### Elders

A writer asks the following questions: "When an elder has served his time and another man has been elected elder in his place, has first elder the right, when called upon, to speak to the church?"

Answer: Certainly. If he is a godly man, and is in good and regular standing in the church, any man has the right to conduct a Bible study and give an exhortation, or exercise his right to publicly encourage the brethren of the church. Because he ceases to be elder, he is not deprived of any right in a religious meeting.

Second question: "If the first elder should afterwards be reelected, is it necessary for him to be reordained?"

Answer: No, it is not necessary. Elders are ordained for life. If they commit immorality or give up the truth, and afterwards are reconverted and return to the church, and should then be selected to serve as elder, it would be advisable to reordain them; but so long as a man continues faith-

ful to God he need not be reordained, although he may be chosen to serve another church, or be released from eldership for a time and then to be reelected. He simply serves ever after, when elected, without reordination.

Another question is,—"What would you advise as to the matter of insuring churches?"

There is evidently quite a difference in principle between the question of life insurance and that of insuring the property of our churches. Companies are organized for the purpose of taking risks on such property, and they are willing for a small premium to guarantee the value of property in case of accidental fire and destruction of property. These companies receive in premiums a sufficient sum to enable them to take such risks, and there can certainly be no wrong in allowing them to take their risks at a small expense to the congregation. Adventist people sometimes have enemies who would destroy their property, and insurance results in the burned property not being a total loss; at least a portion of the value of the property is secured by the insurance. Our people have not been able to discover that there is anything wrong in thus taking advantage of the opportunity offered by insurance companies.

I believe that the people should know what our workers are doing. I trust that they will forgive this belated piece of news. On July 30, the Ravenswood, North Side, and West Side churches joined in a tent effort at the corner of Hamilton Avenue and Montrose Boulevard, which lasted until October 15, and has continued every Sunday night since under the auspices of the Ravenswood church at Library Hall, near by. Large numbers attended, as high as 1,000 it was estimated one night, and 300 or 400 was a fair average many nights. This has continued in the hall.

Elders Everson and Burdick began this series of meetings, but the latter was called to camp-meeting, so I was requested to assist. Fifteen have been baptized as the result and we believe that many more will follow. One of those baptized was a Spiritualist, but is now rejoicing in the truth. Many became disturbed and very angry, but returned again and again until light came to them. One man was attracted by a notice of a temperance talk; then he and his whole family became interested, and are now studying to know the truth. The son-in-law of this family was called to Nebraska to the funeral of his mother and found that both his mother and his sister had just accepted the truth there: A dear old lady who could not attend the meetings heard the message through her relatives who had attended, and then Elder Everson and the writer called to water the seed, and God gave the increase. She was baptized in a Baptist baptistry near her home, through the kindness of the pastor.
