many nations engaged in war, and there was so much anger and hatred let loose? If not, then may not this present situation be a fulfillment of those prophetic words? And if so, remember that the next scene that caught the eye of the inspired prophet was this:

"And thy wrath is come." When that time comes it means that God's mercy has ceased, and the angel of mercy has folded his wings and departed, and God's wrath

is poured out on the earth; and the next event, "The time of the dead, that they should be judged, and that thou shouldst give reward unto Thy servants . . . and shouldst destroy them which destroy the earth."

We, who are living in this grand and awful time, should earnestly take to heart these words of our Master:

"Take heed to yourselves, lest at any time your hearts be overcharged with surfeiting, and drunkenness, and cares of this life, and so that day come upon you unawares." Luke 21:34.

### HOW REVIVALS ARE BORN AND KEPT ALIVE

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It was said of the early church that "The Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved." Acts 2:47. That shows the Lord is back of all genuine soul-winning. The people that the Lord don't add to the church only make trouble for the church. Now, on the other hand, when a group of Christians gather week after week and month after month and no one is added to their church, what is the matter? It is very evident that something keeps the Lord from getting His hand in, and here it is:

"Behold, the Lord's hand is not shortened, that it can not save; neither is His ear heavy, that He can not hear: But your iniquities have separated between you and your God, and your sins have hid His face from you, that He will not hear." Isa. 59:1-2.

When God is put out of the camp by our sins, then soul-saving stops. Occasionally some one may be added to the church, but God has not added them. When stagnation creeps into God's work, that is the secret of it, no matter what other explanations may be given for it.

Under such conditions, what are we to do? Read Rev. 3:2. "Be watchful, and strengthen the things which remain, that are ready to die." In these days of general backsliding, all about us are souls that are ready to die. We must strengthen these, and also be watchful or we will never even know what needs to be done.

Are you longing for a revival in your

neighborhood and in your church? Remember God has one ready for you. He always has one ready. Are you ready to touch the button that will bring it? Remember, ten righteous people could have saved Sodom; but there wasn't ten righteous people in it. Thank God it only takes one person to start a revival. You may be the one. Will you do this?

"When churches are revived, it is because some individual seeks earnestly for the blessing of God. He hungers and thirsts after God and asks in faith and receives accordingly. He goes to work in carnest, feeling his great dependence upon the Lord and souls are aroused to seek for a like blessing, and a season of refreshing falls on the hearts of men."

A splendid spiritual revival, like a small-pox epidemic, only needs one genuine case to start it, and you may be that person. A revival never can die out in a church as long as there is some one who is watchful, who has it in his heart to strengthen the things which remain, which are ready to die.

May God kindle the revival spirit in your community. You can not afford to let it go out any more than the owner of an apartment house can afford to let the fire die out of his furnace right in the heart of winter just because the fireman has gone to sleep.

It is when soul-winners go to sleep that God's revival spirit has to be withdrawn from the earth. It can't find any channels to flow through.

### A TEMPERANCE BATTLE IN MINNE-APOLIS

Our readers know the question of whether Minneapolis, Minn., should be a Dry or a Wet town was voted upon October 4th. It was the largest city in America that had voted upon this question by itself, and so the struggle there naturally attracted national attention.

I was invited to participate, the last three days before the election, in the whirlwind closing campaign. On Sunday morning I lectured in the Bethlehem Presbyterian church. It was a splendid, responsive audience, who felt deeply the call of the hour.

This temperance campaign had been waged

largely on the economic issue. I felt especially impressed of the Lord to present the question from the Bible and from a moral standpoint. God says, "Woe unto him that giveth his neighbor drink, that puttest thy bottle to him, and makest him drunken." Hab. 2:15. That settles the saloon-keeper's status with me. He may ride in an automobile here. He may live on Prospect Hill, and his wife belong to the Woman's Clubs, and his children move in the best society in the city, but God has pronounced a curse upon him and that can no more be reversed than the law of gravitation. Unless he repents from his sin, and abandons his business, that curse will be ratified at the bar of God, if not before.

Twice the Bible declares no drunkard shall inherit the kingdom of God. That settles the saloon question with me. I am interested in getting men ready for heaven, and the product of the saloon can not be admitted there. The Saviour Himself said, "Every plant, which my heavenly Father hath not planted, shall be rooted up." Matt. 15:13. I know God never planted the saloon, and so I know He wants it rooted up, and I propose to be earnestly at work pulling it up, and if the job is not entirely completed when the Master returns, He will certainly say, "Well done, good and faithful servant"

John the Baptist said that every tree which bringeth not forth *good fruit* is hewn down, and cast into the fire. (Matt. 3:10.) I have had abundant opportunity to sample the fruit of the saloon. I have heard the unearthly shriek of the victim of delirium tremens. I have seen the poor drunkard's wife beaten into a pulp by her insane and infuriated husband while under the influence of drink. I have seen the children driven to the "home of the friendless" by this accursed traffic.

I know the fruit by personal observation and I know it is not good fruit. I know God wants that tree cut down, and God being my helper, I am going to spend my spare time hacking away at it. If the tree should not be entirely cut down when the Master returns I will have been in a good deal better business than if I had been watering it, defending it, and building it up.

Sunday afternoon I spoke in the Oliver Presbyterian Church, and in the evening at the Walker Methodist Church. The Lord added

His blessing to each of these efforts. Minneapolis was stirred as it never had been before. The newspapers said that no political campaign in the memory of the oldest inhabitant had been one-tenth as enthusiastic. I believe the Dry forces had nearly a hundred street meetings in operation that same Sunday evening.

The Dry forces believe they have abundant evidence that men voted illegally and that much corruption was utilized to win the day. The whisky forces spent thousands and thousands of dollars in expensive advertising and in importing great speakers to deceive the working men into believing that if Minneapolis went dry they would lose their positions and that the grass would grow on the main streets. The devil not only has a special gift for *originating* lies, but he can also make a host of people actually believe those lies, and especially those who naturally belong to his church.

I was glad to contribute my mite to this splendid campaign. My heart was wrung the next morning on my return home to learn that Minneapolis had gone Wet by a majority of something like 9,000 votes. Nevertheless, I believe that much good was accomplished. The temperance forces were aroused as never before. The next time they have an opportunity they will no doubt sweep this accursed traffic from that beautiful northwestern city, if not from the entire State.
