# Some Predictions Fulfilled

In the Review of Feb. 17, 1890, Sister White wrote as follows: "The Lord will arise to shake terribly the earth. We will see troubles on all sides. Thousands of ships will be whirled into the depths of the sea. Navies will go down and human lives will be sacrificed by the millions. Fires will break out unexpectedly and no human effort will be able to quench them. The palaces of the earth will be swept away in flames. Disasters by rail will become more and more frequent. Confusion, collision and death without a moment's warning will occur on the great lines of travel. The end is near, probation is closing."

In the Signs of the Times of April 21 that same year this quotation occurs in an article by Sister White entitled "The Danger of Skepticism In Our Youth": "We have an individual work to do to prepare for the great events that are before us. The youth should seek God more earnestly. The tempest is coming, and we must get ready for its fury, by having repentance toward God, and faith toward our Lord Jesus Christ. The Lord will arise to shake terribly the earth. We shall see troubles on all sides. Thousands of ships will be hurled into the depths of the sea. Navies will go down, and human lives will be sacrificed by millions. Fires will break out unexpectedly, and no human effort

will be able to quench them. The palaces of earth will be swept away in the fury of flames; disasters by rail will become more and more frequent, confusion, collision and death without a moment's warning will occur on the great lines of travel. The end is near; probation is closing. O let us seek God while He may be found, and call upon Him while He is near! The prophet says: 'Seek ye the Lord, all ye meek of the earth, which have wrought His judgments; seek righteousness, seek meekness: it may be ye shall be hid in the day of the Lord's anger.'"

How vividly these words from the Spirit of Prophecy are being fulfilled right before our eyes. Human lives have literally been "sacrificed by the millions." Each week and almost every day brings its reports of ships hurled into the deep in the "frightfulness" of the "ruthless" submarine warfare. Already 2,000 ships with a tonnage of more than 4,000,000 have been lost. And for three years the world has expectantly looked for some navy of the belligerent to be destroyed in the great sea battle of this war. The airships drop bombs, the traitors and spies, even in our country, plant dynamite, and fires do break out suddenly causing the death of hundreds. The Lord wants His people to understand the meaning of these events. It is certainly time to be sober minded and to seek God. Should not these things appeal to our youth? While thousands are drafted into the war our young men and women should volunteer for God, enter our schools and prepare for service. L. H. CHRISTIAN

#### "Others May; You Cannot"

"If God has called you to be really like Jesus, he will draw you into a life of crucifixion and humility, and put upon you such demands of obedience that you will not be able to follow other people or measure yourself by other Christians, and in many ways he will seem to let other good people do things which he will not let you do.

"Other Christians and ministers, who seem very religious and useful, may push themselves, pull wires and work schemes to carry out their plans, but you connot do it; and if you attempt it, you will meet with such failure and rebuke from the Lord as to make you sorely penitent.

"Others may boast of themselves, of their work, of their success, of their writings, but the Holy Spirit will not allow you to do any such thing, and if you begin it, He will lead you into some deep mortification, that will make you despise yourself and all your good works.

"Others may be allowed to succeed in making money, or may have a legacy left them; but it is likely God will keep you poor, because He wants you to have something far better than gold; namely a helpless dependence on Him, that He may have the privilege of

supplying your needs day by day out of an unseen treasury.

"The Lord may let others be honored and put forward and keep you hidden in obscurity, because He wants to produce some choice fragrant fruit for His coming glory, which can only be produced in the shade. He may let others be great, but keep you small. He may let others do a work for Him and get the credit for it; but He may make you work and toil without knowing how much you are doing; and then to make your work still more precious, He may let others get the credit for the work which you have done, and thus make your reward ten times greater when Jesus comes.

"The Holy Spirit will put a strict watch over you with a jealous love and will rebuke you for little words and feelings, or for wasting your time, which other Christians never seem distressed over. So make up your mind that God is an infinite Soverign, and has a right to do as He pleases with His own. He may not explain to you a thousand things which puzzle your reasons in His dealings with you, but if you absolutely sell yourself to be His love slave, He will wrap you up in a jealous love, and bestow upon you many blessings which come to those only who are in the inner circle.

"Settle it forever, then, that you are to deal directly with the Holy Spirit, and that He is to have the privilege of tying your tongue, or chaining your hand or closing your eyes in ways that He does not seem to use with others. Now when you are so possessed with the living God that you are, in your secret heart, pleased and delighted over this peculiar, personal, private, jealous guardianship and management of the Holy Spirit over your life, you will have found the vestibule of heaven."

# Organizing Our Resources to Finish the Work

Since it is a fact that "The work of God on this earth can never be finished until the men and women comprising our church membership rally to the work, and unite their efforts with those of ministers and and church officers" (Testimonies for the Church, Vol. IX p. 117); and that "Were every one of you a living missionary, the message for this time would speedily be proclaimed in all countries, to every people and nation and tongue" (Id. Vol. VI., p. 438); and furthermore, seeing the solemn statement is made that, "There will be no idler, no slothful one, found inside the kingdom of heaven" (Id., 434); and that the world is breaking to pieces before our eyes and millions of souls must soon face their Creator in judgment, is it not high time to awake out of sleep, consecrate our lives, which means literally to fill our hands with service for God and men (1 Chro. 29:5, margin); organize our forces more thoroughly, buckle on the armor, and go to work in a systematic, conscientious and faithful manner?

It will no doubt be conceded by the reader that the work called for is a stupendous task, seldom, if ever, equaled in the annals of the church, and one that will call for the use of every resource at its command.

Do we not find a parallel in the most desperate

struggle for victory and mastery, that is now being waged by seventeen nations of the earth? And may we not learn a lesson in the conduct of our spiritual warfare of this time, from the nations of earth? We read that the men of this world are wiser in their generation than the church is.

As we view the situation among the warring powers we are forced to the conclusion that thorough organization is one of the chief, if not the chief element sought for by each contending faction. All personal rights have been brushed aside in a determined effort to let nothing interfere with it. Every man and resource are at the command of the leaders, to be used wherever and whenever they think best. The most cherished and holy relations of life are ruthlessly torn asunder that victory may be assured.

We would not infer by this that the work of God can be conducted to such extremes, neither would we seem to teach that organization can take the place of the spirit of God, but we do think it is plain that we can not hope to successfully prosecute this tremendous task to a successful conclusion without a much more perfect and thorough organization of all our forces.

At the time of the exodus a very perfect organization was perfected of all the hosts of Israel. When the boundaries of the Judean kingdom were the farthest extended, it was under the guidance of that wonderful organizer, King David, and when the people of God were the most hopelessly persecuted and their cause the most forlorn, was, when there was no central authority and utter lack of organization, viz., in the days of the Judges. Therefore how appropriate the counsel that has been given us in the following. "The end is near! God calls upon the church to set in order the things that REMAIN." (An Appeal to Our Church, p. 19.

The work of the third angel's message is very well organized from the General Conference down, until the local church is reached, then the system becomes very weak. Very little attention has yet been given to some very essential features. In some cases very little effort is made to organize the territory; no regular meetings conducted in a manner calculated to bring results, are held; the matter of reporting is very feebly prosecuted, and oftentimes valuable letters and readings sent to the leaders by the conference office and department secretaries, are not even read before the congregations.

The enemy is well pleased to have it thus. He does not tremble with fear at such a lack of care, system and cooperation; but no doubt is instead well pleased, knowing that his kingdom is not in much danger, and the believers are not courageous and very sure of eternal life. We are solemnly warned in the following language. "Brethren, if you continue to be as idle, as worldly, as selfish, as you have been, God will surely pass you by, and take those who are less selfcaring, less ambitious for worldly honor, and will not hesitate to go, as did their Master, without the camp, bearing the reproach." (Testimonies for the Church, Vol. V, p 461).

"We can never be saved in inactivity. To be an idler in the Lord's vineyard is to relinquish all title to the reward of the righteous." (Id., Vol IV p. 523.)

If we are weak in this matter of organized, cooperative effort, is it not logical and necessary that we begin the work, from the material side, by organizing our forces thoroughly, and actively cooperate with the conference officers in the future? I have seen small cottages built on a foundation of wooden blocks or posts, but when a skyscraper is built several months of time and hundreds of thousands of dollars are needed to lay a foundation that can be be relied on to to hold up the structure. So in this mighty undertaking we must lay a firm, deep, and strong foundation, that will not fail.

# Special Attention

At our recent camp meeting three resolutions were adopted which I hope every believer in the South Wisconsin Conference will support and endorse, viz:

"1. Whereas, We are living in a very solemn time when prices, wages, and the cost of living are increasing, and whereas, times bid fair to become still darker and harder, therefore

"Be it resolved, That, claiming God's promise and blessing, we pledge ourselves to greater faithfulness in tithes and offerings."

The discussion on this resolution gave evidence that there are those in this conference who fall short in this important obligation. Surely this condition must not continue. Let those who thus hinder the spread of the gospel by withholding their tithes and offerings, change and give that which is holy unto the Lord.

The second resolution is,—

"2. Be it resolved, That we set our goal to lift our entire remaining conference indebtedness this year."

The entire indebtedness amounts to \$10,500. There

is no more opportune time to liquidate this debt than this year of prosperity. There are those who can help to remove this indebtedness by donating as much as \$500; others \$100, and still others less and perhaps others more. Be it small or be it much, let us all help and see how this mountain will melt away.

The third question is,—

"3. Be it resolved, That we instruct and urge all our brethren to pay a faithful two per cent."

This is a two per cent of all our income, which fund will meet the financial necessity of the entire conference. It will buy all our tents and camp meeting equipment, and every other expense that does not legitimately come under the tithe fund. Coming to this conference I learned of this splendid method for the raising of the tent fund, etc. I am converted to the plan and have paid my first two per cent. I hope all will become converted to the system for it is a simple and systematic method.
