East Michigan Camp-Meeting

The East Michigan camp-meeting and conference was held on a beautiful ground at Bay City, August 12-18. The attendance was the largest, with one exception, of all the camp-meetings of the Union. It was said that there were between seven and eight hundred regular campers on the ground.

The people were very responsive, as well as prompt, in their attendance at every service. The call for mission funds met with ready response. More means were raised than at any other camp-meeting in the Union this present year.

Elder Knox of Washington was present at the meeting, and that his sermons, mission talks, and counsel were greatly appreciated was very evident.

Elder Burkholder presided with dignity and courtesy, as well as with fairness and promptness. The general conduct of the camp was above criticism. The order and system were to be commended.

The spiritual interest was good. The devotional meetings were well attended each day. There was, on the part of the people, the earnest longing for the higher life of purity. The longing for a preparation to stand with the Lamb on Mount Zion was not wanting. This may be the Laodicean state and age of the church, but the Redeemer says, "As many as I love I rebuke and chasten: be zealous therefore and repent." "Behold I stand at the door and knock: if any man hear my voice and open the door, I will come in unto him and will sup with him, and he with Me." Some have the door open heavenward in these days of turmoil and unrest. These do not fail to receive of the heavenly feast. Those who are turning earthward receive only leanness of soul and disappointment. This latter class will soon be falling off from the narrow way, that Pilgrim saw in his vision, into the abyss below.

One can scarcely refrain from questioning as to how long these camp-meetings will continue. How long before the last events in human history will be recorded and the kingdom of Christ be ushered in? just now is expressive of the sensuality of the age,—in manner, and thought, for the friendship of the world is enmity with God.

The opportunity for study and meditation afforded by these occasions ought to bring us in touch with the Infinite. In order that we may attain to all which is in the purpose of our divine Head the very best conditions should prevail in all respects. May the divine One speedily bring this to pass.

Helponthe Message Among the Colored People

Please Read in All Churches in West Michigan

Sabbath, September 28

The regular annual collection for the support of the colored work will be taken October 5 in all our churches. From personal knowledge of the work and workers in the South, I appeal for a liberal offering. No people appreciate the message more, and no mission money brings better results than that expended for the colored people in our own country. If the Lord is impressing your heart to help the South, here is a good opportunity. All that is given will be credited to your church on the Fifteen-cent-a-week Fund.

My last work in the South was for the colored people, and truly the calls for laborers were many more than we could supply. The average wage is very small, and yet Elder Haysmer writes me that some laborers have had to be dropped this summer on account of lack of means. This ought not to be; the work must be pushed and increased. Those among the colored people who accept the truth are as loyal in supporting the work according to their means as the white believers, but they can not carry the work and answer the pressing calls. We must help them.

Pray over it, and come prepared next Sabbath.

Resolutions Adopted at the West Michigan Conference at Kalamazoo, Sept. 3-11, 1912

Gratitude to God

Whereas "His divine power hath given unto us all things that pertain to life and godliness, through the knowledge of Him that hath called us to glory" and service, and

Whereas the Lord hath for faithful service verified His promise, "Blessed shalt thou be in the city, and blessed shalt thou be in the field," providing for us "in basket and in store," and in life and health, in membership, and conference prosperity; therefore,—

1. *Resolved*, That for life, health, all blessings, both spiritual and temporal, for the privilege of laboring for Him and with him, we tender gratitude to our Heavenly Father, and with renewed faith in the Lord Jesus and His soon-coming, pledge our continued loyalty to His cause as represented in the threefold message entrusted to us for the world.

Whereas our beloved sister, Mrs. E. W. Webster, a missionary to the West Indies for about twelve years, has been removed from us by the hand of death since our last conference, and

Whereas her presence is greatly missed at this meeting; therefore,—

2. *Resolved*, That we extend to her bereaved companion our heartfelt sympathies in his affliction.

And whereas, since our last camp-meeting our brother and fellow laborer, Brother E. A. Merriam, has been taken from us by death; therefore,—

Resolved that we extend our heartfelt sympathy to his widow and children.

Inasmuch as our message-filled books and magazines are an important facility ordained of the Lord to give His last message to the world and His prospering hand is seen in the work; therefore,—

3. *We offer* to Him our praise for His favors, and as individuals renew our consecration to Him for service, and pledge ourselves to do all we can to encourage others to do the same.

Missionary Endeavor

Appreciating the fact that we are living in the last days of earth's history, and in view of the fact that evidences appear on every hand that the coming of the Lord is near; and

Whereas favorable time and opportunity for giving the gospel message are passing away rapidly; and

Whereas the counsel of the Lord to this people is to the effect that "the work of God in this earth can never be finished until the men and women comprising our churchmembership rally to the work, and unite their efforts with those of ministers and officers;" therefore,—

4. *Resolved*, That as churches and individuals of the West Michigan Conference we immediately devise ways and means for maintaining some phase of missionary endeavor in which each may give his and her best efforts in the promotion of the cause of God during the ensuing year.

Religious Liberty

Expressing our profound belief in the principles set forth in the Saviour's command, "Render therefore unto Cæsar the things which are Cæsar's, and unto God the things which are God's," and that it is the Christian's duty to cheerfully meet the requirement of this command; therefore,—

5. *Resolved*, That we hereby reaffirm our position on the subject of religion and civil government, maintaining that the church and state should be kept forever separate because of the fact that they occupy different realms in the Lord's plan for men in their relation one to another.

Whereas Sunday observance is a religious institution and civil laws designed to enforce its observance are in opposition to the true principles of Christianity and subversive of the American idea of civil government; therefore,—

6. *Resolved*, That we respectfully but earnestly protest against legislation in behalf of compulsory Sunday observance either by Congress or State Legislature, and that suitable literature and periodicals be distributed among officials and the people generally in their interests of giving information on the correct principles of religious freedom.

Temperance

Whereas the subject of temperance reform is part of the message of righteousness entrusted to us; and,

Whereas our attention has been repeatedly called to the fact that "the advocates of temperance fail to do their whole duty unless they exert influence, by precept and example, by voice and pen and vote, in behalf of probibition and total abstenence;" therefore,—

7. *Resolved*, That we make the temperance cause a subject of more serious importance than ever before by conducting temperance rallies wherever possible and consistent, and by securing signers to the temperance pledge.

Resolved further that we endorse the measure introduced into the present Congress for national prohibition and known as Joint Resolution No. 163.

Two-per-cent Fund

Whereas there are in connection with our work many expenses which are not best to defray from the tithe, and

Whereas some of our people have not yet taken up the two-per-cent plan; therefore,—

8. *Resolved*, That more earnest effort be put forth to increase the Two-per-cent Fund.

Camp-Meeting

Whereas at the Lake Union Conference last April it was recommended to hold the camp-meeting for seven days only; and

Whereas the experience during this camp-meeting and throughout the Lake Union Conference this summer, has proved that the time is too short to meet the desire of the believers in the conference and to justify the labor and expense entailed; therefore,—

9. Be it resolved, That hereafter we extend the length of the camp-meeting from seven days to ten days, thereby including two Sabbaths during the period.

Workers' Reading Course

10. We would earnestly urge all our workers to carry out the recommendation passed by the recent conference of city workers relative to the reading course prescribed, consisting of Bible, "Desire of Ages," and "Pastrol and personal Evangelism."

Educational Work

Believing that God has greatly blessed our efforts to follow His instruction in providing Christian training for our children and youth; therefore,—

11. We hereby pledge ourselves to renewed earnestness:(a) By providing primary schools wherever possible.

(b) By urging all those of proper age and grade to attend Cedar Lake Academy.

(c) By encouraging those completing the tenth grade to continue their preparation at Emmanuel Missionary College.

Believing that the standard of our educational work can not be raised too high; therefore, as a means of increasing the efficiency of our teaching force,— 12. We recommend, (a) That all our teachers and prospective teachers attend the summer school at Emmanuel Missionary College.

(b) That a teachers' institute be held during the school year at some convenient time and place, the salary of the teacher to go on during the institute, and the traveling expenses to be paid by the conference.

Missionary Volunteer Work

13. We recommend, That all our laborers and leaders of churches cooperate with the Missionary Volunteer secretary in seeking to make every young Christian in the conference a member either of a local society or of the Conference society.

Also that they give all possible assistance in encouraging all the young people better to qualify themselves for labor by taking the course of study required for Standard of Attainment, and also by each year pursuing one the Missionary Volunteer Reading Courses.

Bible Work

Whereas the servant of God has told us that personal house-to-house work is one of the most efficient ways of reaching the people; and,

 \cdot Whereas there seems to be so few making a specialty of this work; therefore,—

14. *Resolved*, That we encourage suitable persons to turn their attention to preparing for this work.

Magazine Work

Whereas the spirit of prophecy assures us that "the world is to receive the light of truth through an evanglizing minisary of the Word in our books and periodicals;" and

Whereas we have a line of magazines embracing every phase of the message; and

Whereas each of these magazines has demonstrated its efficiency in preparing the way for our large books and the full acceptance of the truth by its readers: therefore,—

15. We recommend a generous use of these magazines in all missionary work of our churches, and their sale by individual members.

Whereas the title of "professor" has come to be applied too frequently among us, to those whose education is not sufficient to merit it, thus belittling the standard that has been and is being maintained throughout all the universities of the land.

16. We recommend, That none save those who possess collegiate degrees and have had experience in school work be accorded this title.

And we further recommend, That all our people comply with this recommendation to the extent of refraining from applying this title to those of our instructors who have not completed the prescribed amount of collegiate work necessary for the obtaining of it.

17. *Resolved*, That we extend our appreciation to Mrs. Chas. Barnard for the use of her premises in connection with our camp-meeting.

Be it further resolved, That we hereby extend our gratefulness to the street-car company for the courtesies shown to our conference during the camp-meeting.

Inasmuch as the *Review and Herald* is exclusively an international, denominational organ,

18. Therefore resolved, That its weekly visits be encouraged, and that every individual put forth an effort to increase its circulation so that its visits may extend to every home in the conference.

Press Courtesies

19. *Resolved*, That our heartfelt appreciation be extended to the newspapers and correspondents comprising the local press for the courtesy shown the West Michigan Conference in publishing the proceedings of this meeting.

Whereas there is a growing demand for a higher standard of attainment and efficiency in our ministry; and,

Whereas the counsel of the Lord is that "unless there shall be altogether a higher and more spiritual standard for the ministry, the truth of the gospel will become more and more powerless;" and

Whereas the Word of the Lord says, "Lay hands suddenly on no man;" therefore,—

20. *Resolved*, That candidates for the ministry should be expected to give full proof of their calling before receiving ordination.

Sabbath-School Offerings

Whereas it has been demonstrated that the Sabbathschools are one of the best agencies for raising the missionfunds in our local churches; therefore,—

21. We recommend, That a special effort be put forth to raise not less than one-third of our proportionment of the mission funds.

And whereas it is clearly evident that there is great need of a more systematic training of Sabbath-school teachers; therefore,—

Resolved, That we urge all our Sabbath-school teachers and officers to take the *Sabbath School Worker* and purchase a set of the Reading Course books for teachers and workers.

Poor Fund

Whereas it has been necessary to provide for the needy poor in our conference during the last year; and

Whereas there is at the present time dependent upon us obligations to the amount of \$75 per month;

22. *Resolved*, That we proceed at this meeting to raise \$413.92 in cash or pledges, the necessary amont to cover obligations to date, and that we recommend our churches throughout the conference to be faithful in sending in to the conference office contibutions to apply on this fund.

Harvest Ingathering

Whereas our conference is somewhat in arrears on our quota of mission funds; therefore,—

23. *Resolved*, That we urge all our workers and people to put forth earnest efforts in the Harvest Ingathering.

Educational Fund

Whereas it is often necessary to give active and aspiring young persons immediate financial assistance in educating them for our special gospel work; therefore,—

24. We recommend, That our members subscribe generously to an educational fund which shall be used to assist such persons in securing an education, this fund to be used, upon the order of the conference committee, as loans to worthy young people for school expenses, until such time as they can pay it back after they get through school.

Association Debt

Recognizing the necessity of earnest and continued efforts to roll away the reproach of debt,—

25. We recommend, That in addition to the Two-per-cent Fund we authorize the president and executive committee to call for special donations to be applied upon the principal of the association debt, and we pledge ourselves to cooperate in this effort to reduce the debt not less than \$1,000 before next camp-meeting.

Religious Liberty

26. *Resolved*, That our conference laborers be urged to study the principles of Religious Liberty, providing themselves with "American State Papers," so that they may be able to rightly represent this department of the work and give information to all concerned.

Harvest Ingathering Campaign

To Be Read in All the Churches

The time for this campaign for missions with the *Signs* has been set for Monday, September 30 to October 4, the short campaign of five days; the longer effort continuing to the end of the year as time and opportunity permit. From September 30 to October 4 inclusive, all believers, especially our young and middle aged people, are urged to devote the time as far as possible to placing the special number of the *Signs* in the homes of the people and receive offerings for missionary work. The poor should not be refused the paper if they desire it, though they may not have anything to give to missions.

Our conference workers should all devote this time, September 30 to October 4, to missionary work with the *Signs*, and thus have a part in the campaign and encourage the people to do as we do, and not merely as we instruct by word of mouth.

It is possible to raise one-third of the fifteen-cents-a-week for missions with the Harvest Ingathering Signs if all will work as if the success depends upon each one individually. Then, from October 4 on to the end of the year, in connection with "Ministry of Healing" work, we can put out many more as we have time to devote to the work. The thousands of papers placed in the homes of the people will be a great blessing to many and will save some; it will be a good experience to us individually and greatly assist the work in the mission fields. In case any have not ordered papers you should do so at once and be ready when the time comes. Some churches have not ordered many papers. We wish you would order more and do better work than we did last year. The campaign netted the mission treasury \$3,500 more last year than the previous year. That was good, and we should endeavor this year to exceed all former records.

Even so we may do. So come along one and all, and let us arise and go hence. Remember the date, September 30 to October 4. It is better to be ready and not go, than to go and not be ready, but it is still better both to be ready and to go. So let us all get ready, and then all go and work the five days, and "whatever is right, that shall ye receive." So may it be. W. H. THURSTON.

North Michigan Conference Proceedings

The tenth annual session of the North Michigan Conference was held at Traverse City, Mich., in connection with the camp-meeting Aug. 26 to Sept. 1, 1912.

All of the conference laborers were present, and in addition we were pleased to have with us Elders W. T. Knox, Allen Moon; Professors C. A. Russell, O. J. Graf, R. U. Garrett; Brethren D. W. Reavis, J. W. Mace, J. B. Blosser, and H. A. Weaver, and Dr. O. R. Cooper and wife.

Reports were rendered by Elder J. J. Irwin, president, S. E. Kellman, secretary-treasurer of the tract society and conference, B. F. Williams in charge of the canvassing work, and Florence Crouch for the educational, Missionary Volunteer, and Sabbatn-school departments.

At the request of the remaining members, the church at Cedar Run was disbanded and the members invited to unite with the Traverse City or Conference church.

The following resolutions and recommendations were adopted:

Whereas, God in His providence has prospered the work and given success in evangelistic effort and financial matters and has spared the lives of all our workers; therefore,—

1. *Resolved*, That we express our heartfelt thanks and gratitude for these manifold blessings and that we here reconsecrate ourselves for more faithful and devoted service the coming year.

In view of the pressing need of funds as follows: \$125 for Cedar Lake Academy, \$150 for a new tent for field work, and \$641 balance on the office building, and

Whereas the faithful payment of the two-per-cent plan will provide for these funds in an equitable manner; therefore,—

2. *Resolved*, That we pledge ourselves to be faithful in carrying out this plan.

3. *We recommend*, That all orders for periodicals and supplies be sent to the tract society at Petoskey, and not to the publishers, thus aiding the tract society to make up the loss sustained through lack of cooperation.

Inasmuch as the Harvest Ingathering campaign has been a success where heartily taken hold of; therefore,-

4. *We recommend*, That the 1912 campaign be entered into with renewed vigor by all our churches.

Inasmuch as, according to Volume IX, page 117, "The work of God in the earth can never be finished until the men and women comprising our church-membership rally to the work and unite their efforts with those of ministers and church officers;" therefore, ---

5. *Resolved*, That we encourage the members in all our churches to take up and maintain individual and church missionary work.

6. We recommend, That as a conference we make an extra effort to raise our full proportion of mission funds; and that we adopt the plan of making weekly offerings in all our churches at the regular Sabbath meetings.

Recognizing the advantages to be derived from a systematic reading of the best literature, as well as a thorough study of the distinctive points of faith and the history of this denomination,—

7. We urge, (a) That our young people avail themselves of the opportunities afforded by the Missionary Volunteer Reading Course.

(b) That every young person in the conference enter upon the study for the Standard of Attainment.

In view of the ever increasing demand for trained laborers in our cause, and of the results of our educational work already apparent,—

8. We urge, (a) That primary schools be conducted wherever possible.

(b) That our young people be encouraged to continue their studies at Cedar Lake Academy.

(c) That those who have finished the tenth grade continue their education at Emmanuel Missionary College.

As a means of increasing the efficiency of our teaching force,—

9. We urge, (a) That all our teachers and prospective teachers attend the summer normal at Emmanuel Missionary College.

(b) That a teachers' institute be conducted at some convenient place the coming year, the teachers' salary to be continued by the churches employing them, and the traveling expenses to be met by the conference.

In harmony with the recommendation passed by the Lake Union Conference,—

10. We recommend, That the conference pay the transportation and moving expenses of our regular canvassers, when it is necessary to move them, if authorized by the conference committee.

Inasmuch as our canvassing work needs to have special encouragement just now; therefore,—

11. We ask our workers, church elders, and all our brethren and sisters to make this work a special subject of prayer and make an effort to secure a goodly number of recrnits this fall and winter.

Whereas the LAKE UNION HERALD contains information our people need, reports from the laborers, and notices from the conference president, therefore,—

12. We recommend, That every family subscribe for the paper.

Whereas there is \$125 balance due on our apportionment to the Loma Linda College of Medical Evangelists and as there is urgent need of this money; therefore,—

13. We recommend, That steps be taken at this meeting to raise our apportionment by cash donations and pledges.

Whereas the "Ministry of Healing" campaign has proved a great blessing to all engaged in it, and whereas the money derived from its sale is greatly needed by our sanitariums to relieve their indebtedness; therefore,—

14. We recommend, That our church officers make a special effort to encourage every church-member to complete the sale of his quota of six books during the present year.

Whereas all our Sabbath-school teachers occupy a very important position in the Master's work, and all desire to become more efficient in this calling; therefore,—

15. We recommend, That each supply himself with the Teachers' Reading Course for the coming year.

16. *Resolved*, That we hereby express our thanks and gratitude to the owners of these grounds for the free use of the same during these meetings, also to the Citizens' Telephone Company for the use of the telephone, to the Record-Eagle Printing Company for their courtesy in granting the use of the columns of their daily paper in publishing the reports of this meeting,
