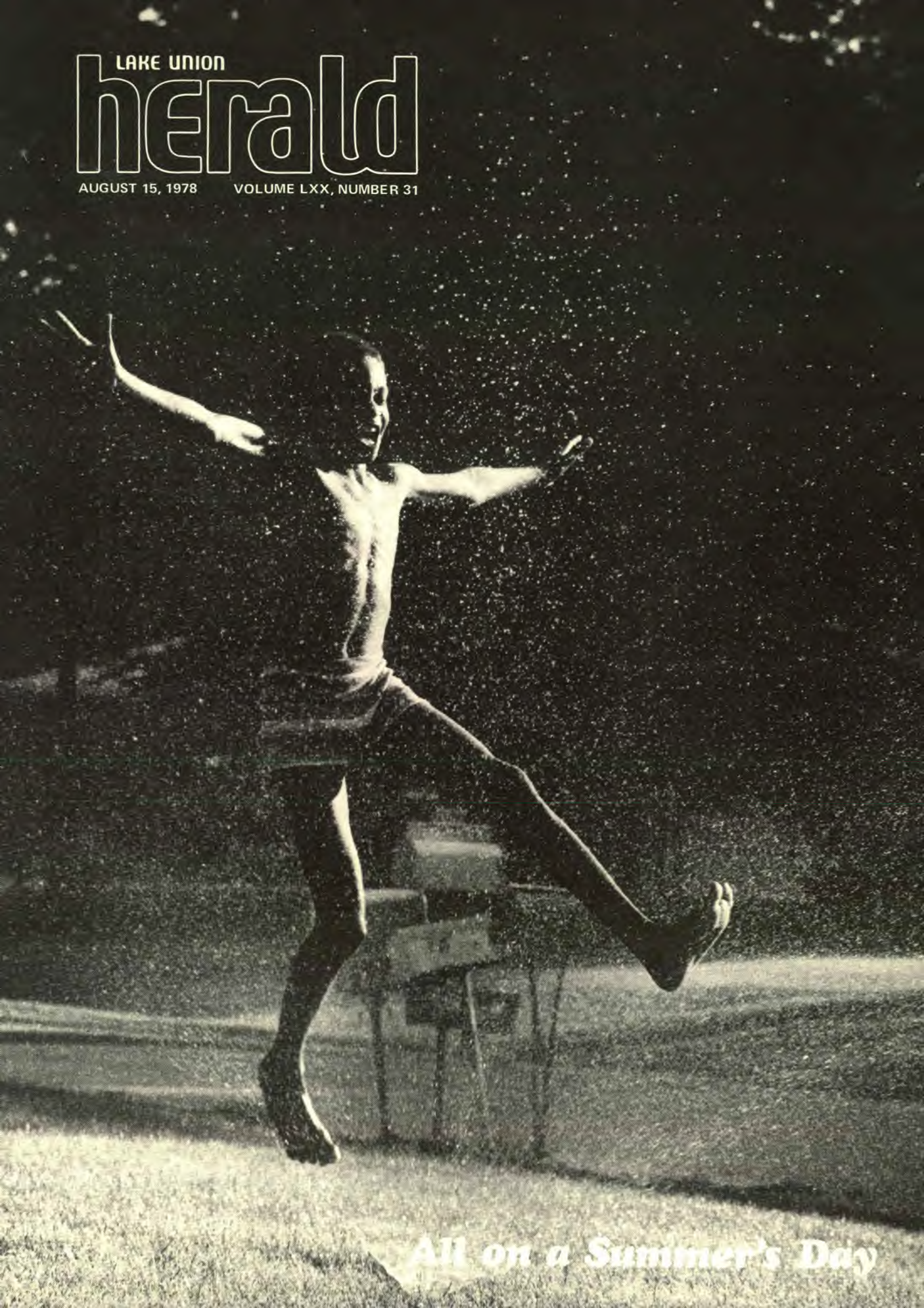


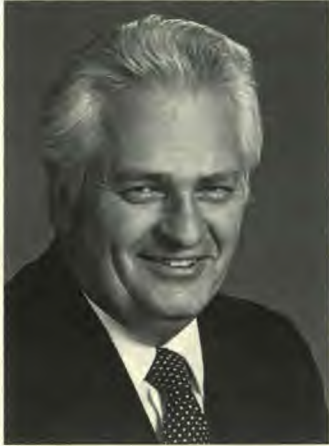

A Chain of Witnesses

One of the joys of camp meeting is the reunion of old friends. One morning during the literature evangelists hour at this year's camp meeting, I listened to a story that has been unfolding for several years.

Elder Bill Bloom, who returned to the Michigan Conference last year to join the ministerial department as director of personal evangelism, had gathered several people together to tell the following story.

Bill's first contact with Seventh-day Adventists was with a layman at Post Cereals in Battle Creek some years ago. Charles Whipple, now deceased, had many conversations with Bill at work and gave him several small books to read. After reading this material and the Bible, Bill surrendered his life to Christ. However, instead of joining the Adventist Church, Bill and his wife joined another church and were very active members. Five years passed.

At this point Elder C. W. Pomeroy took up the story. He was a literature evangelist at the time. He visited Bill's home and sold the Bloom family some children's books.

Later another literature evangelist, Orville Grimes, visited Bill and invited him to attend a week of revival meetings being presented by Elder H.M.S. Richards at the Battle Creek Tabernacle. Bill could not get interested and only attended two meetings. After the meetings Mr. Grimes gave Elder Richards' book entitled, *What Jesus Said*, to Bill.

The book was illuminating for Bill, but also raised many questions. A few days after he had finished the book he became very distressed. He called the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

I was in my study the day Bill called, and we made an appointment to talk. A series of Bible studies ensued, and later I had the privilege of baptizing Bill and his wife, Dorothy.

But the story wasn't finished yet.

The next person to be introduced was Verlyn Ruger, an Adventist businessman from Battle Creek. He had been a member of the youth group in Bill's former church, and was the first of many people who have become Seventh-day Adventists through Bill's work.

Then Elder Kenneth Wenburg spoke. He had started Bill out as a literature evangelist.

Catherine Hartman of Saline, Michigan, continued the story. Bill visited her home and sold some books to her. As a result of further visits and Bible studies she became an Adventist. Her daughter Jane is the youngest link in the chain of individuals who have accepted God's truth.

Elder Bloom is now doing an outstanding work in the Michigan Conference serving as director of personal evangelism. He is working closely with the pastors, training our lay members how to witness and give Bible studies. He has already trained many people who are now leading other people to accept Jesus as their Savior.

Just think: It all started with the witness of a faithful layman working in a factory in Battle Creek, Michigan. May God give us many more laymen who will be willing to be used by Him to finish the work.

A Book Changed Their Lives

To Mike and Tanya Haney religion had little meaning. True, they had grown up in nominal Christian homes, but Christ just wasn't a part of their lives.

Then tragedy struck. A fire broke out while Mike was at work. Tanya and their little girl, Alexandra, were badly burned.

Rushing to their hospital beds, Mike prayed, "Oh Lord, if you will heal my wife and daughter, we will bring up our daughter in a Christian home." Miraculously healed, today they show no scars.

After that crisis Mike and Tanya thought more about religion, but didn't do too much about it. They did begin watching some of the religious television programs on Sunday, but still didn't attend any church.

About a year after the accident, while visiting Tanya's parents in Alabama, another incident occurred which changed their lives.

When searching for a book to read, Mike found one that captured his interest. It was entitled *Daniel and the Revelation*, by Uriah Smith.

"It certainly wasn't the cover which impressed me," says Mike. "It was probably the most drab book there."

However, he began reading and by early evening when the rest of the family returned after being gone all day, he had read almost the entire book.

After supper Mike went off by himself and prayed that the Lord would impress him if what he had read was true. There was so much that he had learned, yet he didn't share anything with anyone, not even Tanya.

Early Sunday morning Mike finished the book. By noon they were on their way home to Atlanta, Georgia. "During those two hours I began to tell Tanya what had happened. She was very open and listened."

They decided they would begin looking for a church which believed many of the things in the book. One thing stood out in their minds. The true church must worship on Saturday.

Once home they began looking in the yellow pages for churches to see when they held their services. There were several S.D.A. churches listed in the metropolitan area of Atlanta, and the Belvedere Church in Decatur, Georgia, was only 15 minutes away. The next Sabbath they went to church in Decatur.

"We felt right at home that first Sabbath," says Tanya. One of the first people they met was Rowena Bowman, a lay Bible worker. Every week for two months Mrs. Bowman studied with them.

After two months of study the Haney's were ready to be baptized. "The Lord led us all the way," says Mike.

During the time they were studying, Mike knew the Sabbath was going to be a problem. His employers were very understanding and let him take Sabbaths off while he was studying. However, shortly after his baptism, he knew he would have to do something.

One Sabbath Mike and Tanya decided that whatever his employer proposed on Monday morning they would accept. Early on Monday, Mike's employer called him into the office. He stated that a problem over Sabbath might soon develop, and so he wanted Mike to direct the company's Chicago division.

"I want you to think and talk this over with your wife," he said. "I know it is a big move."

"That won't be necessary," said Mike "We've already discussed it. We'll go."

Completely baffled, Mike explained to his employer that he and his wife had asked the Lord to guide them and they had promised that whatever they were told to do on Monday they would do.

The Haney's did move. There has been more of the Lord's direction in their lives since they came to the Chicago area. Now members of the Elmhurst, Illinois, Church, they realize that God had a hand in their lives all along.



Me?

Obey Him?

DON: "Women's Lib or Adam's Rib?" We saw that title on an evangelistic handbill recently, and we decided that it really expresses the question that a lot of perplexed people are pondering: Who rules the roost in a

Christian home—does he or does she?

RUTHIE: It doesn't really answer the question to say, "Neither—God rules in a Christian Home." Of course that's true, but God seldom speaks audibly to families today, and has chosen rather to communicate His will through individuals.

DON: But what happens when the two primary individuals disagree? Who breaks the tie? Who casts the deciding vote? Who decides?

RUTHIE: If we were to take a poll of American women—and men—on that question, we'd get all kinds of

answers. Some see the new women's role as independent and self-assertive. Others see her as ideally submissive. Many are not sure.

Think through this situation carefully with us:

Glen has been under-treasurer for the Midwestern branch of a large corporation for about six years. A few weeks ago he was approached by the administration and told that he was being considered for a transfer to a West-Coast branch. The change meant a move up in the company and a welcome raise.

Don and Ruth Jacobsen are professors at Andrews University. They also conduct marriage enrichment seminars every other month.

When he brought up the subject with his wife, Marjory, she was at first surprised, then adamant. She had a good job, was happy in the Midwest, and definitely did not want to move.

Now read through the following seven statements. On the basis of the information that you have, write Agree or Disagree in front of each one. Then compare your answers with ours.

(Incidentally, after we put this exercise together we wrote out our answers separately and then compared them. We discovered that although we worded our reasons a bit differently in some cases, all of our Agree/Disagree choices were the same. You may wish to try it that way with your spouse.)

- _____ 1. They should negotiate and try to work out a compromise.
- _____ 2. Marjory should give in and express complete willingness to go where Glen decides.
- _____ 3. They should make a conditional move—agree to try it—and if they're not both satisfied, move back.
- _____ 4. Glen should give up the idea of a move since Marjory's happiness is more important than his job.
- _____ 5. If nothing else works Glen should exercise his authority and insist that the family move.
- _____ 6. They should postpone the move until both are in agreement.
- _____ 7. They should seek counsel from their parents and act on their advice.

Here is how we responded—and why:

1. Disagree. Although there is merit in considering both opinions, a compromise in this case could mean that both would be dissatisfied. We think their decision ought to be made for the right reasons and not simply because they are able to pacify each other.

2. Agree. Except we don't like the term "give in." If Marjory were completely willing to adapt to her husband's wishes she could realize fulfillment and great joy in helping him succeed. We see her attitude as ideally one that says, Where he goes, I gladly go.

3. Disagree. Impractical.

4. Disagree. Marjory's happiness is certainly a prime concern of Glen's,

but she should be finding her maximum happiness in him, not in her job. But how about the reverse—Glen's happiness ought to be bound up in Marjory, not in his job? This certainly ought to be true—it should be Glen's desire to provide more adequately for his family's happiness that should lead him, with the guidance of God, to make the move.

5. Agree in principle, although we don't like the word "insist." Maybe a better way to phrase this would be, "Glen should attempt to show Marjory the studied wisdom in the move. He should seek her counsel and understand her needs. He should take the initiative in honestly searching to discover God's will for his family. If there is not complete agreement we understand the Bible principle to be that he casts the deciding vote." (See Genesis 3:16 and Ephesians 5:21-24.)

6. Probably disagree. The opportunity to move may not be open six months or a year from now; the decision no doubt needs to be made immediately.

7. Agree with the first part, disagree with the second part. The fact that Glen and Marjory have established their own family does not mean that they are beyond seeking counsel from their parents, or from others. However, after seeking advice they need to make the final decision themselves. If at this age they must go

to their parents to break the tie, they are too young to be married. (See Genesis 2:24.)

The purpose of this exercise is to demonstrate that we cannot rely on our own hunches or the cultural climate around us for making important decisions. We would like to suggest that if you wish to pursue the subject of submission more deeply you might wish to spend some time thoughtfully considering the following passages of Scripture:

1 Peter 3:1-6

Ephesians 5:21-33

Here is an interesting statement that we found recently which well summarizes our understanding of the subject of submission:

"The husband is the head of the family, as Christ is the head of the church, and any course which the wife may pursue to lessen his influence and lead him to come down from the dignified, responsible position God would have him occupy, displeases God. It is the duty of the wife to yield her wishes and will to her husband. Both should be yielding, but preference is given in the word of God to the judgment of the husband. And it will not detract from the dignity of the wife to yield to him whom she has chosen to be her counselor, advisor, and protector."—The Review and Herald, April 22, 1862.

ELECTRON MICROSCOPE PURCHASED

A scanning electron microscope (S.E.M.), which provides three-dimensional viewing on relatively small surfaces, has been purchased by Andrews University for the science departments.

Dr. Asa C. Thoresen, chairman of the biology department, said there are several fields other than biology that are finding the S.E.M. extremely valuable.

For example, histologists are now able to see tissues as they never could before, and archeologists are able to examine and photograph specimens in great detail.

Accessories can be added that make it possible to analyze chemical compositions, and the S.E.M. is even useful in metallurgical work.

Light microscopes are capable of magnifying specimens only about 2,000 times. According to Dr. Thoresen, the largest magnification possible with Andrews' light microscopes is about 1,000 times. With the S.E.M. it will be possible to magnify material up to 600,000 times.

Dr. Thoresen emphasized the importance of having modern equipment in the department.

"The students need to use the tools that are being used today," he said. "The S.E.M. will even be used by freshmen in their basic courses. This is the type of equipment they will be using when they leave Andrews and they need to become familiar with it."

Electron microscopes use electron beams rather than light beams for illumination.

ANDREWS GRADUATES LARGEST CLASS EVER

Andrews University graduated 240 students at commencement ceremonies in the Pioneer Memorial Church, Sunday, August 6, to complete the largest graduating class in the university's history. A total of 676 persons graduated in the class of 1978.

The College of Arts and Sciences and College of Technology together

had 99 graduates at the summer commencement, while 141 graduated from the School of Graduate Studies and the Theological Seminary.

Dr. Jacques Doukhan of France became the first graduate of the seminary's doctor of theology program since its beginning in 1974. Dr. Doukhan, who already held a *docteur es lettres hebraique* degree from the University of Strasbourg, will rejoin the faculty of the French Adventist Seminary in Collonges.

Dr. Donald R. McAdams, president of Southwestern Adventist College, presented the commencement address, "Reason, the Gift of God." Dr. McAdams spent several years on the

history and political science faculty at Andrews before assuming the presidency of S.A.C.

Honorary doctoral degrees were presented to Herbert Blomstedt, prominent European orchestra leader, and Harold Clark, a naturalist and prolific botanical writer.

Mr. Blomstedt, who was awarded a Doctor of Music degree, is presently conductor-in-chief of the Swedish Radio Symphony in Stockholm.

Mr. Clark is noted for his development of the Ecological Zonation Theory and his advocacy of creationism. He was given a Doctor of Science degree.

'FAITH AND LEARNING' COURSES BEGUN

A series of three interdisciplinary courses on the integration of Christian faith and learning has been developed and will be offered in the fall by Andrews' School of Graduate Studies, according to Dr. George H. Akers, director of the Doctor of Education program.

"All four of the university's schools have been routinely reviewing their program in terms of the spiritual mission of the university," said Dr. Akers, "and the graduate faculty felt that a final course designed to help the advanced student 'get it all together' in his or her area of special interest in a

unified Christian context would provide a crucial culminating experience in our curriculum."

Each of the courses carried four credits.

Christian Faith and the Sciences will consider the relationship between the church and science, scientific model building and the ethical considerations of scientific experimentation.

The course, to be team-taught by Drs. S. Clark Rowland, John F. Stout and Robert A. Wilkins, is recommended for all graduate students in the sciences.

Christian Faith and the Humanities offers an examination of the Christian's world view as it pertains to the humanities, and seeks to determine how the humanities contribute to an understanding of man as a creative being.

Study is given to the questions raised by such disciplines as art, history, literature and music. Drs. Delmer I. Davis, Fritz Guy and Gary G. Land will teach the course.

Drs. Rudolf E. Klimes, Marion Merchant and S. Douglas Waterhouse will conduct Christian Faith and the Social Sciences, a study of sociology, psychology, anthropology, communication, education, business, home economics and physical education as they relate to the Christian faith.

CHANGES IN BROADCAST CLASS CAUSE ENROLLMENT INCREASE

A 400 percent increase in enrollment followed the change of the name and format of a class for pastors and evangelists at Andrews' Theological Seminary.

Broadcast Evangelism stresses the holistic approach to evangelism, according to Dr. James D. Chase, who begins his fourth year of teaching the class this fall.

The holistic approach comes from the Bible definition of evangelism, which includes seed-sowing, watering and reaping, says Dr. Chase. An overall local church evangelism strategy is stressed with broadcasting being the seed-sowing part of the strategy.

The class analyzes previous evangelism strategies and evaluates tape recordings of broadcasts. Class lectures, small group discussions and individual labs at Andrews' radio station, WAUS, are included in the course.

Broadcast evangelism encourages the use of radio "spots," 60-second announcements, rather than long religious programs.

"Many people don't tune in religious programs," says Dr. Chase. "That's why spots are so valuable. They go where the listeners are."

Dr. Chase attributes the increase in enrollment—from about a dozen students per quarter to 41 students this summer—to three things: the practicality of the course, the change of the course name (from Religious Broadcasting to Broadcast Evangelism), and the fact that it is now worth four credits rather than three.

Dr. Chase says the name of the course was changed because Religious Broadcasting was merely a descriptive title, while Broadcast Evangelism implies involvement.

In addition to teaching at Andrews, Dr. Chase is currently producing a series of public-service radio spots announcing the availability of Life and Health magazine at newsstands in the near future. The spots will soon be heard on radio stations across the United States.

SHE'S ATTENDED CAMP MEETING FOR 63 YEARS

Bertha Shafer was born in Wells County, Indiana, February 6, 1896. She attended her first camp meeting in

1915 at the age of 19. Today, 63 years later, she is still a zestful camp-meeting attendee.

Formerly a Methodist, Mrs. Shafer became an Adventist when she was 16.

She has lived on a farm in Roanoke, Indiana, since 1935. She attends the Hungtinton, Indiana, Church.

Since joining the church, she has been a tireless worker. She has been a teacher in every class of the Sabbath School, deaconess, Sabbath School superintendent, and an avid distributor of Adventist books and literature. She has given countless Bible studies.

It would be difficult to estimate the number of people whom Bertha has influenced to become Christians. She says, "If I can keep people full of courage and keep them going, I am serving the Lord to the best of my ability."

She has always worked hard at Ingathering—last fall she raised \$130.

Bertha is also a gardener, and she can keep up with anyone who attempts to work with her for a full day—with no backache.

At camp meeting this year she got up at 5:45 A.M. to walk four times around the quarter-mile track.

L.L.U. HEART TEAM IN SAUDI ARABIA

Loma Linda University's Overseas Heart Surgery Team began a continuing program of open-heart surgery in Saudi Arabia in June, according to team co-directors Dr. Joan Coggin, associate dean for international programs in the School of Medicine, and Dr. Ellsworth E. Wareham, professor of surgery.

Drs. Coggin and Wareham, with a group of 11 physicians, nurses, and other support personnel, joined their Arabian counterparts at a Saudi Arabian Ministry of Defense and Aviation hospital in Khamis Mushayt, located in the southern part of the kingdom.

The heart team returned to Loma Linda in April from their third trip to Saudi Arabia. During their eight-week stay the heart team successfully performed 50 heart surgeries without a serious complication or fatality. The heart team performed a similar feat last year when they operated on 51 patients without a fatality.

The team has a contract with the Saudi Arabian Ministry of Defense and Aviation to develop an open-heart surgery program in Saudi Arabia, and in addition has trained eight military personnel in the various paramedical fields relating to open-heart surgery.

1985 WORLD CONFERENCE IN NEW ORLEANS

Church officials have announced that the 1985 General Conference session will meet in the New Orleans Superdome from June 27 to July 6 of that year. This highest decision-making body in the Adventist church meets every five years, with the upcoming session slated for 1980 in Dallas, Texas. Rudolph Reinhard, secretary of the physical arrangements committee of the General Conference, said the superdome sessions will draw 25,000 to 30,000 visitors during the two weekends of the session in New Orleans.
