No doubt, many of you have noticed the petition to Congress in the last issue of the *Liberty* magazine. It is found on pages 141 and 142. We trust that all who have received a copy of *Liberty* will secure sufficient signers to fill the blank spaces on the petition against the present drastic Sunday bill now before Congress, and then tear out the page, as indicated, and send to one of the senators from your State who is now in Congress.

This is one of the most effective ways of defeating these obnoxious measures before Congress, and an emphatic way of calling the attention of our lawmakers to right principles. As I was riding in the train the other day, I perchanced to sit with one of the leading educators in this country, the superintendent of public instruction of one of our largest States, and after talking with him concerning the struggles of religious freedom and how those principles are assailed today, I handed him a copy of Liberty. After looking over the contents, he said: "I confess this is a question I will have to study more thoroughly. This year two religious bills were passed by our legislature which requires religious instruction in the public schools. I felt I ought to oppose it, but I was not well enough informed upon the subject, so kept silent. I am sure if I had put up a good argument against the bills I could have quashed them. If you have any reading matter upon these subjects I want it."

There are hundreds of other men in responsible positions who would rally to our cause of religious freedom if we would put the arguments and principles of religious liberty, which are so clear to us, also in their possession. The last issue of *Liberty* has many striking features of interest, and it cannot help but make friends for our principles. Our people ought to give it a wide circulation just now, and urge every one who seeures a copy to fill out the petition to Congress and send it in as soon as possible.

The West-Side tent-meetings opened Sunday evening, July 6, with an excellent attendance, and the attendance has been good every evening when the weather was at all favorable. On account of two severe storms it was impossible to carry on the regular services. This has hindered us to some e_x -tent in our work thus far. We have also had some extremely

hot weather, the hottest that Chicago has experienced in years. One day no less than forty-eight persons died in the. city as a result of the excessive heat which prevailed.

Our tent is located where quite a per cent of the people are Protestant, and we are glad to report that those who are regularly attending our meetings seem to be a substantial class of people. We feel that the Lord has led in a very signal way thus far. At times in our preparation for these meetings it seemed as though we were going to be diverted in our plans, but at the last moment the Lord overruled and success followed.

The Sabbath before our tent-meetings opened, there was an earnest call made to our people in the city of Chicago to devote one Sabbath as a day of fasting and prayer in the interests of evangelistic work in the city during the summer. The day was generally observed, and as a result we are confident that great good will be accomplished; not only will souls be saved, but it will prove a great blessing to our people who have participated in this most important service. It has also been decided that between the hours of twelve and one each day our people should make the evangelistic work here a subject of special prayer.

I am confident that when we can rally our people generally to join with our workers in assuming a part of the responsibility of this great work it will prove a signal blessing to all concerned.

We expect to introduce the Sabbath question Sunday evening, July 27. We most earnestly solicit the prayers of all our people who read this report, that God will send home, like an arrow, this great truth to the hearts of the people.

Since half the year is in the past, it is fitting that we should render a report to our readers who are giving freely for the advancement of the work. You will be pleased to learn that the little church has made substantial growth along all'lines. Six persons have joined the church, two by letter, and others are receiving instruction. While six have been added to the church, our membership is still about the same as it was the first of the year, because we have granted letters to two and dropped the names of others.

Our Sabbath-school, Missionary Volunteer, and Christian Help Band are useful factors in the work here. A number are selling our literature with good success.

With an active membership of about seventeen, mostly women, this is our financial showing for the seven and a half months I have been here: Tithes, \$296.53; church expense, \$104.25; Sabbath-school, \$42.97; miscellaneous, and thirteenth-Sabbath offering \$21.93: missions, \$12.80; building fund, \$37.50; liberty, \$4.50; total \$520.48.

This is a per capita of more than twenty six, dollars on the basis of a membership of twenty.

It should be mentioned that about fifty dollars has been donated to our building fund from the First church, which brings the fund up to \$570.48.

We are much in need of a strong force of Bible workers and a suitable place of worship. Anyone desiring to help us may send money to Mr. Frank Hiner, treasurer of the East Michigan Conference, 426 Trumbull Avenue, Detroit, Mich., or to the writer at 638, 30th Street, Detroit, Mich.

The Lord has blessed the work here, as we have taught the people publicly and from house to house.
