# August 5

At the recent session of the Lake Union Conference it was voted that the Educational Sabbaths be faithfully observed in all our churches. August 5 is the next date for this special service. Suggestive programs will be furnished, and we hope every church will enter into the spirit of the occasion and be richly benefited thereby.

A recent article in the HERALD spoke of the demand for more and better trained teachers. This demand is increasing and will continue to grow as our churches become aroused upon the subject of training the children for a part in the finishing of the work instead of training them for the world. The world has enough young people to carry forward its work and to fight its battles; God has a higher standard for His children. These high ideals must be ever kept before them.

There are those among us to whom the Lord has en-

trusted means. Such could engage in no more fruitful missionary endeavor than to seek out some consecrated and talented young person and encourage that one in a tangible way to prepare for the noble work of the Christian teacher by taking a course in the normal department of Emmanuel Missionary College. Some are already doing this very thing, and are realizing a rich blessing in the doing of it. Send to the College for a calendar and note the strong work offered in this department. Where we have one normal trained teacher we should have ten.

We are able to see some of the fruits of our school work, but what can be said, what can be done, to enlarge the vision of some of our people? One of the educational superintendents in this union makes the statement that in that one local conference there are 30 churches with an average of 15 children of school age where no church school work is being carried forward.

Do we believe the Spirit of Prophecy? How can we say we do, and then utterly fail to carry out its instructions. And in some instances not be willing to give to the matter of establishing a church school careful and prayerful consideration.

Let us hope and pray that as a result of this special educational program our eyes may be opened that we can see our duty, and having seen, be strong in the Lord to walk in its path. I believe God has a teacher somewhere already in the harness, or in training, or waiting for encouragement to enter into training to answer every call.

The Missionary Volunteer program for that day will be upon the same subject. It seems eminently fitting that these two departments of our work which are set for the salvation of our children and youth should unite to make August 5 a red letter day in all our churches.

# Conference Proceedings

The following plans and resolutions were adopted by the conference:

Whereas the blessings of the Lord have been seen in the work of our conference during the past year in bringing many souls to an acceptance of the truth, in preserving the lives of our laborers, in granting peace and prosperity within our borders, and in greatly prospering us financially; therefore,—

1. Resolved, That we, assembled in this conference, express our gratitude to God for these mercies, and consecrate ourselves to Him for service that the work may be speedily finished.

Whereas a great temperance movement has been launched in this State, and is being carried forward under the motto, "Make Michigan Dry;" be it

- 2. Resolved, That we, the delegates to the 14th session of the East Michigan Conference of Seventh-day Adventists, now being held in the City of Saginaw, hereby express our intense interest in the movement, and pledge our loyalty by doing all in our power, by voice and pen and vote, to drive the great destroyer from our commonwealth.
- 3. Resolved, That we continue to protest against the enactment of laws by Congress for the abridgement of free speech, a free press, and the freedom of the mails beyond existing statutes.

Whereas the *Liberty* Magazine is doing a very effective work among state legislatures, executive officers, and judges of state supreme courts in molding sentiment against religious legislation and the enforcement of Sunday laws; therefore,—

- 4. Resolved, That our conference continue to share in supplying the Liberty Magazine to the members of the state legislature, the govenor and his cabinet, and the state supreme and circuit court judges, and that the necessary expense involved in this item be taken out of the annual collection for the local religious liberty work.
- 5. Resolved, That we express our appreciation of the weekly visits of the Review and Herald and make an earnest effort to place it in every Sabbath keeping home in our conference.
- 6. Resolved, That we endeavor to make the LAKE UNION HERALD all it should be to our field;
- (a) By encouraging all our people to subscribe for it, and
  - (b) By urging all our workers to report items of in-

terest concerning their work, at least once a month. In harmony with the recommendation of the fall council of the North American Division, and the Lake Union Conference at its last session.

- 7. We recommend, That our conference session be held biennial.
- 8. Resolved, That we express our appreciation of the work of our faithful colporteurs, and by words and deeds cooperate with them, and encourage others to join their ranks.

Whereas the plan of paying two per cent of our income into a fund for the meeting of such expenses of the conference as cannot properly be paid out of the tithe has been blessed of the Lord; and,

Whereas these expenses continue to arise; therefore—

9. We recommend, The continuance of this plan, and that we renew our efforts to encourage every member to be faithful in paying it.

Whereas the Harvest Ingathering for missions has proved a great blessing in acquainting the world with this great movement, and in raising funds with which to extend the work; therefore,—

10. Resolved, That we undertake to raise \$3,500 during 1916, and that each conference worker devote at least one week of his time to this work, and that we urge all our people to unite with him in doing the same

Whereas the Home Missionary Department has been organized for the purpose of enlisting every church member in active missionary efforts that the work may be speedily finished; we therefore,—

11. Recommend, That this conference choose a secretary to promote and foster this work in the churches, and unite with other conference workers in organizing each church and company for definite lines of service.

Whereas the third angel's message is fast closing, and the end will soon be reached, at which time God's work and institutions, as well as His people, must have no unfulfilled obligations financial or otherwise; and,

Whereas there is a general movement among our people to remove the stigma of debt that has rested upon our institutions; therefore,—

12. Resolved, That we reaffirm our approval of the policy of a cash basis for our work. By this is meant that individuals send cash with orders, and that recognized laborers and societies remit monthly for all supplies, and that the tract society conduct its work in harmony with this policy.

Whereas our conference laborers can be of great assistance in the carrying out of the above resolutions; therefore,—

13. We recommend, That by precept and example they encourage our people, individuals and societies, to carry out at their homes, the spirit of the resolutions they pass here in conference, teaching, as they meet with churches and companies, from both the Bible and the "Testimonies," the importance of economy and the prompt discharge of all obligations, not only among ourselves and institutions, but also with the world.

Whereas our Sabbath school teachers need the best possible training for their God-given work, and in order that our people may get a new visison of their privileges as members of the Sabbath school; therefore,—

- 14. We recommend, That all workers, and prospective workers in this line, avail themselves of the excellent help provided by the Sabbath school department of the General Conference in the Training Course.
- 15. We further recommend, That all officers and teachers study to make every member of their schools a working member, that they encourage the daily study of the Sabbath school lessons, and that they do all in their power by way of personal work for the salvation of every pupil.

Whereas the foreign mission fields are now, in this time of dire warfare, more than ever before dependent upon the spiritual and financial support from the North American Division Conference; therefore,—

16. We recommend, that the Sabbath schools raise fifteen cents a week per member in order that the conference may be successful in raising its twenty cents or more per week.

Whereas foreign mission study has been successfully used to promote this end; therefore,—

17. We recommend, That more time be given to the same in our Sabbath school programs.

Whereas the Spirit of Prophecy has urged us to enter our large cities with strong aggressive efforts, and to put our work on a basis which will give it the recognition which it deserves; and,

Whereas in the City of Detroit many of our people are worshipping in rented halls, and have no suitable place in which to conduct their schools, and since they have already taken steps to erect a building by pledging themselves to raise \$5,000 for this purpose; therefore,—

18. Resolved, That we as a conference encourage and assist them in this enterprise by raising the sum of \$2,500 in the conference, and that we urge them to take immediate steps to further this effort.

Whereas the Iowa Conference, through the North American Division Conference, has requested the East Michigan Conference to release Elder A. F. French for work in that conference; and,

Whereas Elder French has expressed a willingness to go; we therefore,—

19. *Recommend*, That the conference committee reply favorably to this request.

Whereas we are informed by the President of the North American Division Conference that Elder N. V. Willess of the Georgia Conference desires to have work in a northern conference on account of ill health in the southern climate; and,

Whereas this brother has been recommended to us as a valuable laborer; we therefore,—

20. Recommend, That the conference committee extend to Elder Willess an invitation to come to this conference to labor.

In view of the great temptations that beset our youth while attending the schools of the world,—

- 21. We recommend, (a) That there be a more general observance among our churches of the two educational Sabbaths set apart by the General Conference.
- (b) That a deeper interest be manifested in the schools already established, and that only encouraging words be given to those bearing these burdens.

- (c) That inasmuch as the mid-winter institute has become a permanent and potent factor in building up the primary work in this conference, we urge every church having a school to send a delegate from its sohool board along with its teacher.
- (d) That in the sense of this conference it is the duty of every worker to so acquaint himself with the principles of Christian education that he can give an intelligent study on this theme in the churches that he may visit, and that in every church he visits he endeavor to meet all the young people of school age and urge them to enter our own schools.

Whereas the Morning Watch has proved a source of spiritual uplift to our young people who have faithfully observed the same; therefore,—

- 22. We recommend, That the plan be extended to include all our people.
- 23. We recommend, That our workers and other leaders thoroughly acquaint themselves with the plans of work carried on by our Missionary Volunteer societies with a view of encouraging the members in reaching the following goals: Reading the Bible Through, the Standard of Attainment, the Reading Course, and Foreign Missions.

Whereas experience has taught that churches wishing to carry school work beyond the 8th grade are in need of much counsel in order that disappointment to the pupils or financial loss to the school shall not result; therefore,—

- 24. We recommend, That no church offer work beyond the 8th grade without first counselling the Educational Superintendent and the Union Secretary, and obtaining the approval of the conference executive committee.
- 25. We recommend, That the service on each fourth Sabbath in the month be given to the consideration of plans and methods for Home Missionary work by using the programs in the *Church Officer's Gazette*.

Whereas it has seemed good to the Lake Union Conference to form a new conference in the Northern part of Wisconsin, with an understanding that they might expect the North Michigan conference to cede a part of their territory to such a new conference; and,

Whereas the North Michigan Conference has asked the East Michigan Conference to cede to them Midland County in order that their territory may be self-supporting to a conference administration after parting with a part of theirs; and,

Whereas we are informed that the North Michigan Conference is making a similar request to the West Michigan Conference for some of its territory in case it parts with some of its former territory; we therefore,—

26. Recommend, That we grant the request of the North Michigan Conference for Midland County on condition that they do cede a part of theirs to the North Wisconsin Conference.

Realizing the great importance of a careful adherance to the health principles laid down by God for our protection and blessing in these last days when disease, suffering, and death are everywhere in the land; therefore,—

27. We recommend, That our people renew their interest in these health principles, and use simple rational treatments in preference to patent medicines and poisonous drugs.

Whereas our Sanitariums have been established in the providence of God for the treatment of the sick and the dissemination of health principles; and,

Whereas the Sanitarium for this conference is located at LaFayette, Indiana; therefore,—

- 28. We recommend, That our people patronize this institution and advise their relatives and friends to do likewise.
- 29. We recommend, That each family of Sabbath keepers supply themselves, as far as possible, with a full set of the "Testimonies," or at least Volumes six and nine.

In view of the many acts of kindness shown us by the people and business men of Saginaw, and by the newpapers of the city for their courtesy in publishing liberal reports of the proceedings of this conference, the city council for the use of Ezra Rust Park, the street car company for financial assistance, the Grinnell Brothers for the use of two splendid pianos, Mr. Charles Frueh for palms, and Mr. Carott for water pipes; therefore,—

30. Resolved, That we hereby express our appreciation for these favors, and request that this report be published in the newpapers of the city.

# **Conference Proceedings**

The thirteenth annual session of the Northern Illinois Conference was held at Sherwood Grove, Joliet, Ill., June 15-25, in connection with the annual camp meeting at that place. The first meeting was called to order at 9:15 A. M., Friday, June 16, with Elder W. A. Westworth, the president, presiding. Sixty-five delegates from the churches were present at this meeting and were given seats in the conference. Others arrived later making a total delegation of 136, representing 31 churches.

By vote of the delegates the conference committee was asked to appoint the standing committees for the conference. These committees as appointed were as follows:

Pastoral Committee: W. A. Westworth, T. F. Hubbard, Milton St. John.

Plans and Resolutions: J. B. Blosser, C. A. Russell, Edith Shepard, W. L. Avery, T. J. Tolf, E. R. Lauda, H. E. Moon, W. B. Forsyth, Louis Halswick.

Nominations: H. H. Todd, A. Christensen, L. E. Winslow, A. B. Morrical, E. W. Webster.

Credentials and Licenses: Adolph Johnson, Wm. Covert, W. D. Forde.

The Committee on Plans brought in several reports during the meeting and the following resolutions were adopted:

Whereas the Lord's hand has been seen in our work during the past year in giving us remarkable success in various lines of missionary activity, in prospering our institutional work, and blessing us in financial management; and,

Whereas His protecting power has been manifested in giving peace to our land and in preserving the lives of our workers and ministers; therefore,—

1. Resolved, That we hereby express our apppecia-

ation of His special blessing and care, and pledge ourselves to carry forward the work in full harmony with His will.

2. Resolved, That the sessions of this conference be held biennially instead of annually as heretofore.

Whereas there is need of broadening our educational work and extending its influence into the homes; therefore.—

3. We recommend, That an earnest effort be made to place the journal Christian Educator in the hands of our people; that we urge our people to procure and read "Counsels to Teachers, Parents, and Students"; that the educational Sabbaths be faithfully observed in all of our churches.

Whereas there is a great increasing need of trained teachers for our church schools; therefore,—

4. We recommend, That our ministery and the other leaders in our work be on the alert to recognize talent which could be developed along the lines of teaching, and seek to induce such individuals to take a course of training in the normal department of Emmanuel Missionary College.

Whereas there is greater need than ever before for separating our children from the schools of the world and placing them in schools of God's own planting; therefore,—

- 5. We recommend, That our churches where there are children of school age, give earnest and prayerful consideration to the question of providing for the Christian education of the lambs of the flock.
- 6. We urge our people to avail themselves of the opportunity offered by making a sacrifice if necessary to send to Fox River Academy the young people who are of proper age and grade to be placed in this school of God's planting.
- 7. Resolved, That we express our appreciation of the weekly visits of the Review and Herald, and that we make a special effort to place it in every Sabbath keeping family in the conference.
- 8. We further recommend, That an earnest effort be made to place the LAKE UNION HERALD in every family, and encourage our workers to report at least once a month items of interest concerning their work.

Realizing the need of a special fund in the conference to cover expenses that should not be paid from the tithe, and recognizing the practical benefit that has accrued in the past,

9. We earnestly recommend the two per cent plan to all our people.

Whereas "The advocates of temperance fail to do their whole duty unless they exert their influence by precept and example, by voice and pen and vote, in behalf of prohibition and total abstinence"; therefore,—

- 10. Resolved, That our people prepare for united and effective action whenever the opportunity is granted to vote against the liquor traffic, and that they be encouraged to circulate our splendid temperance literature upon this subject.
- 11. Resolved, That we place ourselves on record as favoring the national prohibition of the liquor traffic as the most effective measure for the elimination of this national curse.

Believing that the fundamental principles of civil and religious liberty are being seriously endangered it is; therefore,—

12. Resolved, That we continue to protest against the enactment of laws by Congress for the abridgment of free speech, a free press, and the freedom of the mails beyond existing statutes.

Whereas The *Liberty* Magazine is doing a very effective work among state legislators, executives officers, and judges of state supreme courts, in molding sentiment against religious legislation and the enforcement of Sunday laws; therefore,—

- 13. Resolved, That our conference continue to supply the Liberty Magazine to the members of the state legislature, the governor and his cabinet, and the state supreme and circuit court judges, and that the necessary expense involved in this item be taken out of the annual collection for the local religious liberty work; also.—
- 14. We recommend, That we put forth an effort at our camp meeting to get our people to subscribe for Liberty at the club rate of twenty cents per subscription, when ordered in clubs of five subscriptions to be sent to one address; or, at twenty-five cents per yearly suscription, in clubs orders of four or more subscriptions to one or more addresses.

Whereas God has greatly blessed the efforts put forth for our young people in their salvation and training in service; and,

Whereas there is imperative need of a great soul winning campaign for and by our youth; therefore,—

- 15. Resolved, (a) That all our workers and church officers make a special effort to inform themselves on Missionary Volunteer plans and methods, and to cooperate in every possible way with those who are appointed to lead out in this work.
- (b) We urge upon our workers, church officers, and parents the importance of encouraging our young people in taking up the different features of our Missionary Volunteer work, namely; The Morning Watch, reading the Bible through, Standard of Attainment, the Reading Courses, and the Mission Goal.

Whereas the circulation of our literature is ordained of the Lord to do a mighty work in preparing the world for the coming of Christ, and His blessing is being manifest in its prosecution; we therefore,—

16. Recommend, That our people do all they can to encourage these workers, by their words and prayers, and by making them welcome in their homes while engaged in this work.

Whereas the Home Missionary Department has been organized to enlist the cooperation of every Seventh-day Adventist in some line of missionary work in the spread of the third angel's message; therefore,—

- 17. We recommend, (a) That this conference, as soon as possible, appoint a Home Missionary Secretary who will devote his time to this work, and in cooperation with other workers organize each church and company for active service.
- (b) That the services on each fourth Sabbath in the month be given to the consideration of plans and methods of home missionary work by using the programs in the *Church Officer's Gazette*.
- (c) That each family of Sabbath keepers supply themselves with a set of the "Testimonies," especially volumes VI and IX, and undertake to read them this fall and winter.
  - 18. We recommend, That our conference laborers and

Sabbath school officers and teachers cooperate with the Sabbath school department in reaching the following goals:

All the church in the Sabbath school, and all the Sabbath school in the church; a Home Department for each school where isolated members are connected with the church; the holding of consecration services for the unconverted once a quarter; a daily study of the lesson; assisting to reach the third million dollar goal for missions by the close of 1916.

Realizing the results and blessings connected with the Harvest Ingathering campaign for missions,—

- 19. We therefore recommend, That our churches fully unite in this work, securing the cooperation of every member, and that they be encouraged to set a goal of not less than \$3 to be raised by each adult member.
- 20. We recommend, That the word "annual" in the first line of Section 2, line 5; Section 6, line 9; Section 9, of Article 5, and line 1 of Article 11, of the constitution be changed to "biennial."

At the sixth meeting of the conference the delegates received the report of the Committee on Nominations. This report elicted much interest, due to some changes in officers recommended by the committee. After a thorough consideration of the report the following officers were elected to serve during the next biennial term: President, J. H. Schilling; secretary and treasurer, Frank Hiner. Executive Committee: J. H. Schilling, Adolph Johnson, H. H. Todd, Frank Hiner, M. H. St. John, E. W. Webster, H. P. Buzzell. Secretary and treasurer of tract society, Frank Hiner; field missionary secretary, C. J. Tolf; Sabbath-school secretary, Edith Shepard; young peoples secretary, Edith Shepard; educational secretary, Edith Shepard.

I gave only two canvasses all day. All the rest took the book because of the recommendations of their friends. I found one lady who had 'Bible Readings' and had loaned it to her neighbors. I sold several books around there. I was very glad to find a home in which they had the old edition. The lady was much pleased with the book and recommended it to her neighbors. They gave me three orders. One lady said, 'I want that book no matter what denomination prints it. My boy goes to roller skating rinks and pool rooms, and I want him read it."

Brother Oscar Olson writes.—"Thursday everything looked blue, but I am beginning to go by faith and not by sight. I went aside where I could be alone with God for a while. I read from the 'Manual' and something seemed to say I was wasting my time and I ought to be out canvassing, but I felt my need of help. After reading and praying things looked different, and before noon I had twenty dollars' worth of orders and by night thirty-three dollars' worth. I praise God for His goodness. One lady I canvassed said, 'There was a man around here not long ago with a book something like that. He was a Seventhday Adventist, are you?' I told her I was and she asked, 'How is it that Seventh-day Adventists sell more books than other denominations?'

Who is it that scatters these books everywhere? It is men and women who have consecrated their lives to the colporteur work. This is one of God's mighty agents for the finishing of the work.

Edwin R. Thiele.—"I have had some interesting Wednesday morning the roads were experiences. very muddy when I started. I worked north to the northern edge of the county and then turned east. I had hardly gone a half a mile when I noticed I had lost my map. I retraced my steps and found it just a little beyond the corner where I turned. I picked it up and again turned to the east, but felt impressed I had lost that map for a purpose. The farther I went east the more impressed I was that I ought to have gone north. Finally I turned back and went north. I sold a book in the first house I came to, and two in the next, and hardly missed a house for the rest of the week. I sold two books at the Sunday school superintendent's home, and Friday a man to whom I had already sold a book told me that the Sunday school superintendent wanted me to bring him another book. This makes three at one house." This sounds unbelievable, yet it is the experience of one of our boys in Carroll County. Does it sound as though books cannot be sold? Brother Thiele took orders for sixtythree dollars' worth of books that week.
