### The Earthquake at Loma Linda

Yesterday at the Loma Linda Sanitarium we experienced a severe earthquake shock and as these things are premonitions of the Lord's soon coming, I will go into some of the details.

About 3:30 P. M., while most of the Sanitarium family were at Los Angeles attending the dedication of the Ellen G. White Memorial Hospital, the earth began to quake violently. Those who were in the San Francisco quake say that the shock here was fully as severe as that. If the buildings had been brick they surely would have been in complete ruin. I was in the college building at the time. It rocked so violently that it was impossible to get out. One could not walk without being thrown this way or that. Those who were outside said that the tops of the buildings swayed six feet and the sides went in and out like the sides of an accordion.

The quake lasted about twenty-five seconds and when it had subsided I rushed upstairs to find the chemistry laboratory full of fumes of the spilled chemicals. The floor was covered with the broken bottles and streams of chemicals ran here and there. Hundreds of jars containing specimens were broken and expensive pieces of apparatus thrown down.

After getting the windows open and running water on the floor to dilute the chemicals we went to the Sanitarium. Some of the patients had fainted, others were praying, and one was severely injured. The chimney came crashing down breaking through the roof and into her room falling on the bed in which she was lying. The iron bed was broken in two and the patient's body nearly covered with a large mass of bricks and debris but almost miracuously she escaped with a broken leg and several severe cuts and bruises. She suffered also from the severe shock but is now improving. Two others were injured by falling bricks. The plaster is off the walls everywhere, and supporting pillars are twisted.

During the shock the whole hill seemed to be jelly under our feet.

Surely the word of the Lord is being fulfilled,—earthquake, fire and flood, confusion and collision, with war and bloodshed everywhere. Now is the time for confession of sins and deep heart searchings. The judgments of God are surely abroad in the land,

Doubtless in the Lake Union—perhaps at the Wabash Valley Sanitarium—He will permit destruction to come that even though we may suffer some property damage we will awake to the fact that we are in the midst of the time of trouble which can only deepen until Jesus comes. Let us confess our sins, making thorough work of repentance and self humiliation, drawing close together in brotherly love that such warnings may not be necessary.

The first is divided into three parts with a leader over each division. Each of these divisions has a nearby town for territory which they visit every two weeks with Present Truth. Two hundred fifty of the papers are being used on each trip. So far two of these companies have covered their territory, one having gone twice and the other once. A number of good experiencs have resulted so far. One family was found who had heard an Adventist sermon about three years ago and had been reading their Bible since and were convinced of the Sabbath and desired to get in touch with our people. Several good talks were had with interested ones and some asked if they could subscribe for the little paper. The Lord is blessing in this effort and we are confident that it will result in more than one soul in Christ's kingdom.

The correspondence band has had but one meeting. They plan to do much of their work at home but will meet once in two weeks to pray together, to study plans and compare results. A club of Signs of the Times was raised by the church for the use of this band. At their next meeting they will start with their active work.

I am sure such efforts are pleasing to God and are in harmony with the instruction He has given us. These are lines of work that every church can carry on, and really it is just such systematic work that is needed today. What is your church doing for its neighbors? Why not follow this worthy example of the Cedar Lake church.
