East Michigan Conference

We have passed another of those grand old waymarks, and are nearer the celestial city than ever before. Our hearts ought to rejoice greatly, therefore, at the prospects of quickly finishing this work and being gathered home.

The early date of the meeting it was thought by many would make our attendance very small. We are glad to report, however, that our brethren and sisters rallied to the call and the latter part of the conference was as large or even larger than last year.

A splendid missionary spirit took possession of the people and swelled the offerings on the last Sabbath to \$339 besides \$1,000 that was pledged to missions on the previous Thursday. In addition to this the conference voted to appropriate \$2,000 of their surplus tithe to missions. Thus this conference will send to missions as the direct result of the camp meeting nearly \$3,400.

As the result of the work done during the meeting, forty dear souls were baptized. A large part of this number were young people, the result of the faithful efforts of the workers in charge of the young people's work. From the number we expect to see some workers for the Lord in foreign and home lands.

Nine companies went out from the camp meeting to do evangelistic work during the summer. Five of these companies have tents and three are located in churches doing house-to-house work and holding Sabbath and Sunday meetings. The tent companies are located as follows: Elder Wheeler and helpers in Detroit, Elders Guild and Videto with helpers, in Saginaw; Elder French and helpers in Fenton; Elder Kittle and Elder Boylan at Greenbush; Elder Hicks and I. J. Woodman at Wheeler. We trust that many earnest prayers may ascend daily for the success of these faithful workers.

At the close of the evening service June 17 Brethren Boylan, Hicks, and Westcott were ordained to the gospel ministry. Thus the work of the Lord moves forward and one by one the faithful workers come to

the yoke as laborers together with God. Long and fruitful may their lives be.

Brethren Miner and Roland have entered the field as tent masters to get their first experiences looking toward the ministry. These are promising young men and we trust may prove their gift and call to the work of the Lord.

The calls for labor come to us more rapidly than we can respond with the men that we now have in the Are there not others who would like to respond to the call of the Lord and enter the work for the salvation of souls? I shall be pleased indeed to hear from such. I am praying that the Lord will give us the funds as fast as He moves on the hearts of our young people to enter the work. The treasurer's report shows a good increase in the tithe for the past year and with that came the increase in our laboring force. Since the conference last year we have started nine of our young people in the work in this conference. Most of these young people have been in our school at Holly. Some of our girls who have been teaching in the public schools in the past are now in Berrien Springs preparing to take up the church school work this fall. More teachers are needed, and the room for Bible work is not nearly filled. Who will consecrate himself today to the Lord for this work?

The meeting closed with a good spirit prevailing, and a favorable impression was left on the minds of the people in the neighborhood. The general testimony of the people was that ours was the most orderly company of young people that had ever assembled on the grounds where the meetings were held. This is an honor to the truth that has made us what we are, and God will honor the youth that honor His truth. Guarded and guided by this great truth there is safety for all our children from the snares and delusions of the present evil world. May the dear Lord help them to be wise and abide therein.

Actual Facts Culled from the Past and Present

Between the last week of May and the first of July our colporteurs' reports have averaged a little more than \$1,024 per week.

During the first six months of this year one colporteur in this conference has secured \$1,456.80 worth of orders. This is an average of \$242.47 per month, or \$121.23 for his commission, or over \$100 clear per month. A great many have been laboring under the false impression that a fair living could not be made in the colporteur work, but this record shows that the Lord pays His faithful servants well.

Eight of our colporteurs have averaged \$886 each for the last six months.

Our sales for the first six months of this year were over \$14,200, or a gain of \$2,978 over the sales of the first six months of last year. Our goal for the year is \$25,000.

One of our student cavassers in 22 days sold \$468 worth of "Great Controversy," which makes an average of \$2.34 per hour. Another of our student canvassers who is working with "Coming King" has averaged \$1.10 per hour for 259 hours, and another colporteur's record for "Coming King" is \$1.07 per hour for 214 hours.

Ernest Craig has taken up work with "Daniel and Revelation" in the eastern part of Tazewell County. We are expecting some good reports from him between now and the time school begins.

The sales for the last week in May of this year were \$1,257, or \$100 more than the entire sales for the year 1906.

Since our conference was divided in 1903 our sales have amounted to \$95,779.28. During the last 18 months of this eleven years \$33,500 has been secured.

The financial report sent out to all our treasurers and elders for June is very interesting. Our Two-percent Fund which showed a decline during the last two or three months is now on the upward move again, and will be a great help to the conference in the heavy expenses of moving our camp meeting equipment to Mt. Pleasant. Our deficit on the mission apportionment now reaches over \$2,600. From January to June are the poorest months in our field, in other words, the best half of the year is before us. We believe that every church will strive hard to sustain

the foreign mission work to the full extent of what is required of us.

Miss Crouch is taking a much needed rest from her departmental work. Professor Russell will look after the church school work during her absence, and Miss Sweet, who is assisting in the office for the summer, will take care of the Sabbath school department.

We are glad to see our field agent, Brother Williams, sufficiently recovered from his recent illness to take an active part in the field work again. Our canvassers have been very faithful, and despite his inability to actively cooperate with them, they have remained at their post and have done good work.

Elder Irwin left the office Monday, June 29, visiting the churches at Frankfort and Mt. Pleasant on his way to the meeting of the Executive Committee of the Union Conference. He was expected home July 8.

We learn that three or four people are awaiting baptism at the Omer church. These individuals were first interested in the truth by the faithful home missionary work done by the lay members, and thus were ready for the clinching truths when the ministers visited the church.

"Where Are Your Children?"

Father, mother, church elder, after you have looked at those boys and girls, can you look up into the face of your Heavenly Father and say, "Yes Father, I have carried out the instruction regarding their education which Thou hast in mercy given me"? Years ago, the Lord said, "Establish church schools. Give your children the word of God as the foundation of all their education," and again He asks, "Where are your children? Are you educating them to discern and to

escape the corruptions that are in the world through lust? Are you seeking to save their souls, or are you by your neglect aiding in their destruction?"

Read this and much more in the chapter on Church Schools in Volume VI of the Testimonies, and answer the questions you find asked of you. When God says, "All the youth should be permitted to have the blessings and privileges of an education at our schools, that they may be inspired to become laborers together with God," He means just what He says; and He holds us responsible to act accordingly. But here is a church officer who says, "We have but five or six children and very little money. We can't have a church school; it is out of the question." In "Desire of Ages" I read, "All God's biddings are enablings." Do we believe what God says?

If you can't *see* how it is to be done, go to *Him* and ask Him. "If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not, and it *shall* be given him."

One asks, "Does it pay to have church schools?" Why certainly it pays; it always pays to obey God. But do you wish something that you can look at as an answer? We have it for you. One brother says, "My older children are all worldly, are not Christians at all; the church school came to us just in time for the younger ones. They are Christians today though by nature they are no better than the older ones."

In another family the oldest child says her conversion and the fact that she is a Christian today is due entirely to the influences of a Christian school. The younger members of the family have not had the privileges of the church school and they have gone to the world.

Nearly all our church school children are converted and become church members; the instruction they receive prepares them for this.

"When heavenly intelligences see that men are no longer permitted to present the truth, the Spirit of God will come upon the children, and they will do a work in the proclamation of the truth which the older workers can not do because their way will be hedged up. Our church schools are ordained by God to prepare the children for this great work." These are solemn, and at the same time encouraging words.

Only half the Seventh-day Adventist children and young people in West Michigan are receiving a Christian education. Is it not time we take steps to change this? God is calling. How shall we answer?

West Michigan has enough teachers this year to make it possible to start several new church schools. What church or family will answer, "Send us a teacher"?

It Can Be Done
