

PRIEST FOUND GUILTY OF SAYING MASS

Father Joseph E. Gedra, a 71-year-old Roman Catholic priest, was found guilty in early November by a Fairfax County, Virginia, court of violating a county ordinance restricting the use of homes in residentially zoned areas. His crime? Holding a Latin mass. Father Gedra was fined \$50 by the four-man, one-woman jury. Counsel for the county claimed that the ordinance was valid in that it sought to limit traffic congestion in noncommercial areas, while Father Gedra's attorneys argued the law was a restriction of the free exercise of religion. His laywers plan to appeal to the Virginia Supreme Court.

NEW ASSISTANT DIRECTOR JOINS FAITH FOR TODAY

Recently appointed assistant director of FFT programming is Gary Haynes. He will be working with Director Don Dick on the production of Faith for Today episodes. Among the organizations Haynes has been affilliated with are the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences, Information Film Producers of America, Society of Motion Picture and Television Engineers, and Fellowship of Christians in the Arts. Haynes has acted professionally for six years on the New York stage and in Hollywood, and is best known for his portrayal of a blind man in the Peyton Place television series.

Since that time, however, Haynes has dedicated his life to Christ. He became interested in the Adventist church through watching the It Is Written telecast and reading E. G. White books. His wife, Valarie, began earnest Bible study and "read herself into the church." They were both baptized in 1968.

The ex-actor prayed for the Lord to use his talents elsewhere. Soon after, the Voice of Prophecy asked him to help develop materials for the Way Out program and produce 60-second radio spots for "rock" stations.

After co-hosting and co-producing "Heaven is in Your Mind," a religious radio program for teenagers on a major Los Angeles radio station, Haynes was invited by Loma Linda University to produce educational and documentary films. This inspired him to form a company called "Message Media" which produced several films in the past five years, many of them dealing with the University and health reform among the Navajo Indians.

As assistant director of programming, Haynes' responsibilities include assisting in the production of FFT episodes, choosing scripts and writers, casting, working with the budget and production schedule, and eventually writing scripts himself.

Currently Haynes is contacting Adventist medical centers for true stories and experiences for use in future Westbrook Hospital episodes.


VOP THANKS LAKE UNION FOR RECENT SUPPORT

Pacific People with a Problem

When you think of the South Pacific Islands, what picture comes to your mind? Tranquil, blue lagoons bathed in golden sunshine and ringed by gently waving palms with happy, smiling, island people singing in the foreground?

That is how many of the island groups look that comprise the Western Pacific Union Mission of the Seventhday Adventist church. However, to be honest, it is only part of the picture. The facts are that the people who inhabit most of the islands of the South West Pacific are people in great need, who desperately need the help of the Seventh-day Adventist church members around the world.

Most of the South Pacific Island countries are experiencing a period of rapid development. Because the church is largely responsible for the education of SDA youth in the South Pacific, these growing needs are placing a heavy strain upon the treasury of the Australasian Division.

The Division has selected projects within three of the local missions of the Western Pacific Union to benefit from the Thirteenth Sabbath Offering overflow on December 20, 1975. These projects are: Staff housing and student dormitories at both the Aore Adventist High School in the New Hebrides and the Kauma Adventist High School in the Gilbert Islands; a new medical facility to house the X-ray and pathology departments at the Aore Adventist Hospital; and provide an educational facility for the New Caledonia Mission.

All young people enjoy a picnic lunch once in a while particularly when the sun is shining and the day is pleasant. But every meal every day in all kinds of weather is eaten outdoors by students at the Kauma Adventist School at Abemama in the Gilbert

Islands. They have no dining hall. From the Thirteenth Sabbath overflow offering they plan to build a dining hall at this school which is so important for the training of Gilbert and Ellice Island youth.

Thatched huts and makeshift houses built from war-surplus materials salvaged at the close of World War II, have for more than twenty years served as staff housing at both the Kauma and Aore schools. The December 20 offering will provide funds for more permanent housing.

Both at Aore and Kauma the overcrowded dormitories were also erected from war-surplus and native materials. When the winds blow and the rains fall, the students have real problems in these decaying buildings. Private study and devotions become almost impossible under these cramped conditions.

The New Hebrides members are proud of the Aore Adventist Hospital, but are ashamed of the makeshift facilities that still house the X-ray and pathology departments. Patients come from far and wide to the Aore Adventist Hospital, very often passing other better equipped hospitals in order to come to a place with a reputation for Christian kindness, good nursing, and sound medical practice.

In New Caledonia the church leaders, parents, and children are very excited at the prospect of having their own denominational education facility for the first time. At Koumac they hope to build an Evangelistic-Educational Center which will, as funds become available, be expanded into a more comprehensive educational facility.

The Western Pacific Union Mission looks with confidence toward the world Sabbath School and the Lake Union members to provide these much needed facilities.

SANITARIUM AND HOSPITAL

PREPARED CHILDBIRTH CLASSES MODIFIED

Classes to help couples prepare for a new arrival in the family will be modified next year at the Hinsdale San in order to provide smaller classes and a more timely presentation of topics during pregnancy.

With the new plan prospective parents will come to the hospital for three evening programs at three-month intervals. Those electing a traditional parenthood preparation will meet with natural childbirth class members for the three general sessions. A special option for four sessions will be provided for those couples choosing the Lamaze approach to childbirth.

A major change in the format is the establishment of a first trimester class for women in their first three months of pregnancy and their husbands. This is the ideal time to discuss such aspects of pregnancy as nutrition, warning signs, and the effect of drugs and smoking on the unborn infant, according to Thomas W. Lant, R.N., director of nursing development.

Three months later the couple will return for a second trimester class to learn about fetal development, normal body changes during pregnancy, and body mechanics.

For the third and final trimester couples who have chosen the Lamaze option will attend four nightly sessions with in-depth instruction and practice of the breathing and relaxing exercises that are important in preparing for childbirth.

A fourth, optional postpartum class following the birth of the baby will offer instruction on layette, newborn care, breast and bottle feeding, physiology of the mother after childbirth, and other topics on the art of parenting.

Prenatal classes taught by the hospital have become so popular that something had to be done to reduce class size. "We had 74 couples enrolled in the November prenatal class," said Lant, "and that's too many for a good learning experience."

By combining subject matter common to both classes the hospital is able to offer one general sequence rather than two separate courses as in the past. With the changes the couples who want to take advantage of the classes should be able to be accommodated without any difficulty.

The new program will be operative for parents expecting a new baby in July 1976, or later.

He gave the audience his reactions during his struggle to obtain the victory over smoking. Through this exposure the whole city was alerted to the SDA community services program.

BROADVIEW ACADEMY IMPROVEMENT CAMPAIGN BEGINS

Broadview Academy began their annual campaign for school improvement Tuesday, October 28. 


Church school students Bryan Lawsen and Mark Johnson present a question-and-answer talk.

PAKISTANI STUDENT CONTINUES HER EDUCATION AT CLA

Audry Guy, a student at Cedar Lake Academy, is surprised at the weight of the winter clothing she will need during the next few months.

Audry, you see, is from Pakistan where the climate is generally warm and sultry. She is at the academy because Elder and Mrs. Neal Sherwin of Vassar brought her "home" with them when they returned to Michigan this past summer after spending 20 years as missionaries to Pakistan.

Elder Sherwin helped 17-year-old Audry to leave the country rather than be forced into marrying a man in his late 20's this December.

Sherwin's support in the move had been sought by Miss Guy's mother, a native of England, who wished her daughter to continue her education in the United States rather than remain in Pakistan and be forced into the marriage. Miss Guy's natural father is deceased.

It is customary in Pakistan for parents to arrange marriages of their daughters often at age 12 or 13. But this was not the wish of Miss Guy or her mother, both accustomed to English schooling requirements and ways of life.

Miss Guy, who has been enrolled as a student in English-speaking boarding schools since age 10, enrolled at the seminary at Chuharkana-Mandi, 35 miles from Lahore, four years ago.

The seminary has classes from fourth grade through college and Sherwin had been on the staff there for eight years.

She would have been a senior at the seminary this year, but is now enrolled along with the Sherwin's children, Linda and David, at Cedar Lake Academy. She enrolled as a junior to permit her to catch up on American history and other related courses not taught at the seminary in Pakistan.

Sherwin said that Miss Guy, who plans to extend her two-year student visa to pursue training to be a registered nurse, could have faced problems graduating from the Pakistani seminary in March.

Pakistani government rules require that all seniors, regardless of the school they have attended, be able to pass examinations given in the native Urdu language.

"Audry can speak Urdu but has difficulty writing the language," Pastor Sherwin said.

The young Pakistani, although raised a Christian, has been surprised at the freedom enjoyed by women and girls in the United States.

Her first surprise came when she went shopping and discovered female clerks. "Women aren't hired to work in any retail or other type of business firms in Pakistan," Sherwin explained.

Miss Guy also has adjusted quickly to the custom of not having to cover one's face here while walking in public and of being able to shop for items in a store without being trailed by a store employee.

Pastor Sherwin, who accepted his first mission assignment in 1955 at Rawalpindi after graduation from Andrews University, received a master's degree while on furlough in 1966. He was ordained in 1959 in Karachi, where he was pastor of a 150-member church and a 120-bed hospital. In 1966, he was sent to the academy in Chuharkana-Mandi, serving there until his return to Michigan this past summer.

FIVE-DAY PLAN TO STOP SMOKING HELD IN ONTONAGON

Houghton and Ironwood Church pastors, Jerry Jablonski and Phil Hopkins, united their efforts in holding a Five-Day Plan to Stop Smoking in the Ontonagon Holy Family Catholic Church, October 20 to 24.

The interesting feature of this Five-Day Plan was that neither pastor had to promote or make any arrangements for it to be held in Ontonagon. Several months before the October date, Mrs. Martha DeVoy, head of the Social Services Bureau for Ontonagon County in Michigan, called Pastor Hopkins, urgently requesting that the Five-Day Plan to Stop Smoking be given in the City of Ontonagon. Pastor Hopkins agreed to do this, if Mrs. DeVoy would work out the preliminary details of the plan. This included radio talk shows, advertising in the Ontonagon *Herald* and on the radio, placing posters in store windows, and providing for a post office box for the mail that came in from interests.

Ads ran in the local daily paper for three weeks, three each week, and the funds came from the interested businessmen of the Ontonagon community. One businessman has volunteered the necessary funds to assist in the Smoker's Alumni group, who will be encouraging people in the community to stop smoking and to help with the next Five-Day Plan.

Pastors Jablonski and Hopkins noted that the radio, newspaper, and handbills assisted in bringing persons to the smoking cessation clinic.

By lecture time Monday at 7 p.m., 42 persons were on hand to receive instruction which would give them the victory over the nicotine habit. Many teachers and persons from the medical profession, along with a good cross section of the community were there. One man who had been smoking for 52 years, gave up the habit by the end of the therapy.

At the last report from this group, 29 of the 42 have

quit the nicotine habit. One of these persons, a dentist, has volunteered to help with the next smoking cessation clinic to be held in Ontonagon in another year. From one of the parishoners has come a request for an informal Bible study group. This lady has taken four Bible correspondence courses from Faith for Today and the Voice of Prophecy.

Lake Union members are asked to pray that organized work can begin soon in this area. This is one of the dark counties in Michigan.

Pastor Jablonski will be holding a Five-Day Plan to Stop Smoking in the Houghton-Calumet area, December 14 to 18. Pastor Hopkins has been asked to have the plan in Mercer, Wisconsin, 25 miles south of Ironwood, and one at Bruce Crossings, on M-28 about 40 miles east of Ironwood. The public is interested in better health, and we as a church have the tools to help them. Pray that much interest can be aroused that people will come to Jesus through this activity.

MEMBER MAKES SIGN FOR CHURCH



BOOK OF READINGS ON SDA HISTORY PUBLISHED

A new, cloak-room view of denominational history is now available in a book compiled and edited in life-as-we-lived-it style by Emmett K. Vande Vere, history professor emeritus at Andrews University.

Vande Vere's own comments are brief. Well-known denominational leaders and lesser-known observers tell the story themselves, complete with the table-pounding committee discussion, humorous asides, tears, and joys that went into the development of Adventism from the Millerites to 1922.

The readings are arranged to provide a coherent overview of denominational history and yet provide a spicy, up-close perspective impossible in analytical histories, Vande Vere said.

Each chapter concludes with a selected bibliography or suggested further reading.

FETZER DONATES VINTAGE RADIO EQUIPMENT TO WAUS

John Fetzer, owner of WKZO, Kalamazoo, Michigan, has given a 1918 Marconi wireless receiver to WAUS, the FM station of Andrews University.

Wayne Woodhams, WAUS manager, declined to estimate the value of the receiver, saying only, "It's priceless." It was made by the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company of America and bears a serial number of 44. The receiver is being displayed near the WAUS John Fetzer Studio.

Fetzer, one-time manager of WEMC, the predecessor of WAUS, also gave 12 pieces of equipment once used by WEMC. In 1930, Emmanuel Missionary College (former name of A.U.), sold the station to Fetzer.

He changed the letters to WKZO and moved the station to Kalamazoo, where it has been ever since.

ART EXHIBIT IN SOUTH BEND

An exhibit of paintings by Greg Constantine, chairman of the art department at Andrews University, started Sunday, November 30, and will run through December 28, in the main gallery of the South Bend Art Center, 122 North Lafayette.

His paintings, called "TV Images," are made up of solid bars of separate colors that form images of prominent TV scenes and characters in much the same way actual TV images are formed.

The paintings have been exhibited in over a dozen places in the U.S. and Canada.

Constantine is represented by the Gilman Gallery in Chicago and the James Yu Gallery in New York City.

NEW APARTMENT COMPLEX AT A.U.

According to V. E. Garber, A.U. vice president for financial affairs, the complex will help remedy a shortage of housing for married students, graduate and undergraduate.

The complex will be furnished, carpeted, and airconditioned.

STUDENT TEACHERS ASSIGNED TO AREA SCHOOLS

Twenty-five Andrews University education students are student teachers for the autumn quarter at elementary and secondary schools in Berrien Springs, Benton Harbor, St. Joseph, Stevensville, Edwardsburg, Niles, and New Buffalo.

Nine students are doing their student teaching outside the local area in Chicago; Elgin, Illinois; Hinsdale, Illinois; LaFox, Illinois; Holly, Michigan; Detroit, Michigan; Cedar Lake, Michigan; Cicero, Indiana; and Oshawa, Ontario, Canada.

A.U. AIRPORT BUYS TWIN-ENGINE PLANE; OFFERS NEW RATING

The Andrews University airport has bought a twinengine aircraft to be used as a trainer for the multiengine rating.

A.U. purchased the plane, a 1955 Piper Apache, for \$12,000. It has a seating capacity of four, a range of 650 miles, and a top speed of 150 m.p.h. Andy Moore, airport manager, says the plane is in excellent condition and should serve the flight program indefinitely.

A comparable new plane, he said, would have cost \$90,000.

The Piper Apache will permit direct flights to Chicago over Lake Michigan, a route illegal for all single-engine aircraft, Moore said.

The multi-engine rating now possible with the Piper is the seventh rating now offered in A.U.'s flight program. Others are private pilot's license, commercial pilot's license, instrument pilot's license, instructor rating, instrument instructor rating, and air transport rating.

The Piper brings A.U.'s air fleet to ten planes. Twenty-four private planes are also based at the airport.
