Come to Camp Meeting

Pray for the Tent Meetings

Four series of tent meetings are being held in Chicago and two others in Northern Illinois. In each of the other conferences several tents are pitched and meetings are held from five to eight times a week. At some of these tents the interest is first-class, at others it is very small. The present political unrest and war, if advertised plainly but without sensation, will be a great help in the meetings. It will also be an excellent time to show up the fallacy of the "Millennial Dawn." In the Russian revolution some years ago, one day of the St. Petersburg

massacres was called "Black Friday." On that very day while thousands were being killed in the streets a band of people met in a room on the third floor to study the prophecies. One man said: "The Adventists are right. What they have told us about the signs is true"; and in that meeting with no minister present, our large church of that city was born.

In some conferences the camp meetings were held early to permit the tent meetings to continue through the summer. In other conferences some tents will have to be taken down because of the annual encampment. I fear that this will cause great loss of precious souls. Tent meetings are an excellent means to reach the people. They are not old-fashioned and out of date, nor is a stereopticon machine or a cooking school absolutely essential to their success. These things are very good as a help. But nothing gives success like the definite, powerful, spirit-filled preaching of the third angel's message. To conduct a progressive and stirring tent effort is hard work. Both the ministers and the Bible workers are under a strain all the time. They must agonize for souls. They must make the singing count. They must sell and distribute a lot of books and tracts. Several times each week the people must be invited, yes urged, to buy reading matter on the subjects presented. They must advertise. They must take up collections. And above all they must search out the interested, read and pray with every one that is willing to study. They must always have one eye on the opposers—and if necessary defend the truth in a public debate. No one without a recent experience knows what all this means. We ought to remember these tent meetings in our prayers. Daily we should ask the Lord to make His faithful servants mighty in the scriptures and give them an abundant harvest of souls. God grant that thousands of people may be lead to the light this year in our Union. L. H. CHRISTIAN

If we have sinned in this matter, God is faithful and just to forgive the truly penitent. But He enjoins us to sin no more. See Exod. 34:6, 7; 1 Jno. 1:9; John 5:14.

Northern Illinois Camp Meeting

September 3-14

The conference committee has decided to hold this most important meeting at Downers Grove. Officials of the city have been very kind and accommodating, and offer to assist us in every way possible. We have received the grounds free of charge. It is elevated and has porous soil, so that no one need fear any

dampness from beneath. There will be no need of flooring the tents, except for those who are sickly. City water is connected with the grounds. It will be partially lighted by electric lights and the remainder of the grounds will be lighted by our own lights, carbo-hydrion lights.

Downers Grove is twenty miles west of Chicago on the C. B. and Q. Railroad, and the same distance east of Aurora on the same line.

We shall have efficient help at the camp meeting. A letter from Elder L. H. Christian informs us that arrangements have been made with the North American Conference to supply the help of Profs. F. R. Griggs and M. E. Kern; besides these Elders L. H. Christian, O. A. Olsen, F. W. Paap, E. A. Bristol, Professors O. J. Graf, C. A. Russell, J. G. Lamson, Drs. F. J. Otis, David Paulson, and Estella Norman, besides our own conference workers. We are looking forward to and earnestly praying for the best camp meeting we have ever had, on account of God's presence and the manifestations of His spirit.

I am sure every heart is stirred and awakened by the war in Europe. It looks like a foretaste of what the times of the great battle of Armageddon will be. The war spirit has broken out in such a short time and in such a fierce manner that it has startled every nation and student of prophecy.

We are looking forward to the largest gathering we have ever had. No pains will be spared to make the camp as comfortable as possible. Tents may be ordered from the tract society, and it will be necessary to order them immediately, for our calls are larger than our number of tents. We shall have to rent tents to supply the demand. Tents will be \$3 for the entire time. Bed springs will be sixty-five cents, flooring of tents will be about \$2. This, however, is not fully settled.

To reach the grounds from Chicago, come on the suburbans or locals; from Aurora the same. The C. B. & Q. Railroad leaves the Union Station in Chicago, corner of Adams and Canal Sts.

Meals will be served on the camp ground on the cafeteria plan. There will also be a counter where cooked foods will be sold at a moderate price. Bring your dishes and you can serve meals in your own tents. As usual there will be a grocery tent on the grounds. COME, bringing God's blessing with you.
