Three Good Reasons

Very many of our people are studying the Harvest Ingathering work at the present time. Earnest prayers are ascending to the Lord from many homes and hearts for His blessing to rest on this enterprise. We desire to mention three valid reasons why every Seventh-day Adventist should engage in this excellent endeavor.

The Harvest Ingathering work is a strong factor in bringing God's message of truth to the world. Our Harvest Ingathering work in past years has led many people to accept the third angel's message. The Ingathering *Signs* for this year contain three strong articles on present-day events in the light of prophecy and the coming of the Lord.

The Harvest Ingathering brings a great blessing to those who engage in it. It gives them the victory in their own hearts. It helps them to confess Christ and His precious cause to their neighbors and friends.

The Harvest Ingathering also results in large mission offerings for the cause. Last year our mission treasury received over \$78,000 from this source. This was an increase of \$22,000 over the previous year. In this Union alone we raised above \$14,000 or \$6,000 more than during 1914.

The General Conference requested us to consider this subject in every church on Sabbath, September 23. We hope that every elder or leader brought this before his church at that time. It is very important that all our people take up this work.

The Call of the Women's Committee for the Ellen G. White Memorial Hospital

Considerable has appeared in print concerning the need for the Ellen G. White Memorial Hospital and the plans for raising the necessary funds, and although the appointment of an auxiliary secretary in the interests of the work in the Lake Union Conference has been very recent, there is heard in all directions gentle echoes of earnest and cooperative inquiry as to how the women of the Lake Union Conference are to accomplish their part. Some have already sent to the Union Conference treasurer contributions for this pur-

pose, and others are holding the money raised waiting for definite instructions as to how to proceed.

October 14 is the date set for the general collection for the Memorial Hospital throughout the North American Division. An effort will be made to reach every church and as many individual women in the churches as possible before that date with a letter and special literature regarding this important work. Do not, however, delay but begin at once to plan for your contribution on that day.

It is hoped that the total amount raised at that time will equal an average of \$2 for each sister of our constituency. While the plan of raising the specified amount-\$61,000, is unique in the fact that the women are carrying the responsibility of securing it, it is not to be understood that the men have no part in it. It is the work of the women to take the initiative in soliciting funds, and it is hoped that every man will respond liberally when the invitation is presented to him. However, dear sisters in the Lake Union, we want to make this offering, as far as possible, from our own personal sacrifice and effort, so that it will not in any way weaken the funds for missions or the response to calls for means which come in the regular channel. The cause of missions is all-important; but in raising money for the necessary hospital facilities for the Loma Linda College of Medical Evangelists you are making possible the all-round Christian education of Seventh-day Adventist physicians and medical missionaries, whose work in foreign lands is tenfold effective. So the work of the Women's Committee is in a sense fundamental.

There has ever been and ever will be an accurately fulfilled schedule in the carrying out of God's designs "To everything there is a season and a in the earth. time to every purpose under the heaven." So at this particular period of the history of God's cause the call comes to "establish a thoroughly equipped medical school, the graduates from which shall be able to take State Board examinations and become registered, qualified physicians." For the past twenty-five years great effort has been made to establish our educational work on its present solid and extensive basis. Have, you considered that in the North American Division we have five colleges and twenty-three academies, besides several seminaries, for the education and training of ministers, teachers, and other workers, but notone institution which can give the necessary training for efficient work in medical missionary lines?

"The *last* work to close among Seventh-day Adventists will be medical missionary work," we are told by the spirit of prophecy. The evangelistic work, the publishing work, the educational work along general lines have been thoroughly established and wonderful power and progress is apparent. As we enter upon the period of peril and persecution the Christian physician and medical missionary will be able to work longer unmolested than any other class of workers. Shall we not recognize the significance of the instruction to "provide that which is essential to qualify our youth who desire to be physicians"?

Let no one fail to give a lift at this time. If you do not have the money for this special October 14 collection, there are various ways in which money can be earned for this purpose. If you desire further information concerning this, or any other point connected with the call of the Women's Committee, write the undersigned, and your inquiry will receive careful attention. Conference Proceedings

The forty-third annual session of the Indiana Conference was held in connection with the annual camp meeting at Brookside Park, Indianapolis, Ind., August 24 to Sept. 3, 1916. Forty-seven churches were represented by one hundred three delegates. Nine meetings of the conference were held.

By vote of the delegates at the first meeting, the Conference Committee was authorized to appoint the standing committees. The following committees were appointed:

Nominations: C. M. Christiansen, J. H. Crandall, W. A. Greenlee, J. H. Talge, G. W. Rader.

Credentials and Licenses: W. A. Young, T. A. Goodwin, R. W. Hostetler, L. H. Christian, L. S. Wheeler.

Plans and Resolutions: J. G. Lamson, E. M. Fishell, Edith Shepard, Mrs. L. S. Wheeler, Professor C. A. Russell, J. B. Blosser, J. W. Mace, G. B. Thompson, R. C. Wirth, H. M. Kelly, W. J. Stone, R. B. Thurber, Mary Kent, Frank Dudley.

The Committee on Plans brought in the following resolutions which were adopted by the conference :

Whereas we have been favored with the blessings of our Heavenly Father in all departments of our work since we were last assembled in conference session; therefore,—

1. *Resolved*, That we in conference assembled hereby join in expressing our gratitude to God for His abundant mercy, and that we now reconsecrate ourselves to the work of the message, and unitedly implore His continual blessings for the coming year.

2. We recommend, That, in harmony with the council of the Division and Union conferences and the action of the other local conferences in this Union, the term of office of the officers of the Indiana Conference shall be two years instead of one, as heretofore, the annual camp meeting to be held as usual; and that the Constitution and By-laws be amended accordingly.

3. Whereas "The tithe is sacred, reserved by God for Himself," and

Whereas "There would be an abundant supply in the Lord's treasury if selfish hearts and hands had not withheld the tithes," or made use of it to support other lines of work, and

Whereas the Indiana Conference is prohibited from doing the aggressive work that must yet be done because of the dearth in the supply of funds; therefore,—

Resolved, That every conference worker and church officer be urged not only to personal faithfulness, but to devote time and energy to the instruction and encouragement of every member to pay a full tithe.

Whereas there are many necessary conference expenses that cannot properly be met from the tithe, and

Whereas a fair, equitable plan has been devised and adopted by this conference for meeting such demands; therefore.—

4. *Resolved*, That all our people be urged to contribute regularly two per cent of their income to the conference treasury.

Realizing that efficiency in service demands preparation; therefore,—

5. We recommend, (a) That our present and prospective Sabbath school officers and teachers more generally avail themselves of the opportunity afforded by the Sabbath School Worker's Training Course.

(b) That all Sabbath school officers and teachers study to become more earnest for the salvation of every pupil by observing Decision days and holding class meetings at regular seasons.

(c) Since our conference has not yet reached the "honor roll" designated by a fifteen cent average in the Sabbath school; therefore,—

Resolved, That it is our duty to make greater effort to reach the standard by setting a goal for our gifts to missions in each school.

Whereas the Lord has told us that this work can never be finished until every member of our churches rallies and unites with the leaders in giving this message; therefore,—

6. We recommend, That a well-organized effort be made by each church and company along the lines of effort outlined by the Home Missionary Department under the direction of a home missionary secretary.

Whereas the Lord has given this people light and guidance through the spirit of prophecy; therefore,—

7. We recommend, That all our people purchase and read a full set of these Testimonies, or at least volumes six to nine.

Whereas "The Lord has ordained that through the canvassing work the truth shall go to all parts of the world," and

Whereas His blessings have been with these workers during the past year; therefore,—

8. *Resolved*, That we extend to these self-supporting men and women our earnest cooperation and encourage many more to join their ranks, and that all recruits be recommended by the conference committee before entering upon their work.

Whereas the spirit of prophecy speaks concerning the union of the medical and evangelical work and Indiana has trained nurses for this work who are not engaged in active labor in Christ's service; therefore,—

9. We recommend, That the conference committee, as far as consistent, place at least one medical evangelist with every aggressive effort put forth.

Whereas the Beechwood Academy and sanitarium in this conference need careful and thorough study, and wise plans laid for adjusting the financial matters pertaining to them, and decisions as to their future location and existence; therefore,—

10. We recommend, That a special committee be chosen to be composed as follows: Twelve men be chosen by the conference committee, who, together with the sanitarium board and the conference committee and the Beechwood Academy board, shall have power to act upon the matters set forth in the preamble. The president of the conference shall be chairman of this committee, and further, we invite the Lake Union Conference Committee, and representatives of the North American Division Committiee to meet with this large committee.

Whereas the Harvest Ingathering for missions has proved a great blessing in arousing a missionary spirit in many of our churches, in making known to the world this great movement, and in raising funds with which to extend the work; therefore,—

11. We recommend, That by precept and example each conference worker and church elder encourage our people to devote as much time as possible to this work and make an earnest effort to reach our goal of \$2 per member.

Whereas the Division Conference has organized and is operating a Home Missionary Department, the work of which is to enlist the cooperation of every Seventh-day Adventist in some definite line of missionary work in the spread of the third angel's message; therefore,—

12. We recommend, That the Conference Committee appoint a Home Missionary Secretary to help organize our churches for missionary services when a suitable person can be found and as soon as circumstances will allow.

Whereas there is greater need than ever before for us to separate our children from the schools of the world and place them in schools of God's own planting; therefore,—

13. We recommend, That our churches where there are six or more children of school age give earnest and prayerful consideration to the question of providing for the Christian education of the lambs of the flock.

In view of the instructions that have come to us in the spirit of (prophecy concerning the organization of our young people,—

14. *Resolved*, That we encourage the organization of Missionary Volunteer Societies in our churches where there is a band of young people who are willing to organize for service; and that they be encouraged to reach a high standard in life by studying the Morning Watch, by reading the Bible through, by taking the Standard of Attainment, by following the Reading Course, and by raising their share for missions.

Whereas it has been necessary to make some material changes and repairs at Beechwood Academy for which the income of the school is not sufficient; therefore,—

15. We recommend, That this conference take immediate steps to raise the sum of \$400 for the present needs of the school.

16. *Resolved*, That we extend the thanks of this conference to the various newspapers in the city of Indianapolis, for their liberal attitude toward us in printing

the items of news furnished by our Publicity Committee; and that we also extend a vote of thanks to the Park Board of Indianapolis for their kindness in granting us the use of Brookside Park for our camp meeting.

Touching Incidents

These items came to me from the General Sabbath School Department. I pass them on hoping they may influence in deciding what *we* shall give to help the missionaries on their way, when we make our fourteenth Sabbath gift, September 30.

Miss Stella Parker, the Colorado Sabbath school secretary writes: "I have recently visited one of our mountain Sabbath schools, and there I heard a Thirteenth Sabbath Offering story that went straight to my heart. A family had accepted the truth last summer, and for weeks before March 25, they had been earning and saving their dollars for the Philippines, even the two little girls. The dollars were all safely 'salted down' as the mother put it, when, just three days before *the* day, fire came and burned the home to the ground. Practically nothing was saved, and the family purse containing a number of bills, and also the precious offering dollars, was lost. It was a hard, hard trial for these new believers. While hunting about in the ruins, a charred dime was found, and this was the only money possessed by the family when the Sabbath came. Yet their faith in God did not waver, and that dime was dopped in with the dollars at Sabbath school. God rewarded their faith, and later the purse was found in the ashes with the bills intact. I traded with the treasurer for that dime, and every time I look at it, I am inspired. And wherever I go I shall take it and tell the history of its life to other boys and girls. Someway I can not get away from the picture of those little girls, digging around in the ruins for their toys, and for the dollars they had earned, and then finding the dime,—then their happiness over having even that much to give!"

A girl in school was planning to go home for her vacation, but having no money for her Thirteenth Sabbath offering for China, she consecrated herself to the Lord for that field, if He should call her to go at any time. She then wrote to her father to give the \$8.35 for her to visit home, for his offering, and she would remain at school until it should close.

In a California Sabbath school, the children went without one meal a week to get money for their Thirteenth Sabbath offering. The parents gave the children ten cents for each meal they missed.

Two little boys took their pet puppies to the market and sold them to get their Thirteenth Sabbath offering. What are we going to do?

Field Notes

Five student colporteurs were successful in earning scholarships in North Michigan this summer. They are Misses Aurora and Alva Wearner, Misses Annie and Freda Swenson, from the Broadview Swedish Seminary, who worked in the Upper Peninsula; and C. B. Courville, who is attending Emmanuel Missionary College this year. Miss Aurora Wearner sold more than enough for three scholarships. This demonstrates that books can be sold in North Michigan successfully, even by young ladies, and no one need hesitate to enter the work for fear of not making a living, for the Lord will bless the faithful efforts of the colporteur.

We would like to correspond with twenty-five prospective colporteurs who feel that the Lord is calling them to this important work. We have already made arrangements with three new workers who will enter the vineyard in a few days. They are Brethren L. J. Macomber, Jack Mitchell, and Oscar Burt. Brother or sister, you who read these lines, is the Lord calling you to enter the ripened harvest field? It will take all to finish the work, and now is the opportune time. The following extract from a letter just received by Brother Keiser shows how the Spirit is watering the seed sown by the colporteur:

"Last month I purchased the book, 'Daniel and the Revelation' for three dollars from your agent, Annie Swenson. Since reading the same I have been much impressed by the skillful and interesting way in which the subject is handled, and should like to purchase a half dozen copies more or less, to distribute among my friends and relatives.

"However, I cannot afford to pay three dollars a piece, which I paid for my copy. Cannot you furnish them in quantity? Please advise me of this matter as soon as possible."

Opening of the College

The College year began September thirteen, under the most favorable conditions in the history of its present establishment.

A large number of earnest students were present at the opening. They come from the four states bordering on Lake Michigan. One hundred ninety-six matriculated on the first day. This is twenty-one

more than the number starting the same time last year. At the present writing, two hundred thirty-three have enrolled against two hundred nine of one year ago.

The dormitories are filled to overflowing. North Hall, the young men's dormitory, is inadequate for housing all the young men. The two other buildings, used for this purpose also, are Brook Nook and East Hall. There are now fifty-six young men and seventythree young women in the home. More are expected soon. All the chapel seats are taken, but a shipment of chairs is expected to relieve the situation soon.

Mr. O. P. Wilson, a normal graduate of last year, lately arrived to take up the work of teaching in the Training School. He will have the sixth, seventh, and eighth grades.

Prof. and Mrs. M. L. Kelly of Mt. Vernon, Ohio, where they taught successfully in the commercial department of Mt. Vernon Academy, have charge of the commercial work.

Elder L. H. Christian was with us over the first Sabbath. On the evening of the sixteenth the annual reception was given in the College chapel. The students were welcomed with appropriate words from President Graf.

The grounds have been well cared for the past summer, and despite the dry weather there is a good growth of grass. One of the features is an oval bed directly in front of the College building. In it are figured the initials E. M. C. The grapes are being picked and sent to market. The corn crop on the forty acres planted last spring seems to be very promising.
