
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


Many the sheep who're lost today

Winter Colds and Spring Fevers

A N excess of indoor climate and too much auto-intoxication are the principal causes for such a surplus of winter colds. But from whence comes that all-gone, run-down, good-for-nothing feeling that steals over so many in late winter and early spring? Can it be avoided? If so, what is the secret?


In regard to old-fashioned scurvy, Dr. Evans, formerly health commissioner for Chicago, writes:

"In scurvy there is a swelling around the eyes, over which the skin has the color of a bruise and a pale face which looks bloated. There are rheumatic pains. The gums swell and the teeth become loose. The breath is offensive. Few people know this picture, yet a large part of the population will have 'a touch of scurvy' between

now and May. With some it will go no further then repeated spells of bad breath. With others the face will be pale and a little bloated, with dark circles and slight bloats around the eyes. With others there will be patches of skin eruptions."

Dr. Evans adds: "The reason is plain. For several months we have lived on 'hog and

hominy,' or what is equivalent to it. Certain needs of the system have not been met. In consequence we have gotten a little out of balance. At this season of the year the yearning is for fresh vegetables and fruits. The greatest yearning is for those fruits and vegetables that are eaten raw."

Green Fodder All Winter

Every farmer knows how much better the stock thrives when taken off dry fodder and fed on green stuff in the spring. So the upto-date farmer now has a silo so he can supply his cattle with green fodder all winter long and the difference in their condition is simply phenomenal. But that same farmer rarely has

sense enough to appreciate that he and his wife and his children, and the stranger within his gates, would receive as much benefit if they also could be furnished some green garden stuff during the winter.

It is not necessary to build a silo for this purpose. Good, sound head cabbage with a little care will keep in any cellar. They contain in abundance the very iron that the children's blood is craving. The "iron tonic" from the druggist is more expensive and is a wretchedly poor substitute for nature's kind. In addition, fresh cabbage made into cole slaw is rich in those mysterious "Vitamines" out of which the body manufactures some of its most essential life-giving elements. On this point Dr. Evans, who is now the popular health writer for the Chicago Tribune, says:

"This is the season of the year when raw carrots are good for the complexion. Raw carrots, by preventing and curing spring touches of scurvy, may prevent some muddiness, some puffiness, and may cure some spring blotches. Raw vegetables are better than cooked, from the scurvy standpoint."

Carrots vs. Claret

Sir Andrew Clark, the well-known physician, advised an old lady who took her daughter to him, suffering from anemia, to give her claret. Six weeks later the old lady returned with the girl, now rosy-cheeked and healthy. "I am glad she has taken her medicine," said Sir Andrew. "Oh, yes," replied the old lady. "I gave her plenty of them. Boiled them and stewed them and gave them to her at every meal." She thought the doctor had ordered carrots.

But there are other things besides raw cabbage and carrots that will prevent winter scurvy and postpone spring fever. Some one asked, "How can I get through this winter and early spring without skin eruptions, rheumatic pains, puffy face and other signs of a touch of scurvy?"

To which Dr. Evans answered, "The first requisite is to eat fruit for breakfast. Especially should the Southern people substitute fruit for some of the meat in their heavy biscuit-steak-waffles breakfasts. Two fruits should be eaten each morning, one raw and one cooked. The best raw fruits are oranges, lemons, grape fruit, pineapples and apples. In

addition cooked apricots, apples, peaches, pears, baked apples or other fruits should be eaten. If apples are not to be had, there is a good substitute, the turnip. Every farmer should go into winter quarters with plenty of turnips. A nice raw turnip is about as palatable to most people as a raw apple."

An Instructive War Object Lesson

The German war cruiser "Kronprinz Wilhelm" started out last year on her deathdealing mission with five hundred substantial, healthy German sailors aboard.

All told, they sent fourteen British vessels to the bottom of the Atlantic Ocean. Each time they replenished their larder from the good things (?) they found on the English ships. They took aboard enough fresh beef to supply each man more than three pounds daily for an entire year. In addition, they helped themselves to an abundance of other kinds of flesh foods and plenty of such goodies as sweet cakes, jam, canned vegetables and fine patent process flour, sago, hominy, cornstarch, ship biscuit, etc. Dr. Gray, health writer of the Chicago Daily News, in commenting on their subsequent experience says:

"On the theory that well-fed men make alert, hard fighting men, these men were continually well fed. Soon some of them began to complain of swollen ankles. Some fancied insects were crawling over their skin. Others experienced peculiar fibrillar twitchings of certain muscles. Some had pains in the nerves of the legs. Still others had very curious disturbances of vision, hearing, taste, smell and memory."

Directly one hundred and ten of these well-fed (?) men were suffering from beriberi, which is a disease that is second cousin to scurvy. Bear in mind, these five hundred sailors were living aboard a modern, well ventilated vessel, under conditions that were in every respect ideal from a health standpoint, with the exception that they "ate and drank damnation to themselves."

Different Names; the Same Disease

Dr. Gray draws the sensible conclusion that for every case of this sickness among these five hundred men aboard that ship, there are thousands of people in the same condition in

every State in the Union, and why not, when the dietetic conditions are practically *identi*cal?

He says: "It may not be called beriberi, but perhaps neuritis, neuralgia, scurvy, enlarged goiter or some other name, but that doesn't in the least alter the actual condition. The name isn't material." Dr. Gray adds that more than one case of winter itch right here at home assumed to be caused by "too dry air," actually is the result of unbalanced diet and the consequent acid condition of the blood.

The so-called "strengthening diet" that so many indulge in at this season of the year favors autointoxication; first by the putrefaction of an excess of protein food remnants in the alimentary canal, and second by flooding the blood with acid-forming material which has a natural tendency to produce to a greater or less degree just such a set of symptoms as put out of commission those hundred and ten husky German sailors.

These common winter afflictions are frequently considered mysterious dispensations of Providence, when in reality they are due to a wide departure from nature's program which responds to that divinely appointed law that "Whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap." Gal. 6:7. Nature, like her God, "Is no respecter of persons."

The Drug-Drinking Folly

Caffeine is chemically akin to uric acid, so it can by no means improve the well-being of the body. In addition, its persistent use tends to disorder the nervous system and so pave the way for spring fevers. Prof. O'Shea, the noted psychologist of the University of Wisconsin, writes:

"An investigation recently made in a large high school showed that eighty-three per cent of the pupils used tea or coffee, or both, habitually. Many of them confessed they were restless in their sleep, a few said they could hardly get any sleep at all at night. They thought their trouble was due to their having too much to do in school. They are constantly overstimulated by alkaloids in tea, coffee and cocoa and consequently are not in a condition to do thoroughly good work in

school. Moreover, they are high strung and irritable.

"It is much the same with tea, coffee and chocolate fiends as it is with whisky fiends. When they get the habit, they can not let go. Why do you encourage your children to form habits which will be as *mill-stones* about their necks?"

Every tea and coffee slave should take earnestly to heart the following words from Dr. Evans, who was the eminent pathologist at Rush Medical College before he became health commissioner of Chicago, so consequently speaks with authority:

"Coffee is a drug. Those who are addicted to its use are drug addicts." And again:

"In order that no misunderstanding may arise, I should say that physiologists regard coffee, tea, tobacco and whisky as drugs in the same sense that opium and cocaine are. The craving for tea and that for whisky, the hunger for a cigarette and that for a dose of morphine, are of the same kind. Each comes of an inborn willingness to cheat in playing the game of life."

The following sensible words are from Dr. Dixon, Commissioner of Health for the great State of Pennsylvania:

"Neither coffee nor tea are to be considsidered as food. Both are stimulants. As with all other stimulants, there is a continual tendency to over-indulgence. . . Any stimulus which they give is transitory, for there is a period of depression following the use of all stimulants. . . Hot water or the cambric tea (hot water, whole milk and sugar) of our childhood, is much better."

In Conclusion

It is gratifying to note that, step by step, painstaking modern medical investigations are clearly demonstrating that if we will eat and drink "To the glory of God," 1 Cor. 10:31, then we can save ourselves some of the most aggravating disorders that at the present time afflict humanity, for it is as true today as of old, "My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge." Hos. 4:6. And still others are destroyed because they do not have the moral courage to live out the light they have. I want to remind such that those that "Wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength." Isa. 40:31.







God and the Little Things of Life

[These helpful experiences were related to our family by Pastor Paap, leader of the General Home Missionary Department in this country, on a recent visit to Hinsdale.—Ed.]

WHILE assisting in a summer tent meeting I met a woman who said she would like to have a talk with me, so we sat down together in the tent, and she said:

"I want to tell you I enjoyed what you said with regard to the wonderful facilities that God has provided for carrying forward the work and how ready the angels are to cooperate with us when we cooperate with them."

She said, "I am a nurse. I had been out on a case and just gotten through. It was heavy work, and I had come home to rest. It was seven o'clock in the evening and I had hardly gotten inside when up drove an automobile with two physicians in it and they said they had a very critical case of typhoid fever. The son of a wealthy family. They had told the family there was only one hope for the boy, if they could get me to nurse him. I said, 'Doctor, I can not possibly undertake the case; I must have rest.' The doctors went away and told the family, who said, 'Don't let anything stand in the way of her coming. We will give any money she asks.'"

She finally consented, and arrived and started on the case and worked till nearly eleven at night. She was completely exhausted and felt she could not go another step, so she knelt down and prayed the Lord, telling Him she *must* have help. As soon as

she got up she heard the gate click, and up stepped a stately gentleman, and said, "Good evening; is this Mrs. ———?"

She said, "Yes; step in."

He took off his hat and overcoat, and put down his little grip, and said, "I have come to relieve you of your patient for a while, but can only stay two hours, and while I take care of the patient, you take some rest."

So she went to bed and rested for two hours.

He said, "I will call you at one o'clock."

He called her at that time, and she felt much refreshed; and the patient was doing nicely. She went to the door with him and thought she would see which way he went, but he stepped off the steps, and she didn't see which way he went. She was wonderfully refreshed and took care of the patient, and he got well. The change was remarkable. He completely recovered. To this day, if they have anything especially strenuous or critical, those doctors say, "Get Mrs. ——."

Who do you suppose it was that came to her rescue? I believe it was an angel from heaven, and you would have a hard time getting her to believe it was anyone else. God is no respecter of persons and stands ready to help persons in the work ever, if we will coöperate with Him in carrying out His mer-

ciful desires. I am so glad we have such mighty allies in the work we are called to do.

How Prayer Works in the Little Things

Last summer, while attending one of the camp-meetings, a woman came to me and told me an experience that she was passing through. She said she and her husband had been to school the year before. They just got through and did not have a penny left over. They wanted to go to camp-meeting, and both work in the provision stand to pay their way.

She said, "And we worked, and earned a little over our board and room, and my husband needed a hat, so we went down town and bought a hat, and last night we went to the meeting in the big tent, and he took the hat off and left it there in the pavilion, as he had not been using one while attending the meetings, and so forgot all about it. He never thought of it until we got home; then he went back and couldn't find it, and he reported to me and I went and looked and couldn't find it."

She was considerably distressed. It was not a big thing, but under the circumstances meant *much* to them. I said, "Have you *prayed* about it?" She said, "No; that is too little a thing to pray about."

I said, "Well, let's pray anyhow." So we knelt down and told the Lord about it and I went around the camp telling different ones good-bye. I got back there again later in the day, and saw her, and said, "Sister, have you heard anything from the hat yet?"

She said, "Yes."

"Tell me about it."

"Well, after we prayed, I decided to go back and look again. I looked in identically the same place where we all had looked before, and there the hat was, and it looked like it had been there all night."

"Oh what peace we often forfeit,
Oh what needless pain we bear,
All because we do not carry
Everything to God in prayer."

I believe prayer in the hand of faith is the key that *unlocks* heaven's treasure house. When the Lord does something for us one way, there are a thousand other ways He could have done it just as easily. The Elder Brother of our race is by the eternal throne of God, working in *our* behalf.

A Modern Example of Elijah's Faith

I was holding some meetings in a certain city, and at the close of one service I referred to Elijah's experience with the widow of Zidon and a dear old sister came up, and said, "I would like to have a talk with you some time."

And I said, "How about now?" So we sat down there in the tent, and she said:

"I want to tell you of an experience we had last winter. I thought of it when you referred to the story of Elijah today and read that text.

"Last winter we were living back in the foothills, and there came on some very bad, stormy weather, and it was such that none of us could get out for two or three weeks. My husband was sick and I was unable to leave. The roads got washed out, so no one could get in to our place. When the storm came up, I had about ten pounds of graham flour in a barrel.

"I did my own baking and always made graham bread. The roads were washed out and things were in bad shape, so I was very sparing in the use of the flour, but it ran out in ten days, and when it ran out, I thought, 'What shall we do?' But I went to reading my Bible and came to this experience of Elijah and this widow, and I told the Lord all about it, just how we were fixed, and asked Him to come to our rescue."

And she went on to tell me in detail about the experience and how for ten days after they had used up all the flour she had in the house, each day she went to the barrel, "And for ten days, every day, I found just enough flour for the baking that day."

I thought that was really a precious experience and it is just exactly what we should expect, so I wasn't surprised. But the striking thing about it was that at the end of that ten days, when the roads got fixed up so people could get to them, and they could get more flour, the barrel dried up. The Lord took care of them while they couldn't do it, but when they could get out and buy their own things, He stopped.

A Quick Response

When I was in California a week ago last Monday, I got a telegram that a sister at a

town twelve miles away was sick, very low, and the doctors had given up all hope. She had pneumonia, with other complications, and asked me, as I had labored in that place and had been her pastor, if I wouldn't get together some of our people and have a season of prayer, and I did so, and we had prayer for her. On Tuesday I went to Riverside, and telephoned and asked how this woman was, and they told me she was much better. She

had taken a turn for the better at the hour we prayed for her the night before.

They said, "Last night, while she was so low, and her temperature was up to 104, and she hadn't spoken for some time, and the doctors were entertaining very grave fears, quite suddenly a change set in for the better and her temperature this morning is down to 99, and she has asked for something to eat." I said in my soul, Praise the Lord.

A New Opportunity for the Outcasts

I T'S only a dark basement with steps leading down from the sidewalk to an underground treatment room, but once inside there is welcome and good cheer, not alone for me as I visited it yesterday, but for the many homeless, jobless and friendless men that inhabit the neighborhood;

A Story of Faith and Sacrifice

The story of the founding of this place of healing reveals a faith and a spirit of sacrifice not often found. The proprietor, Mr. Harold Kemp, a nurse from Hot Springs, Ark., was once a man, who, as he said, "was down myself, and I know how

for this one bright spot is in the midst of the slum district on the West Side of Chicago. On the streets everywhere can be seen men whose faces reveal their lost and helpless condition. these men suffer down here." Mr. and Mrs. Kemp spent about a year in training in the Hinsdale Sanitarium and then single-handed and alone, without any funds, undertook to establish this simple medical missionary

treatment room for needy men. Mr. Kemp started out with only five dollars in his pocket to find a location. He had met Mr. Andrew Paulson, a young man who was just opening up a men's lodging house on Desplaines street. He called on him and told him he had come to put in some treatment rooms.

The young man said, "There is the basement. You can have it without any rent for at least a year."

The mud, slime and filth was about sixteen inches deep on the basement floor. But this condition in no way disheartened Mr. Kemp. He set four men to work and it took them two days to haul the dirt and trash away.

How the Plumbing Was Done

He was asked, "How do you expect to get your plumbing put in?"

His only reply was, "I believe the Lord has set me at this and I know it will be done."

So he went to the plumber of the neighborhood and asked him how much it would cost to put in the necessary plumbing. After looking the situation over the plumber reported that it would take about \$220 without any extra fittings. The plumber then asked how much he could pay down on the job. Mr. Kemp replied, "I can pay you nothing. I know there are going to be treatment rooms here and I want the plumbing done."

The man smiled and said, "I like your nerve." Finally this plumber consented to do it, giving Mr. Kemp six months in which to pay the amount.

How the Lord Got the Lumber

The next thing to be procured was the lumber. After chasing from one lumber company to another each time stating his case he finally found a man big-hearted enough to trust him for the amount of thirty dollars' worth of lumber, and he gave him the best lumber in his lumber yard. When the lumber arrived, the neighbors began to say, "Surely the Lord is working for this man Kemp." With a little help from the men in the neighborhood he put in the partitions.

The next question was, how could he get the painting done. He could not afford

to buy the ordinary white paint that would be necessary. Finally some one told him of cold water paint which was less expensive, so he purchased twelve dollars' worth of it with money that had been given him by some of the Hinsdale workers.

He then started out to find a man who could put on the paint. Going upstairs in the office of the lodging house he saw a man standing there with his arms folded and asked if he wanted work. He said, "Yes." He then asked him what he could do. He said, "I am a painter." He then sent him to the restaurant across the street to get a good dinner, and went without himself as he hadn't the price for two dinners, after which he put the man to work. Thus his painting was done and his treatment room fixed up so he could begin to do good.

He opened this work with special prayer and dedication November 1st. Then the patients began to come.

Helping a Poor Paralytic

One of the first to be helped in this cheery basement was a poor paralytic man who in a dirty and hungry condition met Mr. Kemp on the street and asked him for something to eat. Although at the time living on five-cent dinners himself, while getting his splendid work started, yet Mr. Kemp handed out a nickel to the poor beggar. Later he was welcomed to the basement where kind hands cleaned him up, gave him a treatment and also promised to continue helping him if he would "cut out the booze." He is still receiving treatments in the basement. His stiff rigid muscles are gradually relaxing so that he can use his arms, at the same time his hard heart is being reached with the gospel under the influence of this good place.

Other Men Restored to Health

One man thought he had heart disease and could not live long, but through Mr. Kemp's careful treatment was soon well and strong. I had the pleasure of meeting the wife of this patient and she told me most emphatically of her faith in the treatment and her gratitude for what had been done for her husband.

Another man came in who thought he was suffering from an incurable disease, but

he soon discovered that he had autointoxication. Mr. Kemp's treatments made him over as good as new.

One man came with a big ugly ulcer on his leg. Mr. Kemp told me that already with just a few treatments the sore had begun to heal.

Another man came with a neglected wound over his eye which had become infected and the part was swollen. A few treatments soon cured it up in fine shape. The man went away rejoicing.

"Something Come Over Us Fellows"

A week ago Mr. and Mrs. Kemp felt a burden to start some meetings in their basement room, so they have had meetings there every evening with the result that three of these poor unfortunate men have found the Lord and have been converted. The men are asking day after day for a mission to be started.

An old soldier on the street accosted Mr. Kemp, saying, "Doc, do you know since you folks have been around here there has something come over us fellows that we have not had before."

One man came tottering down the steps leading to the basement, with the tears streaming down his face. Mr. Kemp had met him a day or two before on the street. He came down there and stood in the doorway saying:

"Brother, I want you to do something for me."

Mr. Kemp asked him what he wanted. The man said, "I want to get away from

this booze."
"What do you want me to do?"

"I want you to help me."

He invited him in and his wife talked to him about the Lord and how the Lord could help and gave him a Bible study while Mr. Kemp finished a piece of work he was doing. Soon he had to stop and talk with the man. They had a prayer meeting there and the man gave his heart to the Lord and went out and upstairs to the lodging house. The boys asked him how he was getting on. His reply was, "I feel fine. I am a new man." He had had no treatment for his body, but his soul was sick and spiritual treatment was applied.

Mr. Kemp has gone through hardships and privations to get this work started. Not to advantage himself in any way, but to help his poor brothers who are down and suffer as he did once. He told me that for days he had lived on nickel meals which he had gotten in the restaurant across the way and even then had had to borrow the nickel occasionally.

Prospects of a Mission

Now a large room just above this place is available for mission purposes. The rent is given free and Mr. Walen and some of our medical evangelistic students are to-day cleaning up this room and we hope before the week is out to start some live mission meetings for the poor men and women of that district.

When Christ was on earth He spent a great deal of His time in relieving the suffering of the poor outcasts and the sinners that He met in the way, thus setting an example for us. And we know that His blessing will be upon this work as we undertake to help those whom nobody helps and to lift up those whom apparently everybody is keeping down. We ask our readers to remember us in prayer as we undertake this new work.

Oh, how I thank God that He ever put it into my heart and mind to correspond with some of the men and women who are behind prison bars. Jesus loves these shut-ins and as often as we do it unto one of the least of them just so often we do it unto Christ. Many of these men and women will be saved in the kingdom.

Is This Awful War a Prophetic Landmark?

THOUGHTFUL people are beginning to ask themselves, "Is not this war, after all, an awful chapter in God's great book of human affairs?" We dimly discern the human plan in this great conflict. Is it possible for us to anticipate what God is working out of it? One thing is certain; God's plan, whatever it is, will prevail. It always does; it always will.

Daniel, the inspired prime minister of Persia, saw in advance the conflict that crumbled proud Babylon in the dust. He was shown the clash of arms which brought Medo-Persia to the ascendency. He saw by divine vision the unfolding of human events that brought Alexander to the front and made Greece a universal world power. He also saw the iron monarchy of Rome arise and crush Greece in its cruel grasp. He then saw Rome divided into ten kingdoms. He was even shown the last act in the great drama, the kingdom of God restored in a renovated and regenerated world.

All this can be read in plain English in the book of Daniel. Should we not look for hints in other portions of the Bible that may shed light on this, the most awful conflict that has ever taken place in this old war-stricken and sin-cursed earth?

The Bible outlines a divinely-inspired program that will be carried out in these last days. Is it any credit to us who have experts to forecast the weather, if we fail absolutely to discern the signs of the times in which we live? (Matt. 16.3.)

Universal Peace Talk but Feverish War Preparation

As was shown in the last article, the Bible predicts that in the last days there will be talk of universal peace. (Micah 4:1-7.) But at the same time, a delirious preparation for universal war. (Joel 3:9-14.) Today, on account of the European conflict, war preparation even in this country is in the very air we breathe. It promises to become the overshadowing question in the National Congress just assembled. It bids fair to become the master issue in the next presidential election. So this war is fulfilling this divine prophecy. Will it yet help to fulfill other latter day prophecies?

World-Wide Restoration of Religious Persecution

John, the inspired seer, when he was a prisoner on the lonely isle of Patmos, caught a glimpse of what would happen to the *remnant*, or *last end*, of God's true church in this old earth's history. He says, "The dragon (the

devil, Rev. 12:9) was wroth with the woman (the church) and went to make war with the remnant of her seed (the last church), which keep the commandments of God and have the Testimony of Jesus Christ." Rev. 12:17. And in the very next verse, Rev. 13:1, he saw "A beast," the earthly representative, to which the dragon gave "His power, and his seat, and great authority." 2nd verse. John's attention was directed to this beast until "It was wounded to death," and he kept watching the

beast before him, and causeth the earth and them which dwell therein (that is universal) to worship the first beast, whose deadly wound was healed." 12th verse. And this worship will be drastically enforced. "He causeth all, both small and great, rich and poor, free and bond, to receive a mark in their right hand, or in their foreheads: and that no man might buy or sell (universal boycott) save he that had the mark, or the name of the beast (same religion) or the number of his name." Rev.

13:16-17.

The very next chapter shows this will take place in the last days. There is also an inspired warning against yielding to this revival of false worship in order to avoid its pains and penalties. "If any man worship the

unfolding of events until "His deadly wound was healed; and all the world wondered after the beast." 3rd verse.

John observed that out of the mouth of this beast came "blas-phemy against God." 6th verse.

And what was more, "It was given unto him to make war with the saints, and to overcome them." 7th verse.

No student of the Bible and human history has any difficulty in *identifying* this prophetic symbol. But before the end of all things, John saw a *revival* of this power and this persecution so nearly similar that he speaks of it as "An *image* to the beast, which had the wound by a sword, and did live." 14th verse. And this image to the beast, it is divinely predicted, "Exerciseth all the power of the first

beast and his image, and receive his mark in his forehead, or in his hand, the same shall drink of the wine of the wrath of God (the seven last plagues), which is poured out without mixture (after probation is closed) into the cup of His indignation." Rev. 14: 9, 10. And in the very next chapter John was given a view of the ultimate outcome. He saw "Them that had gotten the victory over the beast, and over his image, and over his mark, and over the number of his name, stand on the sea of glass, having the harps

of God. And they sing the song of Moses the servant of God, and the song of the Lamb." Rev. 15:2, 3. If you and I fail to be in that company we have made a total failure of life, no matter how wonderfully our friends think we have succeeded.

Too Civilized for Persecution

Two years ago we were told in a most convincing manner that the world had become too civilized to go to war, but instead, we have today the most *uncivilized* war the world has ever seen. Brave men are suffocated with poisonous gases. They are drowned without warning in the depths of the sea like rats. It is conceded on every hand that this is the most *unhuman* war that has ever been fought.

Now the same group of men who are forced to admit that the word of God which predicted "wars and rumors of wars" in the last days, has been fulfilled to the letter; this same group of men also tell us we are too civilized to ever have any more religious persecution, but the same inspired Book that told us we were to have war in the last days, also predicts that we shall have universal religious persecution in the last days and it remains to be seen whether God's prediction will come true or whether the theories of men will hold or crumble.

When the divine finger points to the hour of God's prophecies and God's great clock strikes, then things always wheel into line and fulfill the inspired prediction, and remember this prophecy will be no exception. Just as certain as God's book is true, something will happen to give life to the beast and to his image and then we shall again see the same spirit of persecution as in the Dark Ages, for exactly the same reason we have now on our hands a more inhuman war than ever darkened the shadows of the Dark Ages.

Thoughtful persons who are studying this war intently believe they are beginning to see the parts assembling that will help to fulfill His prediction. The world will yet be startled to see the beast's deadly wound fully healed, and when it is healed there will be a revival of religious persecution. Those who have kept their eyes open and who make God's booktheir study will not then be taken unawares any more than this war took them unawares. They were not surprised, because they knew that God had predicted the spirit of universal

war in the last days, in spite of the universal peace talk.

Next month we will consider other divine predictions that this war may be the means of fulfilling.

A WORD FROM HAYTI .

MRS. A. F. PRIEGER, Cape Haytian, Hayti, W. I.

[Some of our readers will remember the thrilling account of missionary work on the island of Hayti by Pastor A. F. Prieger in the March, 1915, Life Boar, which was a report of a talk given before the Hinsdale workers when Pastor and Mrs. Prieger were in this country for a few months' vacation. No doubt many have read in the daily papers of the terrible revolutions in Hayti since that time. However, in spite of the uncertainty of human life these good people have returned to this needy field and we quote the following from a recent letter from Mrs. Prieger.—Ed.]

Eld. Prieger returned to Hayti July 25th. Just then there was very serious trouble here, the president was massacred and the American forces had just taken charge. So the State Department thought best for me to remain in the States, until all was settled. So I took their advice, and I returned two weeks ago. It is so different here now. The streets are being cleaned and the whole island is being renovated. There has been severe fighting out in the interior with the rebels and marines but just recently the rebel chief and eighty of his men were killed and a treaty of peace was fixed up and signed so now we will have rest.

We can get something to eat now, but for six months it was impossible to get sufficient food. People nearly starved to death.

We have started our work again with full force. The native workers are all out in the field and soon the colporteurs will start out and the Y. P. M. V. work will soon be resumed. Two of the societies have already started their meeting.

RELIEVING THE SICK AND SUFFER-

FRANK HALL Danish West Indies.

[Brother Hall, a native pastor of the West Indies, came up to Hinsdale a couple of years ago to receive a medical missionary training. In a year or so he returned to the Danish West Indies, where he is doing a splendid work today. The following interesting letter was recently received.—Ed.]

Lessons on health principles including hydrotherapy, dietetics and temperance are being given every Monday night in our little chapel. These health talks generally reach such classes of men and women who are not interested in their soul's salvation. In this way, they come to learn of the better way. Demonstrations of treatments are being given, so that they may know how to perform them without uncertainty for themselves, at their own homes.

All the members of our church are health reformers. If the ministers, physicians and nurses in our churches would live and teach this principle of health reform, all the spiritual members of the family would follow, for example teaches better than precept.

Working under the Great Physician, who went about doing good (Matt. 9:35), a woman whom the doctor gave up on account of blindness is now able to see by the scientific application of hot and cold water administered to the eyes and back of the head. Now she can see even a pin, and is able to do her domestic duties with the utmost ease. I told her not to speak of it, but she is telling all who are interested in her. She is about fifty-five years of age.

When in the Isle of Tortola, a mother brought her little boy, about three years of age, who was suffering from paralysis of both lower limbs. I then gave him a mild current of electricity over the affected parts followed by simple massage. Further instruction for the child's diet and the use of cold water to the spine, hot sand around the lower parts of the body and sea bathing after was carried out and the child is now able to use its limbs.

"Water treatments are not appreciated as they should be and to apply them skillfully requires work that many are unwilling to perform; but none should feel excused for ignorance or indifference on this subject. There are many ways in which water can be applied to relieve pain and check disease. All should become intelligent in its use in simple treatments. Mothers, especially, should know how to care for their families in both health and sickness. In health and sickness pure water is one of heaven's choicest blessings."

Sufferings are seen on every side, but the day is coming when "the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf shall be unstopped." Then shall the lame man leap as an hart, and the tongue of the dumb sing." Isa. 35:5, 6.

The second coming of Christ Jesus will bring total relief for all who love and serve Him.

"DID HE DO THAT FOR ME?"

[This little incident was told at a recent missionary meeting held at the Hinsdale sanitarium, by Miss Strong, who has been leading out in medical evangelistic field work.—Ed.]

Never in my whole life have the days seemed sweeter than they have since I have been in this work, and never have souls seemed more precious to me than now.

A few nights ago I left my territory, where I was working, and on the way to the depot came to a dark street-it seemed like a dark alley to me; it was a cold, windy night and a lot of little children were about, going in and out of the houses, and they looked halfstarved and their clothes were so thin. Farther on half a dozen were carrying cabbages from underneath a train where the trainmen had discarded them, purposely or accidentally, and the children had gunny sacks, some of them looked as big as the child itself, in which they carried them. My heart ached for those children as I went to the depot. It made me sick at heart. I felt how little and helpless we were to do anything for that mass of children, and there were so many, I thought, what can I do for so many?

As I sat in the depot, a newsboy was sitting beside me, reading one of those little trashy books, "blood and thunder stories," as the expression is, and I asked him, "What are you reading?" He looked up and said, "Oh, a story." I said, "Wouldn't you like to have something better than that to read that would help you to form a noble, strong character?" And he said, "Yes," and I gave him a Life Boat and turned to something I knew would interest him, and I talked with him of the Saviour and asked if he ever heard of Christ. He said, "No." He was about twelve years old.

I said, "Did you ever have a friend who loved you so dearly as to lay down his life for you?" He said, "No."

"Well, Jesus did that for you. He left his home in glory and came all the way here to seek and save the lost and gave His life for just such children and sinners are we are."

He looked up and said, "Did He do that for me?" His eyes were filled with tears, and I didn't feel near so bad, my heart didn't ache as much as before. I felt that is the way the

work is to be done. It is one by one that we can help and do something for them.

We have had very many interesting experiences in our jail services this month, but perhaps the most interesting one happened last Sunday.

Before starting out to our work we earnestly sought the Lord to direct us to those who were honest in heart, and we know that He answered our prayers.

As we were singing in one of the corridors between the cells we noticed an old lady come in and peering anxiously around for a moment she went up to one of the cells and between sobs started talking to a young man behind the bars.

She was a widow and this man behind the bars was her only son and her only support. He was a slave to the demon drink. They lived in one little room on which the rent was past due. She had no money and could get no work and now that her son was locked up, what was to become of her?

When we stop and think of the enlightened age in which we live and that every one can have a chance to hear and know of God's promises to us, yet it is really surprising that we find many who are willing to learn but are kept in ignorance of the precious word of God.

Two ladies I especially call to mind, they were very poor, did not even have a Bible in their homes. GREAT PRINCIPLES FROM A GREAT BOOK

For several months we have been introducing the book "Ministry of Healing" to our readers. Every page is filled with choice truths on health, hygiene, wholesome living, and the gospel for soul and body.

We present to our readers another group of gems culled from this mine of truth:

The Dress Problem

"Many a poor girl, for the sake of a stylish gown, has deprived herself of warm underwear, and paid the penalty with her life. Many another, coveting the display and elegance of the rich, has been enticed into paths of dishonesty and shame. Many a home is deprived of comforts, many a man is driven to embezzlement or bankruptcy, to satisfy the extravagant demands of the wife or children. ... Many a mother with throbbing nerves and trembling fingers toils far into the night to add to her children's clothing ornamentation that contributes nothing to healthfulness, comfort, or real beauty. . . . Almost as soon as they come into the world the children are subjected to fashion's influence. They hear more of dress than of their Saviour. They see their mothers consulting the fashion plates more earnestly than the Bible. The display of dress is treated as of greater importance than the development of character." p. 290. Some of our most fashionable fashions come from Paris, but where does Paris get them from? On this point we read on page 291:

"It was the adversary of all good who instigated the invention of the ever-changing fashions." It is certainly a trick of the devil to have too much clothing on parts of the body that do not need it, and too little on other portions that especially require abundant clothing.

"The feet and limbs, being remote from the vital organs, should be especially guarded from cold by abundant clothing. It is impossible to have health when the extremities are habitually cold; for if there is too little blood in them there will be too much in other portions of the body. Perfect health requires a perfect circulation; but this can not be had while three or four times as much clothing is worn upon the body, where the vital organs are situated, as upon the feet and limbs." p. 293.

It may require courage to carry out this instruction, but it will be worth your while.

"Let women themselves, instead of struggling to meet the demands of fashion, have the courage to dress healthfully and simply. Instead of sinking into a mere household drudge, let the wife and mother take time to read, to keep herself well informed, to be a companion to her husband, and to keep in touch with the developing minds of her chil-Let her keep cheerful and buoyant. dren. Instead of spending every moment in endless sewing, make the evening a pleasant social season, a family reunion after the day's duties. Many a man would thus be led to choose the society of his home before that of the clubhouse or the saloon. Many a boy would be kept from the street or the corner grocery. Many a girl would be saved from frivolous. misleading associations." p. 294.

Such a home would be a touch of Eden; a little spot of heaven on earth. Are you building up that kind of home? If not, why not?

Healthful Dietetics

"In order to know what are the best foods we must study God's *original* plan for man's diet. . . . Grains, fruits, nuts and vegetables constitute the diet chosen for us by our Creator." pp. 295-296.

Those who have been in the habit of eating

green olives which are indigestible and unfit for food should take to heart this statement:

"When properly prepared, olives, like nuts, supply the place of butter and flesh meats. The oil, as eaten in the olive, is far preferable to animal oil or fat. It serves as a laxative. Its use will be found beneficial to consumptives and it is healing to an inflamed, irritated stomach." p. 298.

Pawlow, the great Russian investigator, discovered that there were different kinds of digestive juices made for different kinds of food. That emphasizes the importance of simplicity. It is brought out in this statement:

"There should not be a great variety at any one meal, for this encourages overeating, and causes indigestion. It is not well to eat fruit and vegetables at the same meal. If the digestion is feeble, the use of both will often cause distress, and inability to put forth mental effort. It is better to have the fruit at one meal and the vegetables at another." p. 299.

Pawlow also discovered that food that is relished is easily digested. On this point the author states:

"If the food eaten is not relished the body will not be so well nourished." p. 300.

The amazing discoveries made the last few years on the importance of using the grain as God made it, not after it has been injured by some of our modern methods, is brought to light in this statement:

"For use in bread making the superfine white flour is not the best. Its use is neither healthful nor economical. Fine flour bread is lacking in nutritive elements to be found in bread made from the whole wheat. It is a frequent cause of constipation and other unhealthful conditions." p. 300.

It is the covering of the grain that contains the various mineral salts and the "Vitamines" that are so indispensable to the health of the body.

The Sweets Curse

Thoughtful physicians are beginning to recognize that the eighty pounds of sugar that is eaten for every man, woman and child in our land is a cause of many of our disorders. We eat thirty pounds of candy per capita.

McCann, in his startling book, "Starving America," calls attention to the fact that this excess of sugar creates an acid condition of the blood that robs the lime from the bones and even the teeth, to neutralize it. This is the real cause of the defective teeth which candyeaters invariably have, and the ricketts in children who are fed on excessive sweets and candies. In addition, the candies invariably contain poisonous coloring matter. In reference to this sweet evil we quote the following:

"Far too much sugar is ordinarily used in food. Cakes, sweet puddings, pastries, jellies, jams, are active causes of indigestion. Especially harmful are the custards and puddings in which milk, eggs, and sugar are the chief ingredients. The free use of milk and sugar taken together should be avoided." p. 302.

Healthful Cookery

The day is not far distant when a knowledge of the art of cookery will be regarded as of greater importance than a knowledge of painting, or of music or any of the so-called fine arts, because it more vitally concerns the health and happiness of the human race. On this subject we quote the following:

"It is a sacred duty for those who cook to learn how to prepare healthful food. Many souls are lost as the result of poor cookery. It takes thought and care to make good bread; but there is more religion in a loaf of good bread than many think. There are few really good cooks. Young women think that it is menial to cook and do other kinds of housework, and, for this reason, many girls who marry and have the care of families have little idea of the duties devolving upon a wife and mother.

"Cooking is no mean science, and it is one of the most essential in practical life. It is a science that all women should learn, and it should be taught in a way to benefit the poorer classes. To make food appetizing and at the same time simple and nourishing requires skill; but it can be done. . . . In many places hygienic cooking schools afford opportunity for instruction in this line." p. 302.

"Satan can never gain advantage of the child of God who relies on the word of God as his defense."



BROUGHT A TIMELY MESSAGE



THE NEXT MEDICAL EVANGELISTIC CLASS

Almost every mail brings us inquiries from young people in all parts of the country concerning opportunities for medical missionary training at Hinsdale. To such we would say the next class begins July 1st, but applications are already being acted upon. Send for full information.

The Hinsdale plan in brief is this: The first year, or "the medical evangelistic year" is largely devoted to active aggressive medical evangelistic efforts at the same time the course of instruction is practically equivalent to the ordinary first year's nurses' course only there is more Bible instruction given and practical things are taught so as to help the students to be of use to the people with whom they come in contact.

During this first year the students learn how to approach people and to reach them with the gospel. They lose the fear of men. They learn how to pray, to get answers to their prayers; they learn how to recognize divine guidance. Every student who has already taken this year's work has been grateful to God for such opportunity.

Then those who desire to do so and are accepted are admitted into the second year's nurses' course and receive actual bedside training and more technical instruction, and the following year into the third year and then they graduate from the full-fledged three years' nurses' course.

The students who are taking the medical evangelistic course this year have so far been entirely self-supporting. God has especially helped them and blessed them. This seems almost incredible, but it is so. If people follow the pillar of cloud they still find the manna. It is the people who are wandering way off from the pillar of cloud who are having a hard time to meet their expenses.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR PREPARA-TION AT HINSDALE

Young people can come here to take the one year medical evangelistic course and be fitted for practical medical missionary work and later graduate from the full fledged three years' training course recognized by the New York State Board of Regents. In addition, young people who have been deprived of an early education, or who do not have the money to take a regular course in school can come here and work in the domestic departments earning their way and at the same time having splendid preparatory educational opportunities.

Twenty-five young people in our various departments are enjoying these privileges this winter. There is no vacation to this course. Its classes run twelve months a year. The instruction is of the very highest grade, given by teachers of the highest order. These students are self-supporting and appreciate their marvelous opportunities.

In addition we are now laying plans to create such additional educational opportunities that suitable people can come here for a month's preparation, or six months' practical medical missionary preparation. We will impart to them what we can in the time they have at their disposal. We will give short courses in hydrotherapy, cookery, dietetics, and teach them how to open the Bible in an interesting and helpful manner to the people, and how to give instruction on practical health subjects, etc.

Such opportunities will be particularly valuable to married couples who are beginning to believe that they have bigger business in the world than merely just camping around and making themselves comfortable. want to help those who want to make themselves more useful in their communities, or go elsewhere and do a larger work for the Lord. Our opportunities at present to receive such, are necessarily limited, but as God enlarges our work, we shall be enabled to do more and more of this kind of work. We are asking the Lord to make Hinsdale an open door of missionary opportunity to those whose hearts are hungry for a preparation for active aggressive work for the Master.

THE VALLEY OF ACHOR

Achan was a weak brother and as a consequence he brought trouble upon the whole camp of Israel. Turn to Joshua the seventh chapter and read the entire interesting story. He was finally stoned in the valley of Achor (26th verse), or, in other words, the "Valley of Trouble."

Seven hundred years afterwards, Hosea, speaking of God's backslidden children, says "Behold, I will allure her, and bring her into the wilderness, and speak to her heart (margin), and I will give her vineyards from thence, and the valley of Achor for a door of hope; and she shall sing there, as in the days of her youth." Hosea, 2:14, 15.

Some of you who shall read these words are camping in the valley of Achor. You are surrounded with trouble. Just remember that God intends all that to be a door of hope for you, an introduction to some wonderful experience if you will only let the Lord have His way. The rich parents of so many sons too often see to it that they have no hardship and so they generally amount to nothing. Hardship is an ingredient that God always puts into every great character.

When the children of Israel were thirsty they came to a place where the water was so bitter they could not drink it. They murmured. But Moses had good sense and so he did what we may do, he "Cried unto the Lord." Ex. 15:25. Then the thing happened to him that will always happen to us. The Lord showed him a tree which when he had cast it into the waters, the waters were made sweet.

When you are brought to bitter water, you may have the satisfaction of sweetening it up so that that valley of Achor can become a door of hope to you. I will suggest two or three verses that will always sweeten bitter water. I know it because I have tried them.

The first one is in Psalms 76:10. "Surely the wrath of man shall praise thee; the remainder of wrath shalt thou restrain." Sometimes wicked men work up some devilish scheme to make trouble for us. Remember they can't make us any more trouble than the Lord permits. The remainder He will restrain. We want to restrain it a little before that, but that is too early. We haven't camped long enough in the valley of Achor

to appreciate that it is really a door of hope. God will not let anyone exercise any more wrath towards you than is *good* for you. So don't let the trouble that you are passing through give you nervous prostration. Instead it will prove a door of hope to a larger and richer experience.

If this verse does not help you out of the valley of Achor, try Romans 8:28. "All things work together for good to them that love God."

I grew up on a farm in the distant west. When I was eighteen years old I was stricken down with diphtheria and was dying and knew I wasn't prepared to die. I begged God to raise me up and promised Him I would dedicate my life to His service. God changed that curse of sickness into a blessing and I was again restored to health. That illness which was such a valley of Achor proved to be a door of hope.

When you can't understand why you have to pass through such a severe course of discipline, turn to your Bible and read:

"Now, at the time, discipline seems to be a matter not for joy, but for grief; let it afterwards yields to those who have passed through its training a result full of peace—namely, righteousness." Heb. 12:11. Modern speech. A cold spray never feels good. It is the reaction that comes afterward that makes us feel good.

Nevertheless, like corn, it yields a good crop. Some of you who are reading these lines may be taking a post graduate course in the school of discipline. You didn't finish all the grades when you took the course before, so remember if you are camping in the valley of Achor, the next thing to look for is the door of hope. If you haven't found it yet, ask God to show it to you. It is there.

SOMETHING BETTER THAN SOCIAL PURITY TALKS

The saddest part of the *last* chapter of the long record of the children of Israel's wilderness wandering is recorded in Num. 25 and is introduced by these words:

"And the people began to commit whoredom with the daughters of Moab."

The king of Moab had hired Balaam to come and curse Israel, but he made a dismal failure of it. In fact he was compelled

to bless them. Then a devilish thought came to him and he suggested to the Moabites that they arrange a great feast and invite to it the children of Israel. (Num. 31:16.) And the Moabites "called the people unto the sacrifices of their gods; and the people did eat, and bowed down to their gods." Num. 25:2.

Paul adds another interesting item. He says "The people sat down to eat and to drink, and rose up to sport." 1 Cor. 10:7. (Syriac translation.) Observe that wicked eating and drinking preceded the subsequent devilish practices, for the grossest immorality was mingled with the worship of this heathen deity.

How does this story concern us who are living in this enlightened age? Very much indeed. Paul, commenting on this and similar incidents, says, "All these things which befell them were for an example to us; and they are written for our instruction, on whom the end of the world hath come." 1 Cor. 10:11, Syriac translation. "Wherefore, let him who thinketh he standeth, beware lest he fall." 12th verse.

Paul furthermore says that "Every man that striveth in the games exerciseth self-control in all things." 1 Cor. 9:25, Rev. Ver. And he adds: "I keep under my body, and bring it into subjection; lest that by any means, when I have preached to others, I myself should be a castaway (or an outcast)." 27th verse.

I have seen a piece of tobacco less than an inch square lead a big broad-shouldered man around like chickens chasing after corn. That man knew nothing about self-mastery.

Out-breaking sins do not happen all at once. It takes time to bring down an individual from high and holy ideals until he lays in the dust. Some demoralizing process is going on in that man's mind. The open sin is the last chapter in his experience.

The Roots of Immorality

I have been asked a hundred times to give social purity talks. I have always refused because social purity work generally speaking is only symptomatic. It does not lay the axe to the root. What are some of the roots?

First, the moving picture shows are familiarizing children to scenes of iniquity, vice and sin so that it ceases to be exceedingly sinful

because of intimate familiarity with it. At least half the things shown in the ordinary theaters have a cheap flavor to them. They are bankrupting and demoralizing the mind. More than half the novels produced today are moral junk. They smell as if they had been dipped in moral sewerage. The young who are storing their brains with slush, slime and rubbish can not sweat out high and holy ideals. He who feeds his mind on filth can not keep his soul disinfected. My Bible says, "Touch not the unclean thing." There is natural depravity in every human heart. That is why every man daily needs to have a dose of moral antitoxin administered to him.

Furthermore he who indulges his appetite day by day for the things that are injurious to his health simply because he likes them, is in a fair way to yield to every wicked passion that the devil may plant in his soul. Health reform goes hand in hand with all other reformatory ideals. He who backslides in eating and drinking is paving the way for moral backsliding. The man who does not know how to eat or drink "To the glory of God" (1 Cor. 10:31) has yet to learn the first lesson in keeping under his body, and the last chapter of that is to become an outcast. If we want to live in heaven by and by, we must have some of the heavenly atmosphere in our souls here.

"Wherewithal shall a young man cleanse his way? By taking heed thereto according to Thy word." Psa. 119:9. David says furthermore, "Thy word have I hid in mine heart (Not upon the bookshelf) that I might not sin against Thee." Psa. 119:11. The soul needs the word of God for the same reason the plant needs to be periodically watered.

As a physician I know better than some other folks how near multitudes are to the same ragged edge that the children of Israel were when they were camping on the borders of the promised land. Each one of us ought to constitute ourselves a committee of one to help to establish others on high and holy ideals.

MORE FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE AGAIN

It cost about ten million dollars to eradicate the epidemic of foot and mouth disease last year, and the dairy interests congratulated themselves that it had been done effectually; but this past summer it has again broken out in Illinois and in other parts of the country. Some of the very finest, high bred dairy herds in the vicinity of Chicago have been infected. Some of them have been slaughtered, others have resisted it by securing injunctions restraining the inspector from slaughtering their animals. More than 11,000 head of cattle have been slaughtered in Illinois alone. The week preceding October 2nd nineteen additional herds were infected.

In Europe, hoof and mouth disease has secured such a foot-hold that the government has entirely given up any hope of ever stamping it out. It is said that the hoof and mouth disease infects about one-seventh of all the dairy herds in Europe each year. The day may not be far distant when we shall have a similar situation here.

The increase of disease in the animal creation is the most telling argument in favor of a non-flesh diet. There is more nourishment in a pound of corn than there is in a pound of meat. The same is true of wheat. The sensible thing is to get our nourishment first-hand from nature, instead of second-hand in the form of flesh foods, especially when it takes seven or eight pounds of good corn to get one pound of meat that may be more or less tainted with disease.

The old notion that there is something especially strengthening in flesh food has long since been exploded. Real strength and endurance can be gotten better from natural foods than from flesh foods. waste products from flesh are an additional task on the eliminating organs. They decompose more readily in the alimentary canal, and thus favor autointoxication. Every sensible doctor advises rheumatism, high blood pressure cases, those suffering from Bright's disease, and fevers, to discontinue the use of meat. Why not do the same five years before any of these diseases come and then perhaps they will not come at all.

WHAT IS BEING RECORDED FOR YOU?

"A young man was going down as fast as it was possible for a man to go, through strong drink. His friends had pleaded with him, but he had taken their warnings as an insult.

"One of them, who was a court stenographer, was sitting in a restaurant one evening, when the young man in question came in with a companion, and sat down at the table next to him with his back to him, and not seeing him. He was just drunk enough to talkative about his private affairs, and on the impulse of the moment the stenographer pulled out his notebook and took a full shorthand report of every word he said.

"It was the usual maudlin folly of a young man with his brain muddled by drink, and included a number of highly candid details of his daily life—things which, when he was sober, he would as soon have thought of putting his hand in the fire as of speaking about to a casual acquaintance.

"The next morning the stenographer copied the whole thing neatly, and sent it round to his office. In less than ten minutes he came tearing in with, 'What is this, anyhow?' 'It's a stenographic report of your monologue at the restaurant last evening,' his friend replied, and gave him a brief explanation. 'Did I really talk like that?' he asked faintly. 'I assure you it is an absolutely verbatim report,' was the reply. He turned pale and walked out. He never drank another drop."

This instance, copied from the Herald and Presbyter, is a striking illustration of what is taking place daily in your life and mine. In Mal., 3:16, we have the words: "And the Lord hearkened, and heard it, and a book of remembrance was written before Him." Then in Rev., 20:12, "The books were opened... and the dead were judged out of those things which were written in the books, according to their works." Christ tells us in Matt., 12:36, "That every idle word that men shall speak, they shall give account thereof in the day of judgment."

Every day the record of our lives is being carried heavenward and whether we will or not we must face it and render an account. We may, like the young drunkard, stand aghast at the report but then it will be too late to reform, as he did.
