Notes from the Recent Conference

A talk given in a meeting of the Sabbath-school department by Mrs. Joel C. Rogers, on "How We Do in Africa," was intensely interesting and touching. She said in part: "Our equipment consists of a dirt floor on which the people sit and a blackboard on which I write the record. The record is made up of the number present, the number late, and the amount of the offering. I have learned the names of every one of the people, and that means much when sometimes a name is made up of sixteen syllables.

"At first the natives did not take much interest in the Sabbath-school, but I took pains to show my interest in them. I learned the names of their children, and each Sabbath inquired how the children were. If they told me the baby had not been well, I told them what to do for it, and how to keep it well. This interest on my part won their hearts, and we do not have much trouble. If a member is absent, we do not let a day pass before finding out the reason for the absence."

Sister Rogers said that the natives in Africa give liberally to carry the light of truth to others. She was there during a

severe famine. She noticed a group of government trees stripped of bark to a height of about five feet from the ground. When she inquired what had happened to the trees, they replied, "O Donna, we could not help it. We were so hungry that we just had to gnaw the bark off the trees." And yet these faithful souls saved part of their scanty supply of food and brought it to Sabbath-school as an offering to the Lord. The food thus donated was sold to the native teachers, thus being converted into money.

These conditions wrung the heart of our dear Sister Rogers, especially when she learned that the native teachers were eating only one meal in three days. This they continued to do for six months. When she could bear it no longer she told her cook not to prepare anything more for her except bread. For three long months she ate nothing but bread and water.

Her sympathy led her to purposely forget to ask for the usual monthly offering, but the natives reminded her of it. They gave a larger offering than usual of meal which they had been saving for weeks from their pitiful allowance. They starved themselves to carry spiritual food to others.

Sister Rogers said, "When I think of the sacrifices of these poor black people, I have no hesitation in urging you to give liberally."

Sabbath, May 31, was filled with blessings. Elder Spicer gave a most impressive discourse based upon the exhortation, "Be ye also ready." In the afternoon Elder Conradi talked about the dealings of God with this people, relating many instances that show that God has a special care over His work and His workers. He spoke particularly of the influence of a Christian home. It was into such a home that he went—a careless, worldly, young man. In a very short time his heart was melted by the influence pervading this home, and he gave his life to God.

Every hour of the day was filled with meetings of various kinds. Bible workers' meetings were held each day, and occasionally time was found for a meeting for women on the subject of dress, while the various departments held regular meetings for the consideration of their lines of work.

Wednesday morning, June 4, Elder A. T. Robinson gave a lesson on the importance of daily feeding on the Word of God. "As our physical life is sustained by food, so our spiritual life is sustained by the word of God." "God will make the most precious revelations to His hungry, thirsty people as they feed upon His Word."

In a Bible workers' meeting, Mrs. Haskell spoke of the danger in these last days of allowing the cares of life to crowd out the study of the Word of God, and the service which every Christian must render. As in the day of atonement they were not allowed to do any work, so in the antitypical day of atonement, we must not allow ourselves to be so overcharged with the cares of life, even with good work, that we cannot devote some time to the work of disseminating light to those around us. The tendency to do this is one of the temptations of the last days.

Bible workers should always carry with them some book or pamphlet upon the subject which they are studying with their readers. Read extracts from it, making it so interesting that they will wish to buy the book. She said a Bible worker who is not a canvasser can not be a success.

In one of the meetings of the Sabbath-school department,

Miss Edith Shepard gave a number of suggestions in regard to the work of superintendents, teachers, and pupils. If these suggestions were followed they would result in bringing about far better conditions in our schools. She said, "Have something new every Sabbath. All will wish to be there, for they will not know what may be given that day, and they will not be willing to miss it."

In Dr. Thomason's lecture, Wednesday evening, June 4, on the deterioration of the human race, he said that the death rate in France is thirty per cent larger than the birth rate. He considers this a sign of the times.

A letter received by Elder Daniells from Sister White, said, "Do not let this conference close, as it did four years ago, with the blessing hanging over the heads of the people."

Angels are writing down the record. What it will mean, eternity will reveal.

Full reports have been given in the *Bulletin* of what is only touched upon here. Do not fail to read it if you have not already.

The General Conference session is now in the past and it was a most excellent meeting all through. The delegates have scattered to all parts of the world to take up their work again with new zeal and increased faith. Quite a large number from the home field are now under appointment to different lands as the result of the conference, and they will go on to the different parts of the world within a few weeks.

The reports at the conference revealed a marked progress

in all lands and the feeling was quite prevalent that the end of the world and of the gospel work is nearer than we apprehend.

The readers of the HERALD have, undoubtedly, followed the reports in the *Bulletin* from day to day, however, it is possible that all did not have the *Bulletin* and a few items of interest may be helpful. There were a large number of visitors in attendance at the meeting and a large number came out from the city to the meetings. There were a few conversions, several were baptized, and there was a general renewal of hope in God on the part of all.

Many very interesting experiences were related by the missionaries and it is gratifying to know that there are people in every country reaching out after God. In China the people call the Adventist Church, the one true church. One of the missionaries from China related an experience of one of their young ladies who had received the truth and had attended school for a time. On her return home she desired to give the truth to others of her heathen sisters but it was against the custom there to go from house to house and give Bible readings. She arranged to have the women come to her home that she might teach them the truth, but some of them had little bound feet and could not walk so far. This young lady was so desirous to show them the truth that she carried some of them on her back to and from her home. The missionary asked this question, "I wonder how many young women in this country would be willing to show their love for the truth in the same way."

It is not necessary, in this country, to carry people to our homes to teach them the truth, but if we had the same desire to reach others with the message that this young lady had, there would be much more missionary work carried on and more people brought into the fold.

We are now coming up to our annual camp-meeting and here is an opportunity for missionary work. We can invite people not of our faith to come with us to the meeting and work and pray for them. Some will be converted and saved as the result of such efforts.

We will have several missionaries in attendance at the meeting in Grand Rapids, June 19 to 29, and all should make a special effort to be present and encourage others to attend. We anticipate a very profitable meeting, and none who can possibly attend can afford to be absent.

One thing ever kept before the people during the conference was the importance and necessity of prayer. Much prayer, much power; little prayer, little power. Prayer is the key in the hand of faith that unlocks heaven's storehouse.

Let us all pray for the camp-meeting so soon to come, and come praying for one another and for the salvation of the unconverted. The Lord will help us as we trust in Him.

Missionary Volunteer Work

The Missionary Volunteer Society of the North Side Chicago German church was organized last November, and at present has about half a dozen members. Though probably the smallest society in the conference, we believe it to be one of the most active ones.

We have secured twenty pledges for the Wood-India Fund. Five hundred tracts on the Eastern Question were taken at the beginning of the year. We plan to distribute ten thousand tracts this year. As nothing has been done for the great Slavish population of the city (500,000) that they might hear the truth, we have decided to distribute most of the tracts among them. We have also been working for young people of these nationalities.

As we are few in number and poor in this world's goods, we would ask you to consider this work, and if you feel impressed, to assist us in a financial way to obtain papers and tracts for distribution among the Poles and Bohemians of Chicago, your assistance will be thankfully received.

One of our members is a member of Attainment, and others are expecting to take the examination in the fall. Every alternate Thursday evening we assemble for special Bible study.

We have recently started a young people's library, and even the church is enthusiastic about it. Should any possess good books that they would like to donate, we will be thankful for them.

Our latest advance move is an effort to conduct children's meetings during the time of Sabbath services, and all seem to enter heartily into the plan. We are with the Missionary Volunteers everywhere for the finishing of the gospel work in this generation. In closing I wish to state that we are having fine experiences in selling and presenting the Temperance *Instructor*. We have disposed of about one hundred, and are now taking up other magazines, though none of us are regular canvassers; we must snatch up a few hours here and there. We solicit the prayers of God's people for the Christian youth.
