The Call of the Hour

These words express our gratitude to God for His help here in the Northern Illinois Conference. We are glad to say that our work is onward. The Lord is with us to guide and direct His work to success. What rejoices us the most is the hearty cooperation of our people. They certainly are all of one mind and have one purpose, and that is to do their utmost to advance the cause of God in their respective locations. There is a strong spirit of consecration and missionary activity taking hold of our people; also a very healthy growth and interest for our educational work.

Our field secretaries are doing their utmost to have their respective departments show a strong gain from month to month. The Sabbath school department, which is of course the oldest department among us, is making excellent advancement along the lines of consecration and support of foreign missions. From reports that have already come in, we feel sure that the last thirteenth Sabbath offering was the best one. Our Sabbath schools are trying to keep up their goal of fifteen cents per capita per week for foreign missions.

As far as the present enthusiasm in the Sabbath school work is concerned, we believe that most of the schools will keep up to their goal. As intimated above, there is a spirit of deep consecration manifesting itself. The ominous events that are transpiring in the world are stirring our dear people. They know that if there ever was a time for consecration it is now. May God help that this consecration may be deep and lasting.

The educational work is also very gratifying. Plans are being laid for three or four more church schools next year and we certainly hope that this may be realized. There are many of our young people yet in the schools of the world. If we can get at it in the right way and in the fear and faith of God, we shall get them away from their worldly training and place them under teachers who will train them for eternity. May the Spirit of God help our brethren everywhere to see the necessity for this and help them to cooperate with our educational secretary in accomplishing what God would have us accomplish in educational lines. Our home missionary and colporteur work is also growing. A great deal is done by the churches in distributing the *Present Truth* series.

There is also a small army of magazine workers preparing for service. We believe that in a conference like ours, with a city like Chicago in our midst, we should have at least fifty to seventy-five strong and continuous magazine workers. In fact, we do not only believe that we should have that many, but believe that we shall have them in a very short time.

Chicago affords ample opportunity for such workers who can kill two birds with one stone; that is they can earn enough to support themselves and at the same time disseminate the truth. May God help us in this work, especially.

Our list of colporteurs is also growing. The prospects are that we shall have the largest number of colporteurs in the field this year that we have ever had.

Our efforts here in the city are bearing fruit. A number have been baptized of late by the various ministers. Notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather last night, we had a very good congregation at Willard Hall. A very strong sermon was delivered on the "Change of the Sabbath" which no doubt convinced every Sunday keeper who was present that he was worshipping the beast rather than God. How many souls we shall win in this effort we cannot tell. God only knows, but one thing we do know that we are giving Chicago's best people the chance of hearing the truth, which we could not do if we were having meetings somewhere in a small storeroom. So, taking our work as a whole, we have reason to rejoice and be exceeding glad and to have His praise continually in our mouth, and to have our soul make her boast in the Lord, so that all the humble shall hear thereof and be glad. Our hearts say, "O magnify the Lord with me and let us exalt His name together."

Colored Work at Springfield

A review of the Reading Course was given by different ones. Surely every teacher could extend a vote of thanks to the General Department for selecting such helpful and interesting books.

Thursday morning, we listened with interest to Professor Lamson as he told of many little ways to successfully cope with the boy problem. Mrs. Lamson gave us a little insight into her work and problems with the girls.

In the afternoon, Elder Westworth emphasized the importance of the teachers and the state department standing together. In no other way can the standard of work be raised and the length of school term be increased. It is to be hoped, and worked for, that all our schools follow the plans of the General Department. "In union there is strength."

In the evening, we listened to a stirring address by Professor Lamson on "The Holding of the Four Winds." As teachers, we felt that we could not do too much in preparing both ourselves and our pupils to meet the trying scenes that are just before us.

Friday was Miss Kellogg's day. Every teacher carried home a well-filled note book of very practical suggestions that were given. Still she declared that more had been left unsaid than was said, and we began to hope for a year's study under her in order to gain the rest.
