

Spring Health Talks

W E have reached the time of year when every wise farmer gives his undivided attention to cultivating the soil and planting the seed. Did it ever occur to you that there is an interesting parallel between the new scientific farming, and sane, substantial, scientific health culture?

Some people believe they can secure a crop of good health without the necessary trouble and self-denial to sow for it, without undergoing the pain of ceasing to do evil and learning to do well.

Thousands of people are sowing for the thorns and thistles of ill health. If a man sow in his front yard the seeds of thorns and thistles, sooner or later, they must pierce his own flesh and that of his children.

"Whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap," means that if one desires a crop of good health he must individually busy himself in sowing for it.

Talk on Health Habits

The man who is cultivating wrong, miserable habits, is in that very process sending out invitation cards for disease to call upon him and it certainly would be remarkable if some disease did not accept his invitation.

A chronic disease comes as a result of a persistent course of evil-doing, and can usually be removed only by a persistent course of right-doing.

Just as a watermelon often grows as large in poor soil as in good, so a man may, while living on totally unsuitable diet, develop apparently good physique, but as in the case of the watermelon, there will be an inferior flavor about his moral and spiritual nature.

Talk on Fresh Air and Sunshine

One of the new ideas in medicine is the tremendous healing possibilities of fresh air.

I would urge up all to cultivate the outdoor habit. Transform verandas into outdoor bedrooms. Begin early this spring to do your work as far as possible out on the veranda or under the trees.

An Indian chief was asked why his race was dying out. He said, "Too much house." The same thing is killing tens of thousands of our fellow men.

One of the most certain ways of producing not only unhealthy blood but also an unhealthy mucous membrane is to poultice the lungs sixteen times a minute with impure air.

We speak of things being as "free as the air"; but to many people that is absolutely a joke. In spite of the fact that we have no fresh air trust, that no one has a "corner" on the air market, many people fail to discover how to avail themselves of one of God's choicest blessings.

The bedroom climate in which a man spends about one-third of his time often makes him miserable the other two-thirds.

Your lungs can't be washed, but they can be aired. We can not all move outdoors; but as far as possible, move outdoors indoors. With all your getting, do get fresh air.

A flood of sunshine in the home may fade carpets, but it puts the bloom of health upon your cheeks. Take your choice.

But in order to secure the best results from fresh air, it is necessary to take plenty of deep breaths. We are more dependent upon breathing than upon anything else we do. Some breathe so superficially that they merely change the air in the center of the lungs, just as a hired girl is likely to sweep only the middle of the room. In the farther corners of the lungs the air is not changed at all, so the germs roost there undisturbed and soon begin to hatch mischief.

Talk on Spring Fever

From whence comes that all-gone, run-down, good-for-nothing feeling that steals over so many in late winter and early spring? Dr. Evans says, "The reason is plain. For several months we have lived on 'hog and hominy,' or what is equivalent to it. Certain needs of the system have not been met. . . . At this season of the year the yearning is for fresh vegetables and fruits."

Eat more natural food. Turn your attention to green garden truck to cleanse the blood, such as cole slaw, lettuce, spinach and carrots. When people live on the fruits, grains and vegetables that God originally provided for man (Gen. 1:29), and refrain from entirely spoiling them by so many of our modern processes and inventions, there is no danger of having spring fever.

Sane Suggestions for the Spring Diet

Aside from religion there is nothing that so effects our present and future welfare and happiness as the food we eat.

Many a man feels "put out" because of what he "takes in."

Vicious eating and drinking are the stern and unrelenting parents of four trying children, namely, Bright's disease, diabetes, rheumatism and gout.

What we eat and the state of our digestion determines to a large degree what we are and the amount of power we will wield in the world.

Fletcherize. Some one has said, "If you chew long you will live long. If you taste your food before you swallow it, you will not have to taste it afterwards."

Do not eat between meals. Children should not be permitted to piece at all hours of the day. Do not indulge in light stimulants at mealtime.

The best way to prevent an attack of biliousness or to clear up a coated tongue is to eat nothing but raw fruit four times a day for several days.

Avoid mustard, pepper and highly spiced foods that taste hot when they are cold, for they continue being hot after they are swallowed and even after they are absorbed into the blood. Mustard plasters may properly be applied externally but they should not be used internally.

Do not eat large quantities of protein food. The body can use advantageously only a moderate amount for building and repair material. The waste products that result from it are virulent poisons and pave the way for Bright's disease, high blood pressure, nervous prostration, and many other disorders.

It is estimated that four-fifths of our chronic diseases are due to dietetic errors. They do not rain down ready-made from heaven; they are born at the dinner table and sometimes at the breakfast, or supper table, or between times.

There is a sane, moderate use of sweets which probably does no harm to the healthy individual. It is the candy craze, the disposition to absolutely cover a dish of wholesome cereal with sugar, when, in the process of digestion, it is itself changed into natural sugar,—it is this excessive use that is a curse, and many ignorantly attribute to overwork or to unhealthful climate the very symptoms that are produced by this use of artificial sweets.

Do not forget to be thankful during the entire meal. It is good for the digestion. Fletcher said, "Do not eat when you are bad, or mad, or sad; only when you are glad." Cheer up before you eat and be cheerful when you do eat.

The Bible says that the early disciples ate their food with gladness. It also admonishes us to "rejoice always." If we have not yet attained to that experience let us endeavor to at least be happy at mealtime.

Talk on Water Drinking

During the winter months many people almost forget to drink water, but the average mortal would live much more comfortably if he drank a larger quantity of water. Do not drink while eating, nor eat while drinking.

Drink a glass of water on rising and retiring, an hour before each meal, and one to three hours after eating.

We should drink water from principle. There are poisons in the system that are not properly eliminated unless they have abundant fluid to dissolve them.

It has become a common custom to drink considerable quantities of very hot beverages at mealtime. These excessively hot drinks weaken the digestive organs. The less drunk at mealtime the better, especially at such extremely high temperatures.

There is no food in water, but it is needed in abundant quantities on the inside of the body to bathe the tissues for the same reason that it is necessary to bathe the outside of the body. There is no indication, however, that it should be taken during meals any more than it is necessary to bathe at mealtime.

The Importance of Exercise

When the Lord told Adam and Eve to earn their bread by the sweat of the face, He pronounced a blessing instead of a curse. Today steam and electricity are doing the world's work and humanity is falling into decay. Sedentary habits are promoting a thousand ills from which our forefathers were exempt. Those who have no other opportunity for exercise should determine to take each day a brisk walk with head erect, chest up, practicing deep breathing.

The body requires physical exercise just as it requires water, air, or food. You may think that the infant kicking so vigorously has no sense, but it is genuinely sensible; it is acting out a natural instinct.

The average business man is nearly as adverse to active exercise as a healthy child is to medicine, and sooner or later he pays a dear price for having smothered the instinct for physical activity.

Those who live sedentary lives should cultivate physical activity and put into it the play spirit. Many women who are now chasing various "cures" would have health restored if they would only take liberal doses of household gymnastics. To secure the best results from ordinary labor it is important that the chest should be kept well up, the abdominal muscles drawn in, breathing deeply.

Relation of Religion to Health

Last but not least, have faith in God. He is not only willing to preserve us from the pestilence that walketh in darkness (Ps. 91:5, 6), but He will also bless us with health and strength provided we are willing to co-operate with the laws of health which are indeed the laws of God.

"They that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run, and not be weary; and they shall walk, and not faint." Isa. 40:31.

"If thou wilt diligently hearken to the voice of the Lord thy God, and wilt do that which is right in His sight, . . . I will put none of these diseases upon thee, . . . for I, the Lord, am the 'Physician.' (Spurrell's ver.)" Ex. 15:26.



A Wonderful Deliverance

[While on a furlough to this country Brother Armitage related the following pioneer experience in founding a mission station in Southern Rhodesia, South Africa. A like faith will produce like results, even in this country and in the year of our Lord 1916.—Ed.]

I HAD occasion to make a journey from the new Somabula station, which would require several days' absence. My wife was alone at the station, with only the native orphan children who had accompanied us from the older Solusi Mission. I had started from the station early in the morning.

Toward evening a little boy came running into the tent where Mrs. Armitage was working, crying, "There is a fire in the grass!"

Our mission was located in a valley, and down the valley somewhere a fire had been started and was sweeping toward the station. The season had been dry and the grass was like tinder, standing in places as high as a man's head. One can imagine how that fire would look to the mission family, with only the orphan children and Mrs. Armitage and her own little one on the premises. We had only been a short time at the location, and had not had time to make fire-guards or provide any precautions, and the situation was indeed desperate.

For a few startled moments Mrs. Armitage watched the oncoming flames, and then to herself she said, "Our Heavenly Father has never failed us yet, and I believe-He will not leave us now." There might have been a chance for flight, but there was the mission station with all that it represented of struggle and toil and future fruitfulness in the saving of souls. She turned to the text that had been the deciding word in our entering Africa and our stay and support in many a trying experience. Again she opened the Book and read the promise: "Fear thou not; for I am with thee: be not dismayed; for I am thy God: I will strengthen thee; yea, I will help thee; yea, I will uphold thee with the right hand of My righteousness." Isa. 41:10.

The assurance came to her heart that she was not left alone, and she said, "Our Father will take care of us once more, I am sure."

Still the fire came leaping on. It was no use to think of meeting it to fight it, with only the little orphan children to help. It came to within seventy yards of the station, and there it went out in front, the flames dividing and passing by on both sides of the location, joining farther up the valley and sweeping on beyond, and the mission was saved.

That night I saw by the red glow that there was fire in the valley. I hurried homeward with all speed, and there I found to my deepest joy not only my family and the children safe, but the mission preserved as well. All about the mission the grass was dry, but there stood a five-acre plot untouched. The fire had stopped right in the dry grass, and no one could say why, save as we understand that the promises of our Heavenly Father are sure, and that He will not leave us nor forsake us when we trust Him in the way of duty.



RELIEVING THE ILLS OF HUMANITY

Their place is open to all classes and they never turn a poor sufferer away without first giving him relief. Night or day, they are ready and willing to relieve the sick and think nothing of sacrificing their own comfort and convenience if they can thereby help some one or lead a soul to Christ.—Ed.]

As our opportunities for helping others are increasing day by day, we realize more fully that with each opportunity comes added responsibility. God is wonderfully blessing our efforts, and the patients are receiving results that bring satisfaction to them and joy to our hearts. We realize that God is answering our prayers and blessing the treatments given.

It would take a long time to tell you of all the different patients that have been benefited. Since the treatment rooms have been opened my husband has given almost four hundred and fifty treatments to men that have been absolutely unable to help themselves. We do not inquire as to whether they are worthy or not, but simply help them because Jesus loves them and gave His life for them.

One poor man came to us with sciatic rheumatism. His leg was swollen so large that for three nights he could not remove his clothes. The skin broke open in three places.

At this time the swelling is almost gone and the man has full use of his leg. This man had been afflicted for five or six years.

A dear old lady aged seventy-six years came to us in a very serious condition. She had blood poisoning and erysipelas in her limb. This has been a very hard case, as her age was against her, but God has given us the victory. This dear old lady is out of danger and has no words with which to express her gratitude, first to God and then to us.

Two Helpless Women Sick and Alone

We also heard of a poor widow woman not far from us. We found her sick in bed. We helped her so that she was able to be up the next day. In the course of a few days a baby was born to her daughter. We felt very sorry for them, as the daughter's husband had deserted her and these two helpless women were sick and alone. Some of our workers from the Hinsdale sanitarium brought clothing for the baby. We provided them with some food. The landlord ordered them out because they could not pay their rent. As I looked around their poverty-stricken room and realized that it was the only home they had, I thought my heart would break. I came home and told my husband about them and then we told Bro. Walen, who has charge of the mission upstairs. He called on the landlord and persuaded him to let them stay. They are getting along much better now.

Just one more case and that will be all this time. This man had been pronounced incurable. His heart was supposed to be affected. He weighed 256 pounds when he took his first treatment. He has taken nine treatments and has reduced nine pounds. His heart does not bother him now.

We do all we know how to do for the patients and leave the results with God. We realize that it is God who gives these wonderful results. We give all the honor to God and thank Him, because He uses us in the great work of helping others.

"Is it not to deal thy bread to the hungry, and that thou bring the poor that are cast out to thy house? When thou seest the naked, that thou cover him; and that thou hide not thyself from thine own flesh?" Isa. 58:7.

The Vision We Need

[Brother Thompson of Washington, D. C., presented the following splendid thoughts to our workers at Hinsdale not long ago while on a brief visit to our work.—Ed.]

WHAT is a missionary? I have raised that question sometimes. Now I have come to the conclusion that the greatest need of a man is to have his soul saved. If we can benefit him temporarily we have not done much, but if we can help him physically here and spiritually through all eternity we are being missionaries. I believe the vision we need is the vision of a lost soul and the vision of what it will mean to be lost, to miss eternal life, to fail to lay hold of the fact that God has given His Son to save us.

Men get a vision of what money will do. I was reading about the funeral of William K. Vanderbilt, the multimillionaire. Five thousand people were gathered outside on the street.

When they carried him out one of the workingmen said, "Is that Mr. Vanderbilt they are bringing down the steps?"

"Yes, that is Mr. Vanderbilt."

"Well, well," he said, "how things change! I stood where I am standing now hundreds of times and I have seen Mr. Vanderbilt come down those steps hundreds of times, with millions in his pocket and I did not have a cent, and now he is coming down the steps without a cent in his pocket and I have two dollars."

He was two dollars ahead. The vision of money does not amount to much. But if a man has a vision of eternal realities it is a thing that lasts.

How to Write Your Name on the Scroll of Fame

I have often thought about one instance. You remember the Crimean war. You would have to open up an old dirty history to find out who was the commander in chief and who that great man was that came down to the north of England when they played, "Here the Conquering Hero Comes." We do not know even who led the charge of the six hundred.

We do not know much about these people; but I will tell you one name everybody remembers, that is a household word—Florence Nightingale. You know that without going to a history. She went around in the trenches and in the hospitals and where the wounded and maimed and suffering were and was an angel of mercy, helping people. You do not know anything about those men that slaughtered the thousands, but the one that helped. you remember all about; and they loved her so that when she came into the great ward where men were cursing God every curse would stop. They realized they were in the presence of another kind of spirit. would kiss her shadow, and in all that army, with all those men, she was never insulted. That is the kind of work that lasts. Friends, that endures. Do you want to write your name on the scroll of fame? That is the way to do it.

It seems to me that if we could get a vision of what real worth is, of the best way to immortalize our name and write it down in history, that is the thing to do; but we will have to do it along the lines Florence Nightingale did it—by reaching out and helping somebody. I tell you the fellow we want is the fellow that can help us, after all. We all need it. There are a lot of broken hearts around everywhere and they want somebody to help them. And so I believe God calls us to this work, and I am praying I may get a better vision of it than I have ever had before.

The One Thing Needed

There are a lot of things you can do without prayer. You can be a carpenter and you can be a good many things, and it is possible to be a doctor and not pray much, to saw off a man's leg and perform a good surgical operation without prayer, and I have found a man can preach and not pray much, and sit on a committee and give a lot of advice and not pray much. But when some one comes along and says, "My wife," or "my husband" or son or daughter or somebody "has been given up by the doctors and I would like you to come and talk to her about her soul; I am not sure about her experience," you have to pray then. You can't do that without prayer. And if

you have been off somewhere and got to spinning yarns and having a hilarious time, you can't do that kind of work. You have to be in touch with God.

You can't get down at the bedside of a man with much confidence and pray the healing power of God to come upon him if your own soul is not right with God; if there is a shady thing in your life that nobody knew was there but that you have been nibbling at occasionally. The real missionary for God has to pray. We have got to commune with God. We have to keep our own soul right if we do that.





Preparedness

The most popular word in America today is "Preparedness." It is in evidence everywhere. The leading dailies in our country are sounding the warning. Our most up-to-date magazines contain lengthy discussions on this most supreme theme. Our senators and representatives at the national capitol are struggling over this great problem. Our educators are arousing the enthusiasm of the youth. pastors are talking it from the pulpit. But in the last analysis, what are we to prepare for? In the minds of the most conservative it resolves itself into this: Prepare to slaughter and to slay our fellowmen by the thousands; to blow up their men-of-war; to send their merchantmen to the bottom of the sea; to wreck and ruin, not only homes, but whole villages, as we see our neighbors across the water doing today, who were prepared.

Be that right or wrong, we do not care to discuss here. But there is another preparedness which concerns us even greater, and of that we wish to say a word.

Before this world was sixteen centuries old the Lord had to single out one righteous man and say to him, "The end of all flesh is come before me; for the earth is filled with violence through them; and, behold, I will destroy them with the earth." Gen. 6:13. And you all know how Noah started that worldwide campaign of "preparedness" and at the same time he was preparing an ark for the salvation of those who would get ready. Our Saviour in speaking of the condition of the world before His second coming says: "Nation shall rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom;

and there shall be famines, and pestilences, and earthquakes, in divers places. All these are the beginning of sorrows." And He also said that "As the days of Noah were, so shall also the coming of the Son of man be. For as in the days that were before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day that Noah entered into the ark, and knew not until the flood came, and took them all away; so shall also the coming of the Son of man be." Matt. 24:7, 8, 37-39.

Every careful student of prophecy knows that this great turmoil in Europe is one of the signs of the approach of the battle of Armageddon and the coming of our Lord in the clouds of heaven. Just as Noah, after he had preached for one hundred and twenty years that a flood was coming upon the earth, knew when he saw the first rainfall that God's word would be carried out, so we may know today as we see the nations angry that the wrath of God's anger is about to break upon a wicked world. (Rev. 11:18.)

Preparedness then comes to be the slogan for every believer in our Lord's soon return. "Therefore be ye also ready: for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of man cometh." Matt. 24:44.

Paul also sounds the warning of preparedness. In Romans 13:11, 12, he says: "And that, knowing the time, that now it is high time to awake out of sleep: for now is our salvation nearer than when we believed. The night is far spent, the day is at hand: let us therefore cast off the works of darkness, and let us put on the armour of light."

The "Better Baby Movement"



[Miss Sanborn was asked to visit Havana, Ill., recently and assist the Women's Club in celebrating their "Baby Week." She did so and writes the following concerning her experience.—Ed.]

A S matron of the Life Boat Rescue Home I am deeply interested in the "Better Baby Movement." While traveling last summer I visited the Boston Floating Hospital for babies and other hospitals and maternity homes for the purpose of gaining information which would be helpful in my work. And in my health classes for the girls I try to teach them the best and most scientific methods for caring for their babies. Therefore I was glad when

to the high school boys and girls. A special talk was requested for the domestic science girls, including the demonstration of simple treatments in the home. Four school buildings were visited, ten talks given, thus reaching seven hundred children in three days. I was also asked to visit needy homes and give advice as to the care of the children, home sanitation, etc.

During the three days two mothers' meet-

asked to go to Havana, Ill., to give some health talks; in short, to help them celebrate "Baby Week."

Tuesday I was asked to talk to the school children. I feared that I would not be able to interest them in the "Better Baby Movement," but after I talked a while they asked permission to go without recess that they might hear more about the subject, showing that even small children may be interested in health principles and may help in this good movement.

I was asked to visit every school building and give talks to all grades from the primary ings were held and two general talks given on the care of infants, children's diseases, symptoms, demonstrations of simple treatments, home sanitation, etc.

Thursday was health day. In the morning I gave four talks to school children. In the afternoon a public meeting was held in the town hall in which I was asked to give a talk on rescue work for fallen girls, and at the close of the program to conduct a question box at which time I demonstrated treatments for a number of diseases.

Some of the illustrations I used to impress certain truths upon the children's minds were the following: In Boston, in an asylum for children, for four years before the dental clinic was established, they averaged eighty cases of contagious diseases per year. During the three years following the establishment of a dental clinic they averaged only three contagious cases per year.

Six thousand two hundred and twenty-four babies died in Chicago in the year 1915. A large share of them died, so says the health commissioner of Chicago, because some one failed to put the baby's nose "Up against cold air." Chicago is not the only city where the mortality of babies is great. It is the case in every large city.



physicians realized the importance of fresh air, a young girl was told that she was dying of tuberculosis. She answered: "If I must die, let me die close to nature." So each morning upon her cot she was placed out under the trees. She got well. This and similar cases have served as object lessons to physicians, helping them to see the importance of fresh air in the treatment of tuberculosis.

One winter, in a children's hospital, the young physician in charge stood over a baby who was dying of pneumonia. He decided to take it out upon the yeranda hoping its breath-

listen to these awful stories and I long to warn every mother to guard her child. I would gladly go off and weep by the hour if I could thereby wipe out the deeds that have been done, but I can not. The wounds of sin are the most terrible wounds of all and it is our duty to help the Lord heal them.

One mother confesses to me her negligence in not instructing her child in the things she ought to know. Another realizes that in some way she has failed in her training. So the story goes. If mothers could just see the misery and the sorrow that come from such a course they would begin at once to train their children in the things that they ought to know. During the short time that the girls are with us in the Life Boat Rescue Home we undertake to put into their lives some life-giving principles that will keep them from falling, and we are glad to report that about seventy-five per cent of our girls remain true after leaving us.

I noticed a comment editorially in the Chicago *Tribune* of March 8 which impressed me. The title of the article was "Character and

Temptation." The editor goes on to speak of a certain high school principal in New York City who ordered taken down from the wall of the school building a painting entitled "Am I My Brother's Keeper?" showing a group of homeless people, including a mother and her baby, sleeping on a bench on the Thames embankment in London.

His reason for doing so was that "No man would wish his daughter to be brought in contact with a picture of this character. Girls should have all the enthusiasm, the joy, and beauty that pleasant surroundings can give and there should be no jarring or depressing note."

The editor said, "Pacifism and censorship are the means by which some of us hope to avoid the hard road of cultivating character and restraint. Censorship says we are not strong enough to resist temptation and gives up the job of making us strong enough and attempts to remove the temptation. Pacifism says that we must not see danger because the presence of danger might arouse us to resistance. It is unfortunately what a lot of Americans think. We must avoid coming in contact with life because life gives us jars and depresses us. It is rough and ruthless, so we refuse to harden our bodies or our characters to meet it." The editor goes on to say that it is the professor's influence, not the picture's, which is corrupting the American youth."

The women of today who are meeting and rightly facing difficult problems are those who in their girlhood were compelled to do the same. The men of today who are doing the world's work are the men who learned early in life to toil. We can not shield our children forever and if we did they would be like the slender sapling of the forest. Why not give them the wind as well as the sunshine so that they, like the sturdy oak, can learn to stand alone?

Our rescue work is proving a great blessing to many hearts and lives. One young woman who left the Home wrote the following:

"I love the Home and all I met there and will never forget how kind you were to me. I remember you often in my prayers. I at least was brought closer to God and it has helped me so much. I used to go to church and pray, but just for the sake of going I think. But now when I pray I pray earnestly and feel that God not only hears but answers as He sees fit. I have much to be thankful for I know."

Another one who was in the Home some years ago and has since been happily married and has a home of her own, writes:

"I shall never forget the Home. It seems

to me it was the grandest place I ever was in in my life. I had sorrow and trouble there, yet I spent some of my happiest hours there

and I know there are many girls that feel as I do."

We want to paint the Home on the outside this spring, as it needs it badly. And we shall also have to do considerable painting on the inside. This will mean added expense, but we know the Lord will take care of this work.

What Is Divine Healing?

David Paulson, M. D.

A LMOST the last words in the Bible are these, "Beloved, I pray that in all things thou mayest prosper and be in health, even as thy soul prospereth." 3 John 2, R. V. What a mockery if there were nothing within the covers of that Book to tell us how to realize this divine wish!

Divine inspiration declares that the same God that forgives our sins also heals our diseases. "Who forgiveth all thy iniquities, who healeth all thy diseases." Ps. 103:3. So the doctor can no more heal the sick than the preacher can forgive sin. Then has the conscientious and competent physician no mission? Most assuredly he has. God does not forgive sin unless we confess (1 John 1:9), and He does not heal unless we cooperate. The doctor can set a broken bone, but God alone can cause it to unite. Over the door of a dispensary in India are these words, "We wash the wounds, and God heals them." When a boy I cultivated corn, but I did not grow corn, so in the sick room today I cultivate health, but I am just as dependent upon God to grow the health as I was upon nature when a farmer boy to grow the corn.

Bible Examples of Human Co-operation in Healing

Timothy's digestive disturbances illustrate a class of cases that need regulation of diet rather than special prayer. Paul did not advise Timothy, the great evangelist, to call for the elders to pray, but suggested instead that he should "drink no longer water only (Conybare & Hawson version), but use a little wine (grape juice) for thy stomach's sake and thine frequent sicknesses." 1 Tim. 5:23. Roth. version.

Christ himself by His example sanctioned the use of physical remedies, and left the incident on record so that we may know we have His approval of their use today. When He healed a certain blind man, "He spat on the ground, and made clay of the spittle (clay ointment), and He anointed the eyes of the blind man with the clay." Then He said to him, "Go, wash in the pool of Siloam." (Hydrotherapy.) "He went his way, therefore,

and washed, and came seeing." John 9:6, 7. Christ could have healed this man without these external remedies, but by using them He placed His approval for all time upon proper remedies for proper cases.

Naaman, the heathen general, came to the prophet to be healed of his incurable skin disorder. (2 Kings 5:9.) And although the patient expected to be healed by prayer and laying on of hands (11th verse) yet Elisha prescribed instead a course of baths over in the river Jordan (10th verse). Like so many patients today he thought the treatment was too simple to be of special value. (12th verse.) Yet, when he was persuaded to try the baths, he was healed, and this opened the way for his spiritual healing. (15th verse.)

It was God who healed Naaman when he bathed in Jordan, and it was God who healed Timothy when he regulated his diet. It was God who healed the blind man after the clay ointment had been applied and he had washed in the pool. It is the same God who heals people today when they take the necessary treatments whether they know it or not, for it is God who heals all disease.

Prayer Plus Poultice

Hezekiah was remarkably healed from his dangerous illness by prayer plus poultice. The patient prayed (2 Kings 20:2) and Isaiah prescribed a fig poultice to be applied to the tumor, and he recovered. (Verse 7, Spurrell.)

There is a class of invalids whose health can never be restored until their interest and energies become enlisted in the welfare of others. In other words they are too selfish to get well. It is a waste of time and means to apply either poultices, ointment, or any other physical treatment to these patients. God has a special remedy for such. It is, "To deal thy bread to the hungry, and that thou bring the poor that are cast out to thy house, when thou seest the naked, that thou cover him." Then and not until then, "Thy healing shall spring forth speedily." Isa. 58:7, 8, R. V. Likewise Job was not delivered from his various ills and aches until he

"prayed for his friends." Then the "Lord turned the captivity of Job." Job 42:10. All over the land today there are a multitude of self-centered, selfish, self-indulgent invalids who will never be restored to health till they do likewise.

Christian Psychotherapy

The Bible declares, "The spirit of a man will sustain his infirmity." Prov. 18:14. Arousing a patient's will power is one of the physician's greatest assets in the work of restoration. For "A cheerful heart is a good medicine." Prov. 17:22, R. V. That is Christian Psychotherapy in a nut shell, but it should be used to mend broken hearts and not to set broken bones.

The blighting influence of mind cure devotees and the various other mental healing cults is today sweeping over the world like a tidal wave. Are you, who read these words, being engulfed in it, simply because you feel there is much good in it? If so, remember that nine-tenths of sewerage is good water. It is the one-tenth that spoils all of it. Of course it would be possible to laboriously distill some good drinking water from this very same sewerage, but how foolish to do this if there were a pure mountain stream bubbling up which you could reach and drink to your fill!

It is equally foolish to endeavor to separate the good from the vile in these various mental healing systems when all that is good in them the devil stole from the Bible in order to give an air of respectability to his dangerous delusions. Then why not go to the Bible for it in the first place?

The Question of "Results"

But you ask, "Are not these various mental healing cults getting results?" I answer, "Most assuredly." We are living in the time when the Bible declares Satan is to work with all power and signs and lying wonders. (2 Thess. 2:9.) When Moses' rod was cast down before Pharaoh it became a serpent. Pharaoh immediately called in his group of wonder workers and they cast down their rods, and to all human appearances, they imitated the miracle. (Ex. 7:12.) The devil has no less power today, and to all human appearances actual miracles will be performed and they are already being performed. In other words,

they are getting results, for "as Jannes and Jambres withstood Moses, so do these also resist the truth." 2 Tim. 3:8.

No doubt certain Christian workers will soon have to decide whether they want physical strength imparted to them from a devilish source, or like Paul continue to cripple along in human feebleness if that is God's will. Paul struggled, as many of us are doing, with some wretched, miserable, nagging, physical trouble that he could only compare to a "thorn in the flesh." (2 Cor. 12:7.) Finally, in his desperation, he made it a matter of special prayer three times that he might be delivered from it, and God said to him as He is saying to many of us, if we only have sense enough to appreciate it, "My grace is sufficient for thee: for My strength is made perfect in weakness." 2 Cor. 12:9. Paul happened to be so constituted that he and God could do better team work with the Lord having all the strength and Paul having all the weakness, and when he grasped this wonderful truth he was able to say, just as we will be able to say after we have prayerfully made every reasonable and legitimate effort to be delivered from our infirmities, "Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me." 9th verse.

The Prayer Remedy

In conclusion we will consider the most expensive remedy of all, for it demands the most of the patient and that is the prayer remedy. "Is any sick among you? Let him call for the elders of the church; and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord." Jas. 5:14. The anointing means complete consecration to God's will. If the patient when he is anointed means anything less than that he is insulting "Confess therefore your sins one to God. another, and pray one for another, that you may be healed." Verse 16. R. V. the prayer of faith" (that is a prayer that is in harmony with God's revealed instruction, for any other prayer under such circumstances would be a prayer of presumption) shall save the sick." If the one who prays, and the patient are not in harmony with God's will both spiritually and physically, and determined to obey, then such a prayer not only is not answered but it is an actual "abomination" to God as His word plainly teaches. "He that turneth away his ear from hearing the law, even his prayer shall be abomination." Prov. 28:9.

For fear that God's purpose is not fully discerned the invalid who asks God to remove the bitter cup of sickness should always add the words of Christ when He prayed to be delivered from the cup of death: "Nevertheless not My will, but Thine, be done." Luke 22:42.

"Since I gave my heart and life to God I am doing all I can for Him, for I can never pay Him for His goodness to me. BRIGHTENING OTHER LIVES

We are glad to tell the readers of THE LIFE BOAT we are continuing our city work with increasing interest. With but few exceptions cur numerous experiences we have with our Bible readers and different ones we meet and help in our work are very encouraging.

You will remember the article in the March LIFE BOAT where we were able to find positions for two men. One of the men still has his position. His wife was telling us the other day it was only a month ago when they were in distressed circumstances and want, and now her husband has been promoted and earns \$19 per week and they are getting along nicely, are located in a better neighborhood, and their future looks more bright than any time since they have lived in Chicago. And above all, she says, "We have a chance to study the Bible, and had it not been for you girls our circumstances no doubt would not have been the same." We have sold Bibles to both her and her sister.

On one occasion we were asked to call upon a lady who had had many reverses in life. She lived in a very humble home and surely told us a very pathetic story. She was the mother of five children and has been a widow for almost nine years. Within a month there were two deaths in this home. One, her brother, who died with tuberculosis, and the other, a young man who was boarding with her, fell from a second story veranda and was instantly killed. With the exception of one little daughter earning \$6 per week, this left her without any means of support. She herself is afflicted and unable to work and support her family. We are trying to help this poor widow to get a mother's city pension, which

she is entitled to for her three children under fourteen years of age. We feel this will be truly missionary work, for the family is so needy.

One Sunday morning when we were attending jail services we went to the annex. There were three girls I was particularly interested in. The girls seemed to be touched very much by the words we spoke to them that morning of the love of God and how Jesus had left His home above and came to this world to suffer and die that we might have eternal life. They broke down and began to weep bitterly. One girl confessed she had run away from home. They all resolved that that Sunday morning would be a turning point in their lives. I was able to get the girls' addresses and afterwards wrote a letter to each of them to encourage them to live better lives. In answer to one of the letters I had written I received a letter from one girl's mother. She said:

"If you can imagine a mother half-crazed, you can picture me, but the heartaches can never be known. I had a letter from a dear Christian sister, who wrote and said, 'Dear, do not despair, but turn to the thirty-seventh Psalm and be comforted,' which I did, and it did help, and I prayed, too. I am afraid I do not study my Bible enough and therefore perhaps do not live up to its standards, but I pray God will help me to do better in the future.

"My daughter's letters are all very encouraging. She seems very repentant and longs to be with mother, and I only hope she will be a good girl in the future."

There are times when our hearts are made extremely sad when we see some who take so little interest in the Word of God and the signs that are fast fulfilling that our Saviour's coming is very near. In cases like this we can only sow the seed and our Heavenly Father can bring forth the increase. For He has promised His word will not return unto Him void.

Again we are glad to know there are many who are believing the things found in God's precious Word and are anxious to study farther into these deep lines of prophecy which our Heavenly Father has so wondrously pictured before us through the prophecy of old. This is the privilege of each one who will

study and watch the things that are fast fulfilling before our eyes, which must shortly come to pass before Christ will come in the clouds of heaven.

We are glad to have a part in this great finishing work. "The harvest truly is great, but the labourers are few: pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he would send forth labourers into his harvest." Luke 10:2.

A CURE FOR DISCOURAGEMENT

It seemed quite a task for me to take part in the service the first time I visited the Harrison Street police station, for my idea of conditions of things was far from right. Now after having been there several times, my interest is greater and I have lost my fear to speak for my Saviour. As I try to tell those behind the bars the love of God and how His love for man was so great that "He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life" (John 3:16), I feel more and more the need of a closer walk with God that I may be an instrument in His hands to save souls which are perishing day by day because no one has thought enough of their souls to give them a helping hand, but instead they pass by on the other side as did the priest and the Levite spoken of in Luke 10:31, 32.

For some time before my first visit to the jail I felt discouraged and had about reached the place of giving up the work I had started as a medical evangelist. Up to this time I had done no evangelistic work. I can now see that that was the reason for the feeling of discouragement which had taken possession of me.

I will tell of some of the experiences we have had. One Sunday morning in the criminal side in the farthest cell from the entrance was a man who seemed to be greatly depressed. Bro. Scott had a talk with him and he appeared to be hardened against what was said, but a little later in the service he began to weep and I knew the Lord had touched his heart, so I stepped up to the cell and began talking with him. He said he knew he was a lost man and felt as though he was too far gone to be saved. Then I quoted to him the

words which Iesus spoke to Zacchæus as recorded in Luke 19:10, as well as other comforting Scriptures.

When prayer was to be offered I asked him to kneel with us. He refused, but asked us to pray for him, and while we were praying he got down on his knees. I knew then that the Spirit of the Lord was present. After prayer he was a different man and promised to live a Christian life.

Another experience which encouraged me we had last Sunday. In the first place Bro. Ford gave a talk on the love of Christ for lost man and the preparation necessary for us to make that we may have a home in the New Earth. After this we had some interesting talks with the men, and on leaving this part to go to the criminal corridor I noticed several men had started to read the tracts that were given them.

On entering the criminal side our prospect looked discouraging at first. There were six men in this part. Three were asleep and one did not want us to talk as he wanted to sleep. But in the last cell were two men who took part in the singing and paid good attention to the words which were spoken, also bowed with us in prayer. After prayer was offered one of these men gave his heart to God. He said he didn't know how long he would have to serve for the wrong he had done, but he was going to start a new life that morning and wanted us to remember him in our prayers.

One thing more I wish to mention before closing is that every Sunday when we enter the police station in the room where we have our coats and hats we have a season of prayer and ask the Lord to take all sin out of our lives and to go before us and give us words to speak.

MISSION REFLECTIONS

In our work at the mission we find a very large number of transient people. They are here today and gone tomorrow. The thought often comes to us, what can we give these precious souls that will be of value to them as they battle with life in other places? A thought that will help them to meet a temptation successfully, lend a helping hand to a fellow man, also to remind them that the Lord wants them to become true and noble men and make them dissatisfied with the mean things of life.

As we look into their faces we find there men who will some day make a mark in the world and whom God will use in bringing other souls to Christ. How many different homes and environments one sees represented in this work! If we could look back of the scene it would surprise us to see that many a man hides himself in a large city, that, by the allurements of city life he might forget his past. Leaving a good home and without restraint, he goes the way of the great majority. Why? Because of the lack of an encouraging word that would have set him right. Many times the parents were too busy with other things to look after the boys, or the boys only had parents that fed and clothed them, forgetting the boys had a heart yearning for friendship.

These studies are new to the men. They see things differently—they see that heaven is a real place. HELPING TO MAKE MEN OVER

[Brother and Sister Scott, who are taking the one year's medical evangelistic course at Hinsdale, thus getting a brief training in medical evangelistic work, have been rendering valuable help at the Life Boat Mission—Ed.]

One evening at the Life Boat Mission I recall an experience that made a deep impression on my mind. It was in the after meeting, as we call it, when the workers speak to different ones and invite them to stay for a short prayer meeting, that I met a middle-After talking with him I aged gentleman. found that he had been a Christian years ago. but he had backslidden. He came forward with several others, and while they were praying for God to take them back again, this brother broke down and cried like a child, and amid those sobs of sorrow he asked the compassionate Saviour not to pass him by. Surely the Lord hears the cry of the penitent child.

Another instance—a young man of about thirty-five years of age came into the mission, he said, to spend an hour or so before his train left. He was under the influence of liquor and seemed rather talkative. After the service Mrs. Scott and I asked him to stay a few moments for prayer, but he refused, say-

ing that his train left in a short time, but on finding out that his train did not leave for two hours, we felt safe in taking up his time that he would probably have spent in a saloon. So we asked the brother if he had ever given his heart to the Lord. He replied that he had a long time ago. We then asked him to make a new start. But he refused, saying, "There is no use." After talking to him about the effect of alcohol on the human body and giving him some water to drink, we succeeded in getting him to stay for prayer. After we had had a short season of prayer with him, he took us by the hand and said. "Why. I am sober now." This is one of many results that we see at the mission.

After the close of another meeting I found one man who was discouraged and downcast. He said he used to read and study the Bible, but somehow he slowly drifted away, and now when he read the Bible there were so many things he could not understand. I told him we would be glad to study the Bible with him and explain it, but he said he didn't care to know about it. So it is when we turn our back on God, we slowly drift away and truth becomes darkness to us.

But there were some whose hearts were touched, and one said that by the help of the Lord he would henceforth live a better life. Another young man eighteen years old, addicted to the cigarette habit and separated from his mother and friends, gave his heart to God and said he was going to live a better life from now on. Two or three raised their hands, and said, "By the help of God I am going to live a better life." And the Lord sees those hands go up in distress and He is anxiously waiting for the lost to come back to Him.

To finish the work God has intrusted to His people, there must be more individual and personal work, for every one has a work to do in the vineyard of the Lord.

He has committed unto us talents, and holds us responsible for their use.

Jesus was our example in all things. He was an unselfish, earnest and constant worker. Whether in the synagogue, by the wayside, or at the feast, He spoke to men about their soul's salvation. So it should be with us wherever we are, we should watch for opportunities of speaking to others of the Saviour.

The work of Christ was largely made up of personal interviews, as He had a faithful regard for the one-soul audience.

Henry Clay Trumbull said: "Whenever I am justified in choosing my subject of conversation with another, the theme of themes shall have prominence between us, so that I may learn his need, and, if possible, meet it."

All around us are precious souls. May we continue to search out the suffering ones and point them to Christ, the One who is able to save to the uttermost.

But the blessing of earth is toil."


S O says Dr. Henry Van Dyke and surely every thinking person must agree that labor is one of man's chief blessings.

Dr. H. J. Hall of Marblehead, Mass., who has made and is making an extensive study of the value to invalids of useful and interesting employment, is responsible for these statements:

"Work is so much a part of the normal

human life that the absence of it for any length of time throws the individual out of balance." "It has always been realized that work may be curative, that it may reorganize and regenerate lives that have long been idle." "In hospitals where patients are allowed work to while away the time, they have had one tie to hold them to the work of health and activity, and have had, too, less time in which to meditate on their own sufferings and on the short-comings of their nurses."

That the author of the book, "Ministry of Healing," does not consider the blessings of labor suited to those alone who are enjoying health is plainly shown in the following quotations taken from pages 238-240:

"Those who have broken down from mental labor should have rest from wearing thought; but they should not be led to believe that it is dangerous to use their mental powers at all. . . . Those who have overtaxed their physical powers should not be encouraged to forego manual labor entirely." "When invalids have nothing to occupy their time and attention, their thoughts become centered upon themselves, and they grow morbid and irritable. Many times they dwell upon their bad feelings until they think themselves much worse than they really are, and wholly unable to do anything."

"Inacivity is the greatest curse that could come upon most invalids. Light employment in useful labor, while it does not tax mind or body, has a happy influence upon both. It strengthens the muscles, improves the circulation, and gives the invalid the satisfaction of knowing that he is not wholly useless in this busy world. He may be able to do but little at first, but he will soon find his strength increasing, and the amount of work done can be increased accordingly."

After careful study of these and other authors concerning the need for and the satisfactory results accomplished by the providing of useful occupation for invalids, the management of the Hinsdale Sanitarium has established a Work Cure department for its patients. The work was begun late in November and has steadily grown in popularity with patients and nurses alike.

Work benches are provided where many useful and ornamental pieces of wood work have been made. Three small hand looms have been used in weaving dozens of neat little bath and bedroom rugs. Wheel chair and other almost helpless patients have with the others shared the pleasure of mat weaving, of pyrography, of fashioning numberless quaint and beautiful baskets of reed and raffia. Artists' colors are provided for those whose tastes lead in that direction. Each week shows progress in the variety of Work Cure products.

Few patients leave the institution without making a farewell call at the Work Cure and the expressions of grateful appreciation for its help are enthusiastic and abundant.

We feel that God is directing in this new department and we are glad to know that through its work many weary souls are finding the path to hope and health and happiness.

This letter is from a young man who is serving a sentence of twenty-five years in the Connecticut State Prison. Three years ago, while on his way to the "movies," he got into difficulty and committed a crime which has practically cost him his freedom for life. Had some one introduced him to the love of Jesus before that time and interested him in the things of God, he might have been on his way to a prayer meeting that night instead, and no doubt would have been saved from the awful sin which has blighted his entire life. Many a person is behind the bars today because some one neglected to warn him of the evil of his course.

The Lord has given to these men another chance to turn to Him, and has put it into our hearts to furnish suitable gospel literature for them to read. But a great many of us men only look into it when we get into trouble. For only then do we know that 'God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble.' Ps. 46:1.

"I thank you also for the tract you sent me

and THE LIFE BOAT magazine. There is so much light and truth in it that I always read it four or five times before I pass it on to some other hungry soul.

"As I write these few lines you can not imagine how I feel as I look back to my dear old home. I see my dear old mother and father looking out through the window for me. They have been looking through that window since 1913, when I wrote them that at Christmas I would be home. And God knows how many more years they must look before they can see me coming home."

which students may receive individual attention.



"For seven years previous to Feb. 20, 1916, I was an inmate of the Colorado State Penitentiary and was sent there for illegally manipulating the funds of a bank that I was cashier in. While there I read with great pleasure and profit a monthly magazine called The Life Boat. To say that I read it would not anywhere near convey the idea that I wish to convey. I digested it, shed tears over it, and prayed for the unfortunate girls in your care. Not using tobacco at all, I used to trade my tobacco and matches allowance at the penitentiary for The Life Boat. The Life Boat never reaches the waste paper basket; it is read and reread until it is worn out.

"I have been a free man for only the past twenty-two days and therefore I have no money and am simply working for six dollars for three days a week, which is my only income. "There is one good, honest Christian inmate who is doing 'life' at the penitentiary, and he has charge of all the religious tracts and magazines that come to the penitentiary, and he sees that they are properly distributed, and that the same go to the inmates that appreciate them.

"THE LIFE BOAT is the hardest magazine to secure and it is the best magazine to read. I would subscribe for it and have it sent to the penitentiary, but I simply can not afford it at present.

"It would be the means of saving many a man's soul. It saved me and made a better man of me.

"I was at one time a devout church worker, but the death of my dear and loving wife started me in the wrong direction. Gambling and a high life led to the wrecking of a bank that I was cashier in. I am the son of a banker and I have an A. B. degree from college, but that did not save me from prison."

THE UNPARDONABLE SIN

A poor, wretched, nervous invalid wrote me in great despair because she believed that she had sinned the unpardonable sin, and it worried her night and day. Thinking perhaps this copy of THE LIFE BOAT may fall into the hands of some one else who is suffering in the same manner, I feel impressed to publish for their benefit my answer to her letter:

I want to help you in regard to the unpardonable sin. No one while probation lasts, has committed the unpardonable sin who is at the same time deeply concerned about her spiritual condition. This concern is always brought about by the agency of the Spirit of God. The very fact that the Spirit of God is working on a person shows that she has not grieved it entirely away. It is a trick of the devil to stick that notion into your head.

Instead of being wicked, you need physical health and, of course, spiritual encouragement as well. God knows how to make allowance for your physical condition. He knows that you are a nervous wreck. He don't expect as much of you as He would of one who is in health

To give you an idea of God's willingness to forgive, you just ask God to fix in your mind what I am now writing to you. Turn to 1 Kings 21, and read the entire story of how Ahab and Jezebel killed an innocent man to get his vineyard. Read how Ahab literally sold himself to work wickedness, worse than the heathen that the Lord drove out. (Verses 25 and 26.) No one ever received a more scathing rebuke from the Lord than this wicked king. And then notice in the 27th and 28th verses how he humbled himself. Then read the 29th verse. "Seest thou how Ahab humbleth himself before me? Because he humbleth himself before me, I will not bring the evil in his days."

I know no better illustration in the entire Bible of God's willingness to forgive. His mercy endureth forever. You ask God to forgive your sins, and He does so. That is the end of it. It doesn't depend on your feelings or anything of that kind, for the same reason that when you ring up on the telephone, the girl at the other end doesn't ask you whether you are a good woman or not. The fact that you ring up is a signal that you want a response, and you get it. The Bible says, Ask and ye shall receive.

There is salvation for you because you are a sinner. Christ came to save sinners. He didn't come to save good people. They don't need it. Day by day ask God to accept you. Not for your own sake, but for Christ's sake. Day by day ask Him to forgive your sins and believe He does it, because He says so.

No doubt a great deal of your despondency comes from the absorption of poisons from the alimentary canal. Eat plenty of garden stuff, which does not decompose readily and make poisons. Also plenty of green garden stuff and other plain, simple foods. Look after your bowels carefully so as to prevent stagnation. Carry out these spiritual and physical suggestions, and don't forget to spend as much time as possible in the out-door air, for fresh air is one of God's great blessings.
